Heavy Vote Leaves One Local Run-Off

Heavy voting in Democratic primary Saturday indicated much interest in several races. A total of 2294 was tallied. The first Republican primary to be held in Rotan, at the same time had a light vote of 7.

In local races principal interest was in the County Judge and District Clerk races. Ed Perkins was high man in the Judge race with 1366 to Dave Posey 957. Nealy Morton was reelected as District Clerk with 1202 to Mrs. Eva Nell Dennis 1097.

The Justice of Peace race proved of interest with George Moore leading with 351 to Lon R. Adams 332. J. C. Simpson received 286 votes. This develops the only run-off in local races for the June 2 primary.

Max Carriker led for Representative with 1547, Van Baucum 418 and Giles Bradford 282. Carriker had a majority over the entire district, reelecting him.

David Ratliff led in Fisher County as well as the district for Senator with 822; Latimer 683 and Perkins 592. Ratliff and Latimer go into runoff.

Oddis Brown was reelected County Chairman with 1140 to 726 for Juston Morrow. Jerry Crowley was reelected Commissioner Pre. 2 with 300 votes to Tom Henry Hogan 65.

Don Yarborough led in Fisher County in Governor race with 626 to John Cannally 492. Price Daniel 233, and Marshall Formby 420.

Preston Smith led in the county for Lt. Governor with 926, followed by Turman 663.

In Attorney General race Waggoner Carr led with 1015 to Tom Reavley 706.

Bean led Fisher County ticket for Congressman at Large with 679 to Joe Pool 220.

Fisher County voted against submission of constitutional amendment to abolish poll tax, 684-553. Also against the proposed wagering on horse races.

Violent Weather Brings 'Spotted' Rains

Considerable damage resulted from twisting winds from a thunderstorm early Sunday night in Rotan. TV antennas over town were badly damaged, one cotton storage warehouse suffered roof damage and the plate glass front of the Phillips building to the rear of Ragsdale Drug was broken. The glass was apparently shattered by parts of warehouses to the rear being blown about. Considerable marble size hail accompanied the storm and rainfall varied greatly in different sections of town. Fred Byerly gauged 1 inch while the east part of town reported 1.40, other parts had .70.

Monday night another rainstorm with heavy electrical display occurred. Byerly gauged .17 inch from this. Some wind damage was reported northeast of Rotan, but no one was injured in either storm.

Most of the hail Sunday night was in Rotan and just north, with some damage reported to young cotton.

The rains were both spotted over the territory, reaching south only to North Roby.

Byerly reported 1.97 inches for April, which with the 1.17 during the past week brings 1962 total to 4.36. Sections which received the last rains have ample season to get a crop growing and most of the county has enough to 'plant on.'

New Phone Directory Ready Next Week

The 1962 edition of the Roby-Rotan telephone directory will be mailed to customers May 14, Roy Eury, telephone manager said. The new directory has a white cover and contains 16 "white" or alphabetical pages with more than 2,800 listings. He added, there are also 20 classified or "yellow pages" in this year's directory.

Eury said approximately 2,800 copies have been printed, but many of them will not be mailed to customers. The phone company keeps additional copies on hand as replacements for directors in public telephone locations, for new customers moving to Roby or Rotan, and for new and additional installations in businesses. Eury said dozens of copies will be mailed out of town to people who write to the telephone company and request copies of the local directory.

Eury advised customers to destroy their old telephone directories when the new ones are received. He cautioned people to check the directories first to make sure they remove address and telephone number lists as well as other papers which they may want to keep.

"It's amazing," Eury said, "when you learn the number of people who use a telephone directory as a depository for personal things like pictures, special lists and sometimes important papers. That is why we always try to remind people to check their old directors carefully before they throw them away."

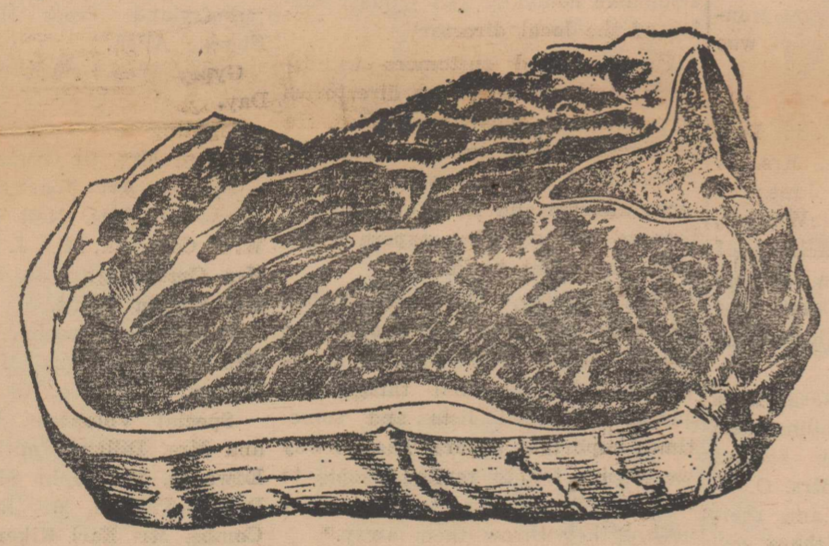

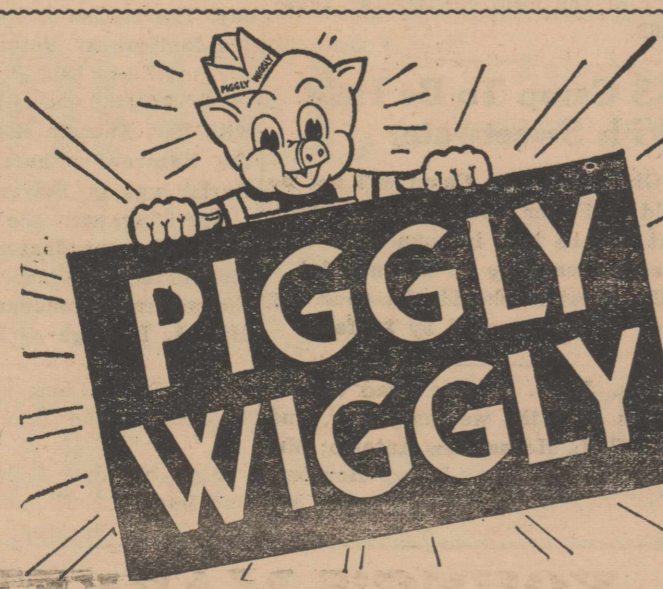

Want to increase the income from your cotton crop? On proven way to do this, says H. A. Turney, area extension entomologist, is to control insects. A properly performing spray rig is a must, and now is the time to get it in top working order.

Here are suggestions on getting the rig in order. Clean all nozzles by washing them in kerosene or soapy water. Check to see that all nozzles are the same kind and size. Replace all worn nozzles and hoses. Test the pump and pressure gauge. If they are not working properly, replace them. A breakdown during the growing season could mean dollars lost in time and cotton.

For the application of early season insecticides, Turney recommends the use of one cone-type nozzle per row. Nozzle spacing of 20 inches on the boom are adequate for late season control. Good foliage coverage can be obtained by placing the boom to 10 to 15 inches above the tops of the cotton plants.

The per acre output of a spray machine must be known before the correct insecticide mixture can be maintained or even mixed in the spray tank. The rig's output can be determined by spraying a measured acre. Available at the local Extension office is a chart which shows how far your spray machine must travel to cover an acre, and this will make the job of adjusting the machine for out of insecticide easier.

You are invited to stop by our office for other information on insect control and also ask for a copy or L-486, Insecticidal Spraying of Field Crops with Ground Machinery.

Visual inspection doesn't tell the story of what is inside a bale of hay. The true feeding value of hay is determined by several factors, points out Shannon Carpenter, area dairy specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and challenges hay buyers to become 3T purchasers.

Carpenter explains the 3T formula this way. The first T is for test. If a ton of hay testing 4 percent crude protein is purchased, 300 pounds of cottonseed meal will have to be fed with it to make it equal the protein in a ton of hay testing 10 percent protein. It's good business to ask the hay seller for an analysis on his product.

The second T is for time. Time the hay was cut. Time since fertilizer was last applied to the crop. Time since the last cutting, and of major importance, time of season in respect to the time the hay will be fed. Ask some questions, advises Carpenter, and if the right answer isn't forthcoming, do some more shopping.

The third T stands for ton, the usual weight basis on which hay is bought. One dollar for a 60 pound bale of hay equals \$33 a ton, but a dollar for a 40 pound bale equals \$50 per ton. The weight of the individual bale of hay thus is very important. Buy by weight instead of the bale.

The 3T hay buyer, concludes Carpenter, knows what he has bought, and how much.

Farmers operate the biggest single industry in the nation. Although there are less than 15 million people living on farms today -- about 8 percent of the total population -- when all the transporters, processors, wholesalers, retailers, etc. are added, the agricultural population climbs to almost 40 percent of the total. Just after World War II, the family grocery bill was about a fourth of the average take home pay. Today, it is less than a fifth, although retail food prices have gone up. Prices would be a lot higher if it weren't for the fact that farmers are getting 13 percent less than a decade ago for their part of the typical market basket of food. Most recent figures show the annual farm income at \$965 per person compared with \$2,216 for the rest of the U. S. population.

Local People Attend Family Gathering

A reunion was held April 28 in the Dallas Library's History Department, honoring Warren Angus Ferris, one of the early pioneers. W. A. Ferris, oldest son of Angus and Sarah (Gray) Ferris, was born Dec. 26, 1810 in Glen Falls, New York. Although Ferris readily admitted he had little formal education, he read widely and showed an amazing knowledge of Literature, Algebra, Geometry, and Trigonometry. Surveying was among his many self-taught occupations.

Before the age of 19, he joined the first expedition of the American Fur Company to the Rocky Mountains, an adventure which lasted six years. During the course of events, he drew the first complete map of the mountainous region; parts of the map are still being used today. He also kept a detailed diary of the journey, some entries humorous and some tragic. They frequently encountered hostile Indians and casualties were numerous.

He prepared his diary in manuscript form hoping to sell it to a publisher, but with no success. His brother, Charles Drake Ferris published the journal in serial form in the Western Literary Messenger of Buffalo in 1842-43. These portions have been known to students of Western Literature for many years, but it was not until 1940 that its historic value was recognized and the entire manuscript was published under the title "Life in the Rocky Mountains." This book is now considered a collector's item and impossible to obtain, although it may be re-printed at a later date.

Ferris arrived in Texas in Dec. 1836, and in letters he described it as a place of beauty and opportunity. In 1837 he became a government surveyor, and organized sev-

eral early expeditions to the headwaters of the Sabine River, the Neches and the Trinity. The streets of Dallas, except for the downtown district follow the lines of the original Ferris survey.

In 1839, Ferris served as a Captain in the Texas Army. In 1841, he joined Gen. James Smith in a scouting expedition against the Indians.

During his early travels, he explored the Yellowstone National Park, giving a detailed description of the "boiling water volcanos" therein. He is thought to be the first white man to see these geysers.

In 1841, Ferris married Melinda Cook. She died shortly after from a "fever". In 1847 he married Frances Moore; they had twelve children.

Ferris settled on White Rock Creek and cultivated a part of his extensive holdings. He contributed articles and verse to the Dallas Herald and other newspapers until his death Feb. 8, 1873. He is buried in the W. A. Ferris cemetery near White Rock Lake in Dallas.

Some 300 relatives attended the reunion in Dallas where they saw the original maps, letters and documents, borrowed from a museum in New York. The family tree was traced back some 400 years and included Lady Jane Grey, "9 day Queen of England", and John and Priscilla Alden. The exhibit will remain in the library through May 11.

Warren A. Ferris was the grandfather of C. D. Ferris of Rotan. Among those attending were C. D. Ferris, Robert Ferris, Jimmy Ferris, Jeanne Ferris and Johnny Ferris, Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Berry, all of Rotan; Mr. and Mrs. Don Ferris of Lubbock, Mr. and Mrs. Boyd Ferris and Mrs. E. W. McDonald and children of Fort Worth.

Why Have School Nurses and Counselors

The following information is given by County Superintendent C. J. Dalton:

The school's Counselor's responsibilities are based upon an overall program of finding answers to the following questions: (1) What are the guidance needs of the pupils? (2) To what extent are their needs being met under present conditions? (3) How can the school better these needs?

In promoting the over-all adjustment and growth of the individual pupil, and in helping him to develop into full maturity, the Counselor's field of opportunities and responsibilities is very wide. Some of the Counselor's duties are supplying pupils with information concerning their educational future informing students of scholarships offered by various colleges and universities; providing occupational information; obtaining information concerning each pupil's abilities, interests and achievements; discussions with principals and teachers concerning pupil abilities and attitudes; counseling with students on personal matters; giving pupils various types of tests and recording these test results in the pupil's permanent records and in the counselor's records along with all correspondence with and about individual pupils.

Dr. Connant, President of Harvard, says that the schools of the United States very much need 20,000 more counselors than they now use.

The following test batteries are given in one or more schools in Fisher County: Otis Mental Ability, Differential Aptitude Test, Iowa Test of Educational Ability, Gray-Votaw-Rodgers Achievement Series, Science Research Associates Achievement Series, Kuder Preference Inventory, SRA Ability Test, Wecher Intelligence Scale for Children, Children's Appreciation

Test.

Test Profiles on all except the Otis are made available to Students and parents.

Approximately 3400 students have taken one or more of these tests in Fisher County since the Counseling Program originated in the fall of 1959. With the exception of 235, which had to be scored by special IBM machines, all of these tests have been hand-scored and profiled by the Counselor, with occasional student help. (At one school the county teachers score their own achievement tests.)

In addition, the Counselor works with the college-bound seniors in the county toward making arrangements for taking the American College Test or the College Entrance Examination, which are the two tests now required for college entrance throughout the United States.

An individual inventory is kept by the Counselor or each scholastic in the county. This information includes a personal data sheet, an identifying photograph, a record and profile of all standardized tests which the student has taken, any correspondence or other written information pertinent to a particular pupil, and summaries of interviews between a student and the Counselor.

All requirements for guidance programs and the Counselors who direct them are established by the Texas Education Agency. The TEA Consultant for this area is Mr. Vernon Odom of Lubbock.

To become a certified school Counselor one must hold the Masters Degree and must have five years' classroom teaching experience previous to becoming a Counselor.

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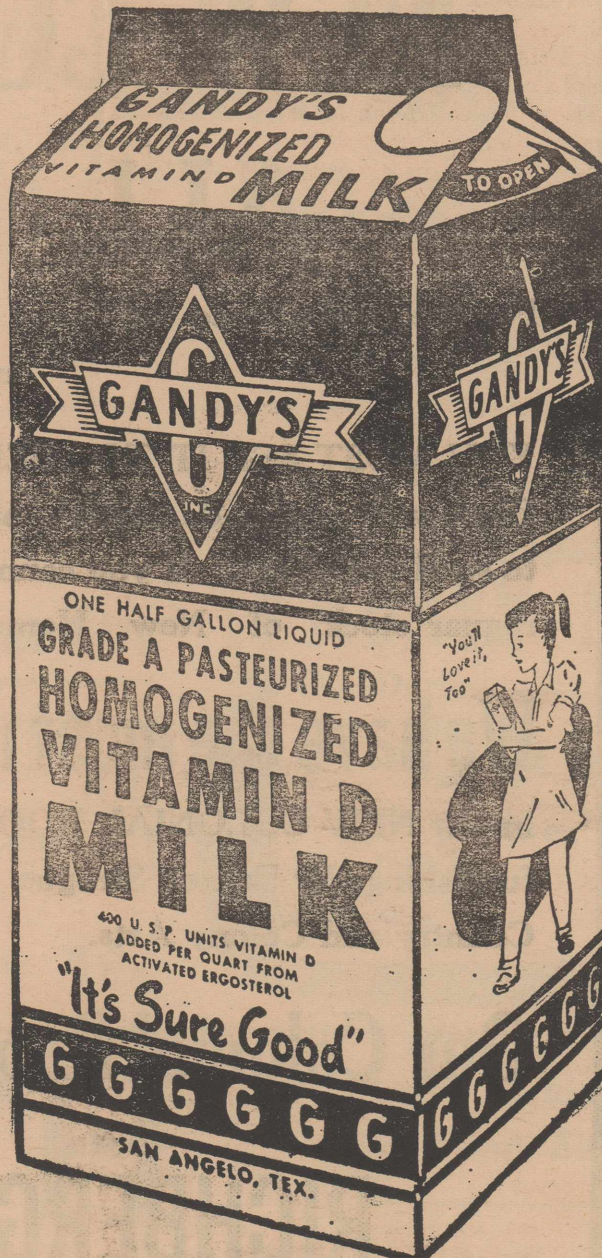
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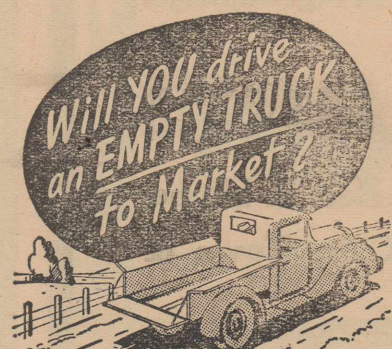
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
