Finch To Lead Wright For Senate Campaign

Congressman Jim Wright has announced the appointment of Al Finch of Rotan as Chairman of the Fisher County in his campaign for United States Senator from Texas.

The naming of Al Finch to lead the Fisher Co. campaign activities for Congressman Wright adds even greater strength to a strong statewide organization, which embraces people from all walks of life.

In making public the names of his area leaders, Congressman Wright reiterated his promise that, if elected, he would be a Senator for all the people, not owned by and group or faction.

"If I can't cast the Senator's vote," he stated, "I don't want to sit in the Senator's chair."

"I am in this race to win," Wright added, "and I expect to win."

Fire Key Rate Is Reduced 4 Cents

Cuts in the fire insurance key rate reduction for Rotan have been announced by the State Board of Insurance, effective immediately.

The key rate in Rotan was reduced from 50 to 46 cents per \$100 of insurance per year. A 4 cent reduction in the key rate is equivalent to a 4 per cent saving in fire insurance premiums.

The key rate is arrived at by "charging" the city for certain hazards and allowing "credits" for protective techniques. Charges use in making up the key rate for both places including deficiencies in water works, water mains and number of fire hydrants, in the fire department and fire alarm system, in the building laws, and conflagration hazards, including overhead wires in mercantile district and frame buildings too close.

Against these charges of 48 cents for Rotan, a credit for having at least one booster truck of at least 100 gallon tank capacity and for teaching fire prevention and principles of fire insurance in public schools.

"Fiber identification" is an important clue to the use of modern fabrics," says Mrs. H. Aaron to the Rotan HD Club, February 17 in the home of Mrs. H. L. Dycus.

Trade names exist for manmade fibers that are useful clues to proper washing, drying, pressing, spot removal and storage, says Mrs. Aaron. One example of trade name of stretch process is Helanca-bulk process. Banlon and Tycora for texture.

Mrs. G. C. Shell, gave a five point plan for buying fabrics. 1. Determine your need. 2. Determine what you want. 3. Consider individual habits of use. 4. How to care for it and 5. How long you want it to last.

"Reading the label on fabrics, or ready made clothes requires knowledge of the characteristics, use and care of each fiber or combination of fibers," says Mrs. Shell.

Meyers, 18, of Abilene in connection with the Aug. 3, 1959 burglary of the Claude Johnson farm 5 miles northeast of Sweetwater; Samuel Lloyd Stephens, 36, of Snyder and Daniel Drew, 36, of Forrest, Ark. for the Jan. 25, 1961, burglary of the Luther Rector service station at McCaulley. All four are in county jail in lieu of \$1,500 bond.

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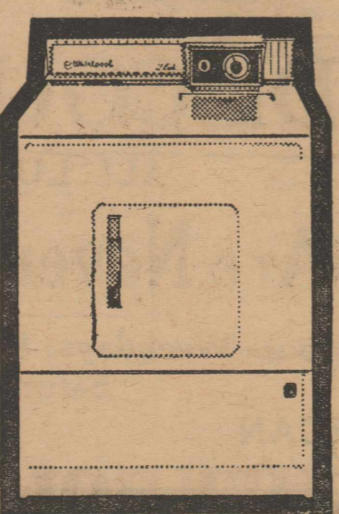

Demand For Land Bank Loans Increasing

Demand for the type of loans made by The Federal Land Bank of Houston is up 30 per cent over the 1960 requests according to Hal Weatherford, President of the bank. He said the demand, among other things, reflects an adjustment which farmers and ranchers are making in their operations by switching heavy short-term debts to long-term land loans. This gives them a better balanced debt load and more freedom in their operations. Weatherford said.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston has more than 237 Million Dollars of loans in force, which is an all-time high. It is one of twelve such banks in the Nation and serves the State of Texas. Its loans are made through 73 Federal Land Bank Associations, and it secures its loan funds through the sale of bonds to the investing public.

Mr. B. L. Conley of Roby is the Manager of the local Federal Land Bank Association which serves this area.

Letter to Editor:

Editor, The Rotan Advance,
Rotan, Texas:

Dear Sir:
The following "letter to editor" is from a former resident of Rotan, now a prominent attorney of Chesterfield, Virginia, who states he enjoys the Advance each week.

"I am exercising my privilege as a former Rotan resident to write to you concerning a letter from Mr. Cecil Lotief published in your February 9, 1961, edition.

Mr. Lotief is distressed about the possibility of a state sales tax to finance Texas public education. For this I find no fault. Taxes, and in particular sales taxes, are exceedingly unpleasant. They place upon the retail merchant the unpopular burden of collection. They increase the cost of merchandise and to a small degree reduce the volume of sales. All of this, of course, hits Mr. Lotief where it hurts the most, his pocketbook.

He states "After all we paid our taxes to the government and so why not accept some of this money back, instead of giving it to other countries?" If there was a serious hope that acceptance of federal grants to education would diminish the foreign give-away program I would, to some extent, endorse it. We all know the two are in no way related and action in one sphere will produce no inaction in the other.

Federal aid to education is undesirable for two basic reasons:

1. Federal aid produces federal control. Examples: farm subsidies, interstate highway construction, river and harbor improvement, slum clearance and power production. It is easy, in light of past procedures, to foresee dictation of teacher standards, curriculum requirement, textbook editing and, of course, total integrations of races, all under threat of withdrawal of funds.

2. Federal aid is too expensive. Every dollar paid in shrinks to about sixty cents when is returned to the locality from whence it came. The cost of collection, accounting and distribution alone is overwhelming. The Washington bureaucracy is not designed to save money but spend it. The jobs of countless thou-

sands of people in federal employ depend upon finding more and more ways to spend government money. Each department head seeks ways to increase his department's duties, which requires more personnel and thus, in turn, places him in a higher category.

Mr. Lotief concludes by asking us to keep faith in our National Government and accept all help we can get for our schools. Let us keep faith in our National Government but let us remember that that government is a group of States, united for mutual advantage. Let us look first to ourselves, our localities, and our states for assistance and depend less and less on Washington to cure all our ills.

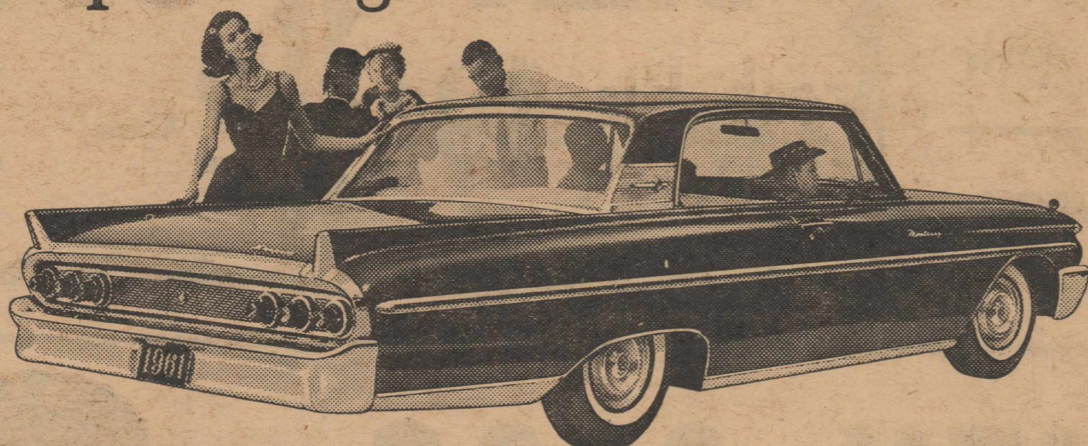

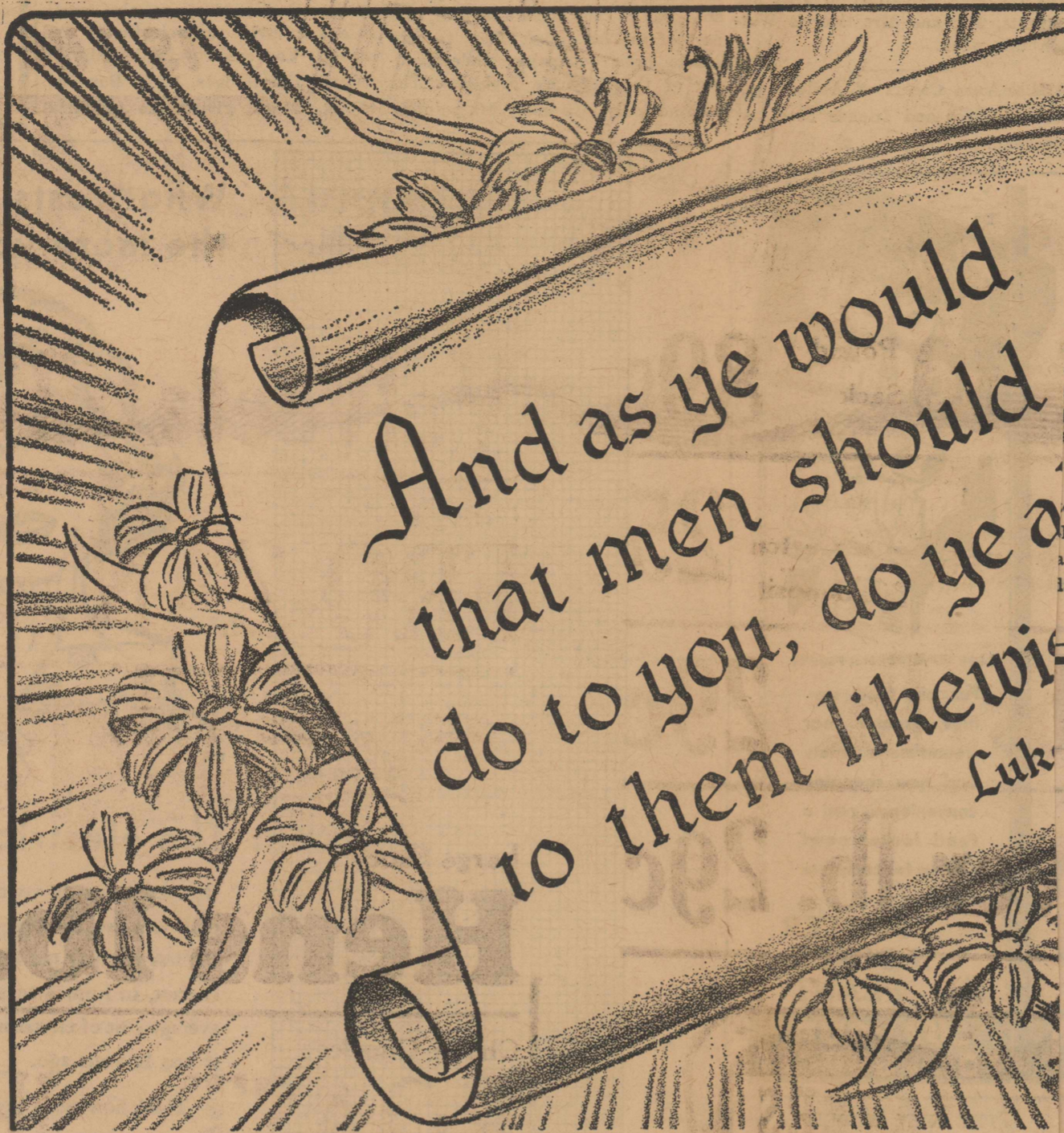

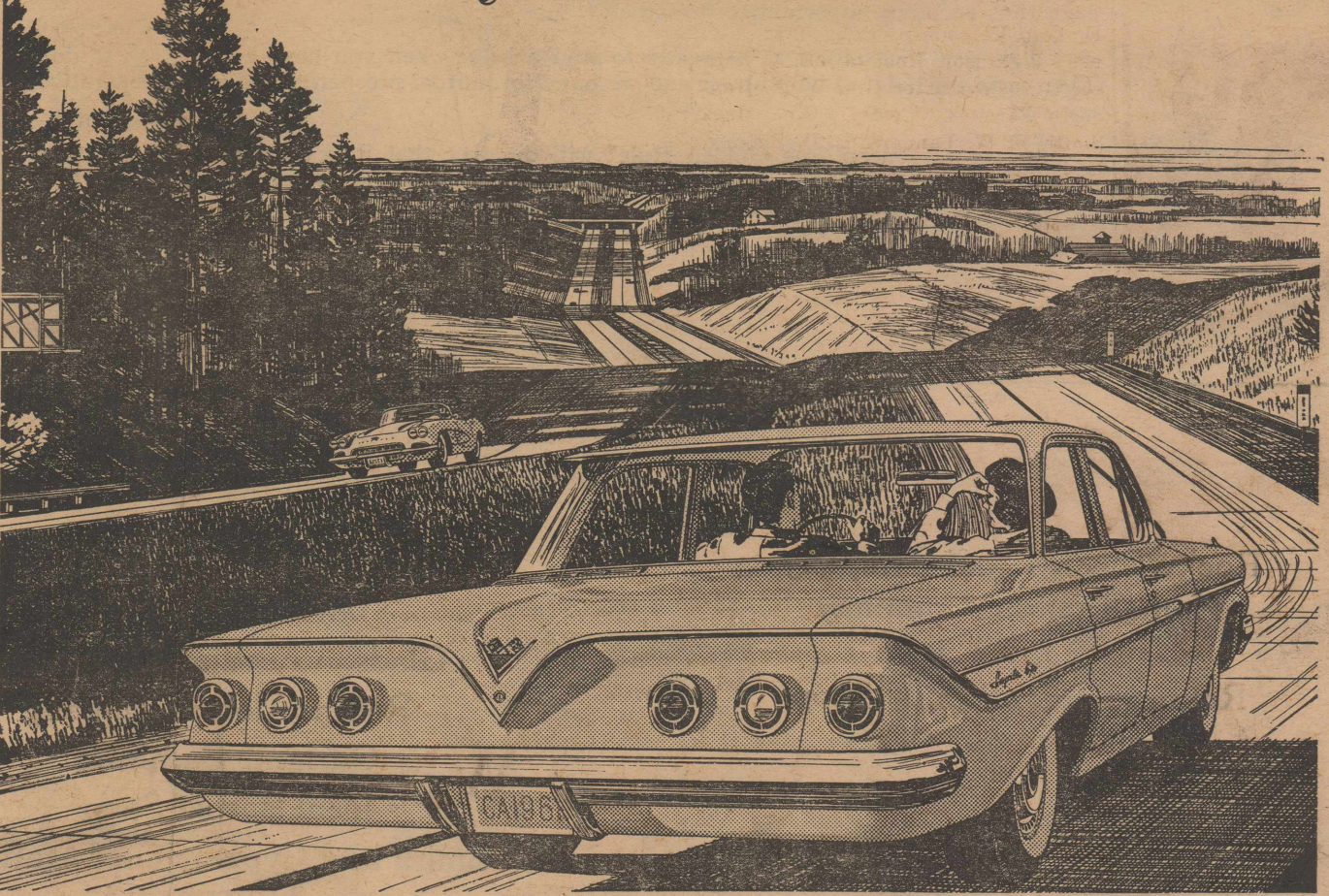
