

Owls To Host Smyer In Playoffs

Silverton's Owls lost a very physical game at Lazbuddie last week, but are in the state playoffs and will be playing Smyer in the first round at home Friday night. Kickoff will be at 7:30 p.m., and it is hoped that Owl fans will take advantage of having the game here and go out to the game to cheer for the district champions!

Admission for the playoff will be \$3.00 for adults and \$2.00 for students.

The championship ended in a three-

way tie, shared with the Owls by Three Way and Lazbuddie. Since only two teams can advance into the playoffs, a coin flip was necessary to determine who it would be.

who it would be.

"Silverton won two out of three
Friday night," Coach Clyde Parham
said. "We lost the game but won two
coin flips."

The coaches of the three schools met in Olton after the games and agreed that the first "odd man out" would represent the district as the first-place team. That turned out to be Silverton. A flip between Three Way and Lazbuddie put the Longhorns in as the runner-up team in the playoffs. This leaves Three Way with a finished football season even though they lost only one game—to the Owls—this season.

Coach Parham came right back and won a home-and-home toss with bi-district opponent Smyer.

Lazbuddie is due to meet 4A champion Meadow in its first-round post-season game, and this game will be played at Lazbuddie.

"It came out good for us anyway," said Coach Parham, obviously disappointed over his team's performance against Lazbuddie which ruined Silverton's hopes of attaining a perfect district record and the outright championship. "I guess it was kind of ironic how it worked out. We had the worst (season) record (6-3-1) out of the three teams and came out number one. Three Way had the best record of all of us and just got through beating Lazbuddie 100-52, and they're staying home."

Coach Parham assured that the Owls must play much better against Smyer than they did against Lazbuddie.

"I don't want to take anything away from Lazbuddie but we played pitiful," the coach said. "We weren't mentally prepared at all—from coaches to players. We didn't have good workouts all week because of the weather and we may have got caught looking ahead to the playoffs. I think the kids know what they need to do now," he added. "They definitely won't be looking ahead this week. Smyer's pretty tough."

The winner of the Silverton-Smyer game will meet the winner of the McLean-Valley game which is being played Friday night at McLean.

The last time the Owls finished in a three-way tie it was with Higgins and

McLean, and Higgins won the flip to represent the district as champion and Silverton went into the playoffs as the




Jamie Frizzell will be observing his birthday in Saudi Arabia on December 7, and his mother has asked Silverton friends and relatives to remember this occasion with cards.





The records have been checked, and now it's official. The last time the Owls won an outright district championship was in 1944, and Silverton was playing six-man football at the time. You may recognize the names of some of those players: J. L. Self, Bobby McWilliams, Clovis Hill, John Arthur Arnold, Donald Weast and Gene Dickenson. They won eight straight games that year, giving up only four touchdowns. They defeated Oklaunion for bi-district 31-6.

You may ask: how is it that Silverton beat Three Way, Three Way forty-fived Lazbuddie in a high-scoring game, and then Lazbuddie destroyed the Owls? There are several ways to explain this, and one of them is that Lazbuddie's star player has been out of the lineup and just returned last week. Also, Lazbuddie people said that the Longhorns didn't play well at all against Three Way. And Three Way must have had a near-perfect game.

Friday night's game was more physical than the Owls have seen. This includes McLean and Guthrie. The Longhorns completely neutralized everything the Owls tried to do, and if that wasn't enough, for some reason the game officials ruled "no touchdown" in a play on which the Owls clearly got the ball across the goal line. This was a very demoralizing experience for both team and fans, and there doesn't seem to be a reasonable explanation for this ever happening. In addition, a multitude of infractions were not called.

A large contingent of fans followed the Owls to Lazbuddie, and cheered as Silverton took the opening kickoff and mounted a drive which resulted in a touchdown. Brian Martin carried the kick back to the 15, and then ran for a first down on the Lazbuddie 29. Bradley Brunson carried another first down on the 10, and Wayne Henderson went in for the score with 9:06 still on the first-quarter clock. Brian West's PAT kick was partially blocked, but was ruled to be good, and the Owls held an 8-0 lead.

Then the Owls kicked off to the Longhorns, and they carried it out to their 21. Martin held them at the 37 on their first play, and the Horns threw an incomplete pass. Lazbuddie scored on the next play, the Owls blocked the PAT kick, and Silverton still led 8-6 with 8:07 on the clock.

Martin carried the kickoff to the Silverton 26, and Brunson made a first

down on the Lazbuddie 36. Brunson picked up five yards, and then a Kirk Couch pass was tipped into the air and intercepted by the Horns. The runner was brought down by Brunson on the Silverton 25. Lazbuddie made a first down on the nine, and passed for a score with 4:16 remaining in the first period. Their PAT kick was good, and the Owls trailed 14-8.

The Owls mounted another drive after taking the ensuing kickoff. Martin ran for four or five yards, and Couch hit West with a pass before Brunson went for a first down on the Lazbuddie 33. Martin added another first down on the 13, and on the first play of the second quarter the Owls turned the ball over on another error, a fumble.

The Owl defense held on this series with good plays by Casey Frizzell and Lyndell Ivory, and forced a fourth-down punt which went out of bounds at midfield

Martin moved the ball to the Lazbuddie 30, and then got a first down on the 24. Henderson got a couple of yards and Martin went to the 18 before yet another turnover, this time an interception on the nine.

Lazbuddie moved through first downs, the first on a fourth-down penalty against the Owls and another on the Silverton 29. Good defense was contributed by Frank Ramirez, jr., Ivory, Frizzell and Brunson. After two incomplete passes, the Horns passed for a touchdown. The PAT kick was blocked by Brunson, and with 2:38 remaining before halftime, Lazbuddie led 20-8.

Brunson and Henderson gained about 12 yards, but the Owls saw the ball go over on downs as time expired in the second quarter.

The Owls kicked off to open the second half, and the Horns made first downs on the Silverton 19 and four before scoring in spite of work by Langdon Reagan and Ivory. They kicked the PAT, and with 8:56 remaining in the third period, the Horns moved ahead 28.8

Martin carried the kickoff out to the Silverton 25, and runs by Henderson and Ivory picked up a first down, after which a face-mask violation on Ivory gave the Owls another first down on the Lazbuddie 25.

Martin ran for four yards, Brunson got three, and Martin carried to the 11. Brunson got a first down on the nine, and then ran to the six. Henderson got two, and Martin crossed the goal line,

Junior Varsity Loses Close Game To Lazbuddie

Silverton's Junior Varsity Owls dropped a close game to Lazbuddie here last Thursday evening in light rain with temperature hovering near freezing. They lost their last two games by a total of five points, and this indicates the level of competition in which they have been.

The Longhorns made a first down on the 16, stopped by Ramirez, and then scored with 3:47 left in the third quarter. They kicked the PAT, and led 36.8

Martin took the kickoff to the 23, and then Couch was shaken up and went out for a play on which Josh Brooks was at quarterback. Couch returned to the game and the Owls punted to the Lazbuddie 28.

The Horns made a first down on the Silverton 34 and another in spite of defense by Brunson, Frizzell and Ramirez. The Horns fumbled in heavy defense by Frizzell and Bryan Breedlove, and the Owls got the ball back on their two.

Brunson made a first down on the 25 and then Martin picked up six as the period ended. Henderson moved to the 35, and Couch completed a pass to Breedlove. Martin ran to midfield, but the ball went over on downs.

Lazbuddie came back with a first down on the Silverton 20, stopped by Henderson and Brunson. The Horns scored with 7:16 left in the game, the Owls blocked the PAT kick, and the score stood at 42-8.

Neither team was able to accomplish much before the game ended.

Martin made a hit on a pass receiver in the game that would have made it into the highlights films, completely flipping the player and giving him a hard landing—but the Longhorn didn't fumble the ball.

The Owls made 11 first downs as

Lazbuddie kicked off to open the game, and the Owls were unable to move the ball. A quarterback sack moved the ball back to the Silverton 18, and the Owls punted short and saw the ball rest on their 35.

The defense held on the next series, and on third down there was a quarter-back sack which moved the ball back to the Lazbuddie 29. On fourth down, Braden Towe took the punt out to near midfield.


The Owls were not able to gain any yardage on their next series, and punted out of bounds at the Lazbuddie seven. The Horns took over there and moved to the 29, before picking up a first down on the Silverton 27 where they were stopped by Lance Holt and Wil Bomar. The next play was stopped by Zane Henderson, and the Owls received a penalty to their own 23. Lazbuddie scored just after the change to second quarter, passed complete for the PAT and led 7-0 with 7:35 remaining before halftime.

The Owls were unable to move the ball, and it went back to Lazbuddie on downs. This series was ended when the Horns fumbled and the Owls recovered

Junior High Owls Are **Undefeated District Champs!**

Silverton's Junior High Owls flew to a district championship here last Thursday afternoon, defeating the Lazbuddie Longhorns 41-12 in near-freezing wea-

The Owls kicked off to open the game, and recovered the Lazbuddie fumble on the Horn 29. Michael Hill carried to the 25, after which Phil Patino ran for a first down on the four. Hill carried the touchdown with 5:13 remaining in the first quarter. The PAT failed, and the Owls owned an early 6-0

Silverton's next kickoff went into the endzone for a touchback, and the Longhorns started on their own 20. After an incomplete pass, a fumble which the Horns recovered and being set back for a loss of four yards on a defensive play by Patino, the visitors

The Owl offense was shaky on this next series of plays, with Jermiah Brooks carrying out to the 34 before a quarterback sack set the team back for a loss. On fourth down, the Owls punted out of bounds on the Lazbuddie seven. and this was just the first of several really outstanding punts of the game.

On first down, the Owls threw the Lazbuddie quarterback into the endzone for a safety, and added two points to their score, 8-0. Then when the Horns kicked off, Patino carried out to the Silverton 17. A quarterback sack moved the ball back to the 14, after which Quarterback Jess Brannon completed a pass to Patino. On fourth down, Hill dropped back to punt, got a bit of a bad snap, picked it up and ran to the Lazbuddie 36 for what would have been a first down if the Owls had not been penalized back to their own 24. The ball went over on downs as the second quarter opened.

Lazbuddie threw three incomplete passes, received a five-yard penalty, and on fourth down threw another incomplete pass. Brooks carried to the Silverton 38 and then went for a first down on the Lazbuddie 32. The Owls were penalized back to the 30, after which Hill carried to the Lazbuddie 34 and another first down. Hill moved to the 31 and Patino ran to the 23. A fourth-down pass from Brannon to Patino was good for a touchdown with 1:57 showing on the clock. There was no PAT, and the Owls led 14-0.

Once again the Owls kicked into the endzone, and on this next series the Longhorns made their first first down of the game on their own 38. The Horns were penalized, after which Patino got a quarterback sack. On third down, Hill recovered a Lazbuddie fumble on the Horn 34 with 22 seconds remaining on the clock.

Brannon passed to Patino for a touchdown on the next play, Cy Comer carried the PAT, and the Owls moved ahead 21-0 with 10 seconds showing on the clock.

The Owls kicked off once again and stopped the Horns on their own 23 with four seconds remaining in the first half. Patino hit the Lazbuddie quarterback, the ball flew up in the air, and Hill got it and ran into the endzone for another quick score for the Owls as time expired on the clock. There was no PAT, and the

halftime score was 27-0 favoring the

Lazbuddie kicked off to open the second half of action, and Patino carried to the Silverton 26 after which Hill moved to the 28. A pass from Brannon to Hill was good for a first down on the Lazbuddie 27, after which the Longhorn defense tightened and forced the ball to go over on downs on the 35. Lazbuddie fumbled and recovered and got off a pass for minus yardage, and then Hill set the Horns back another three yards. On the next play, Hill recovered a Lazbuddie fumble on the 24 with 14 seconds remaining on the clock. At this point, the referees put three minutes back on the clock, and the Owls were back on offense again. Hill gained 10 yards on first down, but the Owls were forced to punt on fourth, with this one going out of bounds on the Lazbuddie

On Lazbuddie's first play, Hill threw them for a loss back to the one, and on the first play of the fourth quarter on a third down, the Horns lost the ball out of the endzone for a safety, making the

Lazbuddie kicked off and Patino carried to the Silverton 37. The team was set back to the 33, and on the next play Hill went all the way for another touchdown with 5:23 remaining in the game. There was no PAT, and the scoreboard read 35-0.

The Owls kicked off again, and the Horns were penalized back to their 10. The Owl defense held, and then Brooks carried a couple of plays, making a first down on the Lazbuddie 34. Patino carried a touchdown with 1:30 remaining in the game. There was no PAT, and the score was upped to 41-0.


