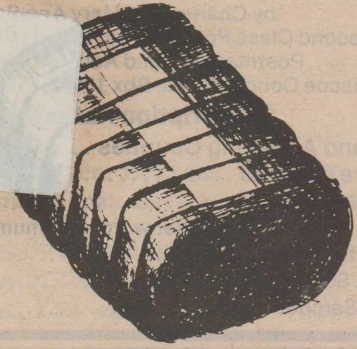

## Homecoming Letters Going Out To Exes Soon

Members of the committee which is planning this year's Silverton School Homecoming have prepared letters and are in the process of locating class representatives to send them out to the classes.

The reunion will be held Saturday, August 11, at the school, with registration beginning at 9:00 a.m. in the cafeteria

entrance hall.

There will be a registration fee of \$1.00 assessed each person.

A brunch will be held in the cafeteria from 10:00 until 11:30 a.m., at a charge of \$4.50 per person. The meal is being catered.

The homecoming program will begin at 12:00 noon in the school auditorium. Dean McWilliams,

senior vice president of Cedar Chemical Corporation of Memphis, Tennessee, will be the speaker. He is a 1951 graduate of Silverton High School.

Classes being honored are those of 1939 and 1940.

There will be a traveling prize awarded to the class with the largest attendance. This will be a traveling prize to be passed on to the next recipients. Anyone who attended the Silverton Schools is eligible to be counted with their class even if they did not graduate from SHS.

Former students and teachers of SHS are asked to bring or send a brief update on themselves, including name, plus maiden name where applicable, address, occupation, number of children, class year, and when you attended or taught in the Silverton Schools.

The homecoming will be held in conjunction with the annual Briscoe County Birthday Celebration which begins Wednesday evening, August 8, with the County Roping at Wood Memorial Arena. Anyone who has ever been a resident of Briscoe County is eligible to enter.

The finals of the County Roping are combined with a Junior Fun Night on Thursday evening, August 9.

A rodeo and western dance will be featured Friday evening, August 10. The rodeo is at Wood Memorial Arena and the dance will be at the county showbarn which has been remodeled during the past year.

The celebration continues Saturday afternoon, August 11, after the homecoming activities. Tricycle races will be held just before a western parade winds its way through downtown Silverton. A barbecue will be served on the courthouse square late that afternoon, and there will be another performance of the rodeo and another dance that night.

## Incumbents Re-Elected By City, School Voters

All the incumbents were re-elected to office in last Saturday's local elections.

In the Silverton Independent School District trustee election, Tommy Burson received 156 votes, Dewey Estes got 150 and

challenger John Wyatt polled 107, with the top two being re-elected for full terms.

Barry Francis defeated Rhenda Burson, 150-60, for election to fill the unexpired term of Jimmy Burson, who resigned following his appointment as Briscoe County Judge.

City Councilmen F. E. Hutsell, Dwain Henderson and Jim Estes were re-elected. Hutsell polled 114, Henderson, 113, and Estes, 92. Challenger Ned Vance Childress received 70 votes.

Write-in votes were received for Wayne Nance, four; Alan Grimland, Ted Kingery and David Johnston, one vote each.

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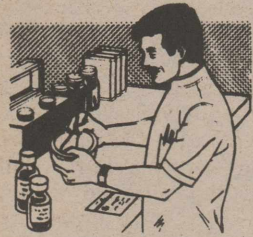

## Cotton Briefs

Cotton's Share of Market Reaches 50%...


In 1989, cotton's share of the apparel and home fabrics market, excluding carpet, reached a 15-year high of 50.2 percent, outselling all other fibers combined. This gain in market share reflects a 16 percentage point increase from 1975 to 1989.

J. Berry Worsham, director of fiber and economic analysis for Cotton Incorporated, says this 16-point gain since 1975 sharply contrasts cotton's situation in the 1960s and early 1970s.


"From 1960 to 1975, cotton's share of all fiber declined 25 percentage points. Much of cotton's dramatic recovery relates directly to increased consumer demand for cotton merchandise, fueled by Cotton Incorporated's aggressive research and promotion programs."

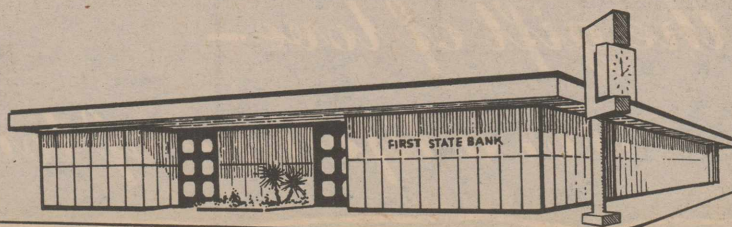

This hearing will be held pursuant to Sections 52.051-52.054 of the Texas Water Code to receive public comment on the proposed designation by the Water Commission of the Briscoe, Hale, and Swisher County Critical Area in 31 Texas Administrative Code Chapter 294.

The purpose of this critical area designation is to assure the availability of a clean and adequate supply of underground water, and to assure that local areas will determine the best methods for handling underground water problems either through the creation of underground water conservation districts or other means. If the Commission designates this area as a critical area, it may call a hearing to consider whether a district should be created over all or part of the critical area, or whether all or part of the land in the critical area should be added to an existing district. Creation of the district would be pursuant to an election within the boundaries of the proposed district.

Although life is not a game, we must have the help and strength of the Church to discover those rules that will determine our ultimate destiny.



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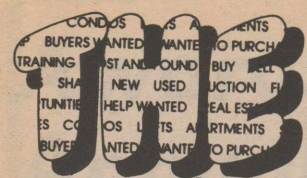
