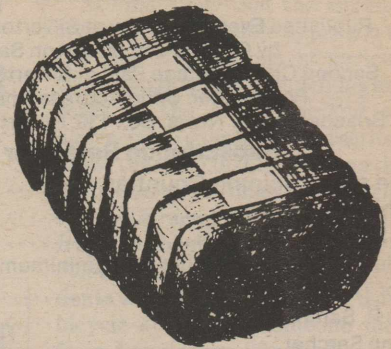
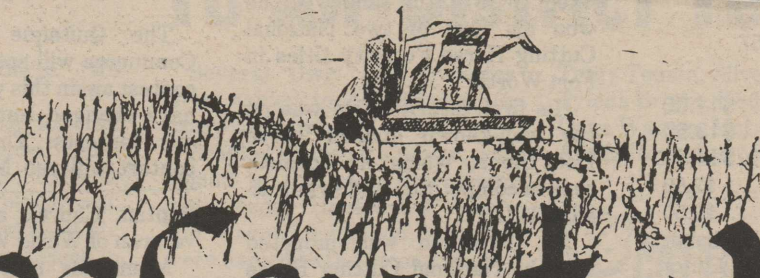

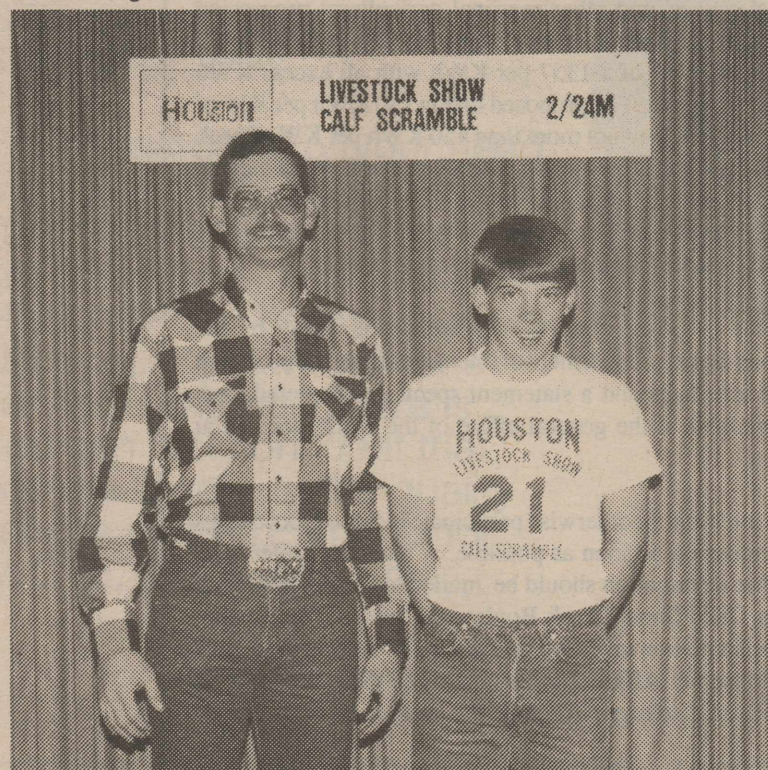

**J. M. [SHORTY] FREEMAN**

J. M. (Shorty) Freeman of Era, a former National Cutting Horse World Champion, died recently at his home at the age of 64. He was the son of Mae and Floyd Freeman. His father passed away in 1954 and his mother

passed away in 1985. Mae Freeman was the sister of Ott and Bud Perkins and Stella Hall.

Memorial services were conducted at the Shorty Freeman Oak Valley Ranch at Era. George J. Carroll & Son Funeral Home in Gainesville was in charge of arrangements.

Zack T. Wood, executive director of the National Cutting Horse Association, said Freeman was one of the sport's legends.

"Shorty was one of the greatest cutting horse men that we've ever had," Wood said. "I view him very highly as a man who gave a lot to this association."

Mr. Freeman was born in Silverton and grew up on the large ranches in West Texas. He

was well-known nationally as a horseman.

He won National Cutting Horse world championships in 1963 on Hoppen and atop King Skeet in 1970, the same year he won his first of two National Cutting Horse Futurity titles in Fort Worth.

His first futurity title was on the well-known quarter horse Doc Olena, which he trained, rode in competition and syndicated in 1978.

Mr. Freeman was inducted into the National Cutting Horse Association Hall of Fame in 1988 and the Riders Hall of Fame in 1990. A pencil drawing of Freeman's face appears on the sport's poster titled "Legends."

Mr. Freeman operated a cutting horse ranch in Scottsdale, Arizona, for a number of years before moving to Cooke County in 1981, where he operated the Oak Valley Ranch in Era.

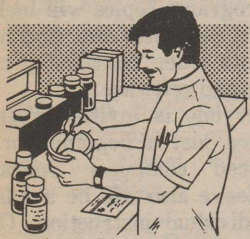
**NOTICE OF REQUEST TO CHANGE AGRICULTURAL PROCESSING RATE**

Notice is hereby given that LIGHTHOUSE ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE, INC. (the utility) intends to reduce the agricultural processing rate available to cotton gins, grain elevators, and other seasonal agricultural processing services. The existing rate contains an energy charge for the first 450 KWh per KW of peak billing demand of \$.1357 per KWh with all excess KWh billed at the rate of \$.03 per KWh. The proposed rate is 150 KWh per KW of peak billing demand per month, but not more than 450 KWh per KW of peak billing demand per season at \$.1357 per KWh with all excess KWh at the rate of \$.03 per KWh. Based upon billing units in the 12 month period ended December 31, 1989, the proposed rates reduce revenues to the utility by approximately \$50,000 or 0.45% of total operating revenues.

Implementation of the proposed changes is subject to approval by the appropriate regulatory authority. A statement of intent including the proposed revisions of tariff and schedules and a statement specifying in detail each proposed change is available at the general office of the Utility located at Floydada, Texas.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. 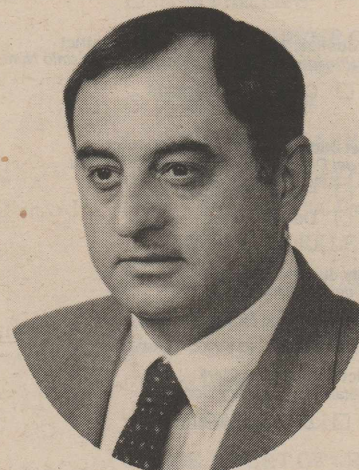

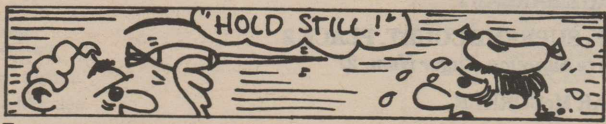
Business Math; Teddy Hubbard placed first in Information Processing, and Rob Weaks placed third and Langdon Reagan placed fourth in Business Law.

**Youths Successful In Houston Calf Scramble**

When the flag dropped at the February 24 matinee performance of the 1990 Livestock Show and Rodeo, the scramble was on, as 28 4-H members and 14 unruly calves covered the 2.75 acre Astrodome arena with excitement.

Josh Brooks won an \$800 calf certificate by catching and haltering and maneuvering one of the elusive calves into the winner's circle. The certificate, sponsored by Bill and Beverly Victor, will enable the youngster to purchase a registered beef or dairy heifer.

Langdon Reagan also won an \$800 calf certificate by catching and taking a calf into the winner's circle. His certificate was sponsored by HSA/Astrodomain.

During the next year, Langdon and Josh will raise their calves under the supervision of their County Extension Agent. They will send monthly progress reports to the calf certificate sponsor and to the show. Also required are accurate monetary records, a journal including photographs and a 500-word essay covering the year's experiences.

The culmination of the year-long project will be when Langdon and Josh return to Houston to show their heifers in a special competition during the 1991 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

"Those students fortunate enough to receive one of these certificates should seize the opportunity and make the most of it," said John Smallwood, chairman of the all-volunteer Calf Scramble Committee. "Maximum effort is required—effort that just starts in the rodeo arena," he added.

The calf scramble program awards 302 calf certificates each year. Since the first scramble was held in 1942, more than 11,000 calves have been purchased at a price of more than \$2 million.

Net proceeds from the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo fund scholarships for more than 1,000 students in Texas colleges and universities. Money also is provided for agricultural research projects at the college level.

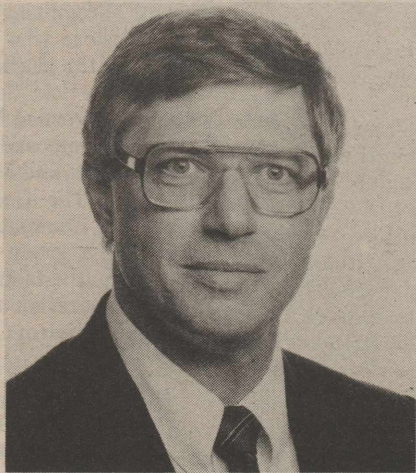
