### GI Loan Program Is Extended

Information has just been received that Congress has passed HR 5723 which extends the GI guaranteed and direct loan program for World War 2 and Korean veterans, and provides additional funds for the VA direct loan program. This law gives new expiration dates for World War II and Korean veterans, providing for a phasing-out of the entire loan program. The new expiration dates as provided by this new law are as follows:

**WORLD WAR II VETERANS**  
All World War II veterans will have until July 25, 1962 to obtain a guaranteed or direct loan; or

World War II veterans will have 10 year from date of discharge from active duty during World War II, plus an additional period equal to one year for each three months of active duty or part thereof during World War II, but in no case beyond July 25, 1967. For example, World War II veterans discharged in 1945, with 30 months service will have until July 25, 1965.

All World War II veterans with a service connected disability will have until July 25, 1967 to use their guaranteed or direct loan benefits.

**KOREAN VETERANS**  
All Korean Veterans have until February 1, 1965 to obtain a guaranteed or direct loan; or

Korean veterans will have ten years from date of discharge from active duty during the Korean conflict, plus an additional period equal to one year for three months of active duty or part thereof during the Korean conflict, but in no case beyond January 31, 1975. For example, Korean veterans discharged in 1955 with 24 months service will have until 1973.

All Korean veterans with a service connected disability will have until January 31, 1975 to use their guaranteed or direct loan benefits.

A total of \$500 million will be available for direct loans during the present fiscal year ending June 30, 1962. Substantial amounts will be allocated to each regional office to provide for direct loans within each area. This bill also provides for additional direct loan funds for each fiscal year until 1975. The maximum amount for a direct loan has been increased from \$13,500 to \$15,000.

In cases where he is eligible for reinstatement of entitlement, a WW II veteran has until July 25, 1967 and the Korean Veteran until January 31, 1975 to use such entitlement. A loan may be closed or guaranteed after the expiration date for a veteran, provided the application was received prior to the expiration date.

All Veterans that have not taken advantage of this loan opportunity should come in and talk the matter over, if you will be at all interested.

**Earl Martin Completing  
Tech Language Institute**

Lubbock-Summer may mean vacation for students, but for 46 teachers of Spanish attending a foreign language institute at Texas Tech, it means returning to the classroom as students themselves. H. Earl Martin of Rotan Junior Hi is one of the 46.

The Summer Language Institute in Spanish is the first at Tech and is one of six in the nation being sponsored under the National Defense Education Act.

Teachers from Oklahoma, Arkansas, Florida, New Mexico and Texas are attending the Tech institute with stipends made available by the act. The eight-week program ends July 27.

"There has been concern about the teaching techniques of foreign languages for a long time," says Alfred B. Strehli, Tech professor of foreign languages and institute director. "Most noticeable today is the approach to language as it is spoken naturally rather than a grammatical approach stressing analysis of the language.

"Purposes of the institute are three-fold," says Strehli. "We are dealing with the teacher of Spanish in a program designed to upgrade the proficiency of spoken language and acquaint them with latest techniques of teaching. We also want to broaden their knowledge of the Spanish culture."

Three visiting staff members are assisting the Tech faculty in the institute. Dr. Dwight O. Chambers, Fresno State University, Fresno, Calif., is a specialist on Spanish culture and civilization on the peninsula. Hector H. Orjuela, University of Southern California, Los Angeles, is a specialist on Spanish American culture and civilization. A Houston public school instructor, Mrs. Olivia Munoz, conducts sessions in secondary methodology and demonstration classes.

Tech staff members assisting with the institute are Dr. Faye L. Bumpass, associate professor of English and Spanish, Dr. Harley D. Oberhelman, associate professor of foreign languages and Strehli.

Demonstration classes of third graders are used to illustrate methods of teaching in elementary schools and junior high students participate in classes showing the use of the aural-oral method on the secondary level.

Emphasis is entirely oral in the elementary grades and the students can develop their natural speech to some extent the way we learn our native tongue, Strehli says. On the secondary level the pace goes much faster. The exact transition to reading and writing is not standardized, and the emphasis is on naturalness of speech and not on isolated words.

Teachers participating in the institute are enthusiastic about the method being taught in the course and most find it superior to the older method of presentation. Using drill and appropriate visual aids, the aural-oral approach gives the students a basic foundation in listening and speaking and speaking before reading and writing.

The method satisfies the desire to speak the language which is what most high school students want, and the aural-oral approach should also produce better teachers or make the difference between good one and a poor one more obvious, said one of the institute participants.

Other advantages of the methods noted by some were the increased interest aroused by the presentation in which the students actively participate and the greater retention of the material which results. Those who have been using the older teaching methods of teaching foreign languages plan to use the new approach.

Visual aids have been used by teachers to present a clearer picture of the Spanish culture and to aid in drills. Some of the visual aids used are movies, slides, pictures, models and drill cards.

A highlight of the institute was a trip to Spanish speaking communities and places of interest in New Mexico. They saw the governor's palace, San Miguel Church and the New Mexico State Fine Arts Museum in Santa Fe. Also included in the weekend tour was visit to Chimaya village, center of textile weaving, where they heard a lecture in Spanish explaining the weaving process followed by six generations of the Ortega family.

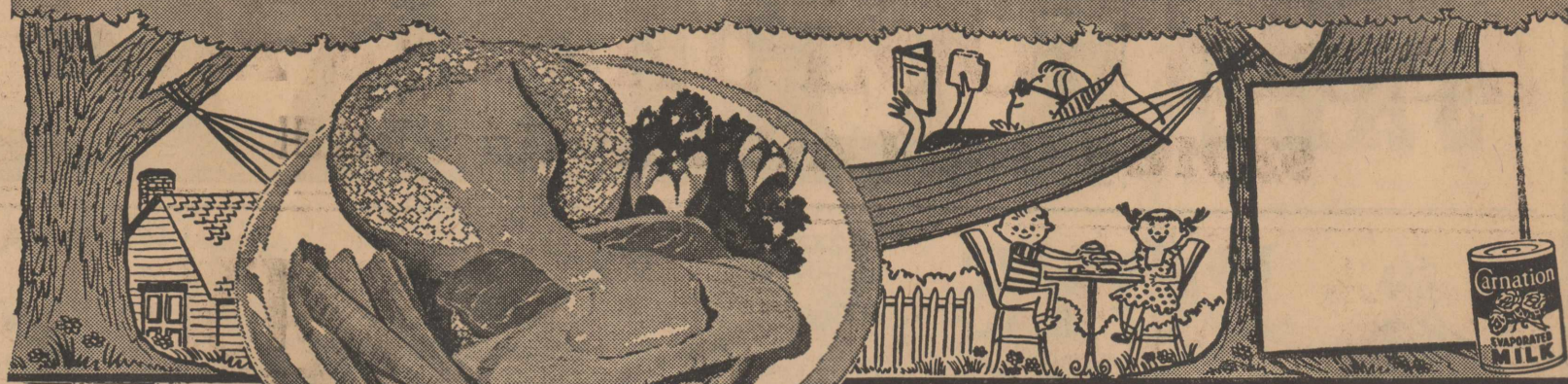

## First Shipment of Wheat Under CROP Program

The first carload of wheat in 1961 for CROP (Christian Rural Overseas Program) in Texas has been contributed, and was dedicated and shipped from Panhandle on Friday, July 14, for flood in Parkistan.

Carson County, of which Panhandle is the county seat, is one of eleven counties with organized CROP committees working to receive contributions of wheat in 1961. The Carson CROP Committee, led by J. T. Broadway, is the first county to receive sufficient wheat contributions for shipment. The total county gifts are expected to exceed the car of wheat.

The movement of the first car of

wheat was prompted by the emergency situation in East Pakistan where floods have left many homeless. The need was presented to CROP by Church World Service for which CROP is the Community Food Appeal. CWS will be in charge of the distribution seeing that it will reach the places of need.

CROP is at work in other areas of Texas receiving contributions of rice, peanuts, cotton and cash. Due to the great demand for beef it plans to extend its challenge to ranchers of the state. Young people in almost every county in Texas will be sharing in CROP's program this Halloween as they enthusiastically make their Trick or Treat calls for CROP.
