

Hammers Take Bi-Dist. From Seagraves Friday

Rotan's outstanding Hammers fumbled their way through four quarters Friday night but dominated the game despite their mistakes to tie Seagrave 22-22 and advance to the second rung of the ladder in the state playoffs.

The two clubs were tied in the scoring and also in penetrations 4-4 but the Hammers led by wide margin in first downs 21-10 to get the nod.

The Hammers played ball control to build up their statistical edge, running 61 plays from scrimmage to only 41 by Seagraves. They had a 190-118 rushing lead and a 298-193 overall yardage edge.

Despite the wide edge in rushing and ball control, fumbles almost proved their undoing as a loose ball gobbled up by Seagraves gave them a life as time was running out. With second down on the Rotan two and 12 seconds remaining, Lennis Polnac, Rotan halfback, came up fast to stop Jerry Waller inches short or the double strip. Time ran out before the losers could run another play.

The Yellowhammers had to fight from behind to get the tie score and cop the semi-final play-off spot. Seagraves led at half-time 13-6 and were out in front 22-14 midway of the fourth quarter.

Donald Goodrum, Hammer halfback and the leading scorer in the area with 156 points, kept the Yellowhammers in the game, picking up 151 yards rushing and 14 points in the scoring column. He broke loose for a 51 yard scoring jaunt but a clipping penalty nullified the effort. He also fumbled away one Rotan scoring chance on the Seagraves one yard line.

Rotan scored first in the second quarter with Goodrum going the last two yards after Quarterback Steve Herron had set up the score with a 16 yard gainer to the one.

Seagrave came back to grab the lead with two touchdowns before the half. A fumble by Bruce Baugh gave them their first opportunity from the Rotan 15. A double reverse with James Petty ending up with the ball, got the yardage needed to tie the score. A run for the two-point conversion failed.

With 30 seconds remaining in the half Rotan elected to gamble on fourth down in the middlefield. Goodrum attempted a screen pass of a fake punt but Monty Sansom intercepted on the Rotan 42 and went all the way to break the tie. The two pointer was good for the 14-6 lead.

Herron circled left end for eight yards for the second Rotan score and Goodrum added the two pointer to tie the count in the third period, and then drove 80 yards in 11 plays to tie it again after Seagrave had gone out front for the second time. Both scores came in the fourth quarter.

Seagraves had driven 70 yards to take the lead again in the opening minutes of the fourth period, a 47 yarder by Waller being the big move in the drive. Sammy Faulkner plunged across for the touchdown and Petty slipped around end for the two points.

In Rotan's catch up drive Goodrum got 46 yards in five trips, one a 22 yarder, then drove over left guard from three yards out for the score. Herron got the two pointer with Polnac throwing a key block to spring him loose.

Miss Neal was crowned Queen of Ranger Junior College at half time ceremonies of their game with Cisco Junior College.

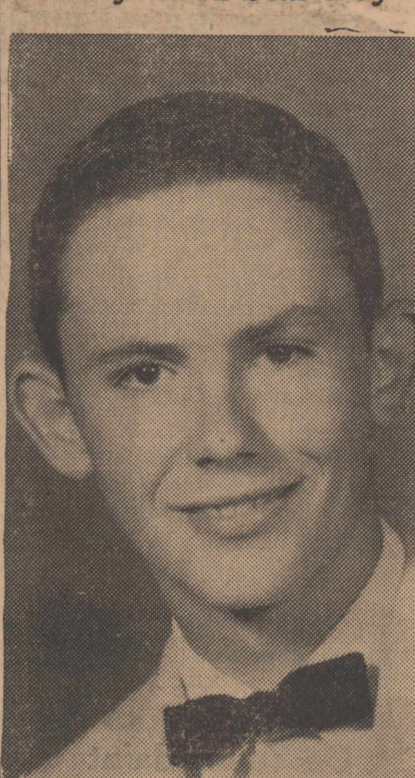
Morrow and Free are co-captains of the football team and crowned the Queen.

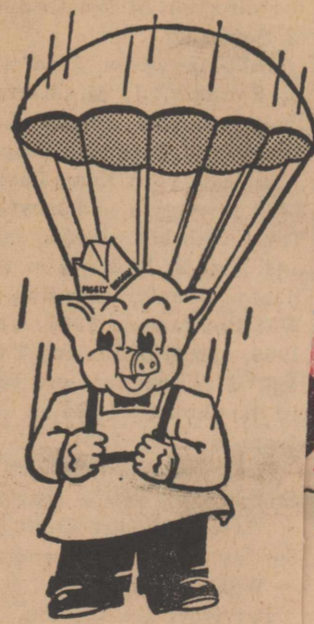

County Agricultural Agent Texas A. & M. College Extension Service

Several questions concerning the application of the State Sales Tax to agricultural production goods have been received by C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist. Bates reports that the Comptroller's office has not made rulings on some of these specific items, but Ruling No. 13 does cover certain items.

According to this ruling, "Persons engaged in the business of selling tangible personal property to those engaged in agricultural pursuits in the State of Texas shall be required to collect the tax imposed by this law. However, there are items specifically exempt from the taxes imposed by this statute when sold to those persons engaged in agricultural pursuits."

Articles exempted from the sales tax under Ruling No. 13 include "The sale of, storage, use or other consumption of any form of animal life of the kind which ordinarily constitutes food for human consumption." This would include beef cattle, poultry and swine, explains Bates. Also Exempted is feed for these animals, dog food, horse feed and bird seed are example of feeds not exempted.

Seeds and annual plants which produce food for human consumption, and fungicides, insecticides and fertilizers applied to them are also exempted under the ruling. Trees, bedding plants, household insecticides and lawn fertilizer are examples of commodities not exempted.

Bates says the ruling also exempts "Farm machinery or equipment exclusively used or employed on farms or ranches in the production of food for human consumption, feed for any form of animal life or other agricultural products to be sold in the regular course of business." It has been ruled, however, that parts for farm machinery and equipment will be taxed.

It will require some time for the State Comptroller to issue rulings on the multitude of items that fall into the "gray" areas of the statute's meaning, Bates continues. As soon as specific rulings can be had, they will be passed on to the public.

For the farmer who raises sorghum grain, and who will learn the basic principles of feeding and management of hogs, the swine enterprises in Texas can be very profitable, according to Fred Hale of the Animal Husbandry Department, Texas A&M College.

Hale says it requires about 700 pounds of grain and 150 pounds of a good protein supplement for the farmer to produce a 200 to 220

pound market hog, where he produces his own pigs. This amount of grain includes the feed eaten by the sow that raised the litter of pigs.

When market hogs are selling at 17 cents per pound, the farmer will get \$2.70 per hundred pounds for his home-grown grain. Hale says. At 18 cents for hogs, he will get \$2.90, and with 19 cent hogs he can market his grain for \$3.15 per hundred pounds with a good swine program.

The average family-size farm with a well planned, properly fenced layout for hogs can take care of 10 sows and 1 herd sire on 15 acres of land. Another 40 acres of sorghum grain land yielding 50 bushels per acre will be needed to produce grain for a 10 sow unit. Here, Hale figures on 160 pigs raised and sold from two litters per sow each year.

If you are interested in selling your grain through such a swine enterprise, we would be glad to talk it over with you and furnish you with leaflets and bulletins on hog lay-outs, watering systems, fences and many other things you will need for a successful hog enterprise.

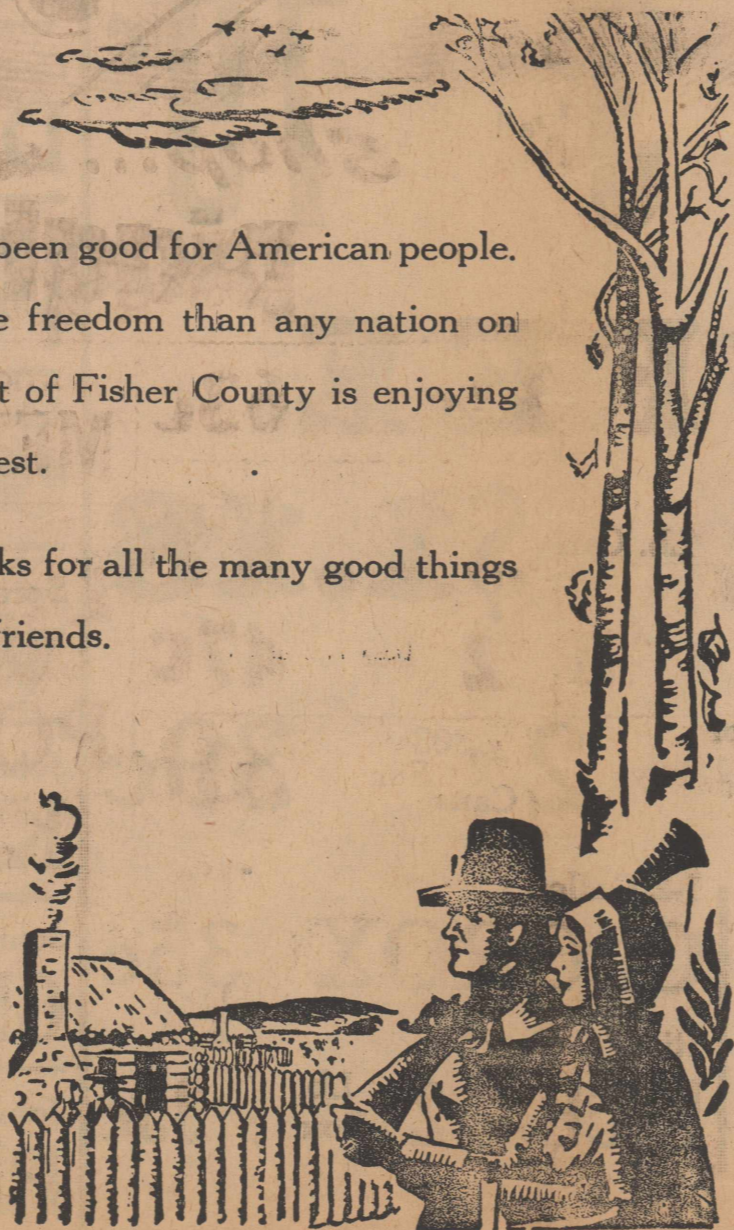

FB Offering Members New Service Program

Inauguration of a new service-to-member program by the Fisher County Farm Bureau has been announced by the organization's president, L. D. Singley.

Farm Bureau members can purchase 2 1-2 pound dry chemical fire extinguishers which normally sell for \$18.50 at the Fisher County Farm Bureau office for only \$9.50 each, a saving of \$9.00.

The Fisher County Farm Bureau office is located at 112 E. Snyder in Rotan. Office hours are 1 to 5 p. m. 5 days per week.

The local Farm Bureau is cooperating with the Texas Farm Bureau farm safety department in this state-wide fire protection program.

"Purpose of the new service is to strengthen our rural fire prevention program, thereby reducing the loss of life and property," Singley said. "This is not a profit-making project and we are not conducting this program to compete with merchants selling fire extinguishers. Our only objective is to provide each and every farmer in the county with adequate fire-fighting equipment at the lowest possible cost."

In stressing the importance of adequate fire-fighting equipment, Mr. Singley said that from 750 to 1,000 persons die each year in the nation from farm fires and that farm property losses run will over \$100 million annually.

The fire extinguisher available through Farm Bureau comes complete with mounting bracket and is good for combatting oil, gas and grease fires and knocks down grass, wood and fabric fires. Also the unit, which is fully charged and ready to use, is safe to use on electrical fires. It is completely safe and non-toxic, the county leader said.

Most local fire stations can recharge the extinguisher, but if this service is not available, the unit can be sent to the Texas Farm Bureau in Waco for free recharging. Since the unit contains no water it will not freeze. It is Underwriter and Coast approved.

About Your HEALTH

Austin—Several thousand Texans are proof that stroke victims need not lead an invalid life, according to State Health Commissioner J. E. Peavy.

These victims of "cerebral vascular accidents" have been totally or partially rehabilitated and have returned to their jobs or other worthwhile vocations, Dr. Peavy says.

The key to this dramatic advance is starting the rehabilitation process early, as soon as the patient is able to communicate, and consistent continuation of a prescribed series of exercises usually by a physio-therapist with a physician's supervision, Dr. Peavy pointed out.

Today, more progressive hospitals, nursing and convalescent homes no longer consider themselves custodians of stroke victims, but institutions of education and training for the patient and his family. As soon as the immediate task of saving the patient's life has been accomplished the rehabilitation process begins.

First, the patient must be taught to eliminate fear. This is done by using as examples other patients who have made recoveries or noticeable progress.

The patient must then be motivated to lead a normal life. His accomplishments are noted and complimented. A system of communication is arranged for the patient whose speech is impaired or who

cannot speak at all.

A series of simple exercises consisting of massage, movement of the limbs, hands, foot and head are begun under the direction of the attending physician.

As soon as the patient is able to move his limbs, hands or feet, the exercises are increased. He is encouraged to do the exercises without assistance, and to add others as prescribed by his doctor.

He is encouraged to assist in feeding and bathing himself—first with assistance and then on his own. Finally, he is encouraged to sit, stand and eventually to walk. He is taught to open doors and dial phones. The patient is now on his way to being rehabilitated.

While patients in many hospitals get this kind of care, some stroke victims are not taken to hospitals, but are kept at home. In addition, many patients are taken home be-

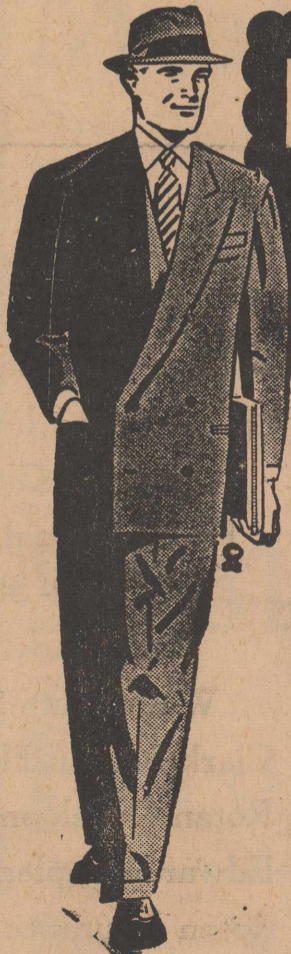
