FHA To Sponsor Local Volleyball Tournament

State Budget Office **Recommends Cutting Veterans Program**

In a letter from Dan Garcia, president of the Veterans County Service Officers Association of Texas to Billye Kesler, Veterans County Service Officer for Briscoe County, Mr. Garcia expressed grave concern that the Texas Legislative Budget Office proposed reducing the budget of the Texas Veterans Commission.

The Commission, which operates offices to assist veterans in VA hospitals and clinics, trains and certifies Veterans County Service Officers and is the focal point for processing claims filed at the Veterans County Service Office. The Commission also represents veterans claimants before the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) at the regional office level and works with the veterans county service officer in appealing decisions by VA which the veteran believes is unjust or unfair.

The emphasis of the Commission's budget request is "support to the veterans county service officer, who the Commission believes is the most important link in the chain of veterans service," according to Garcia. "That is the reason they want to provide (the veterans county service officer) the best training and support possible."

Garcia expressed disappointment and dismay that in this time of war the Texas Legislative Budget Office proposes to reduce funding for Texas Veterans.

"I know the legislature doesn't feel that when the men and women come home from the Desert Storm War, we can throw away our yellow ribbons and forget them!" Garcia wrote. "This must be an oversight or misunderstanding."

Garcia concluded his letter by urging all Veterans County Service Officers to let the citizens of Briscoe County know about this situation and asked them to let their elected State Representatives and Senators know they want them to support full funding of the Texas Veterans Commission Budget to "meet the increased demands for help needed by the aging veteran population and the soon to return (we pray) veterans of the Desert Storm War.'

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

Too Shallow

Get a Jump-Start on **Spring By Planting Trees Now**

Take advantage of the first break in the drizzle and cold by planting a tree because now through mid-March is a great time to start that investment toward future savings in cooling costs of up to 20 percent.

Though new gardeners may balk at this project, planting a tree is not difficult. The best advice is to choose a day to plant, buy the tree, and begin planting after returning home. Letting a balled or container tree sit in the garage or yard a week or so is asking for trouble because it usually doesn't get the right care.

Donald Gibbons of the Soil Conservation Service says there are four major steps:

1. Marking and digging. Placement of the tree is a serious consideration, especially if a person wants the benefits of shade for the home in the summer.

Mark the spot by driving a wooden stake in the ground. Tie a string to the stake and etch a circle at least twice the width of the root ball or container. Now comes the fun part. Start digging, placing the soil on a large piece of cardboard or plastic. Dig about half the hole needed and fill it with water. If it doesn't drain well, the tree will not grow properly and some species do not like "wet feet." Another site may have to be selected.

After finding out if the soil will drain, dig the entire hole one inch deeper than the depth of the root ball or container. Remove rocks from the soil that has been dug out, break up large clods, and refill the base of the hole up to one inch, adding a few handsful of dry leaves. Water the base of the hole again.

2. Positioning the tree in the hole. Place the tree, still in the container or burlap, in the hole. Make sure that the tree is facing the way it will when planted, is straight in the hold, and that the hole is of the right depth. To check this depth, lay a hoe handle or a stake flat from one edge of the hole to the other to make sure that the soil at the top of the root ball is one inch below the level of the surrounding soil. If it is too

high or too low, measure the amount and remove the tree. Dig out the depth necessary or add soil at the base of the hole. Add water to the base, replace the tree, again checking the soil height.

Remove the container and place the tree in the center of the hole. If the root ball doesn't slide out easily, run some water in the container to loosen the soil from the sides. When sliding the root ball out, don't let the soil slip away from the roots. For trees that are balled in burlap, a person may leave the burlap on, but it is a good idea to use scissors, not a knife, to cut several large slits at the base and around the sides to make it easier for the roots to spread as the tree matures

Check the height and straightness again. If there are not any problems, be very careful in removing the tree so as not to damage the roots and disturb the original soil around the roots.

3. Backfilling and watering. Fill the sides of the hole with soil. If necessary, add good quality topsoil. When the hole is 2/3 full of soil, add water and mix the mud to settle the soil and remove any air pockets by proving the mud with the hoe handle or stick. Finish filling the hole until the top of the root ball is covered with an inch of soil and pack the soil firmly around the tree. Add more water, and let the soil settle again. More soil may need to be added.

4. Building a bern and mulching. Build a three to four-inch-high soil berm or mound around the edge of the tree hole to help retain water, sloping the side of the bern away from the tree to ground level. Place a layer of bark or leaf mulch three to four inches deep inside the berm. Mulching will conserve water, keep weeds and grass away and help protect the tree during winter.

Water regularly every week or so after planting and during the spring and summer for the first two years. Water slowly and deeply each time. Once established, the tree needs water only when the leaves first begin to wilt. During the first two years, trees also should be watered during months, especially if rainfall is low or a hard freeze is predicted. Compost may be added for nutrients


President George Bush states "membership in PTA gives children a sense of security and continuity, and it demonstrates commitment to the education and welfare of our nation's youth."

Social Security In Briscoe County by Mary Jane Shanes AMNESTY OFFERED FOR SOCIAL SECURITY CARD MISUSE

Legalized aliens who used false documents to obtain a Social Security card or used a fake card will receive amnesty from prosecution if they stopped using the fradulent cards by January 8, 1991.

About 2.5 million of the 3.1 million people who applied for amnesty under the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986 and subsequent immigration legislation could be affected by the Social Security amnesty provision. The 60-day amnesty was a little-known provision included in the budget bill passed by Congress in October, 1990.

Aliens who have qualified for legal status are eligible to receive valid Social Security cards, but many of them have not taken steps to correct their earnings records. By reporting work they did using previous Social Security numbers, workers can get credits to qualify for higher Social Security benefits in the future.

Officials said legalized aliens can adjust their work records at any time so long as they are not using any fake cards after January 8.

The current amnesty period is an exception to the laws covering use of fraudulent Social Security cards. Normally, the offense is punishable by a maximum of five years in prison and a \$250,000 fine. People suspected of trafficking for profit in counterfeit Social Security cards will continue to be prosecuted.

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
