

Firemen's Convention Drew Large Crowds

Rotan Fire Department hosted the 47th semiannual convention of Mid-West Texas Firemen here last Thursday which was well attended. D. W. Cooper, Throckmorton rancher and businessman was elected president.

Cooper succeeds Doug McGlaun of Snyder.

Other officers elected included C. C. Poe of Clyde, first vice president; Tom Watson of Haskell, second vice president; James C. Asbury of Baird, secretary-treasurer. He is serving his eighth year in this office. Rev. Hillis Herren of Snyder was elected association chaplain. He is also chaplain of Snyder department.

Stamford was selected as site for the April 1963 convention. The October session will be hosted by Colorado City.

Guest speaker for the convention was Weldon Kirk of Sweetwater, district attorney of 32nd district. He was introduced by Bill Smith, Rotan fireman.

Visitors were welcomed by Mayor Juston Morrow. Host chief was A. B. Parker, past president of the association.

A memorial service was conducted by Rev. Herron, who was assisted by N. W. Antry, retired Snyder fire chief and Mrs. Mark Vaughn of Snyder.

The water races, with Antry as supervisor, drew a large crowd of spectators in the afternoon. Snyder won the six-man pumper race with 20.7 seconds time. Haskell was second with 22 seconds and Throckmorton third was 23.5.

Throckmorton won the six-man hookup race with a time of 13.1 seconds. Snyder trailed with a 14 second time.

Throckmorton also was first in the two-man hook-up with 11.9 Roby second with 12.8 and Haskell third with 13.4.

Other towns represented were Roby, Throckmorton, Colorado City, Snyder, Merkel, Hamlin, Haskell, Albany, Baird, Clyde, Winters and Roscoe.

Several state association officials attended the convention, including Vernon B. Rucker of Kileen, president of the State Firemen's and Fire Marshals Assn.; Hugh Notion of Crosbyton, past state president; W. E. Lorn of Del Rio, first state vice president and B. E. Eisenhower of Sinton, candidate for fourth vice president of the state group.

The convention closed with a catered barbecue supper and a dance.

School Nurse Finds Much Faulty Vision

The following information is given by County Superintendent C. J. Dalton:

Before and since Christmas, the eyes of 1221 children have been checked in the four schools of the county, with the result that 238 or 19.5 percent had more or less poor vision.

Mrs. Bobby (Dorothy) Cave, our school nurse, checked the eyes of 693 children in Hobbs, McCauley, and Roby. Of this number 163 or 23.5 percent showed sufficient defects to warrant the attention of a doctor. In Rotan, four competent young ladies and I checked the eyes of 528 pupils, and 75 or 14.2 percent needed to see a doctor.

The reason that the percentage of weak eyes is higher in Hobbs, McCauley, and Roby than in Rotan is that during the two preceding years the out-of-town doctors who had been checking in Hobbs, McCauley and Roby learned late in these two years that they could not come. As a result, many children had entered school since the last check or had developed defective vision since then, while at Rotan their eyes have been checked each year.

Mrs. Cave has also checked the hearing of 565 pupils in Hobbs, McCauley, and Roby, nine of whom had defective hearing and should see a doctor.

If you have received a statement from Mrs. Cave or from me and have not yet seen a doctor, you should do so as even more serious trouble may develop later.

Tennis Tourney At Abilene May 18-19

The Abilene Junior Chamber of Commerce will host a tennis clinic, open to Junior and Senior High school players throughout the Central West Texas area, at Fair Park tennis center in Abilene May 5, 1962.

The clinic will be a prelude to the ninth annual Jaycee Junior Tennis Tournament, which will be held at Fair Park May 18-19.

The Cattle Feeders Field Day at the Experiment Station at Spur was well attended last Tuesday.

Those attending from the county were Dwight Lovett, Morris Guelker James Cave, and Sam Swann and Roy Dalzell, who ranch in Fisher County but lives in Merkel.

Schools designed to give operators of cotton gins practical information which will aid in the ginning of highest quality cotton consistent with efficient machinery operation have been announced for Corpus Christi and Lubbock.

The Corpus Christi schools will be held on May 8 while August 21 is the date for the Lubbock sessions, said B. G. Reeves, extension cotton ginning and mechanization specialist. Sponsors for the one-day schools are the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Cotton Ginner's Association, Continental Gin Co., the Murray and John E. Mitchell Companies, Lummus Cotton Gin Co., Hardwicke-Etter Co. and Moss-Gordin Company.

Five schools will be held simultaneously on the announced dates and each of the cooperating companies will provide meeting rooms for their students. Reeves said participants would receive instructions on the operation, maintenance and repair of each piece of machinery used in a modern cotton gin, including stands, dryers, cleaners, bur machines, extractor - feeders, lint cleaners, and other auxiliary equipment. Experienced factory engineers will serve as instructors.

Reeves said there would be no enrollment fee and added that either a letter or advance registration blank should be sent by the prospective student to the company in charge of the school he plans to attend. The registration should be made at least a week in advance of the school.

The specialist said that additional information is available from any of the sponsors and from local county agents who can also provide the registration blanks. Reeves said that out-of-state cotton ginner are welcome to attend the schools but should send in advance registration.

FERTILIZER USE . . .

Fertilizer use during the 1960-61 year by Texas farmers increased by 8 percent over the previous year with 766,055 tons reported sold, according to Extension Soil Chemist W. F. Bennett.

West Central Texas reported the biggest percentage increase of 32 percent. North Central Texas farmers used 22 percent more and West Texas farmers used 18 percent more. The Gulf Coast and South Texas had a slight decrease in fertilizer use. The increase in fertilizer use for the year came during the spring of 1961.

It is apparent that more and more farmers are using soil tests and research recommendation as a basis for buying and using fertilizer. Stop by our office for information on soil tests and leaflets in proper fertilizer use.

Culling unprofitable dairy cows is always good business. Now is an especially good time, point out extension dairy specialists, because the market for cull cows is favorable and the surplus milk production season is just ahead.

New research facilities to be used for developing better methods of boll weevil control were dedicated at Mississippi State University on March 22. The laboratory will be the center for a concerted effort against the cotton pest by U. S. Department of Agriculture and cooperating state experiment stations.
