

Letter From Missionary In Africa is Interesting

The following letter from Miss Clegg is very interesting. She is a native of Fisher County and has a host of friends and relatives here. She has been in missionary work in Africa for a number of years.

Dear Friends,

As I think of all of you who have been so faithful to write and send cards and parcels, my heart is filled with gratitude for friends like you. May God fulfill His promise to you in making it more blessed to give than to receive.

When I read this quotation, "If faith can remove mountains, is love less powerful?", I realized that we need both faith and love in our work to overcome the power of the devil.

In our hospital service on Easter, we had 22 who came to the altar for prayer. It thrills our hearts to think that nearly every Sunday since our hospital chapel was opened, souls have come to the altar for prayer.

Several weeks ago we treated a witchdoctor who was very ill, but in spite of that she seemed to have supernatural strength. The first night in the hospital she fought nurses and finally ran away. Her relatives brought her back. After several days she showed a sincere desire to leave her old ways of sin and darkness. We saw how God had worked a miracle of love and grace in her heart.

We have another patient who was critically ill, and apparently dying. We were glad that he lived through the night, and were surprised to see his condition improve the next day. Since then, he has continued to improve. One day we reminded him of what God had done for him. He smiled and told us that he had already given himself to the Lord since his illness.

Sometimes many different ones speak to one patient before he makes his final decision for Christ. One of our patients had been visited by the native pastor and later one of the missionary nurses talked to him about the Lord. He even made the statement that we were too religious here. But one night his life hung in the balance. We told him that there was now very little time left for him to decide to follow Christ. During the night he prayed and came back to the Lord. The following day he went out into eternity, but even his heathen relatives were glad to hear that he had returned to the Lord before he died.

A beautiful child of about one year old was brought to the hospital in the middle of the night. But he arrived too late. His parents were very sad when we told them that he was already dead. It was very apparent that he had died as a result of witchdoctor medicine. Then we had the opportunity of talking and praying with the parents before they took their dead child home again. Oh, how we need to pray that God's love will penetrate the darkness of these hearts.

I visited my outstation Sunday School for an Easter service using flannelgraph pictures. There were about 50 present and most of them were children. They listened with much interest as they saw the pictures and heard the story. Help us pray that God will shine His light into these hearts before they are lost in the darkness about them.

During this month I am working duty in the hospital. Many times I am made to realize that God is working with me, and I rejoice that we have the privilege of being workers together with God. He says, "As the Father hath sent me, so send I you." Your Missionary, Neta Clegg

TELEPHONE TALK

FARM INTERPHONE --- NEW TIME-SAVER FOR FARMERS

A practical new communications service will be introduced in Texas in July to help farmers get more things done without so much wear and tear on them or others in their families.

The farm interphone, a compact communications package which will be available in July, should prove to be a real timesaver for hard-working farm families. It is designed to do three big jobs for you who live and work on the farm.



The first thing it does is provide regular telephone service between the house, barn, other farm buildings and key outside work areas. Just imagine how many hours and steps this will save a busy farmer and his family in a month.

Second, the farm interphone is hooked up with special loudspeaker-microphones that make it possible to answer the phone — hands free — without interrupting your work. Outside calls may be answered without leaving the barn.

Finally, the farm interphone is installed so that the sounds of the farm buildings can be heard in the house at night. It's a kind of "nightwatchman" that tells you of any unusual activities, livestock in need of attention, a pump or other equipment that might act up, or even the start of a fire.

Tool Chest on Wheels

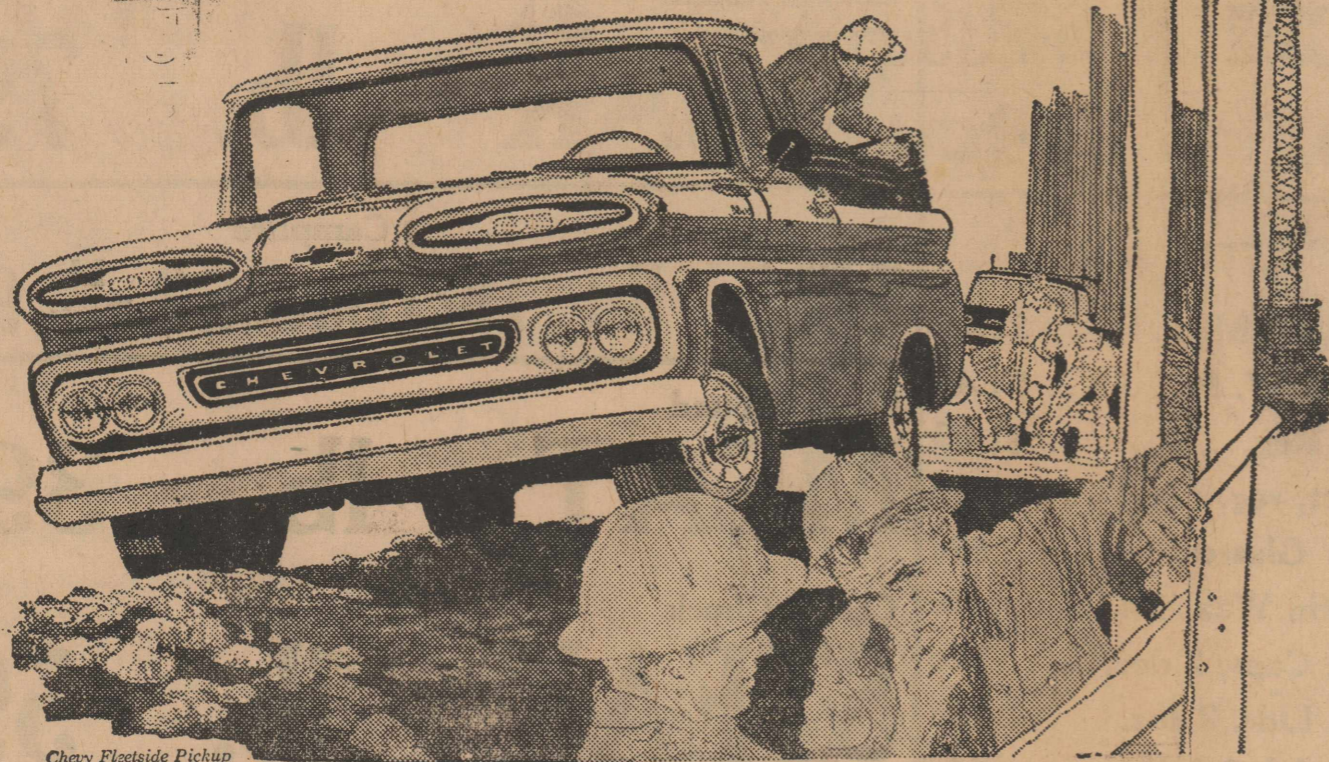

'As It Looks From Here'

Washington, D. C. — Thomas Jefferson said, "Every difference of opinion is not a difference of principle." In this thought lies the strength of our great Democracy which rests on the basic concept of freedom of religion, of speech and of the public press.

Our Nation was founded on this Concept, and particularly since Jefferson's time, our Nation has advanced under it.

Labels have always been popular in identifying philosophies to which individuals and groups subscribe. Eugene Lyons in his recent book attempted a definition of a "conservative." "A conservative," he said, "is one who seeks to conserve the true and tried values of his particular society. He has a wholesome respect for tradition as the repository of the people's experience. He regards change as in the nature of life itself and for that reason wants it slow, systematic, and natural. The life of mankind," he recognizes, "is an ordered growth, not a series of wild, explosive jumps. The fact that conservatism is often confused with 'reaction' is merely a triumph of dogmatic propaganda. Because the whole tradition of America is liberal, an American conservative is in the final analysis the guardian of genuine liberalism."

There was a time in our system of government, as there was with the British, when the term "conservative" and liberal meant about the opposite of what it does today. Out of the British system came the Labor Party and the Conservative Parties. Although the definition of the attitudes prevalent in this Country have been somewhat reversed from its original meaning, it still depends on what part of the Country one comes from and how the terms are interpreted.

A conservative in Jefferson's day wished to conserve power to a central government. A liberal in the sense used at that time, was a States' righter. The liberal believed that power should not be concentrated in the Federal Government, but reposed in the people it represented.

The Paradoxes in the Congress have never been in more evidence than at the present time. The extremes are found in both Parties. Not all Republicans are conservative, and all Democrats are not liberal, and vice versa.

As labels are applied, the Republican Senators from New York and New Jersey are seemingly as "liberal" as any in the entire Congress. Varying in degree, the record of those Senators Kentucky, which are Republicans, are liberal in comparison to their neighbors. The contrast in political philosophies is to be found in the crossing of State lines in many places. Arizona and New Mexico compare favorably in Party numbers, but evidently Arizona is considerably more conservative than New Mexico.

The point is that Labels do not always fit, and it depends on who is making the definition, and to whom and in what area it is applied.

Just a thought: There's a lot of difference between good, sound reasons and seasons sound good.

Dollars & Sense

Get more from your clothing dollars
1. You can do more with less, if you plan well. The well-dressed person emphasizes the coordinated look in each outfit.

2. A wardrobe of fewer clothes, well chosen as to style, use and quality is less expensive, easier to care for and allows for more distinctive results than a larger wardrobe chosen with less thought.

3. Start planning by taking a look at the clothes and accessories you now have.

4. Clean out the garments you never, or seldom, wear and consider at the time why these "white elephants" are in your wardrobe. Was it poor planning or hasty selection or just an irresistible "bargain"?

5. Based on what you now have, plan what you will need for a season, or a year, by listing the kinds of activities in which you are likely to take part.

6. Decide where and when you will shop, and how you will finance your purchases. Be sure you know all of the costs of the different types of available credit.

Does the shoe fit? These questions might help you in buying shoes.

1. Does shape of shoe conform to shape of your toes with the great toe lying straight and the cap not touching toes?

2. In shoes with closed toes, is the shoe 1-2 to 3-4 inch longer than the end of the toes?

3. Is the shoe flexible at the base of the toes?

4. Does the widest part of the ball joint correspond to the widest part in the shoe?

5. Does the arch of the shoe conform to the arch of the foot without exerting pressure against it?

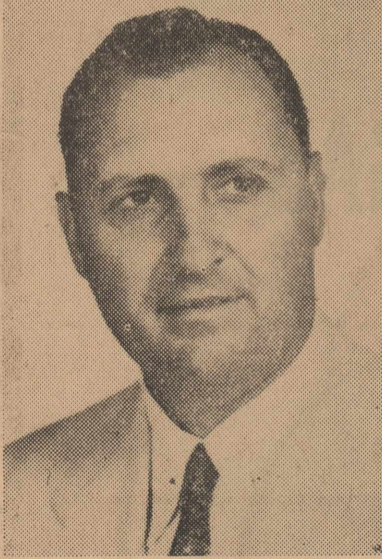
6. Is fit from ball of foot to heel smooth and firm without pressure or gapping? Shoe upper should not cut into the fleshy part of the foot.

7. Does heel section provide firm and comfortable support to the foot? Heels should not pitch, slip or allow the foot to slide forward or from side to side.

8. Do you have both feet measured each time you buy? Judge correct length and width while standing with entire weight on both feet. Try on both shoes. Walk around.

Electric Project Popular in 4-H Clubs

Chicago - A little over 200 years ago Ben Franklin tied a key to his kite string and got one of the most important shocks in history. And about 80 years ago another enterprising American soldered a couple of wires together under glass and illuminated buildings and streets.

Others since have added many inventions and refinements to the electrical industry until today virtually every house, store, factory, farm and school in the state depends on electrical energy.

With widespread use came a need for better understanding the fundamentals of heat, light, power and communications. One such need has been fulfilled for Texas youth through a state-wide 4-H electric program supervised by the Cooperative Extension Service, Texas A&M College, and sponsored by Westinghouse Educational Foundation.

This year with help of volunteer 4-H leaders, county Extension agents and other qualified individuals nearly 6,000 boys and girls are participating in an electric project.

Projects range from simple cord repair jobs to building complicated electronic units. And like their illustrious forefathers, the 4-H'ers strive to increase knowledge and application of electricity.

Incentive awards include college scholarships, educational trips and honor medals. The county having the best rated electric program in the state receives a recognition plaque.

Besides the immediate advantages of this modern program, many 4-H'ers find it an avenue to a future career, says the National 4-H Service Committee, which distribute six \$400 Westinghouse scholarships each year to college students.

A 15-year-old high school sophomore from Stephens county in north central Texas last year won top state honors and an expense-paid trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago.

He is Lester Kuperman who also won a wide circle of admirers demonstrating his scale model farm featuring a low voltage switch system and other modern innovations.
