Probably there are as many unsolved and unresolved issues facing the new Congress as has ever been faced by any of the history of our Country. Not only the issues which may be identified as normal, but also those which have not been met and resolved by the outgoing Administration.

Fairly early in this session of the Congress will be proposals to increase the rate and coerage of the Minimum Wage Law. In line for consideration in the near future will be legislation for more Federal Aid for school constuction, which may include money for teachers' salaries. Following close behind will be a revised version for Medical Aid for the Aged supported by Social Security taxes, and economic assistance for the so-called Depressed Areas, and a new measure for more Government Housing - which will include loans and insurance.

All this and more is on the 'must' list of the new administration. Some things are on the 'must' list, not because of choice, but because of world conditions. This is the matter of dealing with the Cuban situation, the inroads of communism in Latin America, the instability in Africa and Southeast Asia, and other areas where rapid changes are now occuring.


Then, probably above all importance, is to reconstitute our position in the world. Of one thing we can be fairly certain; a most intese effort will be made early in the administration to guarantee the strongest military establishment of any nation on earth. The proposition that we must deal with strength is a strong sentiment in this Administration. At the same time, sight will not be lost of the tremendous importance of trying to keep the peace and to work towards some plan of world disarmament. With nuclear weapons being made possible by other countries such as France, and even little Israel, it can be assumed that Communist Red China will soon have the capacity of exploding an atomic bomb.







What fortunate people we are, in these United States of America! Our fathers purchased for us at great cost the priceless privileges of Democracy; the right of a people to make decisions as to their speech, their government and their religion. This means, as William Jennings Bryan used to say, the right to make our own mistakes, and then the responsibility to correct them. In other words we have accepted responsibility to live together for the common good and in mutual goodwill. We must do two things to be worthy at all of this magnificent inheritance: (1) We must seek to understand and to appreciate what Democracy means, and (2) We must see that Democracy works.

The right to vote carries the responsibility to vote. The right to think for one's self required that we read and discuss and become responsible and well informed thinkers. The right to free speech calls for the self-control and the wisdom which will make our speech of goo temper and of helpful counsel to others, who likewise have the same freedom of speech. The right to worship according to the dictates of our consciences summons us to train our consciences so that we shall choose well, surely that we shall worship somewhere. Democracy is the most elevated of systems of economic, of civil, and of religious living, but it is also the most difficult. For it requires so much of those who assume responsibility to govern themselves. There must be self-discipline; there must be the training of youth in disciplined living; there must be high dedication to the common good, as over against selfish behaviour. A man who lives only for himself is an autocrat and not a democrat.

Democracy challenges each of us to think of every other person as a sister or a brother in the universal family of God; every man is a child of God, who merits respect and concern
