The high frequency system goes into operation today, but has been used during the week in testing.

Clarks state purpose of the system is to make for faster and more efficient service to their customers in the rural section. They can save a full day on much work by the field units calling the master station to secure parts etc., when a special order is required.

The high frequency system is affected less by adverse weather conditions.

Local Delegation In Austin For Hearing

The Rotan delegation of Rotan area citizens left Wednesday morning to attend the public hearing on House Bill 794 before the House Conservation Reclamation Committee in Austin. The hearing was scheduled for 7:30 p. m. Wednesday.

A complete list was not available of those attending. Tentative list given the Advance was Mayor Morrow and the entire City Council, City Attorney Arthur Blanchard, Dave Posey, Buddy Burnett, Wayne Nowlin, Cecil Edwards, A. A. Aaron and Cecil Lotief.

The bill proposes Rotan Municipal Water Authority for the purpose of building a pipeline to bring treated water from Snder to Rotan, about 25 miles. The area covered by the authority would be the City of Rotan, plus the area a mile in all directions from the city limits, plus a one mile wide strip 11 miles out of town along the route of the present Rotan water pipeline to its city well field.

Landowners in this one mile strip are already getting their water supplies from the present pipeline.

This is the first step in getting the water district formed and if the Committee gives favorable report, the Legislature is expected to pass the bill shortly. After this property owners would vote their wishes on the proposed water district.

Most Families Today are worried from payday to payday. Financial difficulties may be due to one or more of the following reasons:

1. Overestimating family income
2. Underestimating expenditures
3. No long-term plans for family goals
4. Irregular or uncertain income
5. Too many fixed obligations
6. Not enough family participation in management
7. Arguing over who should be the manager

8. Differences in attitudes toward values. What is really most important among the things which you have to choose to spend?

9. Poor buymanship
 10. Interest-eating debts
- Analyze your situation to discover what may be your difficulty and then set out to do something to correct the situation.

II. If you must cut expenses:

1. Look at your food situation. Good shopping techniques can help stretch the food dollar. Make your shopping list and stick with it. Make your list from a plan for feeding the family. Avoid impulse buying.

2. Re-examine your long-term expenditures. You may be spending too much for housing, investments, or car payments. The things that you consider most important, your values, may need to be studied to get them in line with your pocket-book.

3. Investigate better use of your recreation dollar. Use public facilities for swimming, fishing, picnics, and concerts. Organize your own entertainment and make a plan for how much you have to spend.

4. What about your medical bills? Give better care of the family. Investigate low-cost hospital and medical plans. Eat nutritious meals.

III. Plan now for large expenditures that our regular monthly income cannot take care of when they are due. These items for you might include the following:

- Property taxes, \$150.
- Car license, 23.
- Yearly insurance payment, 175.
- Car repair, 75.
- Tires, 55.
- Christmas spending, 85.
- Total \$563.

If this is your situation, then you should divide this total by 12 and set aside about \$46 in a savings account so that you can take care of these obligations when they are due. The money you get aside in the savings account can draw interest. If you borrow the money to meet these obligations, or finance them, you pay interest.

IV. Thinking of growing a home garden:

1. Saving may be on the family food budget if a good production is followed. Being in a position to freeze or can the excess vegetables may increase this saving. Figure all of the costs involved, however.

2. Some gardeners grow a home garden strictly because of the quality factor. On the other hand, there are some vegetable crops that can be bought the year-round at a very good price - examples, carrots, head lettuce, and dry onions. To be sure of the best quality from your garden, harvest at the ideal degree of maturity.

3. Families will eat more fresh vegetables if they produce a reasonable supply at home. Very few will purchase the required amount of fresh vegetables at today's retail prices if they must buy their entire supply at the market.

4. Relaxation to relieve tension, pleasure from watching plants grow and produce, and satisfaction gained from producing for your own needs are other points that may influence or in deciding on whether or not you will grow a garden.

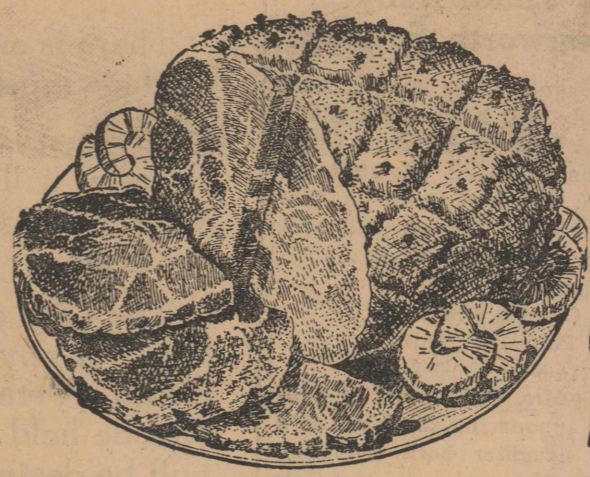
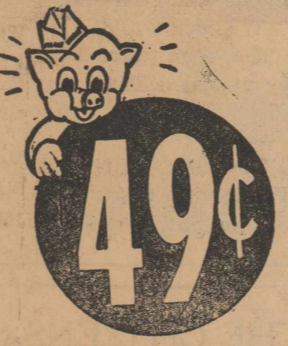

Attention Mr. Farmer

It was felt by most people that the crop-hail policy in use for the last few years was not fully satisfactory to the purchaser or the companies. For that reason, there have been some rather drastic changes made this year in the policy contract by all legal reserve companies insofar as the insuring of cotton is concerned.

As you know, Farm Bureau, in the past, has sold the same policy contract as the other legal reserve companies. This year, we will have our own policy contract as we did not feel that the contract being offered by the other companies afforded sufficient protection for the cost. It is possible that it is basically sound and will afford the farmer the best protection for his crops.

Since it is a new approach from the standpoint of insuring cotton, it is impossible to be completely sure that the premium we will charge is the correct premium. However you can be assured that if the company makes more money than is necessary to pay claims, expenses, and set aside the necessary reserves, the balance will be returned to the policyholders in the form of policyholders' dividends.

We are entering our third year in the crop-hail insurance service to our members. As you are well aware, crop-hail damage is unpredictable. Because of this fact, the insurance company must set aside sufficient earnings in good years to offset the bad. The past two years have not been good years, but despite heavy losses, we have been able to lay aside some earnings for greater company stability. We hope, with you, that this will be one of the good years when the earnings will be sufficient not only to add to company stability but also pay a policyholders' dividend.

We do feel that, for you cotton producers, our policy this year better meets your needs than that being offered by other legal reserve companies and hope you will contact your local Farm Bureau service agent, W. A. Hancock as soon as possible for your insurance protection.

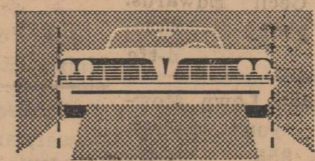

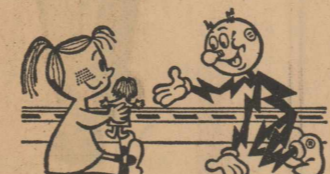

'As It Looks From Here' Christian Science Service Sunday

Washington, D. C.—In recent weeks many people have written me asking what they as citizens, could do to fight Communism. A number of these letters have been from school children and college students.

The FBI was created in 1908. Mr. J. Edgar Hoover has been its Director since 1924.

From the beginning to the present Mr. Hoover has fought subversive elements in our nation. He has surrounded himself with men who are experts in all forms of subversion and un-American activities, whether Communists or something else.

Writing in the April issue of the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin, Mr. Hoover had this to say:

"America, historically an impregnable fortress against tyranny, is engaged in a mortal struggle with world communism. It is time for both citizens and governmental authorities to confront this threat in a calm, realistic, rational, law-abiding manner.

"The Ingredients for Communist Coups in nations which have fallen under its spell always include a populace shaken with fear, hysteria, and confusion. Above all, however, is the danger of irresponsible counteraction by citizens who lend impetus to communism through inept attempts to fight this insidious menace.

"The Leaders of Worldwide Communism proclaim that even American can succumb to the 'rule of revolution' conceived by Karl Marx and galvanized into the first successful communist revolution by V. I. Lenin.

"Lenin said, 'The more Powerful Enemy can be conquered only by exerting the utmost effort, and by necessarily, thoroughly, carefully, attentively and skillfully taking advantage of every, even the smallest, 'rift' among the enemies . . ."

"There Exist Today in our Land a vital 'rift' which the communists are exploiting. Unfortunately, this involves certain people across the country who engage in reckless charges against one another. The label of 'communist' is too often indiscriminately attached to those whose views differ from the majority. Those whose lives are not led according to what one segment of society might decree to be 'norm' are too frequently challenged as 'Reds.'

"Attributing Every Adversity to Communism is not only irrational, but contributes to hysteria and fos-

groundless fears. Communism is indeed, our paramount adversary, and it leans on its credo of invincibility and a concept of historical inevitability to accomplish its ends. The way to fight it is to study it, understand it, and discover what can be done about it. This cannot be achieved by dawdling at the spring of knowledge; it can only be accomplished by dipping deeply into thoughtful, reliable, and authoritative sources of information.

"The Job of Curtailing and Containing Communism is one for legally constituted authorities with the steadfast cooperation of every loyal citizen. This is neither the time for inaction nor vigilante action. We must unite as a people, we must understand our basic American heritage under law, and we must face the communist menace with deliberation, quiet courage, and knowledge. These are the qualities which communism shrinks from — these are the qualities against which communism can never succeed."

This would seem to be the real answer to the question, "What can I, as an individual, do to combat communism?"

If anything need be added to what Mr. J. Edgar Hoover has said on this subject, it is suggested that we start by first understanding our own system of government — what it is; what it stands for; how it was formed; and what it was meant to be when created by our Founding Fathers.

**HD Agent Talks On
'Care of Steam Iron'**

"Things to consider in selecting your steam iron is comfort, balance, water opening, temperature control, soleplate, reservoir and special features such as long cords, left or right hand, also if dealer can service them," says Miss Alice Kemp to the Rotan HD Club, April 7, in the home of Mrs. Wayne Nowlin. Miss Kemp demonstrated how to clean your iron.

Clean soleplate while it is cool with scouring soap pad. Wipe clean with damp cloth then re wax your soleplate by rubbing iron over wax paper.

To clean reservoir fill with white vinegar and allow it to steam 15 minutes. Let it stand over night flat so it will drip. Next morning pour out vinegar and fill with distilled water, let steam 15 minutes, then setting flat. Let it drip 30 minutes, empty and dry.

Caution: be sure all vinegar is rinsed out as any left in iron may stain clothing.
