

Catholic Extension Workers Start Program

According to local Catholic leaders "the increasing materialism and secularization of their society has prompted the average Catholic to realize the need for more active participation by the laity in the church. The lay apostolate movement is becoming one of the most important of today. One of the various groups organized to help Christianize our society and renew the religious face of the Americas are the Extension Volunteers."

This program initiated in Chicago by Reverend John May of the Extension Society of America, was started to parallel in the home missions the work done in the Latin American countries by the Papal Volunteers. The Papal Volunteers send qualified lay missionaries to our Latin American neighbors to work for a period of three years in these predominantly Catholic countries.

The Extension Volunteers contribute a year or more of their time to assisting missionary parishes. The people making up this program work in four capacities: as nurses, as teachers in Catholic schools, as catechists and as sponsors of Catholic Newman Clubs at state universities.

The group sent to Rotan is engaged in catechetical work which consists of taking a comprehensive parish census, teaching Bible school, organizing a parish choir, stimulating the dialogue Mass (full participation in the celebration of the Mass by the entire congregation), visiting the sick and shut-ins, training and counseling the youth (particularly in the Catholic Youth Organization), contacting and informing the migrant workers about the Parish and its facilities answering inquiries about the Catholic Church, and helping in any other areas where they are needed.

The main purpose of the Extension work is to stimulate Christian action in the Parish and to train leaders to take over these various activities. At present there are twenty-five Extension Volunteers working in Texas and Oklahoma. Reverend John Sullivan of Oklahoma City, who is recruiting in colleges across the country this year has set as his goal, three hundred or more volunteers for next year, including single women, married couples, and single men.

Joanne Orlof is originally from Wheaton, Illinois, a suburb of Chicago. She attended Saint Mary College in Xavier, Kansas, majoring in sociology and minoring in Spanish. While doing social work in Chicago's Cook County Hospital last year, she attended classes at De Peell University in the city.

Kathleen Layden is from Muskogee, Oklahoma. She graduated from Saint Mary College with a major and teaching certificate in English and a minor in French and Counseling. Last year she worked for the Eastern Kansas Register, the Catholic paper of the diocese of Kansas City, Kansas.

Both girls have worked in the Legion of Mary and the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine program. They are working under the direction of Reverend Fabian Diersing, pastor of St. Joseph's Parish.

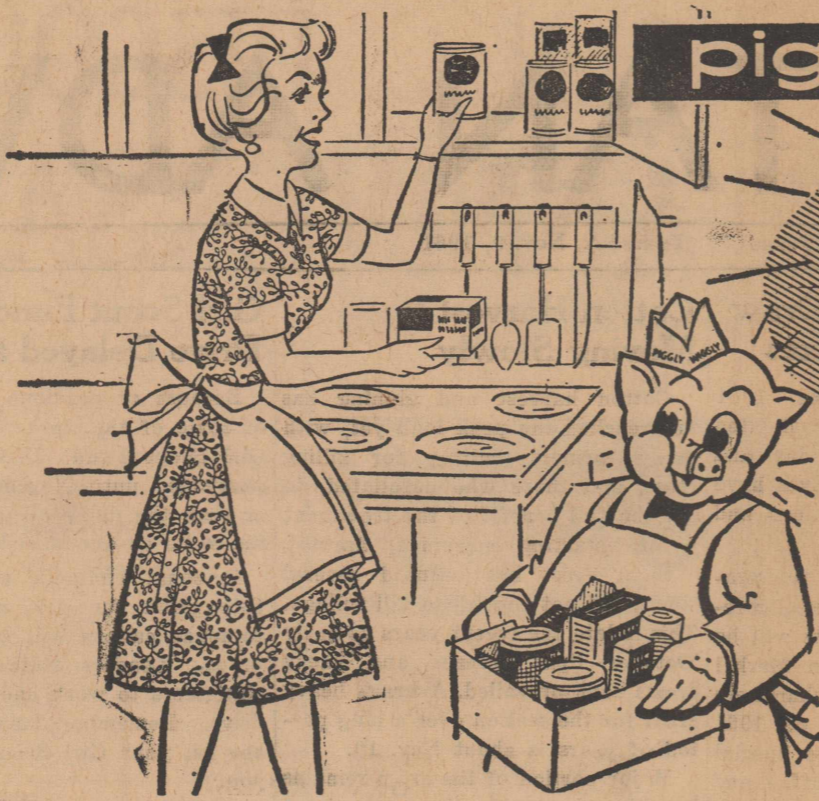
Lynna Lou Poer Feted On 2nd Birthday

Frost can be expected in our area most any time, and when it comes it could mean trouble for livestock producers. Johnsongrass and sorghum sometimes develop a high prussic acid content after a frost, and if grazed by livestock can cause a lot of trouble.

Certain chemical changes occur in the frost-wilted plants, and are responsible for the development of the prussic acid. The poison acts quickly and can kill an animal within a very short time after the damaged plant is eaten. Whether a poisoned animal can be saved depends upon how quickly a veterinarian can get to it.

Frosted Johnsongrass or sorghum should not be grazed until it is completely dry. If it is ready to cut for hay before a frost, it may be cut the first day after frost if care is taken to see that it is completely cured before baling.

Frost-wilted plants may also be used for silage. Generally, enough prussic acid is lost in gaseous form during the ensiling process and as the silage is removed and fed to make it safe for livestock. Animals should not be allowed to self-feed for livestock. Animals should not be allowed to self feed at any time from a silo filled with frosted sudan or sorghum. If there is any doubt about the silage, it should be tested. This can be done by a veterinarian or by feeding the silage to one or two inferior animals.

The expanded rural housing program, authorized by the Housing Act of 1961, became effective on October 15, according to the USDA. Under the new law, owners of housing sites in rural areas and in small rural communities with not more than 2,500 population may be eligible for housing loans made by the Farmers Home Administration. Previously, these loans were available only to farmers.

Housing loans are made for construction, repair, and remodeling of dwellings and essential farm buildings. The interest rate is 4 percent per year on the unpaid balance of the loan. Loans may be scheduled for repayment over periods up to 33 years. Applications for rural housing loans should be made at the local county office of the FHA.
