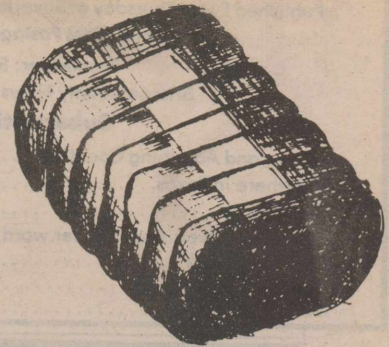

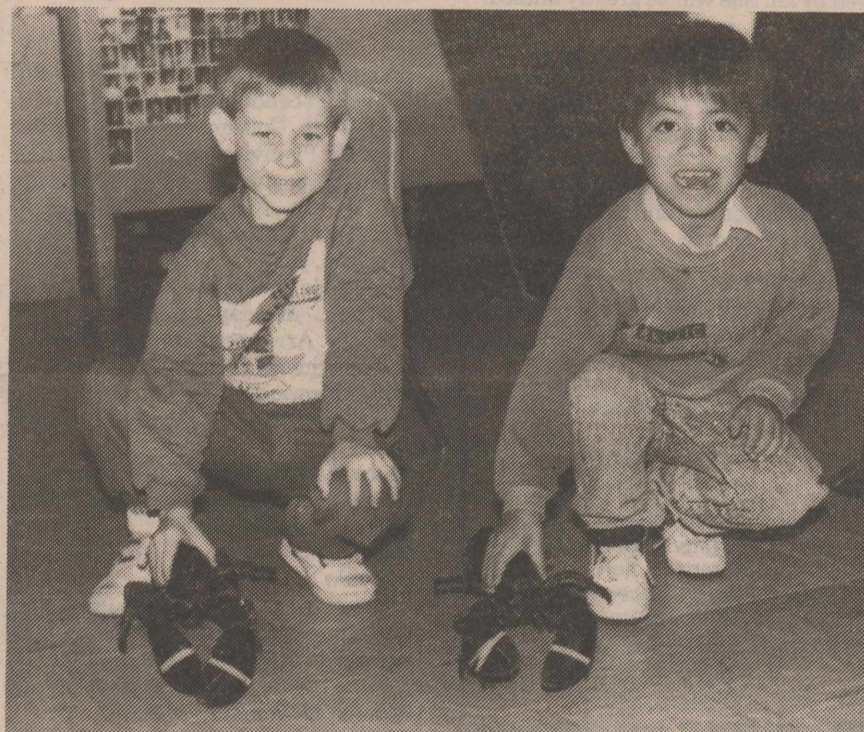

EDITH LOUELLA BAIRD

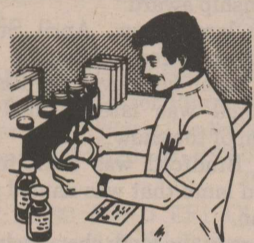

New Postal Rates to be Effective February 3

Even though new postage rates are not effective until February 3, two new non-denominated postage stamps went on sale January 23 at the U. S. Postal Service to make it more convenient to apply first-class postage when new rates take effect at 12:01 a.m. on February 3, 1991, said Larry Ward, Silverton Postmaster.

The use of non-denominated stamps is intended to ensure a more manageable transition to the new rate structure.

"Our new flower stamp is valued at 29 cents and is valid, full-rate first-class postage anywhere within the United States Postal System," Ward said.

"And, for the first time, we're issuing a second non-denominated make-up stamp, bearing text describing its value, worth four cents. It can be used in combination with any 25-cent stamp to make up the difference in the old and new full first-class domestic rates. This single, widely available stamp will make it much more convenient for the American people to make up the price difference and use their existing supplies of 25-cent stamps," Ward added.

The 29-cent flower stamp, available in booklets, coils, sheets and embossed envelopes, and its running mate, the four-cent "make-up" stamp, are available today at Post Offices across the nation. Customers also can order these stamps by phone (1-800-STAMP24) or through the Stamps By Mail program locally.

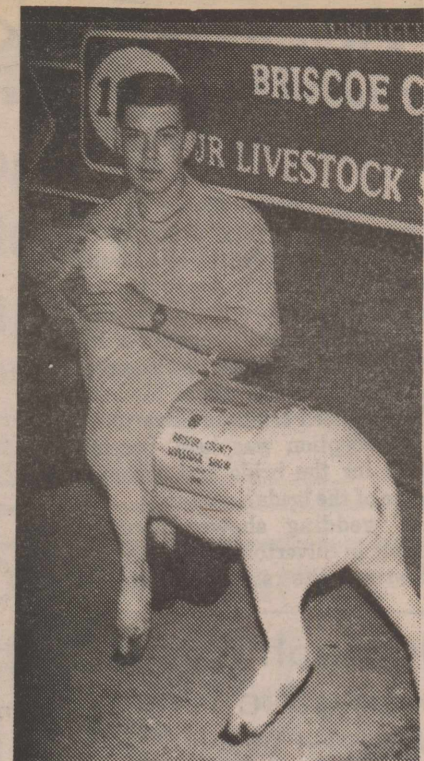

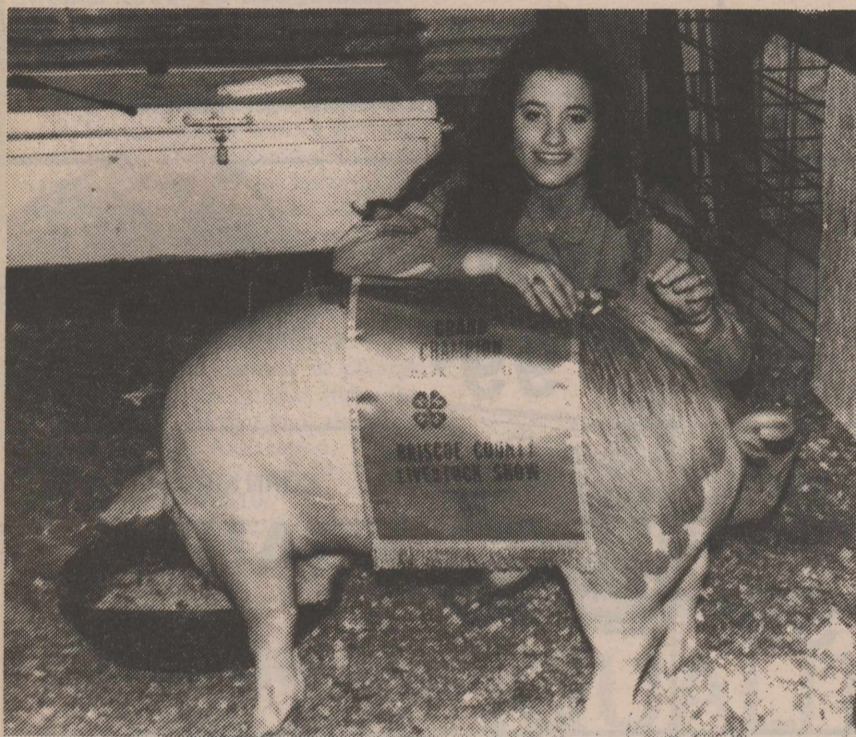

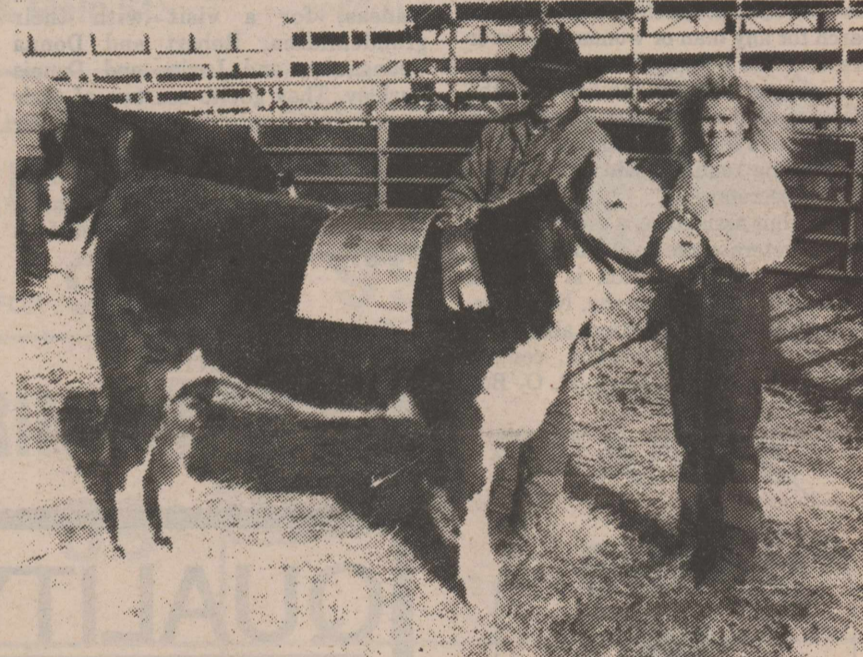

While any person with pertinent comments will be granted an opportunity to present them during the course of the hearing, the presiding officer reserves the right to restrict testimony in terms of time and repetitive comment. Organizations, associations, or groups are encouraged to present their commonly held views, and same or similar comments, through a representative member where possible. Comments on the proposed text should include appropriate citations to sections, subsections, paragraphs, etc., for proper reference. 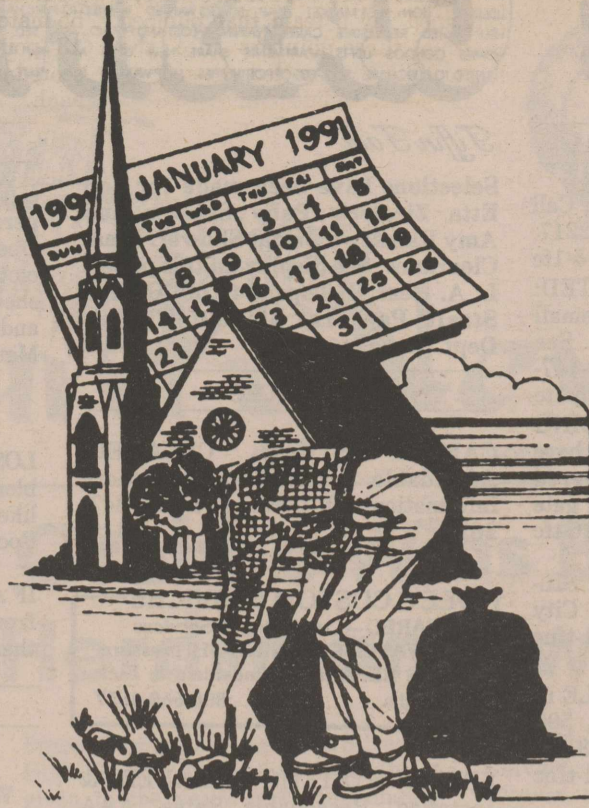

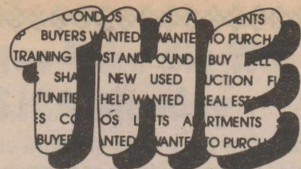
