

Burleson Asks Stadium Be Named For Baugh

Washington-Rep. Omar Burleson, D-Tex., wants the new sports stadium in Washington to be named after Slingin' Sammy Baugh, the former Washington Redskins ace passer and now coach of the professional New York Titans.

Burleson wrote Wednesday to James Francis Reilly, chairman of the District of Columbia Army Board, that such a name for the stadium "would need no explanation to the public."

"No name in the sports world is more familiar to the Washington area or the nation than that of Sammy Baugh."

Baugh was a professional football star for the Redskins from 1937 to 1955. He played college football at Texas Christian University.

Baugh is a native of Sweetwater, and now lives at Rotan, where he runs his ranch. Both towns are in Burleson's congressional district.

Fire Insurance Key Rate Is Reduced

Rotan residents will be saving nearly \$1,200 per year on fire insurance premiums under a new fire key rate decrease granted recently by the State Board of Insurance.

The key rate was lowered from 44 to 41 cents on per \$100 worth of fire insurance premiums purchased annually. A 1-cent reduction in the key rate is equivalent to a 1 per cent reduction in the amount paid for fire insurance. On the basis of the \$38,291 worth of premiums purchased in 1960, the 3 cent reduction would save Rotan \$1,148 on premium.

The new rate was made effective on all policies written on or after July 1. The state sets the key rate for each city by sending out its inspectors who make charges on deficiencies as well as allow credits for protective measures and equipment.

Of the total 43 cents made in charges, 10 cents of this came for the wholly volunteer fire department and 6 cents for lack of enforcement of building laws. Credits were allowed for booster trucks and methods of fire prevention and principles of fire insurance taught in the public schools.

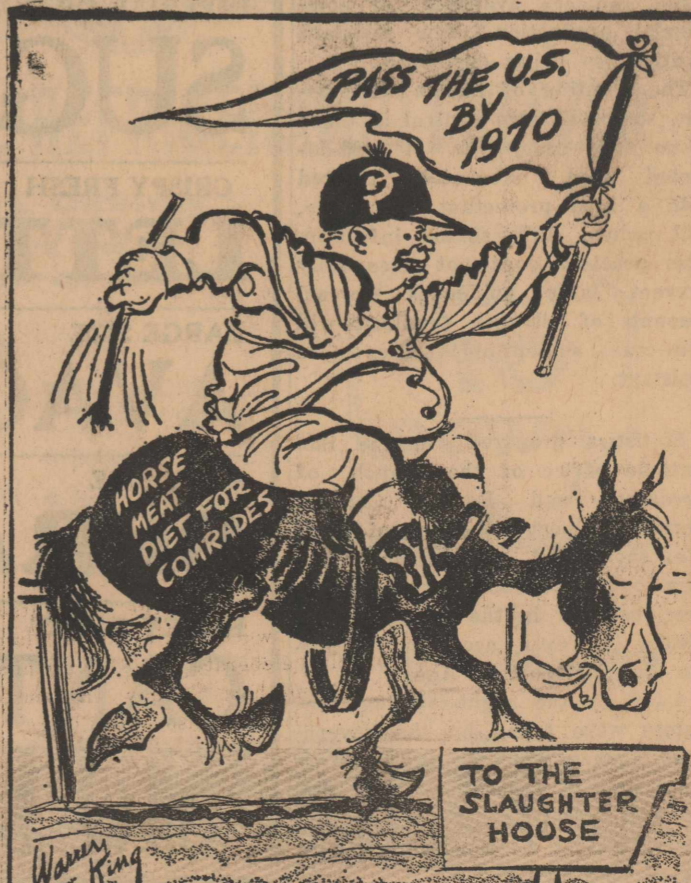

Here is good news for those of you who do not like to find wax particles in your milk from our present cartons. Plastic coated cartons have been developed for packaging fluid milk. These new cartons are designed to replace the present wax coated cartons.

The new carton was introduced and became a big attraction at the Dairy Exposition in Chicago last November. It is a variation of the present wax covered carton. It has a polyethylene coating on the fiber carton. The new carton does not require glue for forming, wax for coating or staples for closing. It comes with the plastic coating already on the carton. All that is necessary is to shape the carton and heat seal it into form.

Manufacturers of the containers say the new cartons will eliminate the costs, inventories and handling of wax, glue and wire; prevent the contact of wax and milk and loose particles in the milk; do away with lanky milk cartons, and improve the appearance of the milk package.

Plastic containers are currently being used on a trial basis in several cities and other installations will follow as soon as additional packaging machines are manufactured. It is reported that conversion kits to modify existing cartoning machines will be available in the near future.

Bacterial blight of cotton causes more damage than any other plant disease in Texas. It generally is most severe on the High Plains and the Coast Prairie, in the irrigated valleys of the Trans-Pecos area and in the sprinkler irrigated areas on the Rolling Plains.

Bacterial blight causes more than one-fourth of the total estimated cotton disease yield loss in Texas. Losses vary from \$35,000,000 to \$40,000,000 per year. Too, additional losses occur in the form of lower and spot grades of the harvested fiber. Losses in 1960 were slightly less than in former years.

Small, angular, brownish or blackish spots occur on the lower leaves. Later the disease may spread to the higher leaves. Only a few spots are necessary to drop the leaves. Yield reduction results from the premature loss of leaves. Small, circular, dark-green spots occur on bolls. These spots enlarge dry up, stain lint and prevent normal opening of the boll. Under severe conditions limbs or stems may die-back.

The disease causing bacteria enter through air breathing pores (stomata) in the leaves, bolls and stems. They also may enter the plant parts through wounds.

The blight organism overwinters in the soil on old plant trash and on or in planting seed. Wind-driven splashing rains, sprinkler irrigation or shirlwinds spread the bacteria from plant to plant in the fields.

The only known practical prevention is the growing of resistant varieties. Acala 1517 BR, Acala 15-17 BR1, Blight master, Austin, Rex and Mebane B-1 have some resistance and are available for commercial production. New resistant varieties are being developed.

The planting of known disease-free seed will give control if there is no soil carry-over. A cid-dented seed, adequately treated with a seed protectant fungicide, will reduce early season infection. This practice does not necessarily prevent later epidemics. Correct amounts of nitrogen fertilizer will help make susceptible varieties more resistant.

Statistics prepared in the San Antonio office of the Branch of Predators and Rodent Control, Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, show that government trappers took more bobcats than in any previous year in the Branch's long history in Texas, according to Milton Caroline, District Agent.

4,479 of the night-roaming predators were taken by the government agency from the agency from ment agency from the fields and pastures of Texas, exceeding last years total of 4,162 which was also an all time high.

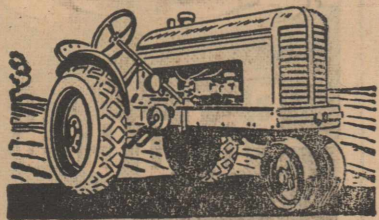

Cub Scout Dad & Lad Program at Tonkawa

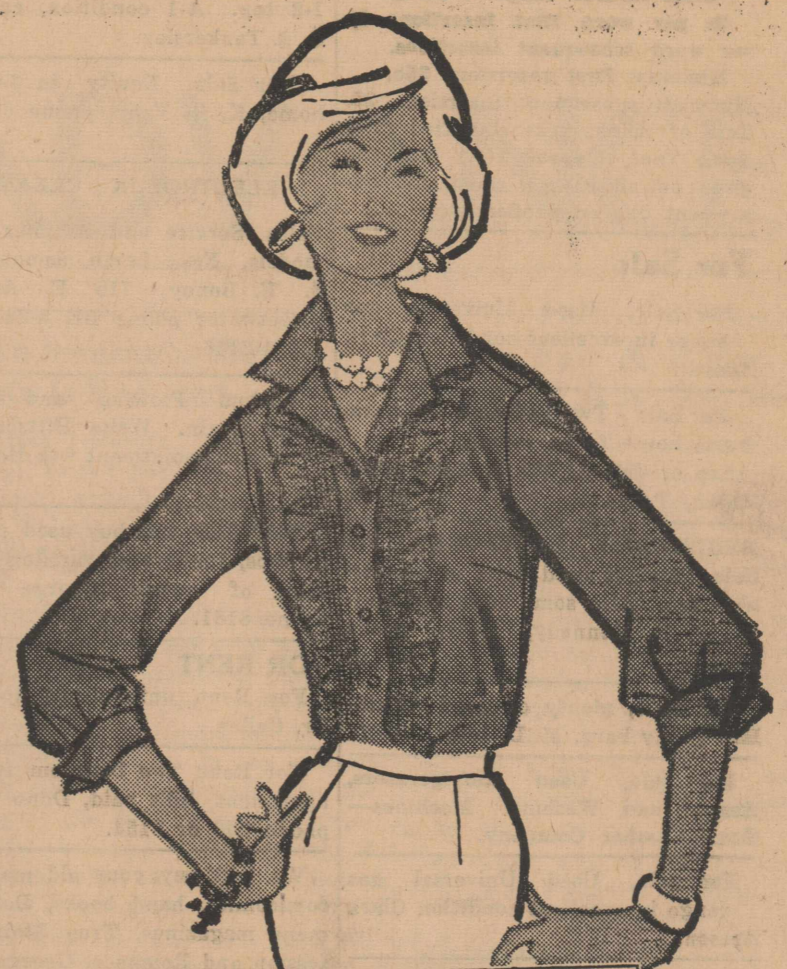

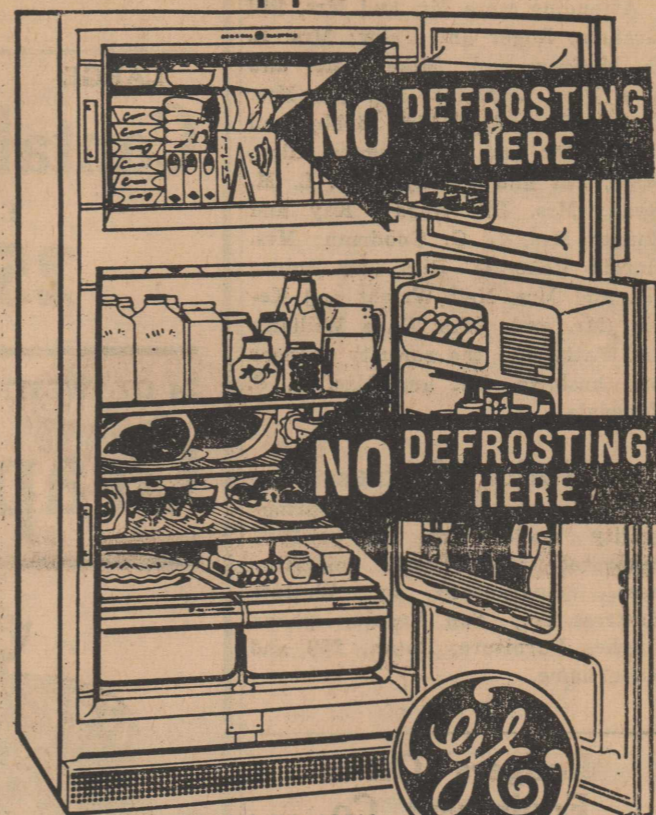



New Farm Trailer License Plates Ready

Austin-New license plates for farm trailers not used for hire are now available, according to Bob A. Lilly, Texas Farm Bureau legislative director.

Lilly said the Department of Public Safety has advised him that the \$5.00 license tags are now in county tax collector's offices across the state. Owners of farm trailers of between 4,000 and 10,000 pounds gross weight must have these tags displayed on their trailers in accordance with a new law passed during the regular session of the 57th Legislature. The law also provides a 30 m. p. h. speed limit, but exempts trailers up to 10,000 pounds gross from brake requirements.

The DPS indicated that it will give trailer owners a "reasonable" period of time to secure the tags before strict enforcement begins, Lilly said. The law became effective with the Governor's signing of House Bill 1082, the farm trailer bill, on May 29, but the new tags were not available until just recently.

Lilly said that the Texas Farm Bureau has been attempting to secure passage of a farm trailer law for several years. He explained that the \$5.00 license cost was a compromise to forestall a veto of the bill.

The TFB legislative director said that the new law was necessary to permit farmers to continue using their trailers to haul farm products. The DPS had warned that it was planning to begin strict enforcement of trailer license laws if a special farm trailer law were not enacted this year. Before the new law was passed, farmers were required by law to obtain commercial licenses for trailers over 4,000

pounds gross weight even though they normally use their trailers for only a few weeks each year.

Farmers who fail to obtain tags will be subject to a fine and also must immediately register their trailer as a commercial trailer and obtain a commercial license plate. A commercial license for a 10,000 pound trailer would cost \$55.00.

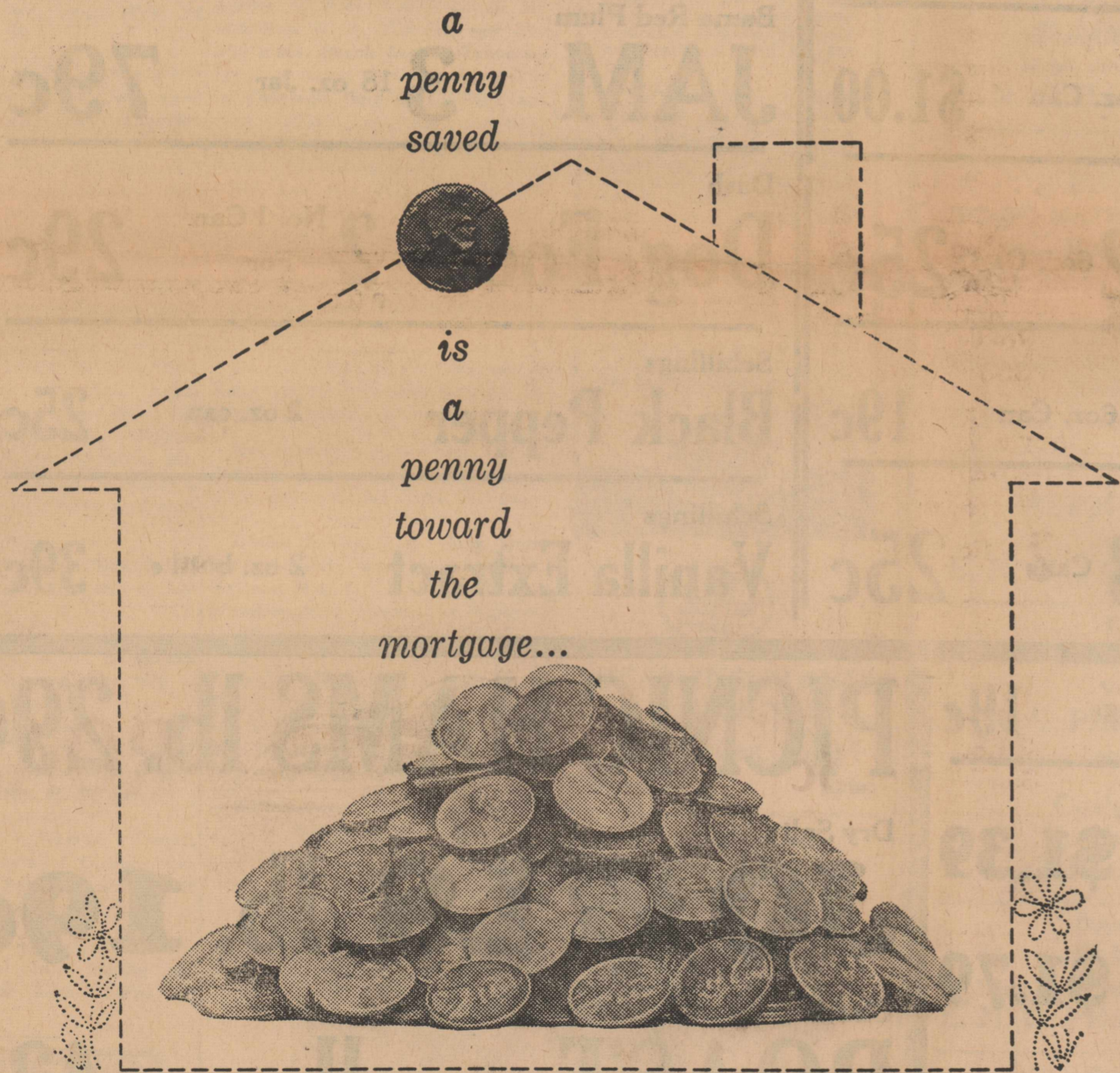

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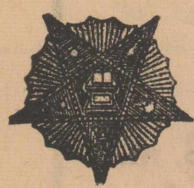

Farm Facts

About 51% of the 1959-60 cotton crop was harvested mechanically. An estimated 36% was machine picked and 15% was machine stripped.

From the Carolinas to central Texas and in irrigated areas of the Far West, when cotton is harvested by hand, workers pick the fleece from the open bolls.

The spindle-type picker duplicates this process as its revolving spindles engage and pull the cotton from the bolls. It does not pull leaves or unopened bolls. Picking, therefore, may be repeated as often as necessary.

In cotton yielding 300 pounds of lint per acre, the average hand picker gathers about 20 pounds of seed cotton per hour. The one-row mechanical picker can pick almost 650 pounds per hour. It can do the work of from 30 to 40 hand pickers.

Unlike the spindle-type picker, the stripper is a once-over machine. It breaks off the entire boll, simulating hand snapping, a practice followed in the semi-arid areas of Texas

and Oklahoma. It can harvest more than a bale of cotton an hour — as much as 30 laborers hand snapping. Virtually none of the cotton crop was mechanically harvested prior to World War II; only 3% in 1947.
