Assistance Requested for Needy Elderly, Disabled

"Texas Department of Human Services is asking for your assistance in making this time of year a happier and more joyful time for several needy elderly and disabled people in the area," said Charlene Stark, social worker. "At this time there are over 23 CCAD in Briscoe County who are Community Care for the Aged and Disabled clients.

Needless to say, with the economy as it is, it is quite difficult for them to survive financially from month to month. Each year, with our communities' help we have made the financial burdens easier on these folks by giving them donations of muchneeded and required necessities of daily living such as food, clothing, toiletries, cleansers, etc. This year, we hope, will be no exception."

She went on to list a number of needed items, including canned foods, non-perishable food items, fruit and food baskets, Ensure or Ensure Plus liquid supplements, household cleaners, laundry detergents, fabric softeners, paper towels, napkins, cleaning rags, scouring pads, mops, brooms, dust pans, aerosol bug spray, toilet paper, Kleenex, shampoo, conditioner, deodorants, lotion, bath soaps, toothpaste, denture cleansers and cream, toothbrushes, disposable razors, Depend undergarments, disposable blue pads, band-aids, light bulbs, bed sheets, blankets, towels, hand towels, dish

towels, bath towels, socks, footlets, stationery, writing tablets, envelopes, ballpoint pens, pencils, lap desks or trays, sensitive skin products, long walking canes.

"When donations are received, several DHS volunteers, staff and myself separate them into several sacks and deliver them directly to the clients' homes. They are thrilled beyond words," Ms. Stark said.

"When you donate any of the items listed, it certainly will help our clients,

many of whom are desperately in need. Any donations can be taken to the Department of Human Services office in Tulia, to Diane Donahoo or to First Baptist Church in Silverton. You can contact me or any other office personnel at 995-2321 between 8:00 a.m. and 12:00 noon and between 1:00 and 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday," she said.

She added that she and her clients appreciate your thoughtfulness and assistance.

USDA Announces Peanut Quota Referendum

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced that peanut growers are being asked to vote December 10-13 in a mail referendum to decide whether poundage quotas and price support will continue for the peanut crops for the next five years.

The Food, Agriculture, Conservation and Trade Act of 1990 requires USDA to conduct the referendum not later than December 15.

If two-thirds or more of the producers voting favor poundage quotas, no referendum will be held for the second, third, fourth and fifth years of the period and quotas and price support will remain in effect for the 1991 through 1995 crops of peanuts. If more than one-third of the producers vote against quotas, poundage quotas and price support will not be in effort for the 1991 crop of peanuts; however, another referendum would be conducted next year to determine if quotas will be in effect for the 1992 through 1995 crops.

Producers are eligible to vote if they were engaged in the production of quota peanuts in 1990. Producers are ineligible to vote if their only interest in peanut production in 1990 was on a

farm on which the land harvested for nuts was one acre or less, there was no poundage quota, or the production was for consumption exclusively as boiled nearly.

In a 1986 referendum, 97.4 percent of the 21,456 peanut growers who voted cast ballots in favor of poundage quotas for the 1986 through 1990 crops of peanuts

USDA Warns Producers of Change in "Trigger" For **Swampbuster Violations**

Producers should be aware that the recently-enacted 1990 farm bill significantly changes conditions under which a producer could lose many U.S. Department of Agriculture benefits because of "swampbuster" violations, Keith Bjerke, administrator of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said this week.

"Under the new law alteration of a wetland may trigger swampbuster penalties for current and subsequent crop years, whereas under the old law planting of an annual crop on a converted wetland was the only trigger for penalties.





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

Required Training Offered For Pesticide Applicators

One of the last chances this year for commercial and non-commercial pesticide applicators to earn necessary continuing education units (CEUs) to comply with state requirements will be offered in Lubbock on December 13.

A one-day training workshop will be conducted from 8:30 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center north of the Lubbock airport. The center is on FM 1294 just east of I-27 at the Shallowater exit.

The training has been approved by the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) for five CEUs, according to Curtis Preston, County Extension Agent for Briscoe County. There is a \$10.00 fee for the training.

Commercial and non-commercial applicators are required by the TDA to receive five CEUs a year to retain certification. Private applicators will have until December 31, 1995 to receive a total of 15 CEUs.

Soil Conservation Improves Habitat For Pheasants

Pheasant hunting season opened last Saturday. You can assure yourself of an enjoyable hunt by NOT doing a few things and, at the same time, protect your soil resource.

DON'T burn playa lakes, corn and grain sorghum stubble. Tall weeds in playas provide excellent winter cover for pheasants. Acre for acre, grain stubble is less suitable winter cover than playa vegetation, but fields of grain stubble contribute many more acres of winter cover throughout the Panhandle.

DON'T overgraze playa lakes. Tall, thick stands of grass and weeds are the qualities that make playas prime winter habitat. Grazing that reduces the height and thickness of the stand will decrease the value to pheasants.

DON'T disk or plow under corn and grain sorghum stubble. Waste grains of corn and grain sorghum are important winter foods for pheasants. Disking or plowing buries most of the grains.

The Caprock Soil and Water Conservation District and Soil Conservation Service encourage you to practice good pheasant habitat management. Improving the habitat of this popular game bird also will reduce soil erosion in the Texas Panhandle

Additionally, many women at 65 have savings and other resources which are gone by 85. Their resources may be depleted by a husband's final illness or the increased living expenses of living alone as a widow.

SSI provides an income floor for many older people with low Social Security benefits and reduced financial resources. Over 75 percent of the SSI recipients over age 85 are women, and advocacy groups believe many more older women may be eligible for SSI.


