



**'As It Looks From Here'**

Washington, D. C. -- In the United States Supreme Court held that the State Department was unauthorized to deny a passport to a person because of his belief. In other words, the Court said that a person with a Communist record not be refused a passport.

Several efforts have been made by the Congress to overcome this decision. The House of Representatives has twice passed a measure, but it has never gotten by the Senate.

The following is a Text of a Bill I introduced on June 7, which it is hoped will have early consideration and pass before this Session of the Congress is ended.

Title: "To provide for the Denial of Passports to persons knowingly engaged in activities intended to further the international Communist movement."

"Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled.

"The Congress finds that the International Communist movement which the Communist apparatus in the United States of America is an integral part, seeks everywhere to thwart United States policy, to influence foreign governments and people against the United States, and by every means, including force and violence, to weaken the United States and ultimately to bring it under Communist domination; that the activities of the international Communist movement constitutes a clear, present, and continuing danger to the security of the United States; that travel by couriers and agents is a major and essential means by which the international Communist movement is promoted and directed; that a United States passport requests other countries not only to permit the holder to pass freely and safely, but also to give all lawful aid and protection to the holder, and thereby facilitates the travel of such holder to and in foreign countries; and that in view of the history of the use of United States passports by supporters of the international Communist movement to further the purposes of that movement, the issuance of passports to any person described herein is harmful to the security of the United States and therefore passports should be denied to such persons.

"The Secretary of State is authorized to deny a passport to any person who is a member or former member of, or affiliated with, the so-called Communist Party, or any organization determined by the Subversive Activities Control Board to be subversive, or who knowingly engages or has engaged in activities intended to further the international Communist movement.

"The Secretary of State may require as a prerequisite to the issuance of a passport, that the applicant subscribe to and submit a written statement duly verified by his oath or affirmation whether he is presently, or has been a member of a Communist organization . . . . . or a supporter of the international Communist movement, and to state the circumstances of any such membership . . . . ."

This measure provides that the applicant for a passport, when denied the issuance of such for any reason, be afforded the opportunity of a hearing. This last section of the bill meets previous objections where it was contended that every man should have his "day in court." This section entitles any person to submit proof to refute evidence against him which has been the basis for denying him the privilege of traveling in foreign countries under the approval of the United States Government.

Just a thought: Courage is nothing more than putting convictions into action.

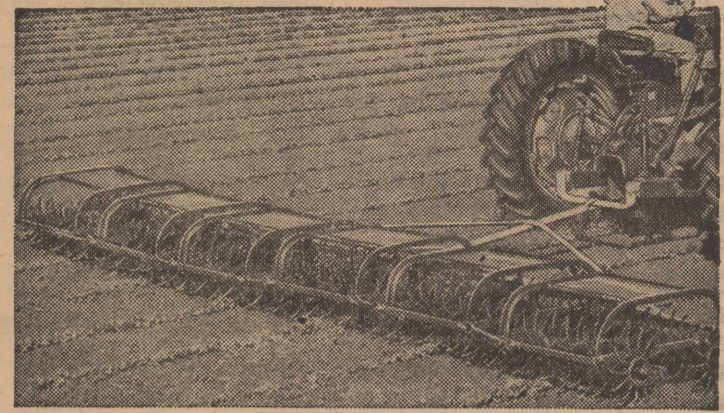

**DPS To Have Extra Patrolman On Duty During Long Holiday**

The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety announced today previous holiday experience in Texas indicates 25 persons will meet violent death on the fourth of July, 1961.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr. said the release of this official prediction "is intended to serve as a challenge to all Texans to prove our estimate is too high."

In announcing the grim forecast, Garrison said the DPS will place in effect "Operation Deathwatch" effective from 12:01 A. M. to 11:59 P. M. on July 4, during which traffic deaths, homicides and suicides, and fatal accidents other than traffic will be tabulated against the prediction.

The department's Statistical Service Manager, N. K. Woerner, estimates that 11 persons will be killed in traffic accidents during the 24-hour period, that five will be victims of homicide or suicide, and that nine will die in drownings and other types of fatal accidents.

"The department's purpose in conducting such an operation is to focus public attention on the fact that holiday driving is more dangerous than usual because more vehicles are on the highways - as well as to compile data which is vital to the constantly - changing problems of traffic supervision," Garrison said.

"In addition to the "Deathwatch," the department will augment the regular highway Patrol force with 150 uniformed patrolmen from the Motor Vehicle Inspection and License and Weight services during the 24-hour period in an effort to keep down the violations that causes accidents."

The DPS director called special attention to the fact that the records show at least one law violation is involved in most fatal accidents in Texas.

"This should prove," he said, "that there is a definite contribution individuals can make to greater highway safety - legal driving."

Garrison pointed out that while emphasis must be placed on holiday traffic hazards, his department also has concern for other incidents which

take human lives. He reminded that during a three-day Fourth of July holiday last year, 10 persons were the victims of drowning out of a total of 15 nontraffic fatalities resulting from other accidents.

"With more boats on the waters of our state than ever before," He continued, "extra precautions should be taken this Fourth of July to avoid tragedy. Boaters should be sure there is a life preserver for every boat occupant and, above all, don't overload or overpower your boat."

Garrison also reminded boaters that 45 miles per hour is the speed limit for all vehicles pulling trailers.

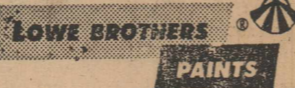

**About Your HEALTH**

It is a sad thing to disillusion those who cherish the myth of their "immunity" to poison ivy or oak or sumac, but the season of prevalence of these toxic plants is fast approaching, and forewarned is forearmed.

Botanical scientists say it is doubtful that anyone is absolutely immune to their poisonous substance. More and more authorities agree that susceptibility is a mere matter of degree, varying with the condition of the individual, the condition of the plant, and the circumstances

of exposure.

Texas has its fair share of the 100-plus plants and plant products known to be capable of causing sometimes severe skin irritations. Among them are the parsnip, lady-slipper, cultivated primrose (especially when in flower), lily bulbs and stalks, stinging nettle, and vanilla beans.

But by far the most common cause of plant dermatitis in Texas and elsewhere in the United States is poison ivy, known to botanists by the tongue-twisting name of *Rhus toxicodendron*. A cousin - - poison sumac, by name - - is common to be swampy regions of eastern Texas, and can sometimes produce severe reactions.

For all practical purposes, poison ivy and poison oak are the same thing. Poison oak is simply any poison ivy that grows as a bush rather than a vine.

Poison ivy is an unusually inconsistent species of plant. Besides growing as a bush and vine, the size of its berries and the outline of its leaves often vary widely. Its leaves are characteristically egg-shaped and pointed, but the edges may be smooth and unbroken or saw-toothed. Moreover, these variations might occur on a single plant, or the leaves on an entire plant may be similar.

But no matter, poison ivy is almost invariably consistent - - its leaves practically always grow clusters of three.

Most researchers agree that actual physical contact with the plant juice either directly or indirectly is necessary before the poisoning agent can cause the typical blisters and skin inflammation.

Thus ivy poisoning is best prevented by learning to recognize the plant and avoiding it. And, of course, it is always prudent to wear protective clothing such as leggings and gloves when going into areas where poison plants are known to flourish. Once exposed, immediate washing with laundry soap and water helps to remove the resin.

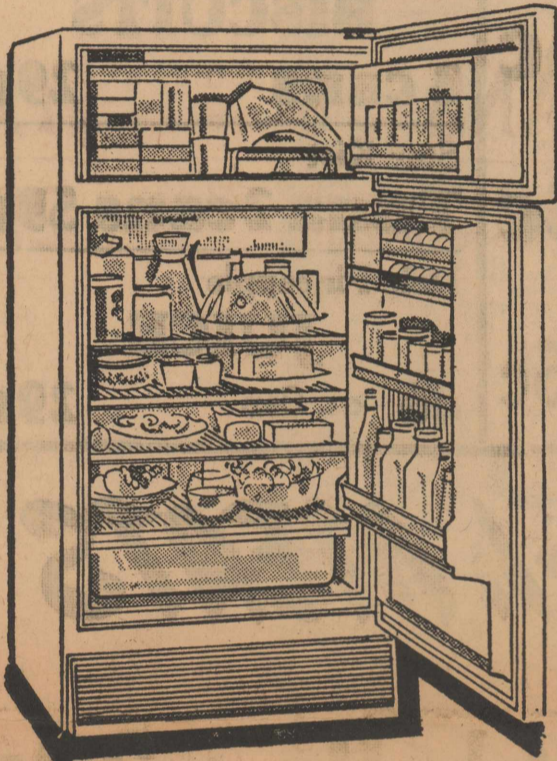

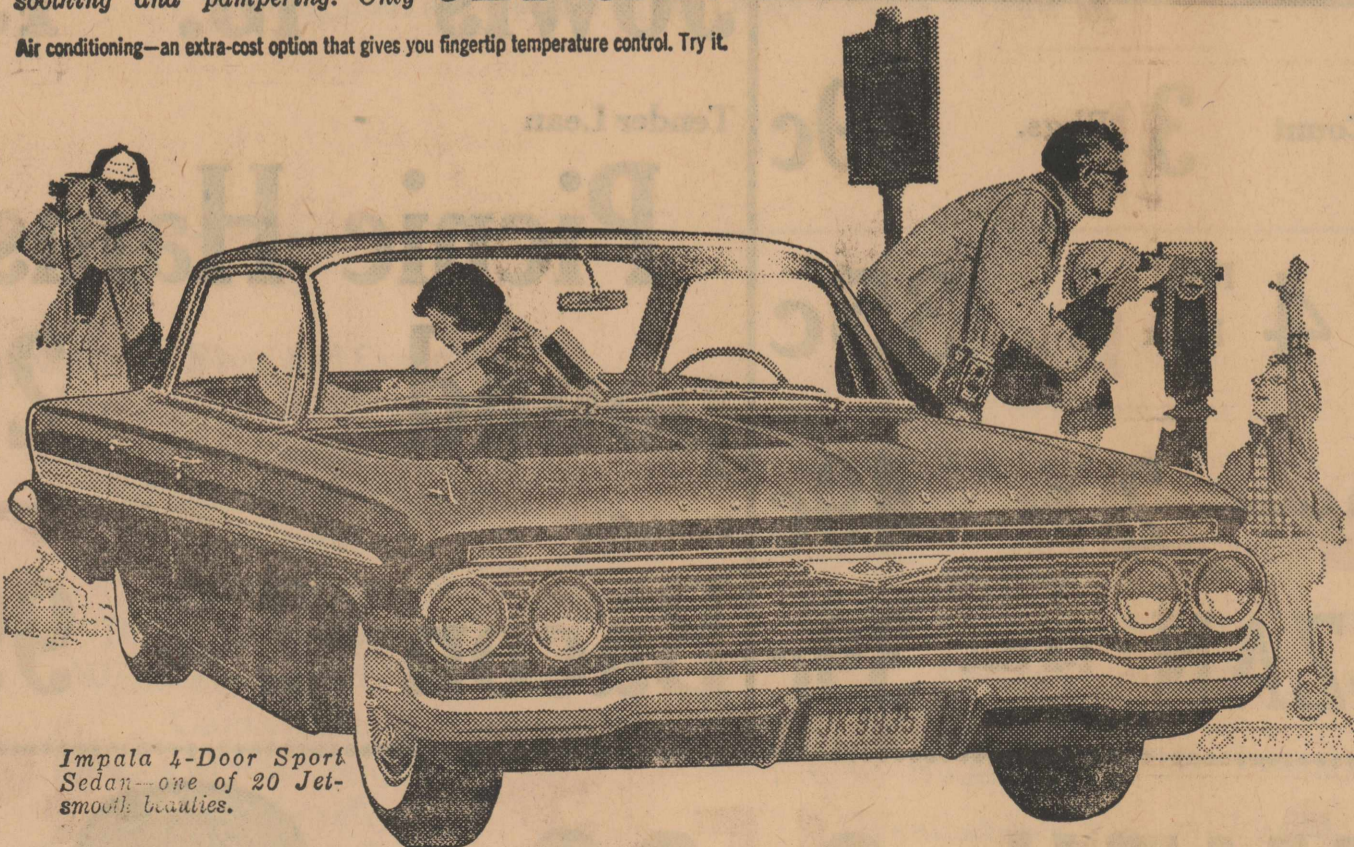

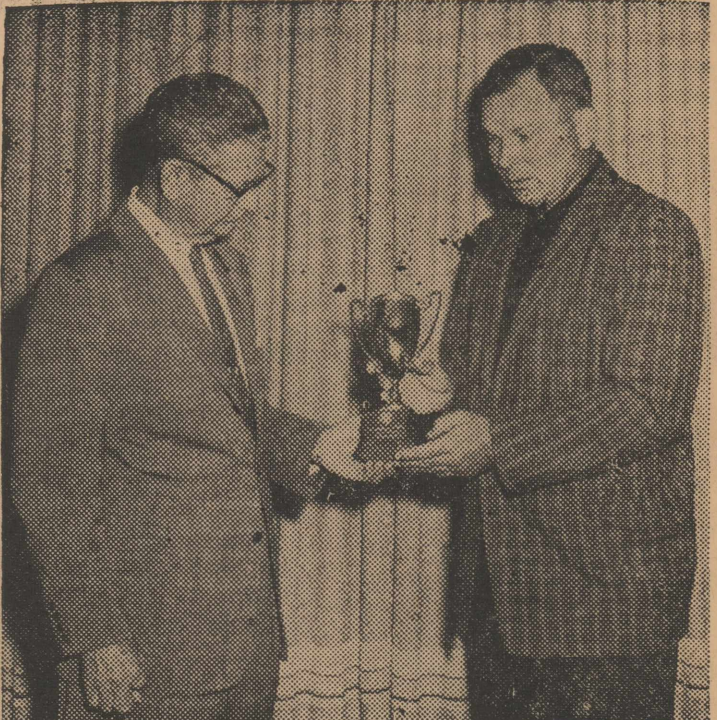

This is a reminder to all farmers who use gasoline for farming purposes from June 30, 1960 and before July 1, 1961 that now is the time to file a claim for refund of Federal tax on gasoline used.

The claim will be allowed only if filed on or before October 2, 1961. Only one claim a year may be filed. The claim should be filed with the U. S. District Director of Internal Revenue, Dallas, Texas.

Every one that filed a claim last year should have received or will receive Form 2240 to be used when filing for the tax refund. In case you loose this card or do not receive one, we will be glad for you to stop by the local extension service office and pick up a form.

Several people have called us in regards to the disease showing up in a lot of the cotton over the county. We have sent off some of the infected cotton stalks to the Plant Disease Lab at A&M for identification. Until we receive a report, stat-

ing otherwise, the visible symptoms show this to be one of the diseases known as Bacterial Blight.

Bacterial blight is prevalent throughout the cotton-growing areas of the United States. The disease can attack any aboveground part of cotton plants and at any stage of growth. It may cause seedling blight, leaf infections, stem rot, and boll decay. Bacterial blight injuries are described by various names, depending on the scriptive terms often used are angular leaf spot, boll rot or boll glight, vein blight, and "black arm".

Losses from bacterial blight are greatest in the Southwest, particularly in the irrigated areas of Arizona and New Mexico and in areas of low rainfall in Texas and Oklahoma. In certain areas of the Pecos Valley and on the High Plains of West Texas and Oklahoma, losses of as much as 25 percent of the crop have been attributed, directly or indirectly, to bacterial blight. In the South Central States losses occur following widespread winds and rainstorms which disseminate the bacteria and produce conditions favorable for infection.

The first symptoms of bacterial blight are small water-soaked lesions on the seed leaves and young true leaves of seedlings. From these primary lesions the bacterial infection may be spread by irrigation water or windblow rain leaves higher on the plant or to surrounding plants. The lesions on the leaves turn brown or black when dry. If the stems and fruiting branches are infected, black, elongated lesions ("black arm") are produced. The black-arm phase of the disease is not common on the varieties grown in the Southeast, but the upland and American-Egyptian varieties commonly grown in the Southwest are extremely susceptible. Severe infection causes shedding of leaves, squares, and young bolls in older plants and thus reduces the yield.

Method of control of bacterial

blight at present depend largely on eliminating the sources of infection on the seed and in the field. A combination of delinting seed with sulfuric acid and treatment with a recommended disinfecting is widely used in areas where serious losses have occurred.

Other methods of controlling blight are the use of seed grown in disease-free fields and the destruction in early fall of infected crop residues by deep, clean plowing.

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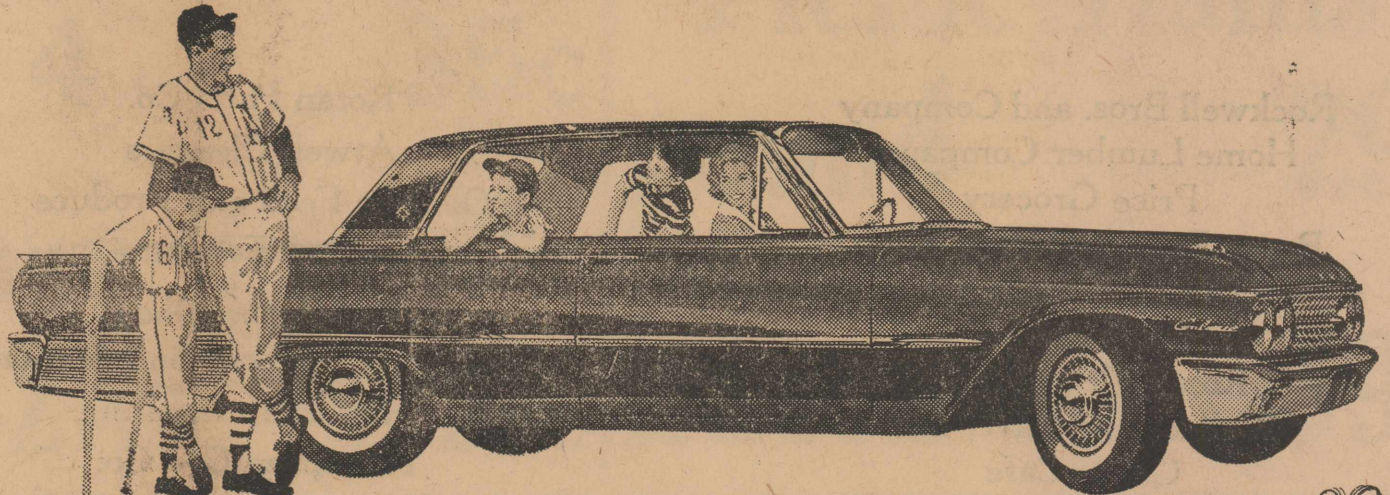

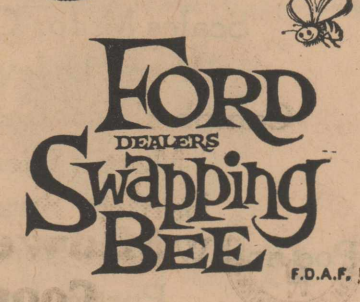
