## Absentee Voting for General Election Opened Wednesday

The extended absentee balloting period opened Wednesday, October 17, for those registered to vote in the Tuesday, November 6, general election, County & District Clerk Bess McWilliams said.

During the extended absentee voting period, which runs through Friday, November 2, registered voters can appear in the Clerk's Office at the county courthouse and other absentee polling places across Texas to cast ballots for the November 6 election. The deadline to register to vote was October 9.

"What this absentee voting period does is provide Texans with an additional 17 days to vote, instead of just on election day," Mrs. McWilliams said. "If you are registered to vote, there simply is no excuse to stay away from the polls."

Under a 1987 state law that relaxed absentee voting requirements, registered voters need not give a specific reason for casting in-person ballots during the extended voting period, Mrs. McWilliams explained.

"If you have made up your mind who you are going to vote for, consider taking advantage of the extended period," Mrs. McWilliams said. "It's real convenient and you can avoid the lines on election day."

This year Texans will elect a United States senator, governor, lieutenant governor and scores of other statewide and local officeholders.

The County Clerk's office is open weekdays from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m.

#### Democratic Rally Planned October 25

There will be a Democratic Rally beginning at 8:00 p.m. Thursday, October 25, in the Pioneer Room at First State Bank in Silverton.

Democratic Chairman Rhenda Burson says she is in the process of contacting state candidates to see if they will send representatives to the rally. Area and local candidates also will be invited. The Texas Caprock Arts Festival will be held in Silverton this weekend, October 20 and 21. The show will be open from 7:00 until 10:00 p.m. Saturday evening, and from 2:00 until 5:00 p.m. Sunday. There will be a reception from 7:00 until 9:00 p.m. Saturday, with awards, including the People's Choice, presented at 9:00.

The Texas Caprock Arts Festival is a juried art show. This year's judge is David Rindlesbacher from West Texas State University. Mr. Rindlesbacher has reviewed all entries and selected sixty-seven in the categories of sculpture, paintings and drawings, and photography. These entries will be judged Saturday morning.

Otho Stubbs of Turkey will exhibit a collection of his work as special guest artist. Mr. Stubbs is a nationally-recognized western artist whose work has been greatly influenced by the Texas Caprock where he has lived since moving to Turkey in 1910.

The Texas Caprock Arts Festival is being sponsored by the Briscoe County Activities Association. It will be held at the Briscoe County Show Barn. All work, except that of Mr. Stubbs, will be offered for sale.

## Mayor Proclaims Red Ribbon Week in Silverton

Mayor A. R. Martin has officially designated the week of October 21-27 as Red Ribbon Week in Silverton.

In his proclamation, Mayor Martin said, "To be drug free is to be a winner. Staying drug free can pay off with good grades for students, a good job and unlimited opportunities.

"Being drug free means not overloading yourself with the extra problems created by using alcohol or other drugs. It means just having to deal with the ordinary stresses and problems of living. You can be arrested and jailed for drinking alcohol, if you're younger than 21, or for having other drugs such as marijuana or cocaine in your possession.

"Being drug free means you're better able to see safety hazards and make responsible choices.

"Being drug free means being free to be yourself and all you can be. You're not a prisoner to chemicals or people who buy and sell them. Using drugs can be especially dangerous for teenagers because they can become addicted faster than adults. Addicted teens are harder to treat than addicted adults. Not everyone who uses drugs gets hooked, but a person who's drug free never will.

"Say no. Alcohol and drugs are easily accessible, and refusing them takes skill and practice. Even though you are drug free, you must be alert when those who may not be drug free are driving. Never ride with someone you know to be on drugs or drinking alcohol.

"Because alcohol and other drugs pose serious health risks, people should not use them. For some people use of alcohol and drugs, even in small amounts, can be abuse.

"Therefore, I, as mayor of the City of Silverton, urge you to be drug free, wear your red ribbons which signifies this, and take part in the special activities planned during Red Ribbon Week. Friday, October 26, is proclaimed as Wear Red Day, both in recognition of the drug-free program and as a symbol of your loyalty to the Silverton Owls football team. Athletic teams don't do well if they aren't drug free, and it is fitting and proper to recognize a drug-free team."



## Owls Take First Step Toward District Title

Silverton's Big Red Fighting Owls took their first step toward a district championship here last Friday night by defeating the Three Way Eagles 6-0 in a key six-man football game.

The road is long between this game and the championship, and to get to that shining goal the Owls will have to win all the rest of their games. They will be traveling to Whitharral Friday for their next game, and the Owls will have to be very careful not to let one of the weaker teams slip up on them. (Remember Miami!)

The large crowd at Friday night's home game was wonderful, and helped keep the team's spirit up by making a lot of noise for the Owls. The team will be needing this every week the rest of the season, and there remains only one home game. Plan now to get together with friends and carpool to the games. You'll miss a lot of excitement if you aren't there. Kickoff is 7:30 p.m. Be there!

"Stupendous defense," said Coach Clyde Parham, explaining the Owl victory last Friday. "Three Way is known for lighting up the scoreboard, averaging about 50 points a game," he noted. "The credit goes to my assistant coaches. They're my defensive coordinators and they did a super job working with the kids. We had different secondary coverage and different kinds of rushes, and they mixed them up and kept them guessing.

"We knew they were going to come out throwing, so we backed off them, then got a couple of interceptions and knocked down three or four passes," Parham said. "I told (assistant coaches) Bob Libby and Ronnie Miller what I wanted to do on defense and they took care of everything. Our plans worked to near perfection."

Silverton allowed feared Three Way quarterback Mario Guillen (described by some as the best athlete in the district), who came into the game averaging over 200 yards passing per game, to just 50 yards. "They had three penetrations, but we just wouldn't let them score," the coach said.

"We've still got a long way to go because we still have to win four games, but after Friday night, the kids finally believe they can play. We really hadn't beaten a real good team until now."

"We finally got everybody healthy for the Three Way game, and that's been a big problem for us as far as gaining consistency," Parham added. "I'll be looking for revenge (Friday

"I'll be looking for revenge (Friday night) since Whitharral beat Gordon in the semi-finals in 1981," said Parham, who was a running back for the Longhorns at that time.

The Owls opened the game Friday night by kicking off, as is their custom. They lose most of the tosses, but when they win the toss sometimes they defer the choice to the second half. Three Way carried out to their 20, and made a first down on the 37 on the first play of the game. Three Way fumbled on the next play and Bradley Brunson recovered for the Owls, but the referees ruled it to have been an incomplete forward pass.

On fourth down, Casey Frizzell threw Three Way for a loss back to their 36, and the ball went over on downs to the Owls

Brian Martin picked up a first down on the first play, carrying to the Three Way 20. Brian West picked up a couple of yards, and Martin ran to the 12. Three Way was penalized for a late hit, giving the Owls a first down on the seven. Brunson carried to the one, and

the Owls were penalized for holding back to the 15. Martin carried to the 13, and the Owls received a clipping penalty, which was declined, and the ball went over to Three Way on downs.

There was an incomplete pass on first down due to the fact that Martin jumped high to knock it down and prevent its being caught. The Eagles then moved for a first down on their 46. Martin knocked down another pass, and Brunson stopped Three Way on the Silverton 39. Defense by Lyndell Ivory and Brunson caused the ball to go back to the Owls on the Three Way 37.

This time the Owls moved forward on a pass to Brunson which moved the ball to the 15, and on the first play of the second period, Quarterback Kirk Couch passed complete to Brunson for a touchdown with 9:53 remaining on the clock. The PAT attempt failed, and the Owls held a slim 6-0 lead.

The Owls kicked off into the end zone for a touchback, and the Eagles started on their own 20. They made about 13 yards on first down, and on third down a quarterback sack moved the ball back to the 28. They punted on fourth down, and Martin returned it to the Silverton 30.

Martin carried to midfield, and Brunson picked up three yards more. Martin was set back to the 38, after which Brunson carried to the 35 where the ball went over to the Eagles.

The Eagles gained a first down on the Silverton 25, after which Martin intercepted a Three Way pass near the endzone and carried out to the Silverton 12. The Owls were unable to move the ball, and punted to the 37 with two minutes remaining in the first half.

Three Way came back with a pass which moved the ball to the Silverton 10, before losing the ball on a fumble which was recovered by Ivory on the 20. The Owls killed the clock, and went into the locker room holding the slim 6-0 lead

Three Way kicked to the Owls to open

the second half of action, and Martin brought it out to the 20, then moved to the 24 on first down. Couch passed to Martin to move the ball to the 32, but the Owls punted on fourth down and dropped the receiver where he got it on the Three Way 15.

The Eagles got a clipping penalty

which moved the ball back to the eight, and were penalized back to the 13 on third down. On fourth down they punted to the Silverton 22, where the Owls went to work with Brunson carrying the ball out to the 35. Martin rushed for a first down at the 39, and Ivory picked up another first down on the 20, which was erased by a penalty against the Owls. Martin carried to the Three Way 35, and Brunson went for a first down at the 25. At that point the offense stalled, and the ball went over on downs. Three Way moved the ball out to the Silverton 36 as the fourth quarter began, and picked up a first down on the 28. On fourth down, the ball went back to the stubborn Owls who just simply refused to yield any more ground to the Eagles.

Once again the Owls were unable to move the ball, and with 6:25 showing on the game clock, the ball went back over to Three Way.

The Eagles picked up a first down on the Silverton 28, and Ivory got them for no gain. The Eagles went for what would have been a first down, but Three Way was penalized back to the 31. On third down, Martin intercepted a pass in the endzone for a touchback, and with 3:42 still remaining to be played, the Owls went on offense again.

Once again, the offense was unable to move the ball, and a fourth-down punt carried to the Three Way 16 where the receiver was dropped in his tracks. The Eagles picked up a first down on their 35 with 1:08 remaining to be played, but were held to no gain by Bryan Breedlove on the next play. They made a first down on the Silverton 36 with 46 seconds remaining, and penetrated to the 15 before the stingy Owl defense made them turn the ball over with 29 seconds remaining.



#### TO THE CITIZENS OF BRISCOE COUNTY:

In my first open letter placed in last week's newspaper I explained to you my immediate concern causing me to conduct an audit of the District Attorney's Office in Floyd County. That was to determine if, in fact, the District Attorney had taken compensation for serving as Floyd County Attorney. Had she done so, then pursuant to Article 16, Sections 33 and 40 of the Texas Constitution, she would have abandoned her office immediately upon receipt of her compensation from Floyd County. This would have placed in question all acts taken by her as District Attorney in Briscoe and the other three counties since November, 1989. Since last week other documents have been furnished to me that makes it even more clear that she had taken compensation for serving as Floyd County Attorney and thus abandoned her office of District Attorney. That was my first and most pressing concern. I also had received such conflicting reports from Becky McPherson and Floyd County Judge Bill Hardin that this, too, caused me immense concern. After a review of some of the records submitted by the District Attorney and the Floyd County Commissioners Court and kept in the Floyd County Treasurer's office there were such conflicts and lack of documentation that these factors combined caused me to order a limited audit. The laws of Texas place on the District Judge the duty to see that the financial affairs of the county are operated properly. In rural counties he may do this by the appointment of a full-time county auditor who reports to the District Judge on a daily or weekly basis. But in no wise can the District Judge give up his duty of oversight responsibility over the financial affairs of county government. That duty is placed on the District Judge by the laws and Constitution of Texas. I cannot give up that duty any more than I can that of holding Court and presiding over trials.

When I saw a problem and ordered a limited audit that would have cost \$700.00, had it been done without objection from the Floyd County Commissioners' Court and the District Attorney, your District Judge and the District Court were met with strong opposition from McPherson and the Floyd County Commissioners' Court. The Floyd County Commissioners' Court hired an Austin law firm to fight my conduct of an audit and they have paid one lawyer to fly here from Austin on several occasions. They then hired this same lawyer and Austin law firm to represent Becky McPherson in her ill-fated efforts to stop the audit. I have not been furnished nor have I seen an affidavit signed by her indicating that she is too poor to hire her own attorney. The Floyd County Commissioners' Court has paid over \$7,000.00 to date to this Austin law firm to represent McPherson in her unsuccessful efforts to stop the audit. They have caused the Courtappointed auditors to make several unnecessary trips to Floydada from Lubbock and caused this Court to be compelled to take legal means to enforce the lawful orders of the Court. I cannot control the conduct of the Floyd County Commissioners' Court. The Commissioners' Court of Motley County requested that I pursue my audit in a resolution passed by the Motley County Commissioners' Court. The Dickens County Commissioners' Court wrote a letter to Becky McPherson requesting her to turn over her records to the Court-appointed auditors. I can only do my duty. Many of the good and decent people of Briscoe County are not aware of the massive effort and campaign underway in Floyd County to stop an audit and expose to public inspection the deception and fraud which has been imposed upon the taxpayers of Floyd County, but also upon the Comptroller of Public Accounts in Austin, and your tax money. Extreme efforts are being taken in Floyd County to stop these facts from being brought to light so that the people can judge them. As I said, the Floyd County Commissioners' Court has paid out over \$7,000.00 to an Austin law firm to do everything possible to stop the audit from going forward. My auditor would have charged around \$700.00 to do the audit, had he been permitted to do so without objection and lawsuits being brought to stop the audit. But such was not to be. Every possible effort has been made by Becky McPherson to stop the audit. In the last pleadings filed by her lawyer hired by the Floyd County Commissioners' Court, Becky McPherson requested visiting Judge McCoy not to order the records turned over to my auditors because McPherson claimed the protection of the Fifth Amendment against self incrimination. Can you imagine such? Can you condone an elected public official attempting to claim the Fifth Amendment privilege against self incrimination in an effort to get to public records kept in her possession and control which any citizen has a right to examine at any time for any reason whatsoever? The Floyd County Commissioners' Court is paying for the Austin lawyers to make such pleadings. One must begin to wonder why there is such opposition to the conduct of such a minor audit and such extreme methods are being used in Floyd County to silence this effort to get to the truth.

What has my audit accomplished so far? We have discovered a systematic scheme of double billing all four counties, including Briscoe County, on the part of Becky McPherson. Because of this fact I have appointed a Special Prosecutor to compile this supporting data and to

present this to the Grand Jury of Briscoe County and the other three counties where the double billing occurred. There is no excuse for double billing for travel expenses. A letter to the editor from Mrs. Odgen, the secretary to Mrs. McPherson, indicated that such practice was "standard office procedure". Let me assure you this "standard office procedure" only started with the arrival of McPherson to the District Attorney's office. It was not done by her predecessor and Mrs. Odgen served as secretary for Mr. Hollums for many years. It is not acceptable behaviour for your public officials to be paid twice for the same travel expenses. I will demand that this practice cease and I will instruct the Commissioners' Court to adopt accounting practices to see that double billing does not occur in the future. I have never engaged in such practices, neither did my predecessor, Judge Miller, neither did the former District Attorney, Mr. Hollums. It is just not acceptable and will not be tolerated by this Court.

We have also found that the Floyd County Commissioners' Court has adopted a practice of permitting the District Attorney to send in requests for expenses without having any receipts to back up those claimed expenses. After my audit commenced, McPherson returned to the Floyd County Treasurer over \$8,500.00 in money she received by sending invoices for expenses to the Commissioners' Court for which, in truth and in fact, she did not have. This is improper and will cease.

The Court-appointed auditor does not have his report completed, but when it is I will examine it and may thereafter make other and further recommendations and issue such other orders to the Commissioners' Court as may be necessary and proper to see that the financial affairs of this County are handled in accordance with the procedures provided by law and sound accounting procedures.

It has been suggested by Becky McPherson that I have been "after her". So far as I now know, she is the only public official in these four counties engaged in double billing for travel expenses, in sending statements for expenses in excess of \$8,000.00 which were not, in truth and in fact, incurred. Her defense to this audit has been not only to smear me in the media but not that was sufficient she also has attempted to smear the good name and reputation of your County Attorney, Sharon Sutton Pigg. I know Mrs. Pigg to be a very able and hard-working lawyer. I have been aware from the beginning that she was serving Motley County and providing her services to prosecute cases in County Court there in Motley County. I was consulted about this when the arrangements were made between Briscoe County and Motley County. Everything was done in accordance with the laws of Texas. Article 2.07 of the Texas C.C.P. provides that such arrangements may be made between counties, and such was done. Mrs. Pigg has never overcharged, overbilled or in any wise attempted to procure monies from Briscoe County which were not just and right. She has been paid by Briscoe County in a manner that conforms to the law and long-established accounting practices. It is indeed unfortunate and sad that McPherson has attempted to smear her in this matter or suggest that she is doing nothing more than Mrs. Pigg is doing. Such is not the case. It is important to remember that the Floyd County Commissioners caused to be paid to McPherson \$1,750.00 per month as compensation for serving as County Attorney of Floyd County. Motley County has never paid Mrs. Pigg any money for services. There is no relation whatsoever between what Mrs. Pigg is doing in helping Motley County and what McPherson has done. The defense which Becky McPherson has sought to employ is one of trying to smear everyone and blaming everyone else but herself for the mess she has gotten herself into. It is time that she face up to the reality of the trouble she is in and quit trying to blame good and decent people who have the courage to stand for what is right and the courage not to be pushed aside because of the cries of friends and relatives who have tried to paint those willing to do right and live within the confines of the law as sore losers or trouble makers. I have faith in an educated public. I have no faith in an uneducated people's ability to govern themselves. Demogagues have taken advantage of the facts that many citizens are not keeping themselves informed about the operation of their District Attorney's office, the duty of county and state officials and the District Court. I pray that this and my previous article has had the effect of letting you know the truth so that you may judge my reason for requesting a \$700.00 audit fairly and properly and clearly understand that my reason for conducting same had nothing whatsoever to do with political motives or personal grudges, as Becky McPherson has suggested.
