Farmer's Poultry and Hogs Pay Year's Grocery Bill

> An example of what one Haskell county farmer is doing by practicing diversification and poultry raising is shown in an instance called to our attention by R. J. Reynolds, groceryman of

Mr. Reynolds states that one of his customers whose name will be furnished on request, called at his store Saturday to pay his account for the year, which covered his purchases for a family of four from January 1st to Sept. 24th-practically nine months. The farmer had been bringing his eggs from a flock of Rhode Island Red hens, together with his surplus of home-killed and cured meat during the winter months of this year, crediting the market price of these products against his account during the nine months. Upon balancing the account, the farmer had a balance of twenty-seven cents to his credit, instead of being in debt to the merchant for his year's supply of grocries

This is only one of several instances of like nature called to our attention by Mr. Reynolds, who states that a number of his customers are paying their grocery bills with eggs and poultry, leaving all money from their crops as a surplus.
