Farmers are reminded of their igibility for a refund of the 4-cent per gallon Federal gasoline tax on
that used for farming purposes. The claim should include all eligible gasoline gallonage purchased between July 1, 1960 and June 30, 1961.

The claim for refund should be filed on Form 2240 and not later than September 30. The gasoline on which a refund may be claimed covers that used for
farming purposes and includes most farming purposes and includes most
normal production operations. Three exceptions however, are noted by the specialists. They are gasoline used on the highway, even though
for transporting farm products; for transporting farm products;
that used for processing packaging that used for processing, packaging,
freezing or canning operations and freezing or canning operations and
that used for non-farming or personal purposes.
Records of fuel purchases should
be kept to verify the refund request
and care should be exercised to
avoid inaccurate or excessive claims.
