Jaycees To See Project Echo Demonstration

Plans to expand worldwide communications by bouncing telephone calls off satellites orbiting in outer space will be described tonight to members of the Rotan Jaycees.

Glenn Scott, science demonstrator for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, will use miniature equipment to demonstrate Project Echo, an experiment conducted by Bell Telephone Laboratories scientists who made coast-to-coast long distance calls by bouncing voice signals off a balloon satellite to orbit 1,000 miles above the earth.

Other techniques the Bell System has developed to improve and increase telephone transmission also will be demonstrated. Among these is a device that can transmit samples of many different telephone conversations over the same pair of wires at the same time and then decode them back to normal voice conversations at their destinations.

Scott also will demonstrate how microwave systems work to beam long distance calls and television programs across the country via the airways.

His science program, "Voices Across Time and Space", is being brought here by Roy Eury of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

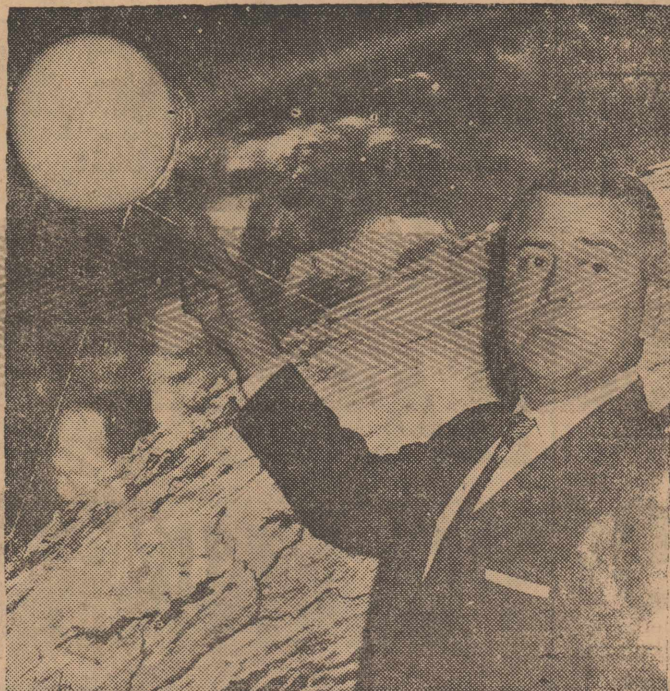

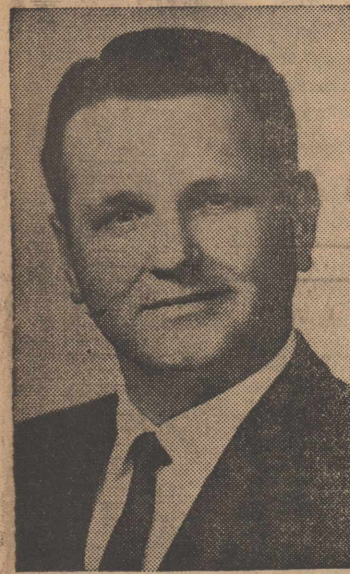

Rep. Max Carriker Seeks Reelection



Rep. Max Carriker, farmer and rancher of Fisher County and veteran Democrat of the 91st District, announced he will seek re-election to the House of Representatives from the new District 80, composed of Mitchell, Nolan, Fisher, Dickens, King and Stonewall counties.

Rep. Carriker, presently in Austin for the third call session of the 57th Legislature, summoned by Gov. Price Daniel, made his announcement after he served as Chairman of the Agriculture subcommittee, which drafted the Farm-to-Market Road Bill, known as the McIlhany Bill, which is designed to increase the net mileage of the Farm-to-Market system and to provide sufficient funds to maintain the roads.

"The Farm-to-Market roads of Texas are virtually important to everyone," Mr. Carriker stated. "These roads form a network around our counties, linking our farmers and ranchers to our cities. The Governor tagged this as emergency legislation, and I have worked hard with the other members of our committee to draft a bill which would be acceptable to everyone concerned."

Other than his service on the vital Agriculture Committee, Rep. Carriker is a member of the House Committee on Revenue and Taxation, the House Committee for Penitentiaries, the House Committee on Education, and Rep. Carriker serves as Chairman of the House Committee on Judicial Districts.

While serving as Chairman of the Committee on Judicial Districts, Rep. Carriker finalized the bill which made Fisher County a part of the 32nd Judicial District along with Nolan and Mitchell Counties. It was during the 56th Legislature that Rep. Carriker drafted legislation for the Nolan County Juvenile Board which is unique in Texas and considered one of the major progressive steps in this crucial and humanitarian field.

During the present special session, Rep. Carriker supported Gov. Daniel in passing the missing heirs bill. "This bill was drafted to protect unwary depositors against excessive bank charges. Our west Texas bankers were outstanding in their good records in this field, but in certain sections of Texas, it was possible for the heir of an estate to discover that the account, which should have been his, had already been depleted by bank charges," Mr. Carriker stated. "In our area we are particularly fortunate that we have such fine bankers, and this law was in no way meant to undermine the confidence of our people in the banks. It was simply meant to protect Texas. I am confident that as a result of this bill, many previously unknown owners of these deposits will be found, and hundreds of thousands of dollars which have been laying dormant will be put into circulation."

Rep. Carriker also supported Gov. Daniel's proposal to restrict the loan shark activities in Texas. "There were ugly and blatant abuses of Texas citizens, and this law was a necessity."

Rep. Carriker has supported, from the very beginning of his service in the Legislature, the severance beneficiary efforts and opposed any tax on independent petroleum and royalty owners. "I am concerned with the small, independent..."

Director Urges Early Vehicle Inspection

Austin -- The Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, Col. Homer Garrison Jr., today urged motorists to secure their 1962 vehicle inspection stickers as soon as possible prior to the April 15 deadline.

After that date, vehicles not displaying the new inspection sticker will be operating in violation of the law and the operators of those vehicles will be subject to arrest, he said.

Garrison said approximately half of the inspection period has expired and only about one-fourth of the vehicles in the state have been inspected. Unless the number of inspections is increased appreciably soon, he added, long waiting lines will be forming at inspection stations as the April 15 deadline approaches.

"There are some 4,800 authorized inspection stations in the state and they are ready and capable of handling the inspection of all vehicles without delay if owners of the un-inspected vehicles do not wait until the last few days before the deadline," Garrison said.

He pointed out that vehicles inspected so far this year have fewer defects than have ever been noted heretofore. He said vehicle defects contributing to motor vehicle accidents in Texas is the lowest in the history of the state.

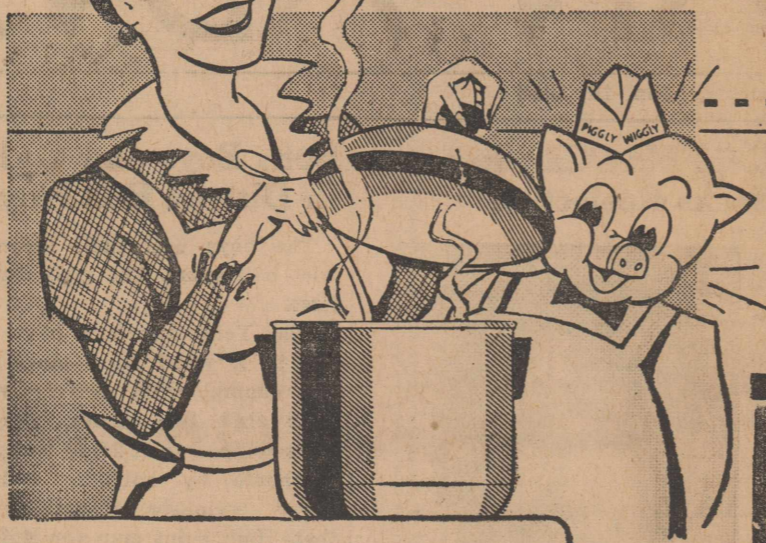

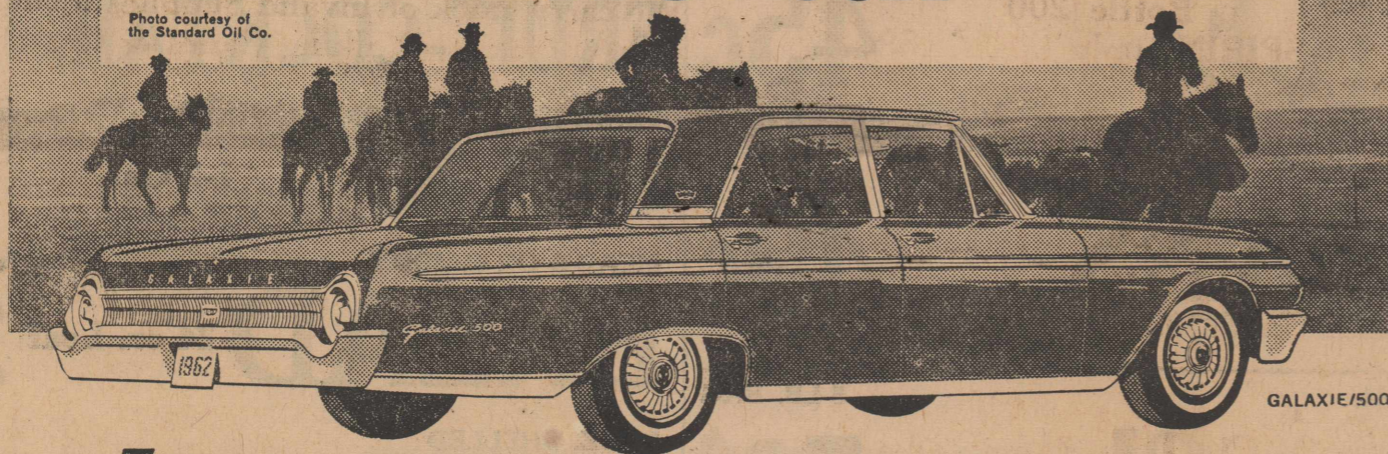

Fishing To Open In Lake Sweetwater Soon

Recent netting samples from Lake Sweetwater indicates that game fish stocked in the summer of 1960 have grown by leaps and bounds. Black bass, stocked as fingerlings, now weigh between two and three pounds. Several channel catfish caught in the check-nets weighed 2 3-4 pounds. One flathead catfish (yellow cat) was caught which weighed 10 pounds. A few crappie and bluegills (not stocked by the Commission) were also recovered in seining, but at this point will not be detrimental to fishing. No carp, suckers or shad were caught in any of the seining operations indicating a thorough clean-up on rough fish was achieved.

Seining operations in 1959, made prior to chemical treatment of the lake, showed that rough fish made up 99.89 per cent of the total fish

Here is something that should be of interest to all sportsmen, as a side line to the screwworm control program. Some research people estimate the deer count would jump 50 per cent the first year. Since screwworms kill about that percent of the young. If this is so the bag limit could be doubled.

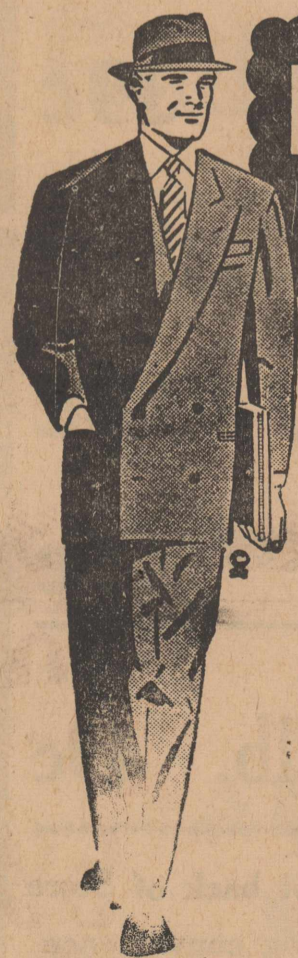

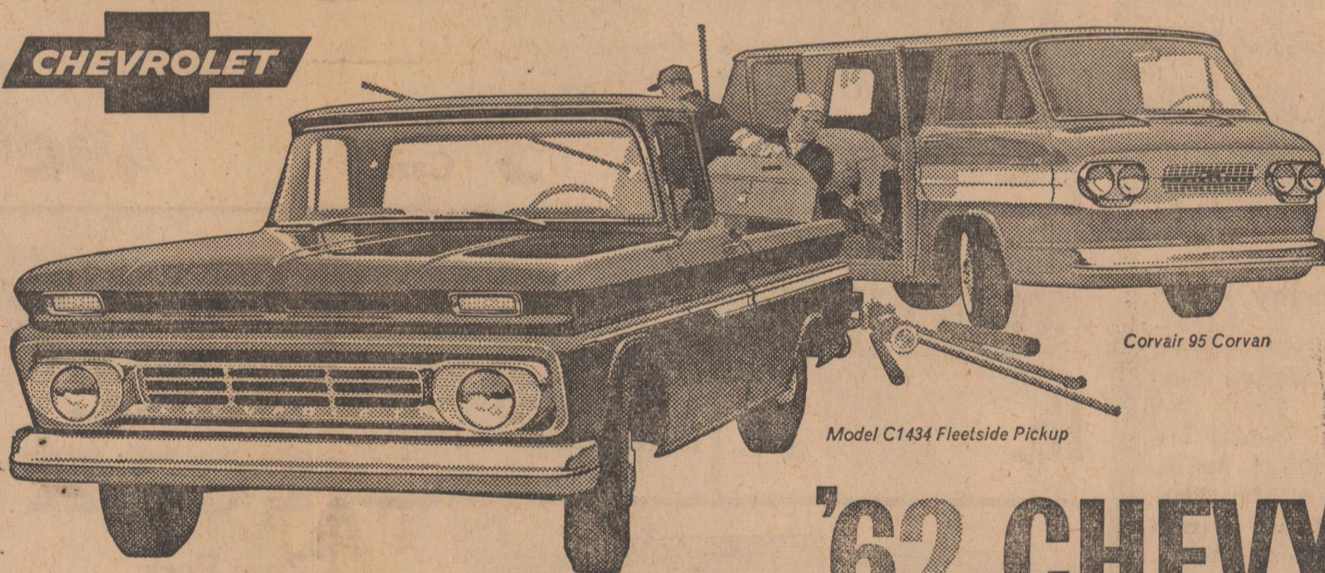

dent oil operator and owner, not the large corporation. My ideas are in conformity with the policies of TIIPRO (Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners). That is where I belong, as I represent people and not corporations."

Rep. Carriker was born and raised on a farm and ranch in Fisher County. His family are well known as pioneers in Kent and Fisher Counties. He attended Roby High School, then graduated from Hardin-Simmons University of Abilene in 1941. He married the former Dorothy Dry of Rotan, and they have three children, two boys and a daughter who are enrolled in the public schools of Roby, Texas.

Rep. Carriker served in the Air Force for three and one-half years during World War II, and two of those years were spent overseas in the Pacific Theater. Later, he served for two terms on the Roby School board, and was Fisher County Democrat Chairman until he resigned to run for the State Legislature.

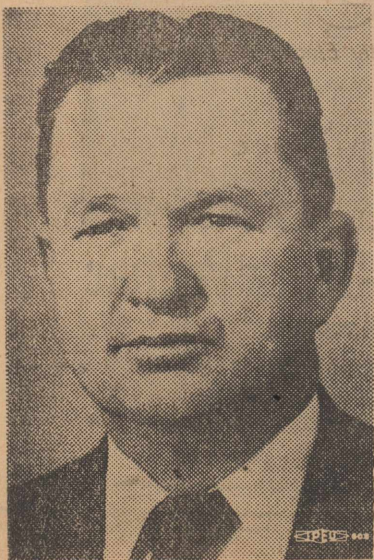

Marshall Formby Enters Governor Race



Calling for a return of the Government to the people of Texas, Marshall Formby, Wednesday, made his formal announcement for Governor in the Democratic Primary. Formby, made his announcement from McAllen, in the Valley, where he was guest of honor at an appreciation dinner. Recently, the highway through the Valley was named the "Marshall Formby Valley Expressway."

Formby is a former County Judge; former State Senator; and, a former member and Chairman of the Texas Highway Commission. He is a strong advocate of the State Farm-to-Market Road System.

"Texans are demanding a more positive, progressive state administration, headed by a Governor who

is not obligated to any cliques in either Washington or Austin. People are tired of the bickering and fussing among elected executives in Austin and they want a new leader -- but one who will not be dictated to from Washington," Formby said in his announcement.

"Furthermore, the State needs a good solid businessman approach to solve the State's economic problems. I propose to bring sensible and logical leadership to the Governor's office when I am elected."

Formby's platform includes favoring a simplified tax system; amending the so-called unfair merit car insurance ruling; increasing the speed limit to 70 miles per hour on 4-lane divided highways in rural areas and then strict enforcement; solving the State's water and soil conservation problems; less red tape for small businessmen and farmers; and, operating Texas on a cash basis. He favors greater consideration for the State's senior citizens.

Formby lives at Plainview. He was born in Hopkins County. He is a practicing attorney, farmer and co-owner of four Texas radio stations.

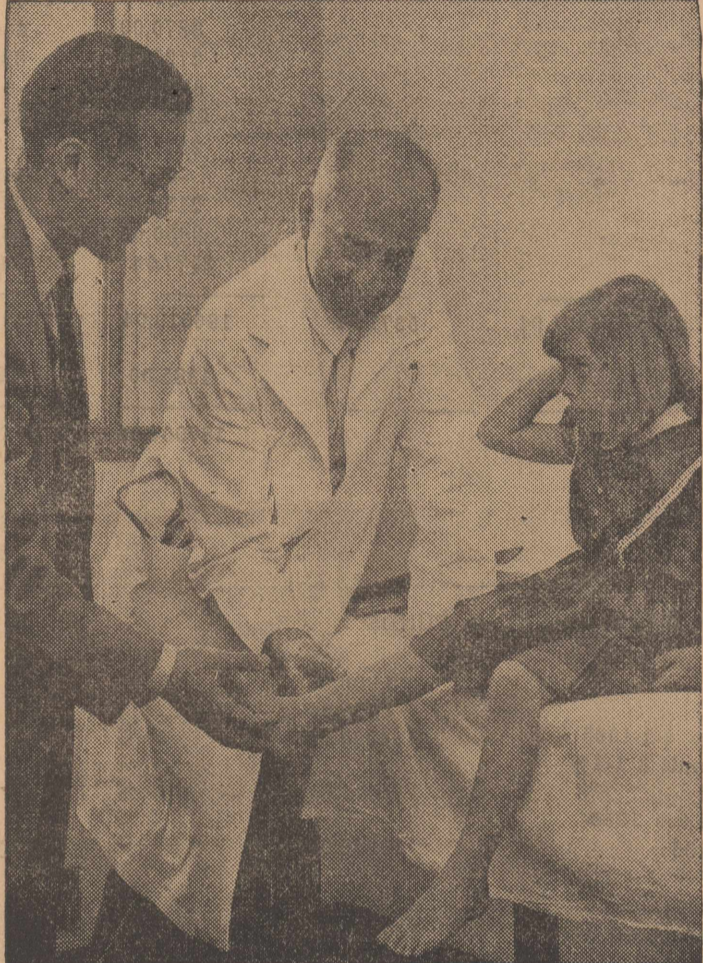

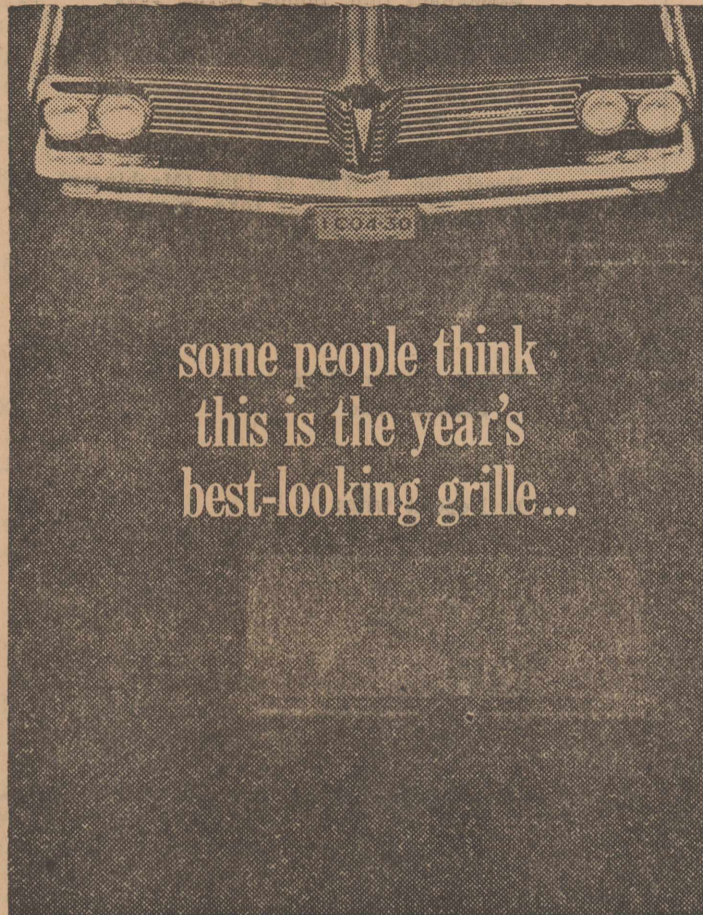
