Farmers are reminded of their eligibility for a refund of the 4-cent per gallon Federal gasoline tax on that used for farming purposes. The claim should include all eligible gasoline gallonage purchased between July 1, 1960 and June 30, 1961.

The claim for refund should be filed on Form 2240 and not later than September 30.

The gasoline on which a refund may be claimed covers that used for farming purposes and includes most normal production operations. Three exceptions however, are noted by the specialists. They are gasoline used on the highway, even though for transporting farm products; that used for processing, packaging, freezing or canning operations and that used for non-farming or personal purposes.

Records of fuel purchases should be kept to verify the refund request and care should be exercised to avoid inaccurate or excessive claims.

Form 2240 does not apply to diesel and special motor fuels. Farmers who have questions regarding taxes on these fuels are advised to contact an Internal Revenue Service director.

Form 2240 is available at the local extension service office.

The biggest single factor influencing the amount of milk a cow produces is the amount of feed she eats.

A. M. Meekma, extension dairy specialist, says that contrary to the belief of some, feeding, not breeding is mainly responsible for milk production. Inheritance determines the top potential level of production, but environment determines actual production.

To support his theory, Meekma cites a study by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, in which 462 lactation records of 230 cows were studied over a seven-year period. This study showed that season of calving, days calf was carried while milking, and length of puerperal dry period, also influenced production.

The specialist says it is evident that Texas dairymen need to get more feed into their cows. "Not only do we need more and better forage, but we should feed the grain mixture according to the per-

formance of the cow if we are to make the most profit from dairy cattle," he says.

Pond weeds have ruined many a good fishing spot. A heavy growth of annoying weeds can be a real headache, but there are methods of solving such problems.

Careful planning before building a farm pond can help prevent such a problem. Large areas of shallow water should be avoided because weeds nearly always become a problem in areas where the water is less than about three feet deep. Deeper water reduces the amount of sunlight penetration and thus helps prevent excessive plant growth.

Weeds that grow beneath the water surface often can be controlled through the use of fertilizers. The fertilizer acts as a stimulant for the growth of microscopic plant and animal life which, in turn, reduces sunlight penetration. Fertilization also helps the fish because the benefit from the increased food production.

If you see that weeds are beginning to infest your pond, act quickly. If the weeds are considered to be of an undesirable type, they can often be removed mechanically. This includes cutting, pulling, raking

and other inexpensive methods. The methods should be employed before the weeds become too well established.

In recent years, chemicals which can be used to control many types of pond weeds have been developed. When properly used, they can be effective and safe. Improper use, however, can be dangerous to fish, other wild animals, livestock and humans using the pond water. Since there is no single chemical which is safe and effective in the control of all pond weeds, you must first have the troublesome weed identified. If a chemical can be used, you should follow the instructions very carefully. It is important that you properly apply the right chemical at the correct stage of plant growth.

Stop by our office and ask for Bulletin 213, Improve Your Farm Fish Pond, which covers this subject and deals with other fish pond problems.

If there is a slightly chubby miss in your family, you'll be interested in knowing of the new designs that have been sized for her. As of this season it is possible to find "chubby size" among the designs in the counter catalogues of one of the commercial pattern companies. The sizing is labeled as 8 1-2 C to 14 1-2 C, and are resized versions of girls' 7 to 14 fashions. They are smart in appearance and will solve many of the fitting problems.

Cottons in a flurry of colors, shapes, and textures await the school crowd this fall. Fashions follow adult lines, with loose but closer to the body shapes, flared skirts beneath long torsos and a relaxed two piece look. Cotton knit, corduroys, hopsacking and poplin lead the parade for the new look classroom wear. 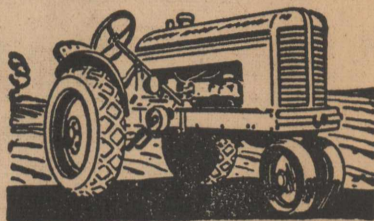
Carolyn Herron Wins First-Dist. Dress Revue
