Members of Rotan Municipal Water Authority met Snyder City Council Tuesday night in Snyder for discussion of the purchase of water for Rotan and the water district.

H. T. Fillingim, president; W. I. Branch, vice-president; Joe D. Burk, secretary, Bill Hardy and John Gray attended the meeting at the Water Board.

Various phases of the project were discussed, but no definite agreement was made on the purchase of water.

Rotan's water farm, near Camp Springs is supplying water to fill immediate needs and no shortage has existed this year, but the water level is lowering and other courses apparently are necessary to assure the district an adequate supply.

After a definite plan has been worked out it is expected that the Water Authority will call a bond election to finance the project.

## B52 Bombers To Make Low Flights Over Double Mt. Area

Tinker Air Force Base, Okla.—The Double Mountain area, is playing an important role in connection with the B-52G intercontinental bomber of the U. S. Air Force.

Recent flight tests conducted in the area prove that Double Mountain is ideal for calibrating the new radar of the B-52 while flying at a low altitude, Tinker Air Force Base officials said.

Since the tests are to start immediately, these officials desire that residents of the area be informed of the low level flight check program. There will also be considerable smoke as well as noise and residents are urged not to become frightened, they said.

One of the pilots making the low level flight checks is Capt. William T. Bonner, stationed at Tinker, who is the son of Mrs. T. R. Bonner of Sweetwater. He was reared in the Claytonville community in Fisher county and graduated from Sweetwater high school. Maj. Charles T. Smith, chief of Flight Test, will be in charge of the program.

Undercurrent plans, the B-52's will fly over the Double Mountain area approximately four times a month making from three to six passes each trip. These passes will be from north to south and north with turns being made north of Rotan and southeast of Jayton.

## Navy Requests Reserve Voluntary Recall

The Navy Department announced that requests for voluntary recall to active duty are desired from certain categories of Naval Reservists, both officer and enlisted, for periods of twelve months or more.

Enlisted Naval Reservists in 24 different ratings and all reserve Naval Officers are encouraged to volunteer for recall. Applications should be submitted to the Commandant of the Eighth Naval District in New Orleans in accordance with instructions which are held by all Navy Recruiting Stations and Naval Reserve activities.

This is another of the steps being taken by the U. S. Navy to increase its strength to the level asked for by President Kennedy and approved by the Congress.

Wheat producers who have planted more than 13.5 acres of wheat in at least one of the years 1959, 1960 or 1961 are eligible to vote in the August 24 referendum, except those who have a feed wheat exemption for the 1961 crop.

Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman has called for the widest possible participation in the referendum and has emphasized the importance of the determination that growers will make—whether or not marketing quotas will be effective on the 1962 wheat crop. A two-thirds majority of growers must approve before quotas go into effect. Approval of quotas will also make the new wheat stabilization program available to wheat producers.

The wheat stabilization program will cut 1962 wheat acreage allotments by 10 percent. If quotas are approved, cooperators will be eligible for the 1962 wheat price supports of \$2.00 a bushel. The present support level is \$1.79, which is 70 percent of parity.

If quotas are not approved, there will be no limit on marketing, but support at 50 percent of parity would be available to farmers who comply with their wheat acreage allotments.

Goals of the new program is to reduce government stocks of wheat now near 1.4 billion bushels by 100 million bushels. Estimated savings to taxpayers would be \$50 million the first crop year.

Farmers will vote at local polling places throughout the 39 state commercial wheat area. County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committees will have charge of the referendum locally. Producers desiring more information on the referendum are invited to call on this committee or local ASC office personnel.

During the months of May and June, Texas farmers submitted 1,149 soil samples to the Agricultural Extension Service Soil Testing Laboratories, reports William F. Bennett, extension soil chemist. The largest number of samples was submitted to the laboratory at College Station, the second highest to the High Plains laboratory, and the least to the Baylor County lab.

Bennett points out that the Extension Service maintains these laboratories for Texas farmers to use in determining their fertilizer and limestone needs. Even though soil tests have some limitations in determining fertilizer needs, Bennett says the \$2.00 spent on a soil test is the most important money on a fertilizer program.

The chemist closes by saying that farmers who are planning fall crops should submit their soil samples now. This will insure receiving the analysis in time to apply the needed fertilizer.

Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman reports government stocks of wheat are now near 1.4 billion bushels and would probably increase another 100 million bushels unless the program for 1962 is approved in the August 24 referendum.

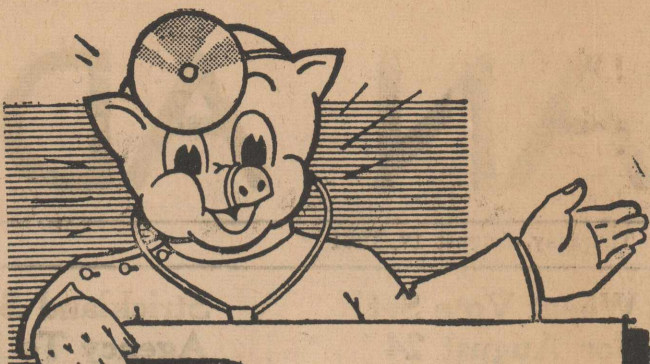

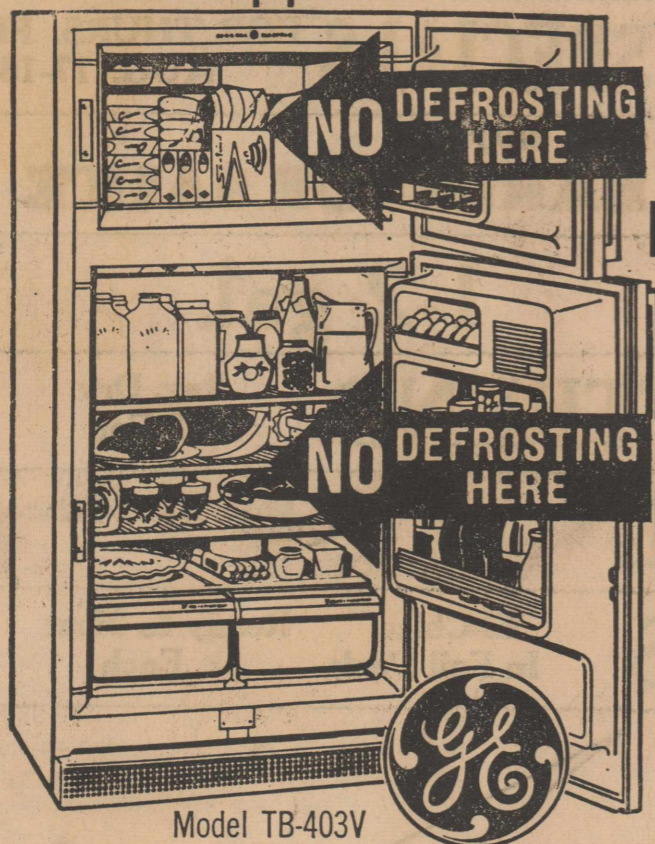

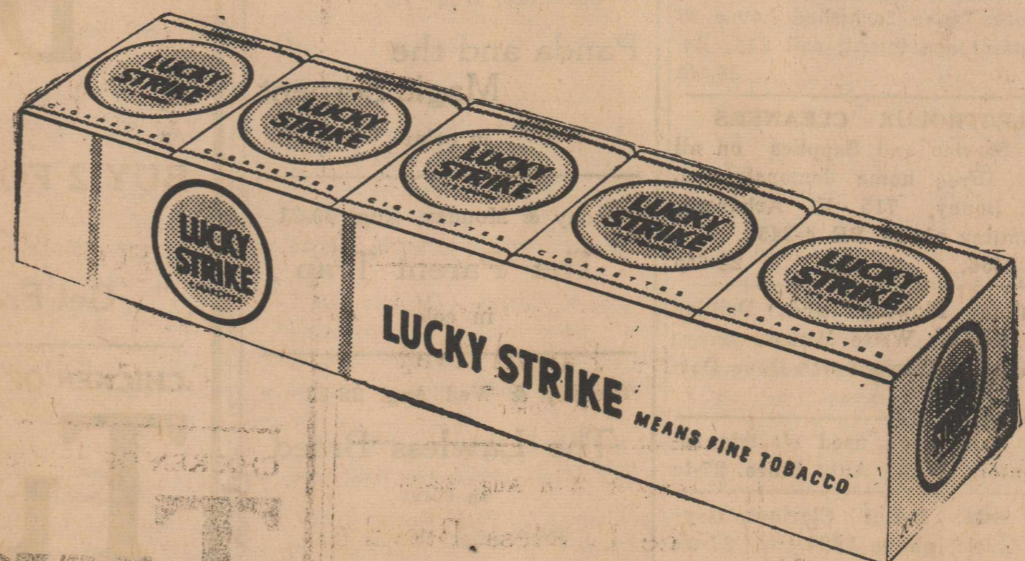

Wheat producers who have planted more than 13.5 acres of wheat in at least one of the years 1959, 1960 or 1961 are eligible to vote in the August 24 referendum, except those who have a feed wheat exemption for the 1961 crop.

Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman has called for the widest possible participation in the referendum and has emphasized the importance of the determination that growers will make—whether or not marketing quotas will be effective on the 1962 wheat crop. A two-thirds majority of growers must approve before quotas go into effect. Approval of quotas will also make the new wheat stabilization program available to wheat producers.

The wheat stabilization program will cut 1962 wheat acreage allotments by 10 percent. If quotas are approved, cooperators will be eligible for the 1962 wheat price supports of \$2.00 a bushel. The present support level is \$1.79, which is 70 percent of parity.

If quotas are not approved, there will be no limit on marketing, but support at 50 percent of parity would be available to farmers who comply with their wheat acreage allotments.

Goals of the new program is to reduce government stocks of wheat now near 1.4 billion bushels by 100 million bushels. Estimated savings to taxpayers would be \$50 million the first crop year.

Farmers will vote at local polling places throughout the 39 state commercial wheat area. County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committees will have charge of the referendum locally. Producers desiring more information on the referendum are invited to call on this committee or local ASC office personnel.

During the months of May and June, Texas farmers submitted 1,149 soil samples to the Agricultural Extension Service Soil Testing Laboratories, reports William F. Bennett, extension soil chemist. The

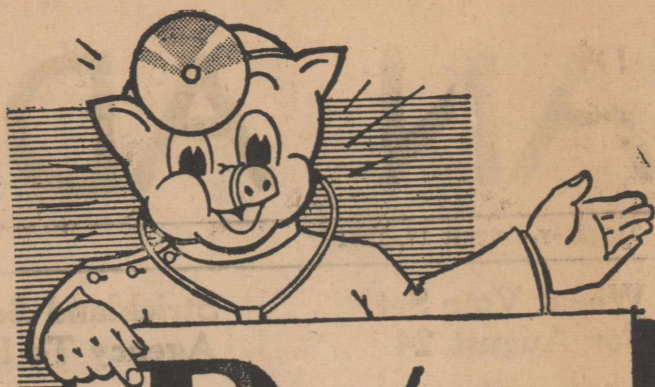

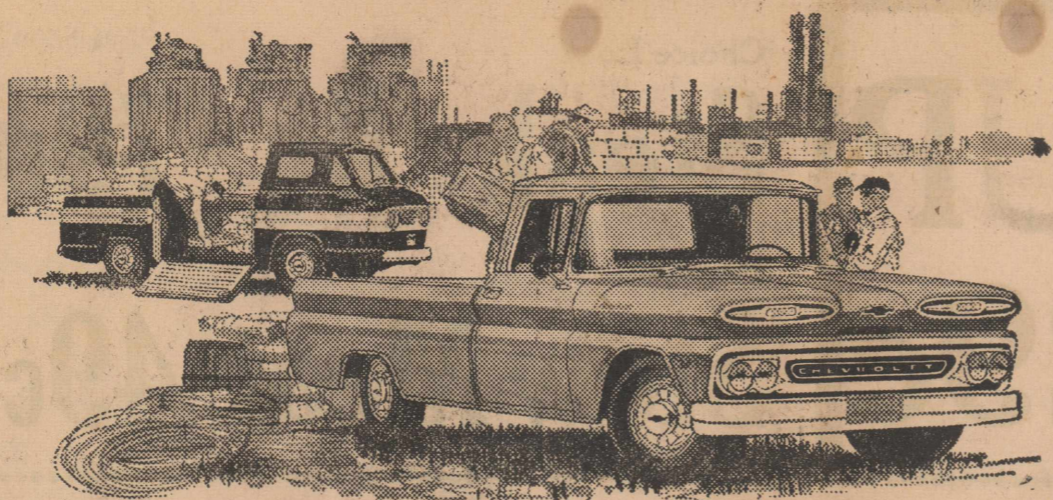

### Look At The Bright Side

"Why are we hearing so much about what is wrong with America and so little about what is right with America," asks Dr. Arthur A. Smith, economist for the First National Bank in Dallas in his recent "Economic Letter." "Why do even men in high authority persist in emphasizing our troubles instead of our blessings? I am at a complete loss for an answer," he continues.

Psychologically we are hurting ourselves, the noted Texas economist points out, for not only is constant negative thinking poisonous to the individual, but its venom depresses society, weakens us as a nation, plays into the hands of those who would delight in seeing us destroyed, especially seeing us destroy ourselves.

Next time you listen to the radio or television newscast, estimate what percentage of the news is negative and what percentage is positive, he suggests. Why does the ugly, the sordid, the scandalous, the tragic, the depressing make up so much of what we hear and read? Why is the bad always sensational and the good not sensational?

"No one with good sense takes delight in the fact that there are some 5 1-2 million workers unemployed in this country, but it might help us eventually to hear that at the same time more people are employed than ever before," he says.

He suggests it is about time for us to begin to remind our people of a few things of which they can be proud, including the following:

1. America is the strongest nation in the world economically. No other people even come close to having as high a standard of living as we do.

2. The health of our people, measured by any standard, stands favorably with that of any nation, and far surpasses 90 percent or more of the world.

3. We can be proud that a larger percentage of our people are afforded an opportunity to get an education and advance as far as they can than is found anywhere in the world.

4. Above all, no other people enjoy as much freedom as Americans. Unfortunately, we take our freedom for granted—neglect to realize how precious it is and how easily it can be lost.

So it would be well," he concludes "of all of us spent more time thinking positively about ourselves and our country. So far as the economy is concerned, why not be sensible about its behaviour—realistic? Economic growth in a free society will never be smooth and rise steadily upward year after year, endlessly, ward year after year, endlessly. Fluctuations are inherent to a free society. The current mild recession is only temporary, and we must not allow it to blind us or to destroy our confidence in the fundamental principles which have made America great."
