## Pest Control Fund Drive Is Short

The Texas Animal Health Research Foundation, which is making war on flies that produces the screwworm, is running short on operation funds.

Fisher County is short of its quota by \$3,000. Last week \$4783.45 had been sent to the Foundation, reports James Cave, treasurer of the county committee.

"We urge all stockmen to send or bring in their contributions at the earliest possible moment," Cave said.

These contributions can be sent to James Cave or deposited at either of the Fisher County banks.

"The contribution was set at the rate of 10 cents per head on sheep, goats and hogs; and 50 cents per head on cattle and horses," Cave said.

Recently the M. G. and Johnny D. Perry Foundation at Robstown made a \$50,000 contribution to the program, declaring that, "this program is the greatest thing that's ever happened," to the animal health foundation in its fight to eliminate the dreaded screwworm from Texas.

"We certainly don't want Fisher County to fail to meet its quota of funds," Cave said.

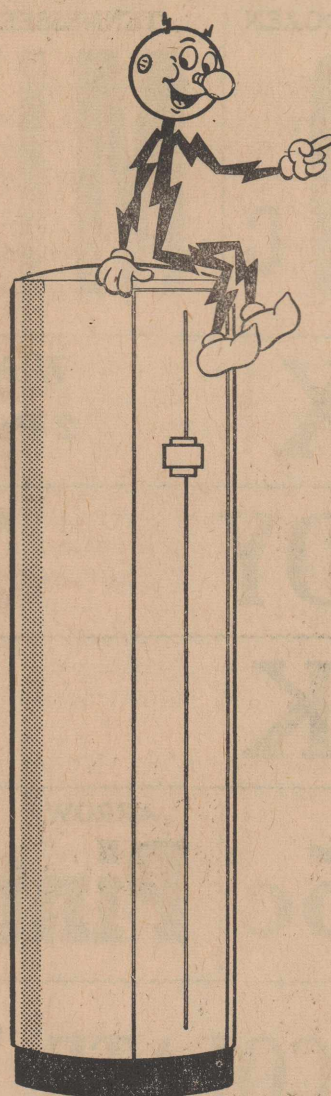

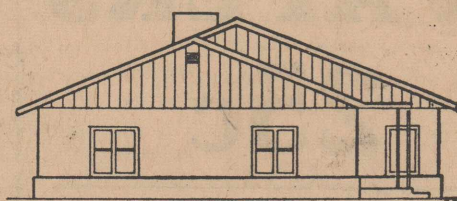

**For Weight Watchers**

Do you have a weight problem? Many a person goes on a diet, loses weight successfully, then a few weeks or months finds she has re-gained all of the weight she has lost.

What is the reason for this inability to hold one's weight?

Chances are that the dieter has reverted to her old habits of too much food and too little exercise.

Nutritionists in the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Research Service say that even though you've reached the weight you want, you can't suddenly go back to your old calorie-laden diets. Since it was a reducing plan that took off those extra pounds, the same plan will keep the pounds off.

A person with the weighty problem may ease up a little on the diet routine, but servings should be increased cautiously. And it is a good idea to keep an eye on the scales regularly.

For persons wanting information on weight control, an excellent booklet on weight control has been put out by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Entitled "Food and Your Weight," the pamphlet offers basic weight control facts and a daily food guide. It suggests meals and menus for reducers and for those who want to gain weight, and it lists the calorie values of nearly 400 food items so you can plan your own meals according to your likes and dislikes.

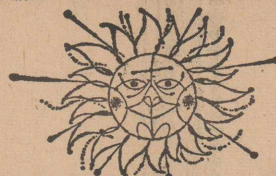

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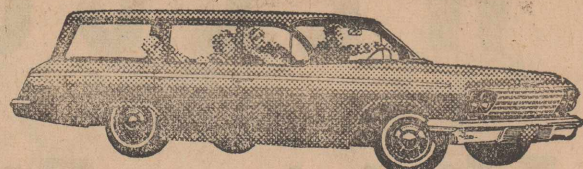

Out of each 8-hour day, Americans work 2 hours and 19 minutes to support the government, according to The Tax Foundation. In fact, taxes take a greater proportion of our earnings than any other category of expenditures—more than food, clothing, and medical care combined.

Taxes take about 29% of the total workday as compared with 17.3% for food and tobacco, 6.9% for clothing and accessories; 17.5% for housing and household operation; 4.4% for medical and dental care; 8.1% for transportation; 3.9% for recreation; and 12.9% for all other expenses.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture points out that the cost of food has risen less than most other items on the cost-of-living index.

For all items other than food, the increase is 30.9% since 1947-49. Transportation costs have gone up 45.7%; housing, 32.5%; rent, 43.1%; medical care, 59.6%. For all food, including that sold in restaurants, the increase is

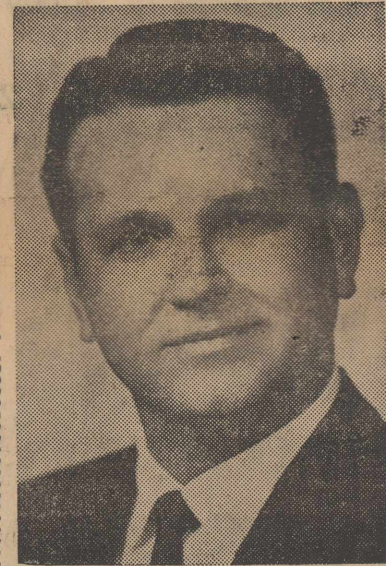

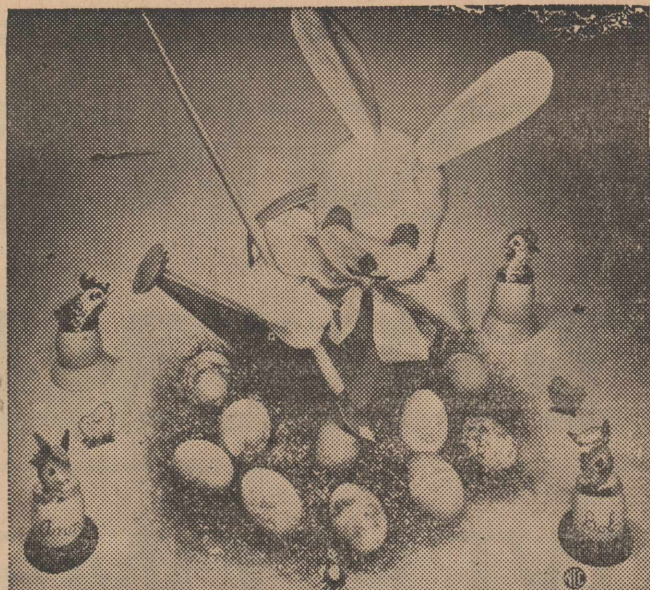

An improved procedure for determining soil phosphorus is now being used by the soil testing laboratories operated in the state by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Extension Soil Chemist W. E. Bennett said the change will give a better indication of the phosphorus status of the soil, particularly the heavy textured kinds.

The new procedure is the result of several years of research work by Texas Agricultural Experiment Station personnel, Bennett said.

Many soils will show higher phosphorus values with the new method. The change results in the removal of certain types of soil phosphorus not extracted by the previously used

method. The higher phosphorus values will tend to occur primarily in the heavy textured soils of the blacklands, the

Coast Prairie, Rio Grande Plains and the Rolling and High Plains. The Houston black clay soils for example, which have been properly managed and fertilized with phosphorus during the past several years may show levels up to 40 to 60 pounds of phosphorus per acre compared with 10-15 pounds under the previous method of determination. The same will be true of the Pullman Clay loams of the High Plains and similar heavy soils.

The use of the new procedure in the soil testing laboratories will permit us to more accurately predict the need for phosphorus fertilizer.

Several of the soil tests, from the county this year, show a need for more phosphorus. This could relate back to the improved testing procedure and-or to the increase in crop production the last few years which has used up some of our available phosphorus.

Really we don't have many sheep producers in the county, but though there might be a few interested in the field day coming up. McGregor Experiment Station's annual Sheep and Goat Field Day has been set for Thursday, April 19, at 10 a. m., Superintendent H. O. Hill announced today.

McGregor, one of 20 substations of the Texas Agricultural Experi-

ment Station, is considered the center of research for the state's \$100 million sheep and goat industry. Dr. Maurice Shelton heads this phase of the station's research activities.

A panel of highly competent specialist will be on hand to discuss all phases of sheep and goat management as well as outlook for the industry.

Visitors will have an opportunity to view research facilities and to discuss individual problems with station personnel. The Day's activities will be concluded with a lamb slaughtering demonstration by Dr. O. D. Butler, head of the department of animal husbandry at Texas A&M College and Extension Meats Specialist Roy Snyder of College Station.

The sign-up deadline under the 1962 feed grain and wheat stabilization programs has been extended until April 14 in 24 states including Texas. The extension was announced by Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman.
