Rotan's Yellowhammers showed classy form here Friday night in swamping Spur team 42-0. Donald Goodrum scored four touchdowns in pacing the Hammers to the win.

## Cotton Gathering Halted By Rain Sunday Night

A cool wet front moved into the area late Sunday night, after several days of warm sunshine. Fred Byerly gauged .75 inch of rain, which was heavy in other parts of the state.

Temperature dropped sharply and a low of 48 was reported here Tuesday morning. Several farmers report traces of light frost. Most old timers have been predicting an early, hard winter, and indications thus far bear this out. With much late cotton and late frost will mean much to this entire section. Killing frost is normally expected about November 10, but the last few years first freeze has been about the 10th of October.

Cotton gathering which was just getting underway was halted for several days and is just now getting started again.

Local gins had a total of 916 bales Wednesday afternoon.

## Ford's PP&K Contest Closes October 7

Registration time is nearly over for the Ford PP&K contest for boys age 6 through 10. Last day for registering is Saturday, Oct. 7 in the first Punt, Pass and Kick competition.

The public is invited to the football field to watch grade school boys test their skills in punting, passing and place-kicking footballs. Entrants will receive one point for each foot the ball lands on either side of a center line. The contest will be held at the football field at 9:30 a. m. Saturday, Oct. 14.

Tommy Watkins, high school coach, director of competition, said each ball would be marked at the spot where it lands, and that distances immediately would be measured by the judges. He pointed out that boys would be competing against others in their age groups only, thus preventing unequal competition.

Judges for the unique competition, designed to offer all boys the opportunity to take part in football activity, will be Fred Schkade, Marshall Hill, Neil Wright, Dwayne Kamstra and Glen Gruben.

In case of ties in the competition for the first, second and third place winners in each age group, the competition will be repeated by those boys. First prizes will be football uniforms, second prizes will be warm-up jackets and third prizes will be footballs.

In addition to winning the football uniform first prizes, the most skilled boys in each group also will be in the running for an appearance at one of the home games of the Dallas Cowboys, when regional winners will punt, pass and kick in an elimination to determine the five National Champions. Scores from every P. P. and K. competition in this area will be compared, and the best competitor in each age group chosen for the elimination appearance at the Cowboys game.

Mr. Watkins said that in case of ties between boys in this area, additional tie-breaking competitions will be held to determine the regional winners.

"We may be back on the football field in another week to stage a competition for one of our boys who is tied with someone in another part of the state," Mr. Watkins said. "If so, the same procedure will be followed--he will punt, pass and kick for distance and accuracy and his new score will be forwarded to PP & K headquarters for comparison."

Early stalk destruction and farm cleanup are valuable tools for farmers to use in the control of pink bollworms and boll weevils. It has been proven many times that proper early fall stalk destruction will reduce both the pink bollworm and the boll weevil survival the following winter.

In many areas of the state, boll weevils have been a serious problem this year, and in certain areas the population of pink bollworms has increased. Extension entomologists say that a large number of boll weevils are expected to be present in cotton during the late fall. Destruction of stalks destroys the food supply of this insect and reduces the number which may survive the winter, they point out.

Insects are attracted in large numbers to late-irrigated fields of cotton, so farmers should stop late irrigations to prevent this. In most cases, it is expensive to produce a late fall crop because of the large buildup of pink bollworms, boll weevils and other insects. Also, there is a good chance that a large population of pink bollworms and boll weevils will go into hibernation and survive the winter as a result of this late cotton, explain the entomologists.

In areas of the state where stalk destruction is recommended, it is one of the most economical and effective methods of controlling the pink bollworm and reducing boll-weevil populations. The use of stalk shredders is highly recommended since these machines kill many of the pink bollworms left in the field after harvest. It is advisable to plow under the shredded residue to a depth of 6 inches within 5 days after cutting. Stripper harvesting aids greatly in reducing the number of pink bollworms. A large amount of the infested material is stripped from the stalk and carried to the gin where the pink bollworms are destroyed during the ginning operation.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has issued a new bulletin that tells what a family needs to know about providing food and water for survival at home or in a shelter following nuclear attack.

The population, "Family Food Stockpile for Survival," tells how to store and how often to replace food stockpiles and lists equipment needed for emergency cooking. Sample menus are included showing how to provide a reasonably balanced diet using these foods.

This bulletin and others on Civil Defense and construction of family Fallout Shelters are available at the local extension office.

Anyone interested in the use of date processing for keeping beef cattle production records should get a copy of the recent Extension Service publication B-978, "Using Data Processing Equipment to Keep Beef Cattle Records." This bulletin contains a thorough discussion on use of this service, as well as information on what is necessary to employ it. A copy may be obtained from the local agent's office.

Dairymen are missing a chance to increase profits by failing to emphasize a first rate milking forage, a good breeding program and disease control are important, but the actual harvesting of the milk is just as important, advises Meekma.

## The VA Loan Program In Brief

Under the VA direct loan program, the veteran borrows his money directly from the VA up to 100 per cent of the purchase price or cost, to acquire a home in any area where money is considered unavailable from institutional lenders for VA guaranteed loans.

**How To Apply:** Application for a direct loan is made by the veteran (or a service officer) to the VA regional Office in letter form. He applies for a VA direct loan, briefly outlining the amount desired, the purchase price and the location by which the veteran makes application for the direct loan. If funds are not immediately available, the VA notifies the veteran of his number on the waiting list and his request is retained until funds become available. Actually, about half of those on the waiting list drop out before their names comes up.

**Loan Costs:** Under present law, the veteran is required by law to submit \$504.00 with his formal loan application, by postal money or certified check. In addition, he must pay to VA at time of closing an amount equal to 10 per cent of the loan amount less \$50.00 on loans for existing property, or 2 per cent less \$50 on construction loans. Part of this fee will be used by VA to pay cost of the credit report, appraisal fee and loan closers cost for closing the loan. In addition, the veteran must pay the title insurance cost, three-year insurance premium, and

filing fees.

Purpose of Loan: VA direct loans can be made for: (1) purchase or construction of a home containing only one living unit; (2) Purchase of a farm where there is a residence; (3) Construction on land owned by the veteran of a farm residence to be occupied as his home; or (4) the repair, alternation, or improvement of a farm residence or other dwelling owned by the veteran and occupied by him as a home.

**Loan Terms:** (VA direct loans may be made to a maximum of \$50,000. They may be 100 per cent loans, depending on the veterans ability to repay and provided the cost of the home does not exceed what the VA considers "reasonable value". Interest rate is 5 1-4 per cent, the same as guaranteed loans. The maturity is 25 years, but may go to 30 years if the veterans income is deemed inadequate to repay the loan on a 25 year term.

**VA May Sell Direct Loan:** Under the law, the VA is authorized to sell direct loans made to private lending institutions and other investors at per.

Early stalk destruction and farm cleanup are valuable tools for farmers to use in the control of pink bollworms and boll weevils. It has been proven many times that proper early fall stalk destruction will reduce both the pink bollworm and the boll weevil survival the following winter.

In many areas of the state, boll weevils have been a serious problem this year, and in certain areas the population of pink bollworms has increased. Extension entomologists say that a large number of boll weevils are expected to be present in cotton during the late fall. Destruction of stalks destroys the food supply of this insect and reduces the number which may survive the winter, they point out.

Insects are attracted in large numbers to late-irrigated fields of cotton, so farmers should stop late irrigations to prevent this. In most cases, it is expensive to produce a late fall crop because of the large buildup of pink bollworms, boll weevils and other insects. Also, there is a good chance that a large population of pink bollworms and boll weevils will go into hibernation and survive the winter as a result of this late cotton, explain the entomologists.

In areas of the state where stalk destruction is recommended, it is one of the most economical and effective methods of controlling the pink bollworm and reducing boll-weevil populations. The use of stalk shredders is highly recommended since these machines kill many of the pink bollworms left in the field after harvest. It is advisable to plow under the shredded residue to a depth of 6 inches within 5 days after cutting. Stripper harvesting aids greatly in reducing the number of pink bollworms. A large amount of the infested material is stripped from the stalk and carried to the gin where the pink bollworms are destroyed.

### 'As It Looks From Here'

Omar Burleson, M. C.

Washington, D. C. -- It is with appreciation that the following editorial from the Lubbock Avanche-Journal of September 11, is reproduced.

"Omar Burleson: Good man for Post at UN--A veteran West Texas Congressman, Omar Burleson of Anson, has been named by President Kennedy as a Member of the U. S. Fall meeting and, after considerable delegation to the United Nation's soul-searching Mr. Burleson has accepted the invitation.

"Mr. Burleson, as down-to-earth as a field of grain sorghum, long has looked with a jaundiced eye at much of the UN operation. Like most of the rest of us, the Anson Congressman, now in his eighth term, has good reason to believe that the international debating society is far short of what it ought to be. Therefore, he has been critical of much of the doings of UN figures and has not hesitated to speak up.

"However, Mr. Burleson decided that as a some-time critic of the UN, he could not conscientiously decline the request that he be a part of the U. S. delegation during the approaching Congressional recess. "If we run away from the things we don't agree with, I'm not sure we have the right to criticize them," he said.

"Mr. Burleson noted in his acceptance, however, that he will not go to New York and be any part of a "rubber stamp." He told the State Department before accepting that he

would "call 'em as I see 'em," referring to U. S. attitudes on UN matters, and the State Department people said that's what they'd want him to do. So Mr. Burleson will go to New York.

"Knowing the Congressman to be a reasonable, but in no way a vacillating individual, we're glad he's to be part of the U. S. UN delegation this Autumn. His common sense point of view conceivably could level off some of the more "intellectual" approaches to UN problems as they affect this country and we know for sure there will be at least one firm voice on our delegation fighting all the way against permitting the Red Chinese butchers from being seated.

"It will be interesting to watch the gentleman from West Texas in action with the striped-pants boys in New York's middle East Side."
