Clues to Clothing Care-

Next time you shop for fabrics or ready-to-wear, be sure to check the fiber label. That's an important clue to the kind of care and wear you can expect, according to extension clothing "specialists of the A&M College of Texas.

Since March 3, 1960 the new Textile Fiber Products Inentification Act has been in effect. This means that all textile fiber products must no wearry a label which gives the generic (family) names and percentages by weight of the fibers in the product.

We all recognize the natural fibers--cotton, linen, silk and wool; but, some of the man-made fibers have unfamiliar generic names. Specialists point out that it is very important to learn these new names because they give an important clue to proper washing, drying and pressing temperatures and to spot removal.

Trade names also exsist for many fibers. But when a manufacturer uses a trade name he must pair it with the generic names of fibers, so that you still have this important clue to clothing care.

Specialists give a practical fivepoint plan for buying clothing in a leaflet, "For clues to clothing careread your fiber label."

Ask for a copy of this new bulletin from your county home demonstration agent's officee.

JEWELRY REFLECTS YOUR TASTE AND PERSONALITY . .

The jewelry you wear reflects a bit of your own taste and personality. Even inexpensive jewelry can add just the right accent to your costume, if it is carefully chosen, according to Rheba Merle Boylese, extension clothing specialist of the A&M College of Texas.

Proper choice means that certain styles and textures are best for different occasions. And when more than one piece of jewelry is worn, the pieces should be related in texture and type . . . but not necessarily "matched sets." Look for modern and conventionalized pieces rather than those that have a naturalistic design. •

In addition, because of his steadying influence and demonstrated interest in sound government, he has been appointed to such key interim study groups as the Tax Study Commission, the Cost of Government Study Committee, the Legisla. tive Budget Board, and a special committee to study the problems of the aging. Based on the broad knowledge of state fiscal affairs, gained from his wide experience as a member of these several committees and agencies, Senator Ratliff says that he sees "no need whatever for further state tax increases anytime in the foreseeable future." He does insist, however, that amendments are definitely required to remove inequities and to simplify collection of the sales tax. Recent experience has proved that this law should be corrected to prevent certain injustices and to eliminate unnecessary complications,' Ratliff said: Senator Ratliff's primary legislative interest through the years has been the major problem of West Texas--water. He has co-authored legislation making water available to the cities of Abilene, Anson, Albany, Breckenridge, Hamlin and Stamford. He also co-sponsored legislation creating the White River Authority which will bring an adequate supply of water to Post and Spur, and legislation creating a water supply for Roby and Rotan. In addition, Senator Ratliff co-authored legis-

lation to provide water for the school at Gail.

Senator Ratliff in making his announcement expressed his gratitude for the many honors extended to him by the people of the 24th Senatorial District and plegded his continued dedication to sound and Ratliff said.



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

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
