Director Urges Early Vehicle Inspection

Austin -- The Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, Col. Homer Garrison Jr., today urged motorists to secure their 1962 vehicle inspection stickers as soon as possible prior to the April 15 deadline.

After that date, vehicles not displaying the new inspection sticker will be operating in violation of the law and the operators of those vehicles will be subject to arrest, he seid.

Garrison said approximately half of the inspection period has expired and anly about one-fourth of the vehicles in the state have been inspected. Unless the number of inspections is increased appreciably soon, he added, long waiting lines will be forming at inspection stations as the April 15 deadline approaches.

"There are some 4,800 authorized inspection stations in the state and they are ready and capable of handling the inspection of all vehicles without delay if owners of the uninspected vehicles do not wait until the last few days before the dead-line," Garrison said.

He pointed out that vehicles inspected so far this year have fewer defects than have ever been noted teretofore. He said vehicle defects contributing to motor vehicle accidents in Texas is the lowest in the history of the state.




