We are entering our third year in the crop-hail insurance service service to our members. As you are well aware,
crop-hail damage is unpredictable. Because of this fact, the insurance company must set aside sufficient earnings in good years to offset the bad. The past two yearo have not been good years, but despite heavy losses, we have been able to lay aside some earnings for greater company stability. We hope, with you, that this will be one of the

We do feel that, for you cotton producers, our policy this year better meets your needs than that being offered by other legal reserve companies and hope you will contact
