**Hammers Tie For 2nd In Relay Meet**

Rotan's Yellowhammers tied Rule Bobcats for first in the A & B division at the third Hamlin Relays held at HS-U track in Abilene. Hamlin won first place, with 130 1-3 points and Rotan and Rule tied with 54 points, on the rain-soaked track. Seven records were broken during the meet.

Rotan freshman Howard Van Loon heaved the shot put 52 feet 3 1-2 inches, for an all-time new meet record. His throw was only 4-2 under the state's top mark of 56-5 1-2. Van Loon set a new Double Mountain relays record in Double Mountain relays here last week with a 51-8 1-2 mark.

David Baugh left his competition far behind as he swept the 880-yard run in 2:00.7. He broke his old record of 2:02.0 which was set last year.

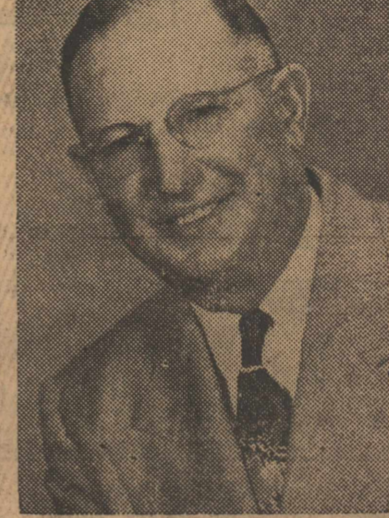
**Senatorial Election To Be Held Tuesday**

Eating tossed green salads is an easy way to "take" vitamins and minerals. Dark green and yellow vegetables are excellent sources of vitamins A and C. High on this list of vegetables are fresh cabbage and other salad greens, carrots, asparagus, broccoli and green peppers. All vegetables will give a greater return on your investment when they are served fresh and raw.

Quick loaf breads add extra energy and interest to meals . . . delicious served hot, in sandwiches, or as toast for breakfast.

Recipes for tasty banana nut, prune, orange nut, or peanut butter bread are given in extension bulletin, "Quick Breads." You can get a copy from your local demonstration agent's office.

Try new garnishes for soup . . . Everyday food items which make unusual soup garnishes are thin strips of canned pimento, paper thin slices of lemon, orange or lime, slices of stuffed olive, and grated or crumbled cheese. Whipped cream with a dash of horseradish is good with some types of soups. With tohato soup, try popped corn.

Serve cottage cheese often. It's a year-round favorite when it comes to dairy foods. It's a good buy, too, since it's low in cost and high in food value. Top quality protein, calcium, the B vitamins and all the other minerals and vitamins of milk are offered in this easy-to-prepare, versatile and inexpensive food.  
An average serving of about three-fourths cup will furnish about half the protein needed daily by adults. Low in calories, but filling, it's an ideal food to include in a reducing diet. Use it to prepare quick salads, budget-stretching main dishes, and tasty desserts.

What is a good meal? . . . Extension foods and nutrition specialists of the A&M College of Texas define it as one which meets the health needs of each individual in the family by providing one serving of all food groups listing in "Food for Fitness," a guide for good eating. Basic patterns for breakfast, dinner and supper are given in their extension bulletin entitled, "Quick Meals."

You will find tasty recipes, and easy-to-follow suggestions for preparing oven meals, one-dish meals, top-of-range and boiler meals, and pressure sauce pan meals. Soups and sandwich menu with recipes are included, too.

Cutting Calories is a popular subject these days . . . But many of us eat the wrong foods out of our diet when we launch our own weight control programs by simply cutting calories.

Every food contains some calories . . . the fuel needed to keep us moving. But some foods contain so many nutrients - vitamins, minerals and protein - that every calorie is virtually "loaded," according to Frances Reasonover, extension foods and nutrition specialists of the A&M College of Texas.

Learn to choose "loaded calories." It can mean better health . . . an improved morale and appearance. The Texas Food Standard lists foods needed daily. You can get a copy from your county home demonstration agent's office.

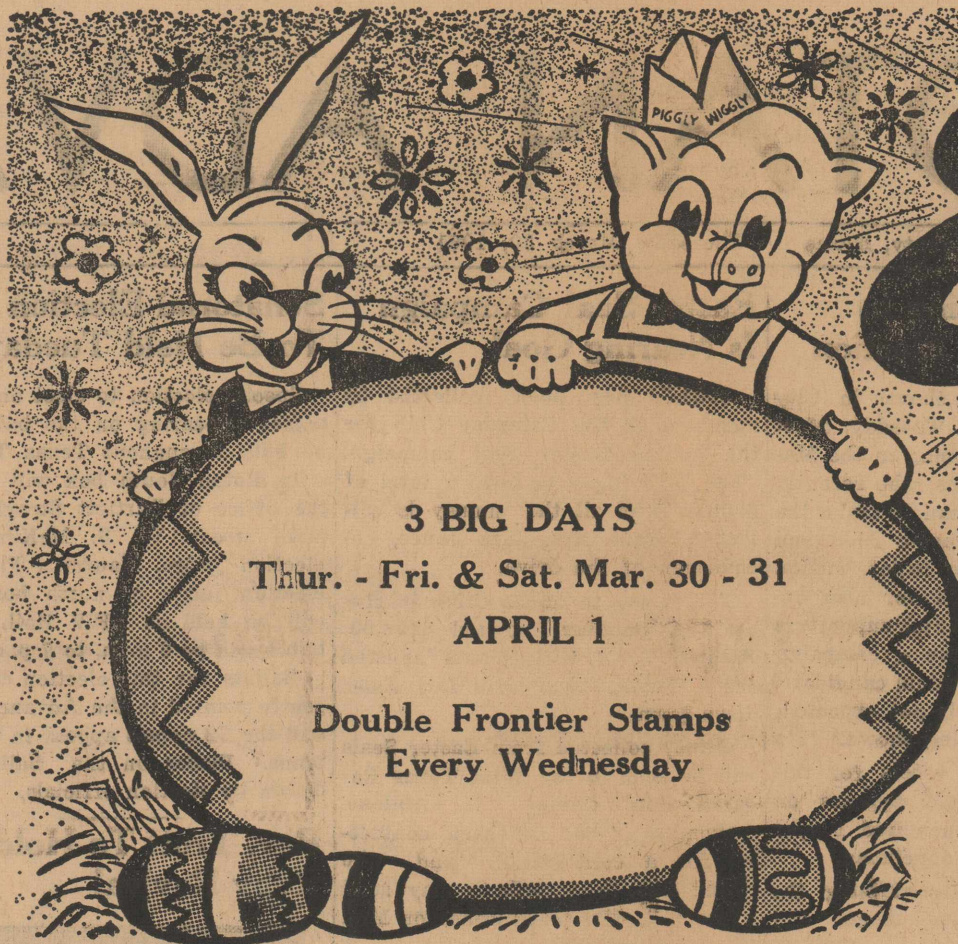
Denten foods are receiving top billing at many food markets now. Ample supplies of fish, eggs and cheese are available to meet the demands of home makers seeking meat substitutes.

March is egg month . . . The period when egg supplies are largest, prices lowest and quality highest. In red meats, some of the "specials" on beef includes forequarter cuts, stew meats and ground beef. You'll find ample supplies of fryers, and good values in turkeys.

At the vegetable counter, you will find the hardy vegetables, such as cabbage, mustard, red potatoes, dry onions, celery and carrots, continue to be the best buys. Iceberg lettuce, endive and escarole are good choices for salad greens.

Bananas and grapefruit offer the best value for your fruit dollar. Bananas, avocados and pineapple are available in some stores and strawberries are appearing at fruit counters in some parts of the State.

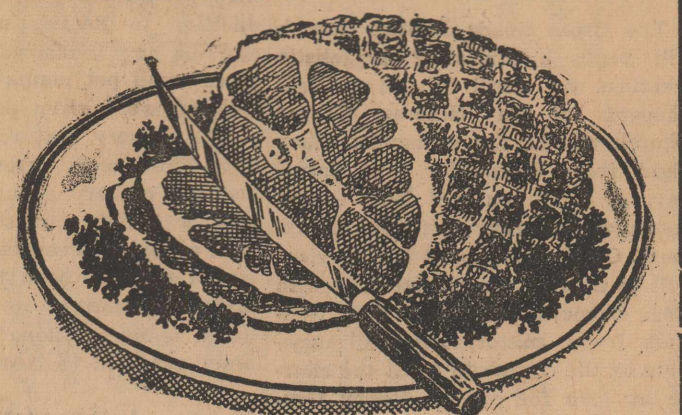

In this age of mechanized cotton production, a uniform stand with desirable plant spacing is a must. Since such a stand requires precise planting operations, both equipment improvements and planting practices are important. It is also important to take full advantage of the growing season by obtaining a satisfactory stand the first planting.

One guide to use in aiming for maximum germination of the first planting is soil temperature. Temperature is major factor in seed germination and cottonseed germinates poorly at temperatures lower than 70 degrees F. It has also been proven that seedlings grow more slowly and less vigorously at the lower temperatures.

In order to determine the accuracy of soil temperature as a guide to planting dates, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station conducted a series of tests at the Lubbock substation. One of the findings was that minimum soil temperatures at an eight-inch depth for the ten-day period preceding planting were useful as planting guides.

It was also found that cotton seedlings emerged in five to nine days when the preplanting soil temperatures at eight-inch depth averaged 60 degrees F. or above for ten days. But up to fifteen days were required for seedling emergence when the average soil temperature was lower.

Another advantage of using soil temperatures instead of currently recommended dates as a planting guide is that it allows earlier or later planting, depending on current weather conditions.

Anyone desiring more information on the tests conducted by the Experiment Station may drop by our office and pick up a copy of MF-465, "Soil Temperature-A Guide To Timely Cotton Planting."

Applying fertilizer to the farm fish pond not only increases the amount of food in the water, it is also one of the best practices for controlling submerged mosses, says Ed Cooper, extension wildlife specialist. The first application should be made in early spring.

Since the pond water is usually deficient in the same nutrients as the soil over which it flows, use the same commercial mixture that is used for the farm crops. An initial application of 100 pounds per surface acre of water is suggested. This amount should cause an extensive development of plankton, resulting in a change in the color of the water. The plankton is used for food by the fish and organisms upon which the fish feed.

Periodic checks of the pond to determine when additional fertilizer applications are needed. Submerge the arm into the water to elbow depth and if the thumb can be seen plainly, more fertilizer should be applied. Only the amount required to produce the desired plankton development, or bloom, should be applied. This may be about half of the initial application.

Pond fertilization should be stop-

ped during the summer months, because fertilizer can cause a shortage of oxygen. This is especially true during the periods when the wind is not strong enough to cause wave action. If oxygen depletion is too great, the fish will die.

Fertilizer to be used during the year should not be applied all at one time. Start in spring and make enough applications to maintain the desired bloom. The shading from the bloom will control submerged mosses, thus fishing and swimming more enjoyable.

## 'As It Looks From Here'

Washington, D. C. -- Mental illness is one of the greatest health problems in America. Many feel it to be the number one problem, but it ranks far down the line in interest and in dollars and cents spent for patients' care and research study.

In recent years there has been an increased interest in trying to do something about this very serious situation. In 1955 there was established a Joint Commission on Mental Illness and Health under grants administered by the National Institute of Mental Health. The purpose was to analyze and evaluate the needs and resources of the mentally ill people of America and make recommendations. The Commission released its report last week, March 24. The study carried on by the Commission reveals amazing information. The crux of the report is that attempts must be made to provide more human care for the mentally ill and to transform "insane asylums" into hospitals and clinics true to the healing purpose of medicine.

One of the most revealing findings of the study is that comparatively few of 277 State hospitals administer treatment to their patients calculated to bring about recovery. In other words, we continue to treat our mentally ill as people who "must be put away." We have never come to look upon the insane or mentally ill as we look upon people who have other illnesses. We too often assume that the "insane" person is one who must be removed

from society for the rest of his life. For ages people have looked upon people who have "lost their minds" as "totally crazy" and that the only place for them is behind bars.

Human beings regard loss of liberty, forceable detention, removal from the community and imprisonment as punishment for wrongdoing. The mentally ill are no exception. As the pioneer reformer Clifford Beers once said, "Madmen are too often man-made."

Before enough can be done for the mental ill, an appeal such as is made for polio, cancer, heart disease, and cerebral palsy must be made. A mentally ill person is not disgraced by his illness, nor should the family of such an unfortunate one feel that a stigma is placed on them. The fact that society tends to reject these unfortunates is, of course, well known. What is tragic is that while we promote crusades

for many other types of physical illness, so little has been done in the past to reach those whose illness is less understood. There was a day not long past when tuberculosis at times stigmatized its victims. But the stigma of the disease, recognized to be physical, tends to disappear as it becomes better understood and publicly attacked.

The reason this is true is rather simple. The physically sick person fits society's deep-seated conception of a sick person. Feeling helpless, he turns to others for help and, receiving help, is responsive to it. He evokes sympathy. Commonly, the acutely ill psychotic does not appear to want help or except help but, quite the reverse, thinks he is not sick and may interpret "help" as "harm." He repels sympathy. Oftentimes society then uses its huge institutions as dumping grounds for social rejects rather than as true

Even violence by the mentally ill is an exception rather than the rule -- a popular misconception. It is a characteristic of the mentally ill that they behave in an irresponsible manner; it is a characteristic of society that we behave toward them in the same manner.

Under the numerous social programs of the Federal Government, it would seem justified to place mental health research high on the list of activities. Evidently there are large gaps in our scientific research about the fundamentals of mental illness.

Certainly State and local Governments should have the responsibility of administering to patients in their own institutions, but to draw on the knowledge developed by research under the National Institute of Mental Health.

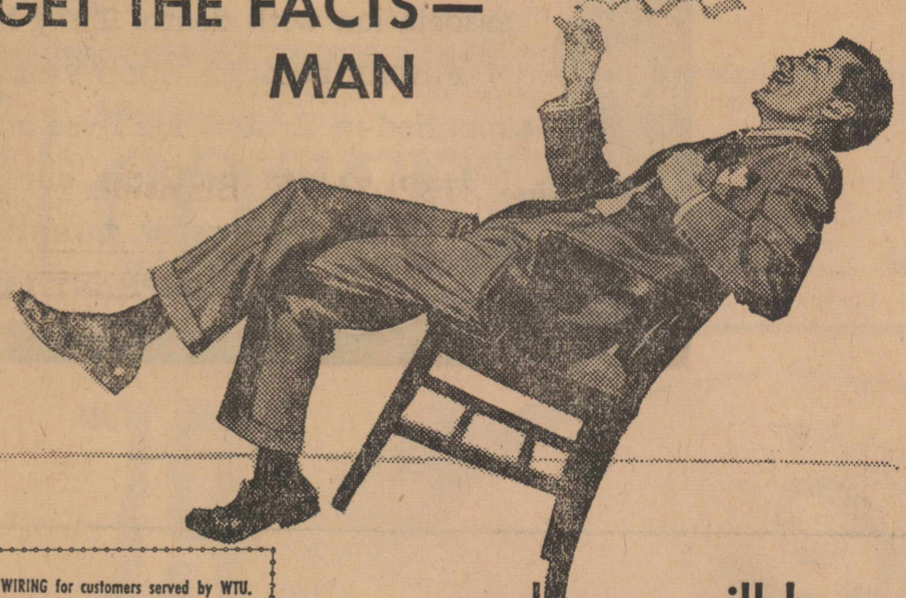

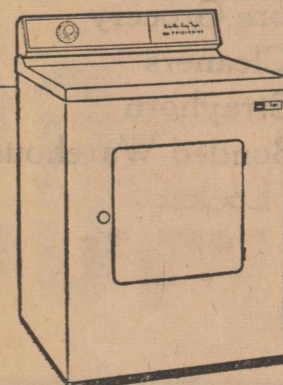
