Mike Bishop's Country Time Jamboree Coming to Silverton For Performance Feb. 7

Mike Bishop's Country Time Jamboree country music variety show is a two-hour high energy show that presents country, bluegrass and gospel music, a blast from the past with the '50's-'60's review, great family comedy and a heart-felt patriotic salute. The show will be presented in the Silverton School Auditorium beginning at 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, February 7.

This fantastic show is owned and operated by Mike Bishop, originally of Wilson, Arkansas. Mike plays drums, sings and emcees the two-hour production while his wife, Dale, also sings and does a super pantomime to the Ray Stevens hit "Along Came Jones" which never fails to get a great reaction from the audience. Before starting Country Time Jamboree, Mike was entertainment director for Dogpatch USA for eight years and worked a year for Lee Mace's Ozark Opry at Lake of the Ozarks, Missouri.

In addition to Mike and his wife, performing on stage is the Country Time Jamboree band made up of versatile multi-talented performers featuring such instruments as the steel guitar, fiddle, harmonica, mandolin, banjo, sax, guitar and piano rounding out an evening of great family Mitchell, South Dakota; the North Alabama State Fair; the Arkansas Governor's Conference on Tourism and in many more exciting places. In all, the show has performed in 22 states and entertained hundreds of thousands of people.

Brunson is Defensive Player of the Year

Bradley Brunson has been named Defensive Player of the Year and a member of the second annual Globe-News Six-Man Super Football Team.

Dennis Hill of McLean was named Offensive Player of the Year, and C. W. Williams of Lazbuddie was named Coach of the Year.

State semifinalist and fourth-ranked McLean paced the Super Team with five selections, including running back Hill, who led the Tigers with 1,804 vards rushing on 218 carries and 32 touchdowns despite playing a full game on offense only three times this season. Brunson, middle linebacker for the Owls, repeated as the Super Team's Defensive Player of the Year. Brunson was in on 121 tackles and intercepted two passes in the regular season. Also named to the Super Team were Paul Williams, 5-10 Lazbuddie sophomore, quarterback; Kirk Garner, 5-10 Valley senior, and Hill, 6-3 senior, running backs; Cleve Wheeler, 6-0 Miami senior, center; Matt Cozbey, 5-11 Lazbuddie sophomore, and Destry Magee, 5-10 McLean junior, ends; Tuffy Sanders, 5-11 McLean junior, place kicker.



Immunization Clinic is January 16 at Valley School


An immunization clinic offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases is scheduled January 16 at the Valley School.



Games of Polyana or WaHoo could go way into the night, but the feature event was to watch her let her hair down out of that huge bun on the back of her head and brush out the braid just before bed. Then, it was up early the next morning to catch the brushing, braiding and winding back.

If our rowdiness and mischief got out of hand, it was a sure thing that court would be held while looking into those blue eyes that could pierce to the soul. There was never a doubt she was fully able to separate the grain from the chaff in all tales rendered. Then, in an instant those same eyes could give a sparkle of approval that made diamonds in the snow seem dim. I liked the sparkle best.

When the Apostle Paul told the Philippians to be content in whatever situation they were in, Mam-Maw must have been listening closely cause she sure liked to smile and laugh. Her smile accompanied with peach tree twig was her standard attire, but it was her laugh that was a joy to all. Fact is, she had a laugh for every occasion, one for surprise, joy, approval, and amazement. The one for amazement was easiest to spot because it was followed by a musical, "Well I declare." When Mam-Maw cried she cried all over just like she laughed. That must have been because she loved so completely. We just didn't hurt without her hurting more.

During that time the politics of this nation weaved back and forth but Mam-Maw never turned to the right or left. No sir, she was Baptist right down the line. 
