JOHN CONNALLY

BACKGROUND: Native Texan. Born on farm in Wilson County, near Floresville. One of 7 children of J. B. and Lela Connally. Family Bible shows birth date as Feb. 27, 1917. Connally family in Texas dates back more than 5 generations. Connally family still lives in region settled by forebearers in 1849.

FAMILY: In 1940 married Idanell Brill, daughter of Austin leather dealer. The Connally's have three children -- John III, 15 - Sharon, 12 - and Mark, 9. All three attend Fort Worth Schools.

EDUCATION: Attended public school in San Antonio and Floresville, graduating in 1933 as salutatorian. To help pay his way through the University of Texas Connally worked part time as a candy and chewing salesman and on a highway construction crew as a batch weigher.

Was elected president of the University Student Body in 1938. Received his law degree the same year. Was also president of his law class, assemblyman from the School of Law, chairman of the Student's Assembly in 1938-39, and chairman of the Student Publication Board. Connally was dean of his legal fraternity, was elected to Fraiers in his Junior year, and appeared in Who's Who in American Colleges.

MILITARY SERVICE: Volunteered for active duty in the Navy months before Pearl Harbor. Served in Atlantic and Pacific combat theatres. Was awarded numerous combat decorations including the Legion of Merit, and the Bronze Star for heroic performance under pressure of battle. Rose through ranks to Lt. Commander by time of his discharge at war's end.

GOVERNMENTAL AND PUBLIC SERVICE: Served as Secretary of the Navy in the Kennedy administration for which he received public and official acclaim for outstanding leadership.

Following graduation from Law School, Connally became Congressional Secretary to then Congressman Lyndon Johnson. Also served as administrative assistant to Senator Johnson for 8 months in 1949.

1962 governor's race is his initial effort to seek public office. Led the first Democratic primary, May 5, by 110,000 votes.

BUSINESS BACKGROUND: From 1949-52 he was a partner in the law firm of Powell, Wirtz and Rauhaut in Austin. From 1952 until appointed Navy Secretary by President Kennedy, Connally became an attorney for Richardson and Bass, independent oil operators in Fort Worth. An executor of the Richardson estate. Has participated in management of companies and corporations engaged in salt water control, carbon and carbon black, radio and TV, insurance and investments, and oil and gas. As Navy Secretary was responsible for an annual budget on 15.5 Billion dollars. His personal and business life was checked and cleared by the FBI, Naval intelligence, Central Intelligence Agency, and the Senate Armed Services Committee. Appointment was unanimously confirmed.

PROFESSIONAL AND CIVIC BACKGROUND: Director of the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show; honorary Chairman of Gonales Warm Springs Foundation; Director, Boys, Inc., a charitable organization devoted to elimination of Juvenile delinquency; member of executive committee and councilman at large of the Ex-Students Association of the University of Texas.

Member and director of the Southwestern Legal Foundation, State Bar of Texas, FortWorth Bar Association, Tarrant County Bar Association, American Bar Association, American Judicature Society.

Member Wilson County Farm Bureau, South Texas Hereford Breeder's Association, Texas Hereford Breeders Association, Santa Gertrudis Breeder International and Galiceno Hore Breeders Association of America.

Served as attorney for Organization of Texas Electric Co-ops. Led fight for beneficial legislation to enable the organization and operation of Rural Telephone Co-ops.

Served as Director of the Lower Colorado River Authority, participating actively in extensive flood control and water conservation projects on the Colorado River.

Member Methodist Church.

DON YARBOROUGH

BACKGROUND: Born in Louisiana on December 15, 1925. Moved to Texas in 1937.

FAMILY: Shortly before 1960 Texas Lt. Governor's race married Kay Edwards of Houston, a newspaperwoman. They have one child - a daughter, Inez, 14 months old.

EDUCATION: Attended school in Louisiana, until 1937, Finished high school in Texas. Before entering University of Texas Law School, returned to Lafayette, Louisiana, to attend Southwest Louisiana Institute. In 1948 was a National Inter-collegiate Debate Champion. Was assemblyman from the School of Law.

MILITARY SERVICE: Marine Corps Veteran of World II and the Korean Conflict. Enlisted in Marines at 17, following high school graduation. Became company commander at age 20.

GOVERNMENTAL AND PUBLIC SERVICE: Unsuccessfully sought, Lt. Governorship of Texas in 1960. -- was beaten by Ben Ramsey, the incumbent. One week and a half before deadline announced his intention to seek Democratic nomination for governor.

BUSINESS BACKGROUND: Partner in Houston law firm of Yarborough, Brigman. In 1955 was elected president of the Houston Jr. Chamber of Commerce.

PROFESSIONAL AND CIVIC BACKGROUND: Member Board of Directors of Hedgecroft Hospital Auxiliary, Board of Directors of Holly Hall Home for the Aged, Board of Directors of Big Brothers, Chairman of Economics Committee of the Houston Bar Association, State Bar of Texas, and United Fund Co-Division chairman. Member Episcopal Church.

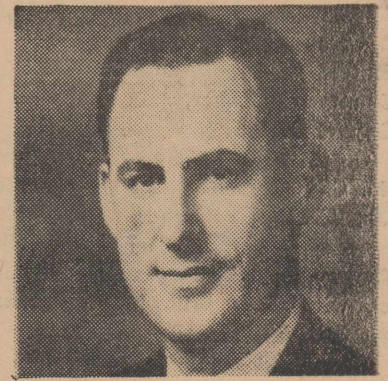

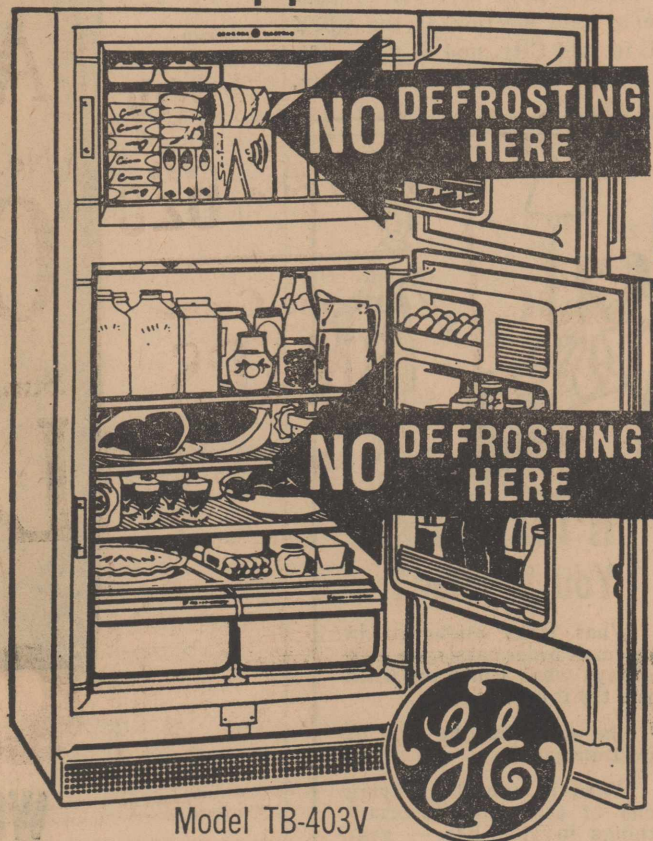

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in the City of Rotan, Texas, on June 12, 1962, at the CITY HALL in said City, in obedience to, and on the proposition set forth in an Ordinance duly passed and adopted by the City Council of said City of May 22, 1962, which is as follows:

On this, the 22 day of May, 1962, the City Council of the City of Rotan, Texas, convened in regular session at a special meeting in the City Hall of the City of Rotan, Texas, with the following members present, namely:

Juston M. Morrow, Mayor.
C. J. Thornton, Alderman.
Charles Atwell, Alderman.
Willie Fleming, Alderman.
Rudolph Lotief, Alderman.
Mrs. N. O. Johnson, Alderman
and Thaddie Wilson City Secretary at which time the following proceedings, among others, were had to-wit:

Mayor Juston M. Morrow introduced a proposed ordinance calling an election, hereinafter set forth. The ordinance was read in full and a full discussion and consideration thereof then ensued.

Alderman Lotief moved that said ordinance be passed and adopted. The motion was seconded by Alderman Fleming. The motion carried by the following vote:

Ayes: Mayor Juston M. Morrow and Aldermen C. J. Thornton, Charles Atwell, Willie Fleming, Rudolph Lotief and Mrs. N. O. Johnson.
Nocs: None.

Thereupon, the Mayor announced the ordinance finally passed and adopted, and said ordinance as passed and adopted by the City Council and approved by the Mayor of the City of Rotan, Texas, is as follows:

AN ORDINANCE

Calling an election in the City of Rotan, Texas, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified resident property taxpaying voters of said City who own taxable property in said City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, a proposition concerning and relating to the issuance of \$90,000.00 street improvement bonds; providing for notice of said election; and enacting provisions incident and relating to the subject and purpose of this ordinance.

Whereas, the City Council of the City of Rotan, Texas, deems it expedient to issue coupon bonds of said City in the principal amount of \$90,000.00 for the purpose of the construction and improvement of the streets of said City; and accordingly desires to submit to the qualified voters of the City, for their action thereupon, the proposition hereinafter set forth for the grant of such authority as therein contained; Now, Therefore,

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Rotan, Texas:

I
That an election be held in the City of Rotan on June 12, 1962, which is not less than fifteen (15) or more than thirty (30) days from the date of this ordinance, at which election there shall be submitted to the qualified resident property taxpaying voters of the City of Rotan, Texas, who own taxable property in said City, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon, the following proposition:

PROPOSITION

"Shall the City Council of the City of Rotan, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of the City of Rotan, Texas, in the principal amount of NINETY THOUSAND (\$90,000.00) DOLLARS, maturing serially in such installments as may be determined by the City Council of said City, the maximum maturity being not more than twenty (20) years from their date, bearing interest at a rate of not to exceed four and one-half (4 1/2 percent) per cent per annum, interest payable annually or semi-annually as may be determined by the City Council of said City, for the purpose of the construction and improvement of the streets of said City; and to levy an

annual ad valorem tax on all taxable property in said City sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and to create a sinking fund to pay the principal thereof as the same matures, as authorized by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, including Chapters 1 and 7, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended?"

II

That the polling place for the holding of said election shall be at the CITY HALL in the City of Rotan, Texas, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of said election:

Kaufman Florida, Presiding Judge.

Ed Patton, Assistant Judge.
Mrs. Carlton Burrow, Clerk.
Mrs. Jim McCright, Clerk.

and the boundaries of said City are hereby declared an election precinct for the purpose of holding said election.

III

That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the general laws of the State of Texas; and only those qualified resident property taxpaying voters of the City of Rotan, Texas, who own taxable property in said City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be allowed to vote at said election.

IV

That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number in conformity with Chapter 6, V. A. T. C. S., Election Code, as amended, and there shall be printed on such ballots the following:

V

That, concerning said proposition, each voter shall mark out either with pen or pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition.

VI

That a copy of this ordinance signed by the Mayor and attested by the City Secretary shall serve as proper notice of said election. Notice of said election shall be given in accordance with Article 704, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended.

VII

That the City Secretary is hereby authorized and directed to post notice of said election at the CITY HALL in said City, and at three (3) other public places within said City,

all of which notices shall be posted not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the date set for said election.

VIII

That the City Secretary is further authorized and directed to cause said Notice of Election to be published in THE ROTAN ADVANCE, a newspaper published in and of general circulation in the City of Rotan, Texas, which notice shall be published on the same day in each of two (2) successive weeks in said newspaper, the date of the first publication being not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the date set for said election. Except as otherwise provided herein and in said Article 704, as amended, the manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws governing general elections.

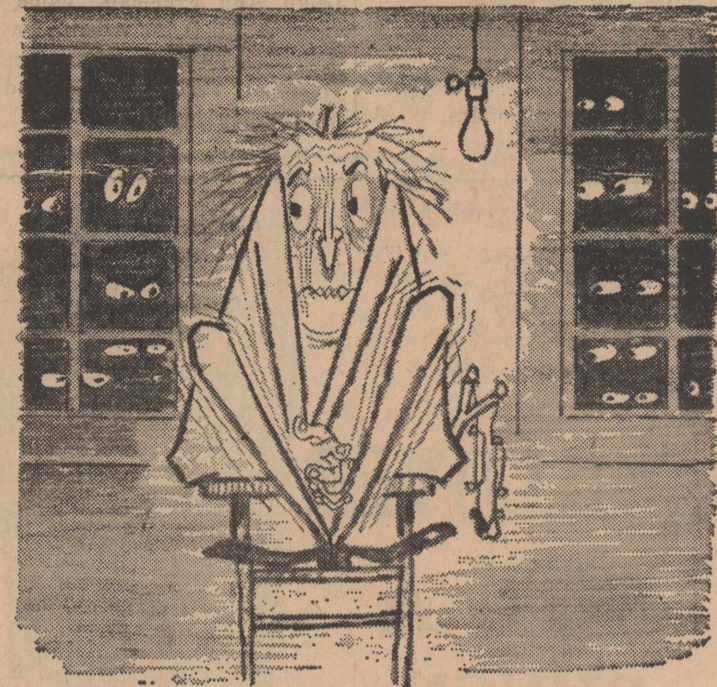

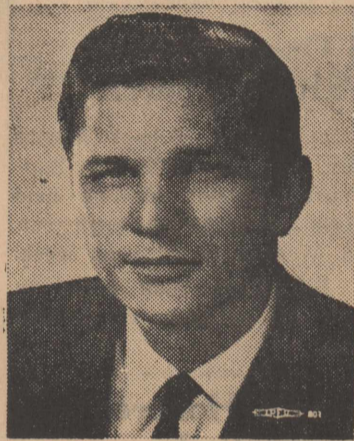
