Jaycee-Ettes Plan Christmas Decoration Contest For 2nd Year

The second annual Christmas Decorations Contest is being sponsored by the Rotan Jaycee-Ettes. There will be two divisions:

1. Home Decorations including windows, doors, and outdoor decorations and exhibits, and 2. Store Windows.

There will be cash awards in the Home Division consisting of \$7.50 for first place, \$5.00 for second place, and \$2.50 for third place.

An engraved trophy will be awarded to the store with the winning window. This trophy will remain with the winning store until the 1962 contest. At that time, it will be presented to the new winner. However, if the same store is the winner for three consecutive years, that store will retain the trophy permanently.

Anyone residing in the city of Rotan and any store in Rotan may enter the contest by filling in the entry blank found in this issue of The Advance and mailing it to Mrs. Archie Neeley by December 15. Displays must be up by December 15, and judging will take place between December 15 and 19. The Rotan Jaycee-Ettes will not be responsible for judging any decorations or displays not officially entered. Winners will be announced in the Christmas issue of The Advance, December 21, and a listing of all entries will be printed so that everyone may see all of the displays and decorations. Home Division Rules and Suggestions:

1. Anyone living in the city limits of Rotan except members of the Rotan Jaycee-Ettes may enter the Contest by filling in and mailing the entry blank. 2. Entries will be judged on the basis of originality, attractiveness, and appropriateness to Christmas.

3. Displays should be clearly visible from the street and should be lighted each evening December 15-19. If possible, displays should be lighted each night throughout the Christmas season so that everyone may enjoy seeing the decorations.

4. Displays need not be elaborate. Simple displays presenting a pleasing appearance often win the awards in such contests as this. Often persons can create with their own hands and ingenuity something that is not necessarily expensive.

Natl. TB Assn. Leader Honored For Work

The voluntary tuberculosis movement was honored by the presentation of a Bronfman Prize for Public Health Achievement to James E. Perkins, M. D., managing director of the National Tuberculosis Association. The award took place during the 89th annual meeting of the American Public Health Association in Detroit, according to word received here by Mrs. James B. Day, president of the Fisher County Tuberculosis Association.

Mrs. Day stated that Dr. Perkins was cited as a leader in the campaign to eradicate tuberculosis in this country and in the world, and for his contribution to the netire field of public health -- particularly through his activities in the National Health Council. He is a member of the executive committee of the Council.

Mrs. Day said that the citation pointed out that as 'chief executive officer of the National Tuberculosis Association since 1948, Dr. Perkins has contributed expert knowledge and wise counsel to the 2,500 voluntary TB associations, including the Fisher County Tuberculosis Association, in a nationwide effort to wipe out a communicable disease, with its serious threat to the health of the people.'

Hammers Lose Regional To Strong Wink Team

Rotan's Yellowhammer led Wink Wildcats 6-3 to second half play last Friday at Midland in regional play, but were overpowered in the second stanza of play. They went into the game rated much weaker than they played, against the strong aggregation and gave good account until the final gun.

Wink winner of 12 straight games including 2 state playoffs, go in to quarterfinals this week.

The Hammers shocked the Wildcats in the first half with brilliant offense.

Wink was unstoppable on the ground all day and Bates hit the critical pass when he had to. The Wildcats ground out 327 yards rushing.

Rotan's attack was led by the sparkling runs of halfback Donald Goodrum scored the Yellowhammers touchdown on a 26 yard run and finished the day with 94 yards. This was Goodrum's 26th touchdown this season and raised his total point record to 176.

Wink started the scoring with Robinson's field goal on its first possession of the ball in the game.

Rotan rolled deep into Wink territory three of the first four times they had the ball but could not push across until Goodrum powered across with 40 seconds left in the first half.

A touchdown was set up on end Bill Ashton's interception of a Wink pass, which he returned to the Wink 43. QB Steve Herron put the ball on the 26 with a 17 yard dash around left end and Goodrum went over on the next play. Ashton was low on the try for point.

Wink scored twice on passes in the third was each score climaxing long drives.

Hammers threatened once in the second half, rolling to the Wink 10 late in the game, but Herron was dropped for a 10-yard loss on fourth down.

Rotan's line, led by Ashton and tackle Howard Ivan Loon, played the heavier Wink forward wall on equal terms but could not handle the swift backs. Wink has now scored 480 points and this was its second lowest score of the season.

Midwest Electric CoOp To Make Refunds

Midwest Electric Cooperative of Roby has announced that \$74,321.33 in Capital Credit Refund will be mailed December 4, 1961. These checks will go to members who were receiving from Midwest Electric in 1955.

The checks will be sent to approximately 3400 members and will average about \$20.00 each.

This is the fourth Capital Credits Refund to be made by Midwest Electric Cooperative. It is also the largest. The first refund was made in December of 1958 when \$19,435.64 was returned. This was one half the net margin for the year 1951. In December of 1959 the other half of the 1951 margin and all of the 1952 margins were returned. This amounted to \$42,116.87. Last December, the margins for 1953 and 1954 were returned. They totaled \$58,852.28.

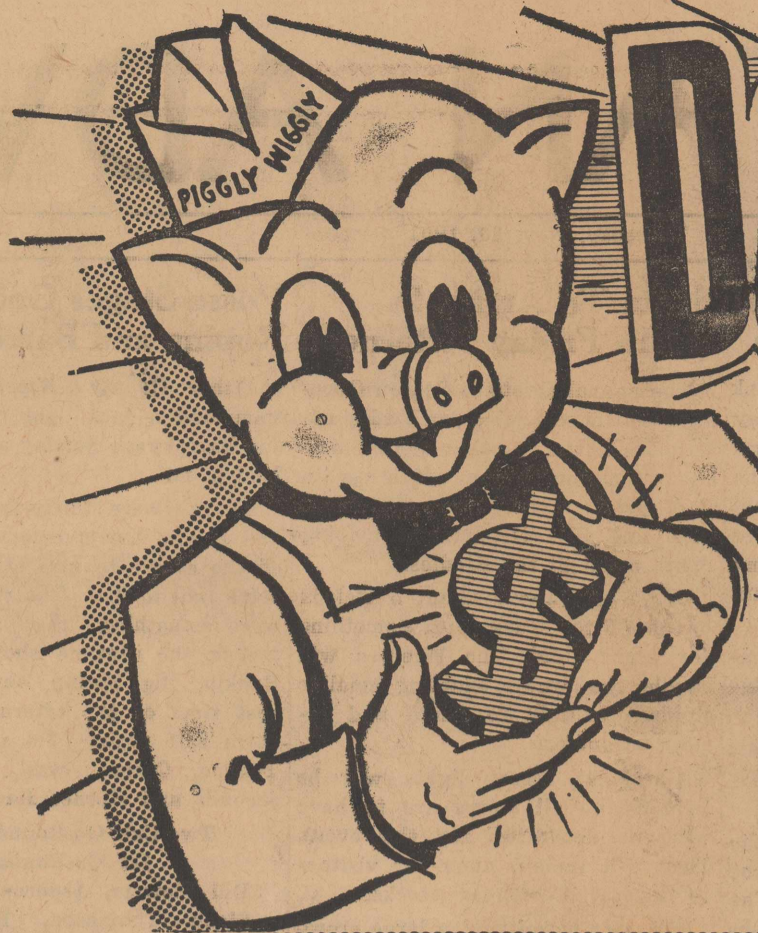
Catholic Parishoners Hear Lay Speakers

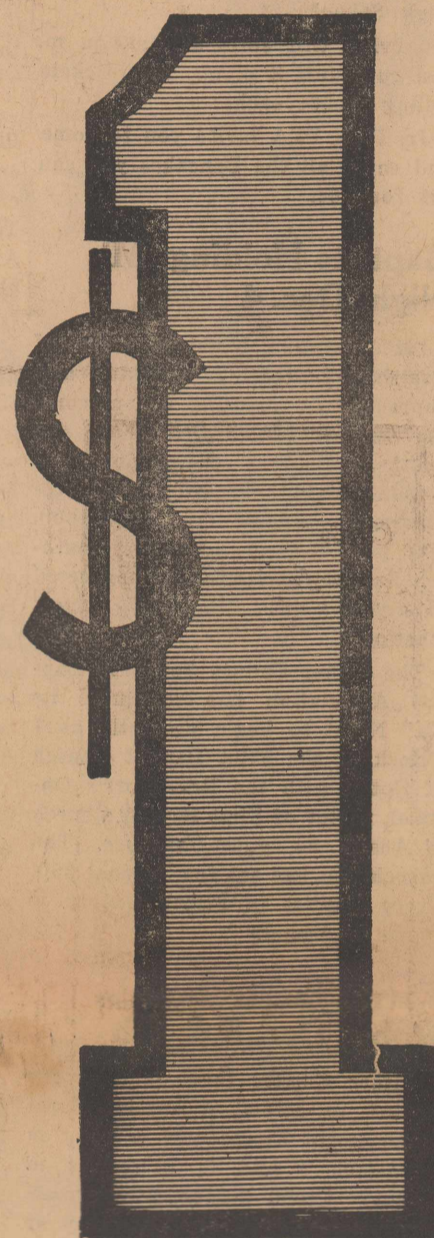

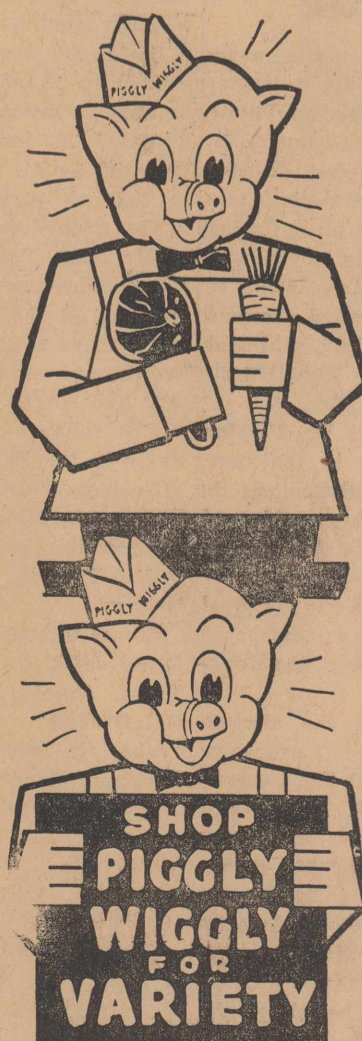

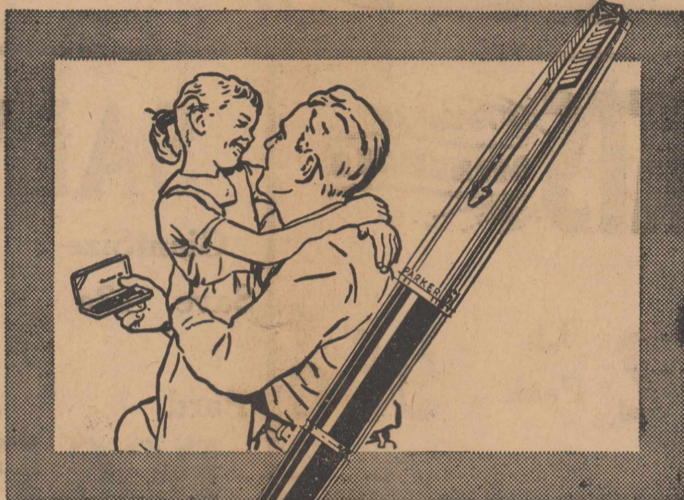

Huge Control Program Planned On Screwworm Problem Over State

The animal health situation in Fisher County and Texas is getting major attention. The screwworm, a pest causing an established annual loss of one hundred million dollars, is a primary target.

In a recent meeting initiated by County Agent James S. Norman, and Vocational Agriculture Teachers Bill Robinson, Ray Womack and Jimmy Laurie and attended by a group of livestock producers and others concerned with animal health decided to organize and support a state-wide effort.

Dave Posey was elected chairman and James Cave, secretary-treasurer. Other members of the county committee are Roger Smith, Bob Williams, Richard Floyd, M. W. Strickland, Jack Willingham, Sterling Willingham and Glen Webb.

The group will support the recently formed Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation in its drive to do something the animal health situation. Its purposes are to receive and disburse funds, and sponsor research and educational programs on animal health-including diseases, insects and parasites-to the end that these hazards of livestock production may eventually be controlled.

"Animal health," chairman Posey said, "is not only a concern of the producer but the economic loss also affects business and consumers. We all have a lot at stake in this program."

The Foundation's first major effort will be a program aimed at controlling the screwworm. The proposed program is patterned after the successful drive in Florida and the Southeast. The U. S. Department of Agriculture, livestock producers and the State of Florida

teamed up to just about remove the pest from the scene. The method used was based on the release of sterile male screwworm flies over the State which resulted in the production of infertile eggs and almost complete elimination of the fly population.

Such a program in Texas will encounter problems not found in Florida. It is bordered by great land areas where the flies overwinter but cooperative efforts could overcome some of the problems, the chairman said.

"Through county organizations such as ours, every livestock producer and other interested person will have an opportunity to support the Foundation and its programs. Producers are being asked to contribute on the basis of 50 cents per head for adult cows, horses and steers and 10 cents per head for sheep, goats, swine and deer," Posey said.

Contributions may be made to any member of the committee. All monies collected will be passed on to the Foundation for support of existing research facilities and conduct of large scale field tests.

Chairman Posey said, "We know

The group heard Curly Hays, with the special services department of West Texas Utilities Co. of Abilene, who told of the importance of 4-H Club work.

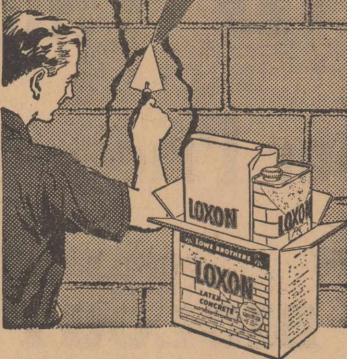
