TB Christmas Seal Campaign Opened

1961 TB Christmas Seal Campaign opened in Fisher County Wednesday with Seals being mailed over the county. Everyone is urged to send contribution as early as possible, in order that this important work may be carried on. If you do not receive Seals a call to County Chairman, C. J. Dalton will get them to you.

Currently, you and your neighbors are spending \$7,000,000 a year on the operation of five state tuberculosis hospitals; but only about \$100,000 a year in state funds to find the tubercular patients that ought to be in those hospitals.

Ten years ago state tuberculosis hospitals had no beds for the aged, no beds for children under six years of age. Patients died while waiting for one of the nearly 1,600 beds that were crowded into space for only 1,000. Hospital treatment was limited to nine months, merely to make room for those on the waiting lists. Even so, 67 percent of the patients left the hospitals against medical advice.

Today there are beds for the aged and beds for young children too. There are more than 3,000 beds in the total capacity of state tuberculosis hospitals. Only about 2,400 of those beds have patients in them. 600 are empty. The average length of patient-stay is over 400 days. Only about 27 percent of total patients now leave those hospitals against medical advice.

No one really knows for sure, but it has been estimated there are probably 2,000,000 infected persons--positive reactors to tuberculosis tests--in Texas' population. Of that total number of infected persons, perhaps 6,000 or more are active cases outside of public and private hospitals. And of those 6,000 active cases, some 2,000-25,000 are beyond proper medical surveillance.

Now the estimated cost throughout the nation for one case of tuberculosis has been estimated at \$15,000 including medical care, rehabilitation of the patient, relief payments to his dependents, and direct loss of wages. Using that cost factor, and even the most conservative estimates of prevalence of the disease in Texas, can there actually be any doubt the correct answer to the question "Bargain or Burden?"

County Agricultural Agent Texas A. & M. College Extension Service

All area cattlemen are reminded of the Livestock Feeding and Grain Marketing Tour to be held January 14-20, 1962. The tour is sponsored by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in cooperation with the A&M College of Texas, Texas Technological College, and Grain Sorghum Producers' Association.

This will be an opportunity to join your neighbors in West Texas on a special train into Arizona and California to inspect commercial feed lots and develop our markets.

Stops on the tour will include the Phoenix area, Imperial Valley in the El Centro area, the San Diego area, the San Joaquin Valley in the Bakersfield area, and see Texas cattle being fed Texas milo.

Tour cost for one person will be \$246.00. All requests for reservations must be made by December 15 to the Agriculture and Livestock Department, West Texas Chamber of Commerce, Box 1561, Abilene, Texas.

Deadline for enrolling in this year's Texas Community Improvement Program is January 31, 1962, according to Reagan Brown, Extension Rural Sociologist at Texas A&M College. He urges all community leaders who have not already done so to send in enrollment cards before that date. More than 200 communities have already enrolled.

The Texas Community Improvement Program is sponsored by the electric service companies operating in Texas and is supervised by the Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M College. Purpose of the program is to improve the physical appearance of homes, farms and communities, improve quality of livestock and crops and to encourage adoptions of modern methods on the farm or ranch and in the home. The overall effect of the program is to make the rural community a better place to live.

If you are interested in improving your community through this program, you are invited to join. Information from your county Extension agents.

The protein level of the grain ration being fed to dairy cows could be a factor in the drop in milk pro-

duction of individual cows in a herd. Shannon Carpenter, area extension dairy specialist, suggests a test to check this factor. Weigh the milk produced in one day from at least four cows, fresh not less than 60 days. Then add cottonseed meal or some other protein supplement to their feed at the rate of one pound for each 8 pounds of feed. After five days, again weigh the milk from the same cows to measure the change in milk flow. An increase of one pound or more per cow per day indicates that the protein level in the ration for the herd, should be raised.

Texas dairymen and others interested in the industry will have the opportunity of a lifetime on November 30 and December 1 to hear and discuss problems with nationally known authorities in the field of dairying. A. M. Meekma, extension dairy specialist, believes this year's Dairy Short Course at Texas A&M College will offer one of the best programs ever.

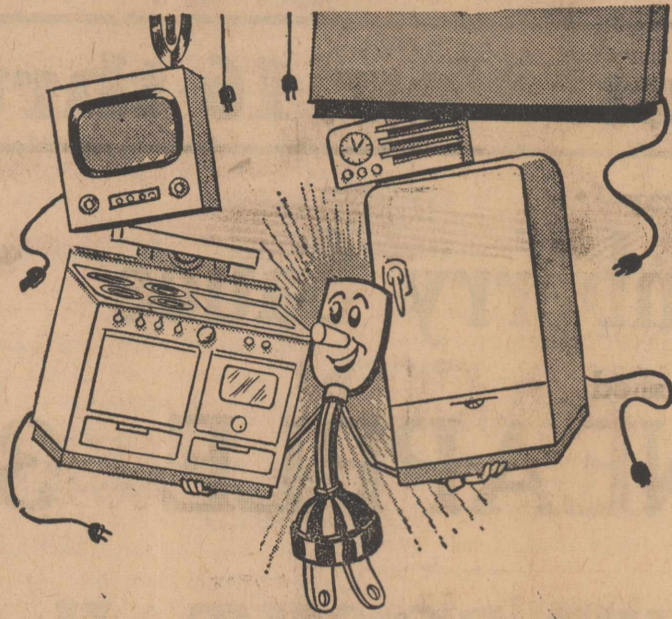

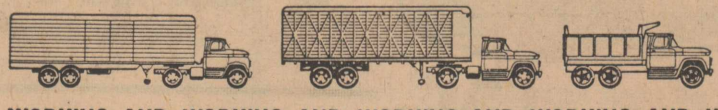

Figures Given On Transferring County Superintendents Office

Facts below are given relative to the transferring of the County Superintendent's office to the office of County Judge.

The following statements are being made because of the requests of people who want information about the cost of the county superintendent's office and what would happen if the office should be closed. The information is not being given for the purpose of influencing anyone for or against closing the office.

The salaries of the county superintendent, his assistant, and all other assistants are all paid by the State and no part of them is paid by the county.

In the event that the office is transferred to the office of the county judge, none of the money now being paid for salaries will be divided among or given to any of the schools of the county as all of them are state-aid schools. Some of it will remain in Austin for distribution elsewhere, and the remainder will be sent to this county for the operation of the office through the county judge.

The law provides that the county judge will receive \$2600.00 per year as salary and \$1050.00 for travel; the law also provides that an assistant will receive \$2600.00 annually, that \$360.00 will be used for the county board meetings, \$6.00 being paid to each of the five members for each meeting attended, then 1c per scholastic enrolled in the January census shall be paid, the year 1961-62 being \$19.03 for the 1903 pupils in Fisher County.

The above items for the county judge's office total \$6629.03 per year if the office is transferred to that office.

The total budget for the county superintendent's office for last year was \$15,800.00. The amount spent was \$13,744.05.

Subtract the county judge's budget of \$6629.03 from the county superintendent's budget of \$15,800.00, and the difference is \$9,171.00, which amount will remain in the state office, with the \$6629.03 coming to the county judge's office.

Also the law provides for continuing the county board in office to continue in control as heretofore.

The statement as to who pays the salaries in the county superintendent's office can be verified by the county officials who pay county salaries. That and all the other statements can be verified in the office of the Texas Education Agency, telephone Greenwood 6-9181, Austin.

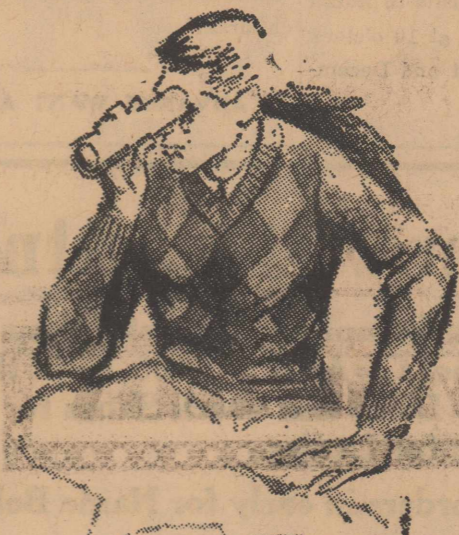

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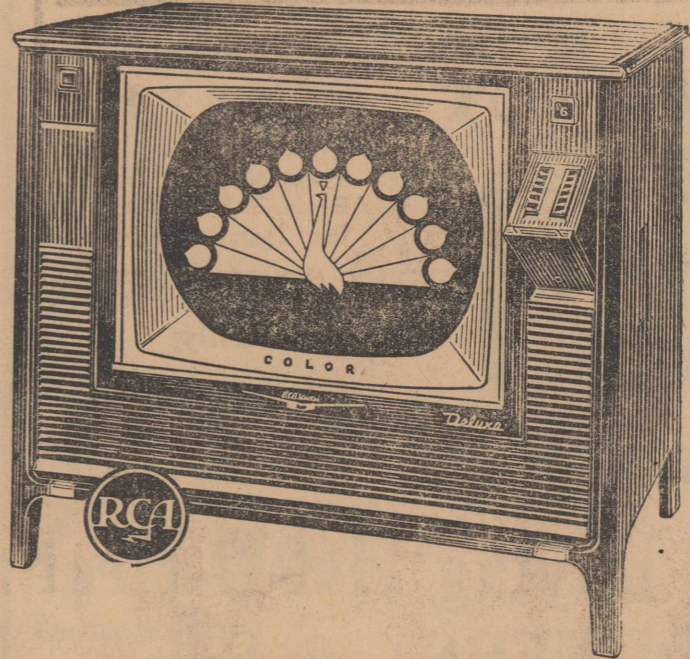
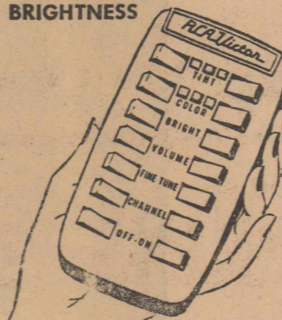
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Peak SS Claims Occur In January

For the past 7 years, peak claims loads in the Abilene Social Security office have been in January, according to Don Austin, Field Representative, who visits Rotan regularly. He adds that claims filed in January are thereby usually delayed in processing because of such high workload.

Austin suggests that persons 62 or older planning on retiring in January or February of 1962 see him on his next visit here to discuss possible advantages of getting their claims filed before January. With these liberalizations in the 1961 Amendments, everyone over 62 who has had 3 years or more of social security credits should investigate the possibility of collecting at least some retirement benefits in 1962 even though continuing to work. If expected earnings for 1962 are to be less than \$3,000, Austin urges a discussion with him about payment possibilities. The next visits to Rotan will be at the City Hall at 10 o'clock on Friday, November 24 and December 8 and 29.
