Looks like several acres of Coastel Burmuda will be planted in the county this year. Mack Blair, Dwigit Lovett, Willard Burk, Milton, Burk, N. I. Templer, ecil Edwards, and J. O. Roberts are a few of the ones that have indicated that they would put out Coastal.

Coastal Bermuda is an excellent pasture grass which produces high reilds of good quality, forage once it becomes established. Many farmers fail to get good stands or quick stands, however. What causes this?

E. M. Trew, extension pasture specialist, says the major reasons for not getting a good stand are planting in a light or heavier stand of other grass, using dried out sprigs or grazing before a stand is obtained. These problems can be oversome with proper management.

A good "rule of Thumb" is that Coastal will grow where Common Bermuda will. Here is enother facture in our favor. Coastal is reclaiming some soils that are so salty they lave been considered worthless. This grass has given high production under good management in Werd County on salty soils with irrigation water high in salt content.

Research underway at the Georgia Coastal Pheins station (where the Coastal Bermuda was propigated), Suggests that Coastal Bermuda requires only about half as much water as Common Bermuda to produce a pound of dry matter.

The first step toward a good stand is preparing a good seedbed. It should be clean, firm and moist, and free of other growing grasses. Trew says farmers are expecting too much of Coastal Bermuda when they expect it to take over from established grasses.

Next is planting at the proper time. It is usually best to plant in the spring, after the soil warms up.

A satifasctory stand cannot be expected unless fresh livable sprigs are used. Sprigs should be planted the same day they are dug, and they should cont in at least three nodes. It is important to keep sprigs shaded and moist until they are planted. Tests have shown that exposing sprigs to sunlight for four hours reduced viability by as much as 97 percent.

Recommended planting rate is 9 to 15 bushels of sprigs per acre, plented in 30 to 42 inch rows. It is essential that soil be firmed around the sprig after planting, says Trew. This can be done with the wheel or large compress wheels.

Before fertilizing, a soil test should be run. Where soil is not too weedy or grassy, the fertilizer can be put in a band 3 to 4 inches below the sprigs at or ahead of planting. Otherwise, fertilizer should be applied as a top-dressing after Coastal begins to grow. Never broadcast fertilizer until a good stand is obtained, advises the specialist. It is also a good idea to sop-dress once or twice with nitrogen to stimulate growth.

"Remember", warns Trew, "don't graze the Coastal until good stand is obtained. Grazing before this may seriously delay getting a stand."
Bullentin MP-519 Coastal Bermuda grass, lists such things as: Area of adaption, Establishment, Fertilization, Method of Planting and Management, is available at the county extension office.







other words, a soil survey determines the kinds of soils and their characteristics. It tells how the soils are distributed and where they come from and how they behave.

During this final field review the group will study the important properties of the soils. They will then calssify these into defined units, to fit into a national classification scheme, according to Schwartz.

Following the final field review the information will be published in a soil-survey report. This report will include maps on a photomosiac background which will show the location and extent of the soils, how they can be used and managed for sustained production, their limitations and potentialities as well as their suitability from an engineering standpoint, such as dam-sites, building and road sites, and road construction material.

Actually this survey is a part of the cooperative soil survey going on all over the nation. When completed it will give a complete picture of the nation's soil resources.

It originated in Milan at the beginning of the 16th century and its purposes, according to Pope Paul III, was "to appease the anger of God provoked by the offenses of Christians". It was popularized in Rome by St. Philip Neri and St. Ignatius, who urged its observance as an act of reparation for sins. It was introduced into the United States by Archbishop Kenrick of St. Louis in 1854.



Economic Growth

Over the years, the advocates of increased government spending have presented clever argumentts to support their case. One of their most persistent arguments is that such spending is essential to the promotion of rapid ecenomic growth.

At first, this sounds very impressive, for surely all of us are in favor of ecenomic growth since economic growth has given this country the highest standard of living ever enjoyed by any people, enywhere, at any time.

But where is the relationship between unbridled Federal spending D. Turner Sunday. and ecenomic growth? The only kind of ecenomic growth permanently useful is measured in terms of additional spending of a debased currency.

Real economic growth comes from private capital investment. It comes from the use of new worksaving machinery and more productive labor. Spending at the government level may cause a temporary increase of output, but it will achieve nothing in the way of permanent growth, for government is simply not productive in terms of goods. And in the end. this artifical thimulus causes far more harm than good.

Thomas Jefferson, one of our great Founding Fathers, said more than 150 years ago: "I place economy among the first and most important virtues and public debt as the greatest danger to be feared. To preserve our independence we must not let our rulers load us with perpetual debt." He then suggested the prime domestic problem with which we Americans are faced today and staked a course for us to follow: "We must make our choice between economy and liberty or profusion and servitude."






