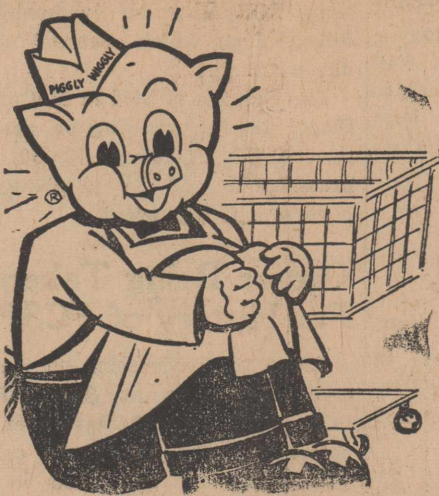

County Agricultural Agent Texas A. & M. College Extension Service

One of the main conversations since last Thursday has been about the hail and how much damage it caused. Roby and the immediate area seemed to be hit worse than any other part of the county.

Looks like most of the cotton will have to be re-planted from Roby West about ten miles and East about eight miles. The width of this 18 miles strip varies from a few miles to around ten miles.

Several home owners have been asking about the treatment of the hail wounds on their shade trees and shrubs. Damaged bark around the wounds should be removed so they will dry out and then the damaged area may be painted with shellac. When the shellac has dried, a wound dressing or tree paint may be applied over the exposed area.

There are various types of wound dressings. Those most commonly used are orange shellac, asphaltum paints, outdoor house paint, grafting wax and alcohol, and the commercial tree paints.

Formal dedication of the new sterile fly production plant at Mission, headquarters of the Southwestern Screwworm Eradication Program, are scheduled for Saturday, June 16.

The new plant, located at Moore Air Force Base, is designed to provide 50 to 75 million sterile flies per week. With production beginning in mid-June, the first flies from the new plant will be released in early July.

"We are very pleased with construction progress at the Mission plant," Marvin J. Bridges, executive director, Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, said. "We will have fly production underway ahead of the date we originally hoped construction would be complete."

"Early completion of the plant will be a tremendous boost to the program since we will have the sterile flies required to cover the wide area necessary for eradication in the Southwest."

"Completing a 'crash' construction program of this type would not have been possible except through the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, using funds contributed by individual livestock producers and sportsmen from all over the Southwest."

Release of flies produced at the temporary plant at Kerrville has been increased to over 20 million per week. This, along with last winter's cold weather, has significantly retarded normal build-up of native screwworm populations. The increased production at the Mission plant will provide sufficient flies to give added impetus to the aridic-

ation program. The program is a joint effort of the Texas Animal Health Commission, the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, and the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Following is some information that might be of interest to those of you who have planted some Coastal Bermuda. Rotary hoes do an excellent job of controlling seedling grass and weeds in new Coastal plantings. Too, they break up soil surface crust. Killing the weeds and weedy grasses in this stage prevents them using needed moisture. A cultivator or mower will control larger weeds, and 2, 4-D might be used on broad-leaved weed if applied at the proper growth stage.

Grazing Coastal before a complete cover or stand is obtained often means the grass will take two seasons instead of one to give a stand. This is costly, and it multiplies the weed problem.

Several people have reported large numbers of moths around their homes the last few days. These moths have been identified as the adult of the variegated cutworm. This particular species causes ser-

ious damage to sorghum, corn and cotton in the larval stage. Control of the moth around the home is difficult, but satisfactory results can be obtained by using household aerosols around screens and windows. This species has 2 to 4 generations per year, overwinters as a larva or pupa and requires about 18 to 21 days for the larval development.

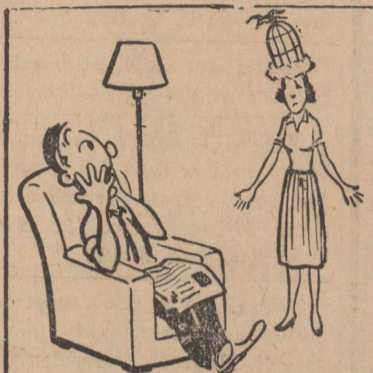

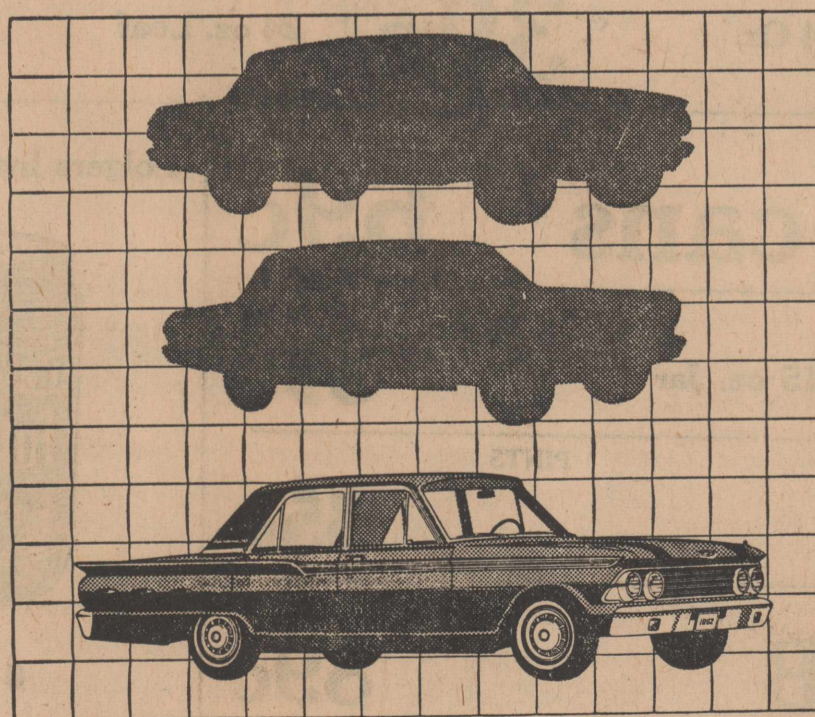

Are you selling your house?

A house, like any other merchandise, must look attractive to sell, Wanda Barkley, Extension service specialist in home management, emphasizes.

No other merchandise is subjected to such critical inspection and fault-seeking as a house, the specialist reminds. If the property is not attractive, it may draw bargain hunters who will buy only if they can get a lot more than their money's worth.

Here are four types of improvements that home owners can do:

Repair--see that every part of the structure is sound and that all mechanical equipment works. Even a sticking drawer shows poor upkeep and suggests hidden faults.

Modernize-up-to-date kitchens and bathrooms count most. Experts say you get back money spent improving these rooms. A person who buys an obsolete house expects to fix it up himself and will knock more than enough off his offer to cover his anticipated expense.

Decorate--brighten with new paint and paper, even if the buyer redees everything the day he moves in. Also seed the flower beds, prune the shrubs and patch the lawn, especially in front.

Clean-get rid of trash and clutter, straighten up the closets so they look spacious. When prospects are coming, see that every room is picked up and turn on some light to give the place a homey, comfortable look.

HERE'S WHY WIENER PRICES VARY

Have you noticed the variation in prices of a pound of wieners or hot dogs?

Here's some information for good shoppers on the subject by Mrs. Gwendolyn Glyatt, Extension Service Food marketing specialist at Houston.

The list of ingredients on the label of wieners will tell you why some are higher-priced than others. Ingredients on the label are listed in order and according to the amounts included--such as ground beef, pork, cereal, dry non-fat milk and soy flour.

These ingredients--other than meat--absorb and hold water, thereby increasing the weight, Mrs. Glyatt points out.

"They're also lower priced than meat, so the cheaper packages of wieners will have larger amounts in relation to the meat content. The federal meat inspection mark is the shoppers' guarantee that the product is wholesale, suitable for human consumption, and is honestly labeled," she said.

The mark is a round purple stamp with the words "U. S. Inspected and Passed" printed within the circle. The stamp also has a code number that identifies the packing house that processed the product.

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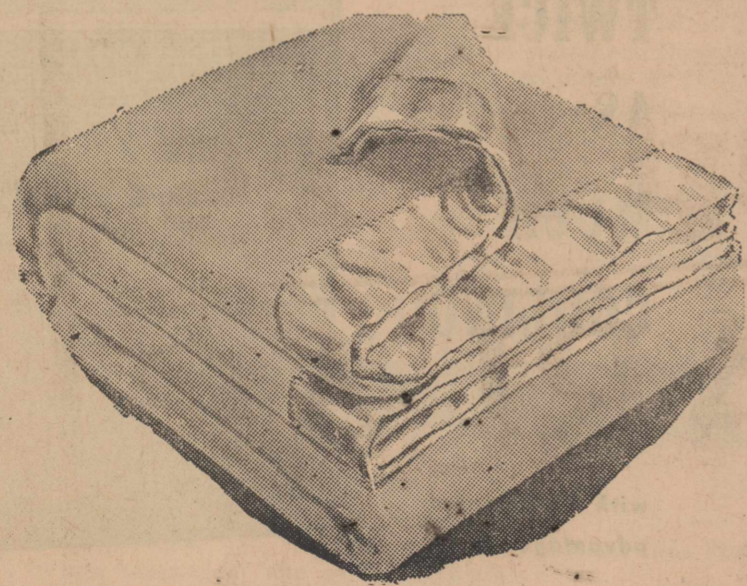

Local Delta Gamma Sponsors Magazines of Friendship

Gamma Tau Chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma, under the direction of its president, Empress Day, joined with the Southwestern Region in sponsoring this program. Each state in the region drew a different country to send reading matter. Texas drew the Philippines; and Gamma Tau in turn drew the Quezon Provincial Library, Lucena City.

To date Gamma Taos have sent more than 400 magazines to this library and to individual Filipinos who have asked to be included in the program.

Gamma Tau feels this is a most satisfying and worthwhile project. It provides a way for each member as an individual American citizen to do something about furthering friendship with people in other countries and thus help present the America we know to people who often get only a distorted picture of our country and its people.

The chapter chairman has received several letters from recipients of magazines sent. The librarian of the Quezon library wrote, and we quote, "... we are very grateful to you for giving us these much needed reading materials. . . Thank you again for your unconditional help."

And answer to our inquiry as to their need for books: "Our readers are voracious readers and they read more fictions than non-fictions as our records show. If Delta Kappa Gamma through you will welcome our needs for books, especially if they are from book club selections, we will appreciate very much the members' willingness to share their books with us. . . I am looking forward to how we can reciprocate the kindness of the American People."

And speaking of reciprocation, individual donors have received letters from individual Filipinos who have read our magazines in the library. Quoting Raymond C. Lagdameo of the Office of Engineers, Lucena City: "I have just finished reading one of your Friendship Magazines (The Saturday Evening Post) from a public library here and was surprised that they were being sent free by you. Since American magazines are being sold here beyond the reach of most readers including me (due to Import Control Law), I will appreciate so much if you will add me to your mailing list. Thank you and best regards to the officers and members of Delta Kappa and you."

He was added to our list and after receiving his first shipment of magazines he wrote: "... you are indeed so kind to share me copies of these interesting magazines (Post, Time, Look, The Cattleman,

Progressive Farmer) . . . these periodicals have been read by at least a dozen of my friends. Some were being borrowed for weeks; my heart felt gratitude for you and your friends who have given me this opportunity to understand more about the United States through "Magazines for Friendship". And under separate cover we receive Philippines Free Press, a weekly magazine printed in the Philippines and in the English language. And it continues to come. We are learning something of their viewpoint too.

Although she would be proud to claim the credit, Delta Kappa Gamma did not originate the program "Magazines for Friendship". The Southwest Region decided at Phoenix last summer to assist with the work. A California professor, Mr. Croissant, organized and started the program as a non-profit organization to further giving people in other lands a true picture of America and Americans.

Magazines for Friendship is a people to people program. Good magazines are mightier than dollars, and a well fed mind is infinitely more satisfying than a well fed body. Those individuals, who have a gnawing need to do something about the erroneous picture many people of other countries have of us, can so easily share our wealth of reading matter fostering goodwill and friendship rather than hatred because of our compacency.

The old adage, "Not what you give but what you share" fits here. Sending a used magazine (one well read) may be almost as expensive as sending a subscription to someone, but there is something about the sharing that has strength and goodwill.

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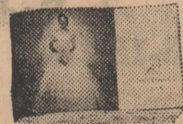
