



**Easy Outdoor Cookery-**

A quick, easy way to prepare the main dish for a picnic or outdoor meal is to cook on skewers . . . "Shish-Kabobs" are delicious and different.

There are many possibilities, according to Alice Kemp, Fisher County Home Demonstration Agent. You may have all vegetables or all meat on the skewer, or alternate the meat cubes with a combination of vegetables such as tomato wedges, chunks of carrot mushrooms, pieces of green pepper, onion, etc.

A basic "shish-kabob" is made with boneless meat, cut in 1-12 or 2-inch cubes. (Beef, lamb, ham or pork may be used.)

With lamb or veal, use the shoulder or leg; with beef, use the round, chuck or rump. Allow 1-2 to 3-4 pound per person.

Prepare the meat by simply brushing with lemon juice and olive oil, or marinate from 2 hours to 2 days in the following mixture: 1 part of lemon juice to 3 parts olive oil seasoned with crushed garlic, salt and pepper, and if you wish, add some thyme, oregano, bay leaf or cumin.

Now string the cubes on your skewers . . . If you like the meat rare push the cubes closely together. For all around crispness, separate them on the skewer.

Broil over coals. It will take from 10 to 16 minutes, depending on how well done you want the food.

Serve immediately.

**Save Color and Food Value in Vegetables**

Limp, over-cooked, drab looking vegetables have little appetite appeal, and little food value. You will save color and food value by using proper cooking methods, reminds Alice Kemp, Fisher County Home Demonstration Agent.

Serve three vegetables each day - a green or yellow vegetable, sweet or Irish potatoes, and one other vegetable. Here are some pointers to remember in cooking vegetables.

Use fresh, crisp vegetables.

Cook in as little water as possible. Cook only until tender - don't overcook.

Cook vegetables in their skins when possible.

Cook most green and yellow vegetables in a covered pan.

Never use soda in cooking vegetables - it destroys part of the food value.

Serve vegetables as soon as possible after cooking . . . The longer they are exposed to heat and air the more vitamin C they will lose.

Directions and special recipes for tasty vegetable dishes are given in Extension Bulletin 923, "Vegetables - Selection, Care and Cooking." You can get a copy from your county home demonstration agent's office.

**House Family Reunion Held Sunday**

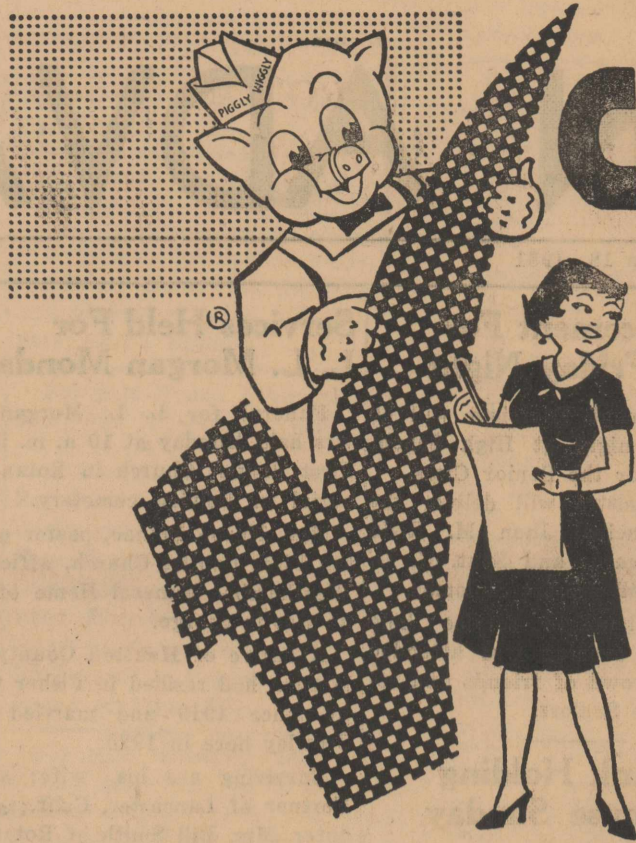
A family reunion was held on Mothers Day at the home of Mrs. J. W. House.

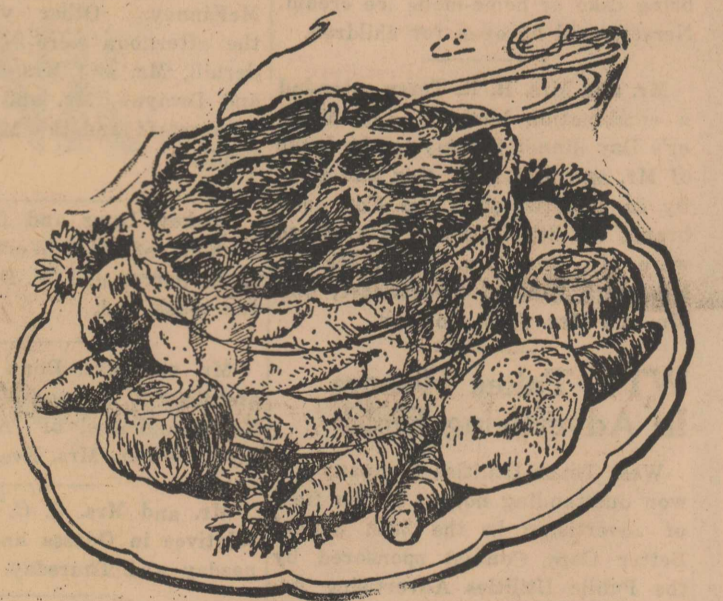

## More Rights For Servicemen-Dependents

Ninety days of service are not required to qualify a veteran for burial allowance. It does not matter whether he served one day or more than ninety days. If he had any kind of discharge other than dishonorable he is eligible for the allowances toward his funeral. Before August 18, 1958 the amount was \$150, since that time the allowance has been raised to \$250.

A certified copy of the death record, an itemized bill of the funeral director, receipted to show that bill is paid in full and if veteran had no claim number, a certified copy of his discharge papers. If the funeral director's bill has not been paid, he is entitled to file for the claim. Certain additional payments may be made if the veteran dies in the

Veteran Administration Hospital, these may include transportation of the body of the veteran from the hospital to his burial place.

Any claim for the statutory burial allowance must be supported by a statement of account (preferably on the printed billhead of the funeral director) showing the name of person for whom services were performed, the nature and cost of the service rendered; all credits, and the name of the person or persons by whom payment in whole or in part was made. Where payment has been made in full the statement of account should be receipted in the name of the firm or individual performing services. The funeral director may file for an unpaid bill.

plied in the death of any veteran, discharged under conditions other than dishonorable. If no claim is made by the next of kin, a close friend or an associate may receive the flag. An American Flag may be obtained by a service officer, an undertaker or other interested person from the nearest V. A. office or a first class postoffice where a supply of burial flags are kept on hand.

Each veteran who has served and has been discharged in any way except dishonorably is entitled to a headstone furnished by the government in all private and National cemeteries. Headstones furnished may be either upright or flat. Upright headstones are all made of marble. The flat markers are made of marble, bronze or granite.

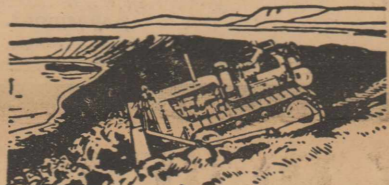

## About Your HEALTH

Austini—Accidents killed 93,000 Americans last year—including more than 5,200 Texans. How many of those people died because they were "accident prone?"

There is no way of knowing, of course. "Accident prone" is a phrase coined by the experts—psychologists, industry men and others on the theory that many accidents result from the victims' emotional make-up.

Studies by agencies interested in

health and safety have shown that relatively few people are responsible for a high percentage of accidents. Conclusion: a person who has had one accident is more likely to be involved in another one than a person who has had none at all.

State health Department studies confirm this. For example:

An industrial firm tries to reduce accident rates among heavy equipment operators by ordering a painstaking investigation into every mishap. Everything from shop environment to operator reaction time is checked.

The accidents continue despite an intensive educational campaign. But when the operators with bad records are being transferred to other jobs, accidents involving heavy equipment fall to one-fifth of the former rate.

The transferred operators? They keep on having accidents on their new jobs and at home.

The experts have traced definite personality patterns among accident-prone people. Almost invariably they are impetuous, following impulses without deliberation or planning. Their decisiveness is, in reality, a drive for independence and self-reliance.

For the most part, investigators have found they have a history of neurotic traits in childhood. They simply reach a point, in their failure to handle an emotional situation, when an unpleasant happening becomes a physical and emotional necessity.

Result: a "accident." But while admitting that such a thing as accident proneness exists,

stress environmental hazards and biological conditions such as fatigue, temporary stress-produced in attention, impaired vision or hearing or underlying disease as the major culprit in accidents.

Too much emphasis on accident proneness, they feel, tends to obscure need for correcting defects in industrial equipment, slum housing, inefficient traffic systems and

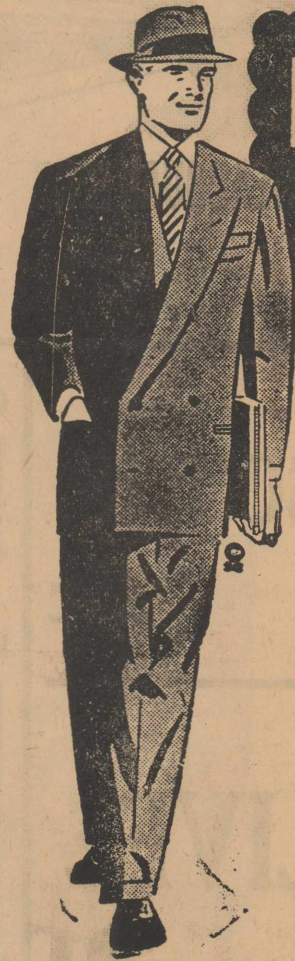

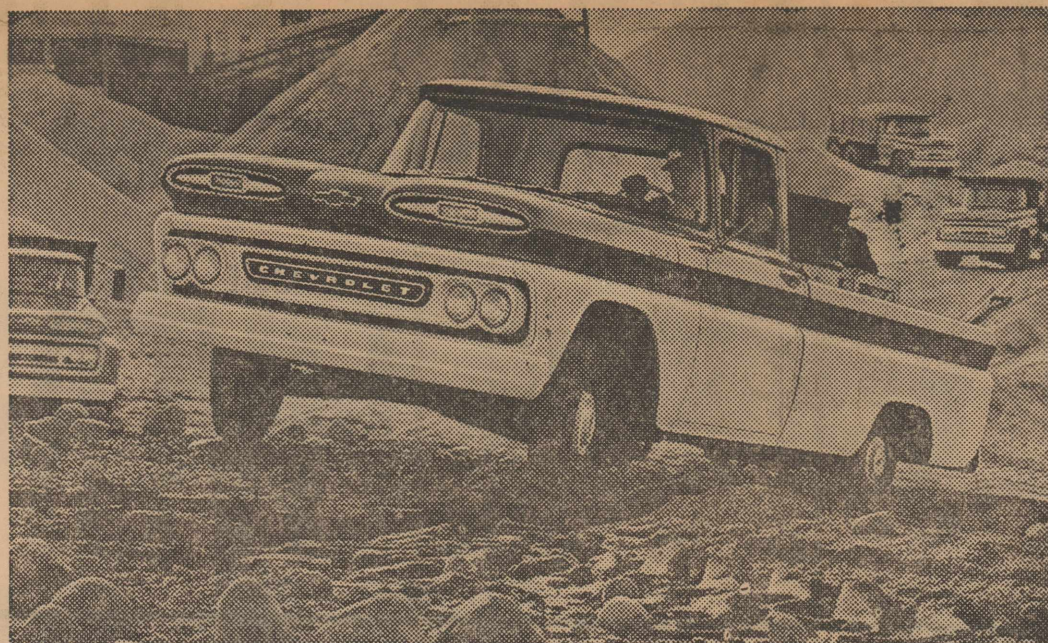

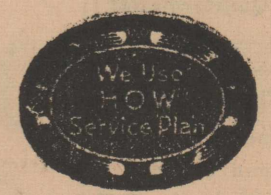

The latest report to the Secretary of Agriculture indicates that Texas, as of May 5, 1961, had 18,044 farms signed up under the feed-grain program and that sight drafts in the value of \$3,210,485 have been issued, according to State Administrative Officer W. Lewis David.

"The program is now getting into full swing," David said, "and we anticipate that some 60 to 70 thousand farms will have signed up before the closing date of May 31."

Mr. David, of Corsica, was appointed State Administrative Officer of the ASC last week. He is a former member of the State ASC Committee, a graduate of Texas A & M College, served as County Agricultural Agent in Madison, Liberty and Brazoria counties and is a successful farmer in his own right.

Johnsongrass can be eliminated from Texas cotton fields in one season through the use of proper cultural methods supplemented by Spot spraying, says Glenn Black, extension cotton specialist.

Herbicidal oil such as naphtha should be used early in the season while cool weather prevails. Diesel or kerosene give best results during warmer weather. Water solutions of sodium dalapon or other chemicals are also effective. Oils are commonly applied to the crown of Johnsongrass near the ground while water solutions are applied as foliar sprays.

A half and half mixture of naphtha and diesel oil or naphtha and kerosene are oil sprays commonly used in warmer weather. Oil mixtures may be used for economy

with CO56 added for increased toxicity, or for a combination of contact toxicity and residual effectiveness. Oil sprays kill on contact when applied to the crown of Johnsongrass sprouts 6 inches or less in height.

Sodium dalapon is usually used at the concentration of 20 pounds in 100 gallons of water. It is applied to the foliage and is a translocated herbicide but also has a residual effect.
