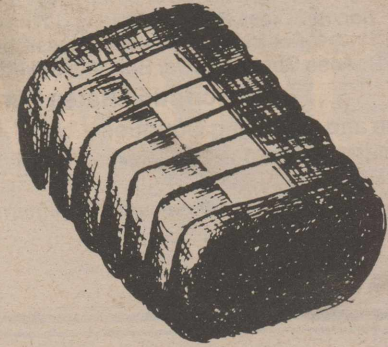

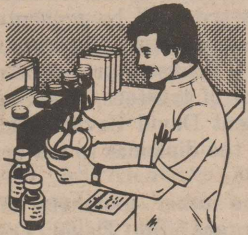

He was a senior student at Tarleton State University in Stephenville, where he was a class officer and member of the Student Senate. He was an honor student, president of the Young Republican Party, and a member of Kappa Delta Rho Fraternity.

He was a member of the First Baptist Church in Quitaque, and was active in the church youth group his junior and senior years in high school.

Loading all their possessions in a 1936 Willis car, they moved to California for a year. They moved back to Briscoe County in 1938 and began farming eight miles southwest of Silverton, where they resided until moving to Silverton a few years ago following their retirement from farming.

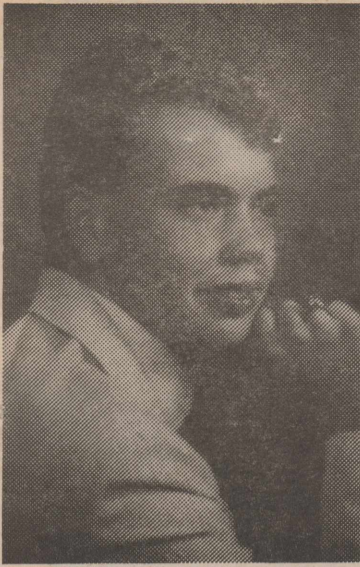
BIG stories. That's the nice way of putting it. Most of us like to say she LIED! and quite often! Julie and Wayne would have made a pretty good pair back then.

# Coalition Could Destroy Best Program for American Consumers

A coalition in Congress purporting to save money by changing farm policy would actually destroy a program that has produced for American consumers the most abundant, lowest cost and safest food supply in the world, according to S. M. True, president of the Texas Farm Bureau.

Congress is now considering farm policy to succeed the farm act that expires at the end of this year.

"The coalition, led by Texas Congressman Dick Arme (R), and an unusual cast of Northeastern members of Congress includ-

ing Rep. Barney Frank (D-Mass); Rep. Charles Schumer (D-NY), and Rep. Claudine Schneider (D-RI), has no idea of what it takes to bring safe, plentiful food to the table," True said.

The Texas farm leader said the group has targeted programs for peanuts, wool and mohair, dairy and sugar in their quest to "create havoc" in the agricultural economy.

"This is a strange strategy because wool and mohair price support comes from tariff revenues while peanut and sugar prices are supported primarily by quotas, rather than general revenue money.

"The present farm program, most of which we hope will be continued for another five years, has stabilized income for farmers and has helped us expand exports, which has benefitted all Americans," the Plainview cotton, grain and beef producer said.

True pointed out that the cost of food to the average American family, now at 10.4 percent of disposable income, is the lowest in the world. He added that one American farmer or rancher now supplies food and fiber for 114 people, here and abroad.

"The incentives in the farm program have, in effect, guaranteed a low-cost supply of food and natural fibers for the American consumers," he said.

The Texas Farm Bureau president said the 1985 farm bill is responsible for helping make agriculture a vital part of the national economy.

"We have come through one of the most destructive farm depressions in history, and most farmers are just now getting on their feet—thanks in large part to the present farm program.

"A continuation of this kind of farm program for another five years is necessary as agriculture makes a transition to a market-oriented economy.

"Farm program costs have come down dramatically since the present farm program was enacted in 1985.

"The anti-farmer amendments, if adopted, would disrupt the most efficient farm-to-table food system in the world. We will count on the more knowledgeable members of Congress as well as an understanding public to prevent this," True said.

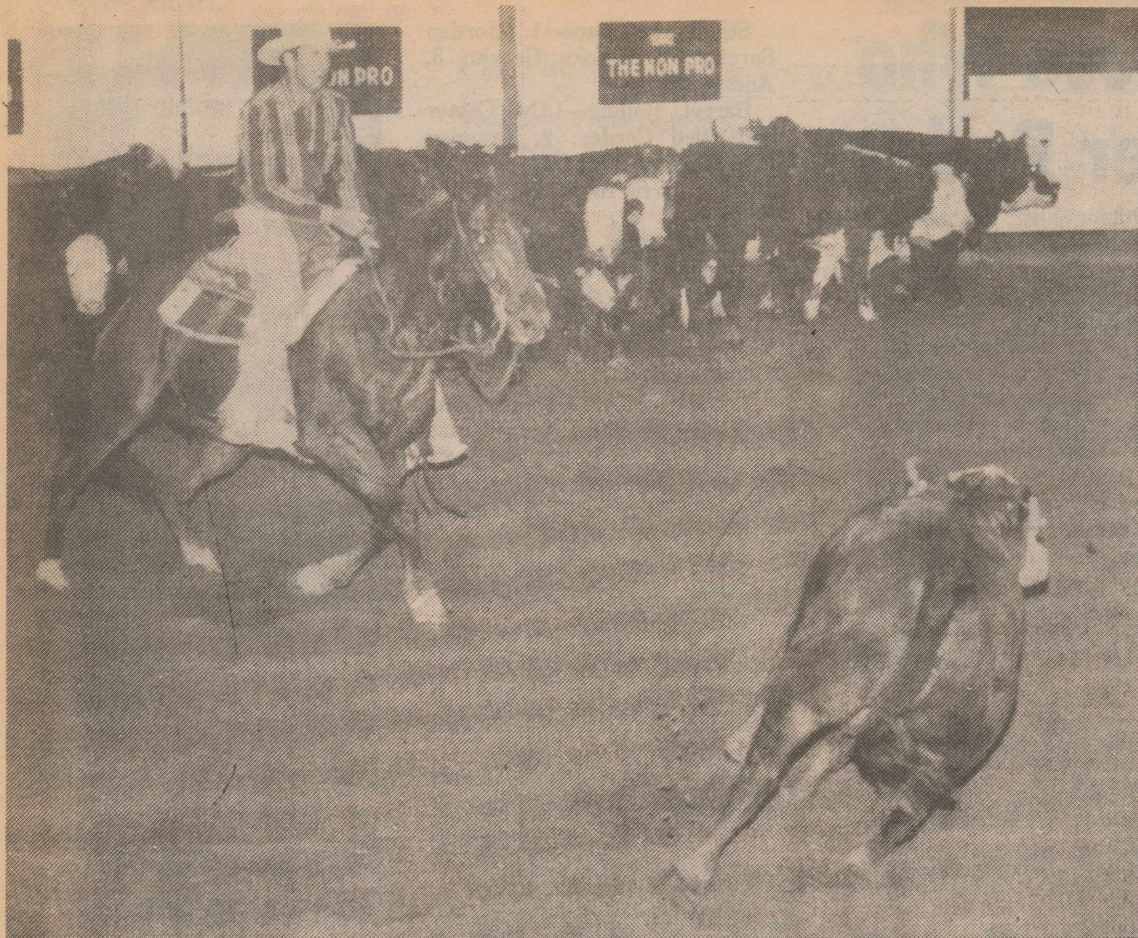
