New Lions Club Officers Installed

New officers were installed for Lions Club at Tuesday's luncheon. Dr. C. M. Callan will head the organization as president for the year. Complete list of officers will be published next week.

Among guests at the meeting were Mr. and Mrs. Ira Wood, operators of the Rotana Inn, and Dr. C. U. Callan gave a short talk on lodging accommodations in Rotan since the founding of the town and commended the builders on their faith in Rotan with the present venture.

A representative of the Urban Renewal department explained possibilities of a number of plans that seemed feasible for Rotan to explore in developing the town. This phase is being investigated by the City Council and more information will be published.

Sound Range Management Urged

Successful ranchers have found by experience that the solution to grazing problems depend upon adherence to sound range management.

R. W. (Dinker) Webb, Range Conservation technician who assists the Upper Clear Fork Soil Conservation District lists these four basic principles as being the foundation of a good range management program:

1. Prompt adjustment of livestock numbers to available forage.
2. Adjustment of livestock numbers by seasons as to the grazing use of each grazing unit or pasture, to meet requirements and growth habits of the more important forage species.
3. Proper location of fences, stock-water facilities and salt to insure even grazing of each pasture.
4. Stocking the pasture or pastures with the type of livestock that will graze most economically the specie of forage found on the ranch.

According to Webb, sound range management methods are determined by several steps which include: recording on a map various range sites, range condition classes, kinds and amounts of various forage species. When this job is completed an analysis of the findings will aid in determining the changes needed and the range management practices that should be used to improve poor quality grazing land. In selecting the necessary practices to improve sub-marginal rangeland, each practice should be selected as to its soundness from the standpoint of conservation and range management. These practices should be planned so that they will be applied in an orderly sequence and in order of their importance.

The final step is to provide, in the plan of operation, for yearly or seasonal observations of key forage species and the practices applied as a basis for determining adjustments needed to meet current conditions.

Milburn Cook, Work Unit Conservationist of the local Rotan Soil Conservation Service Office extends to livestock men, an invitation to let he, Webb or other qualified personnel of the SCS, go over their grazing lands with them and assist them in evaluation of their range problems.

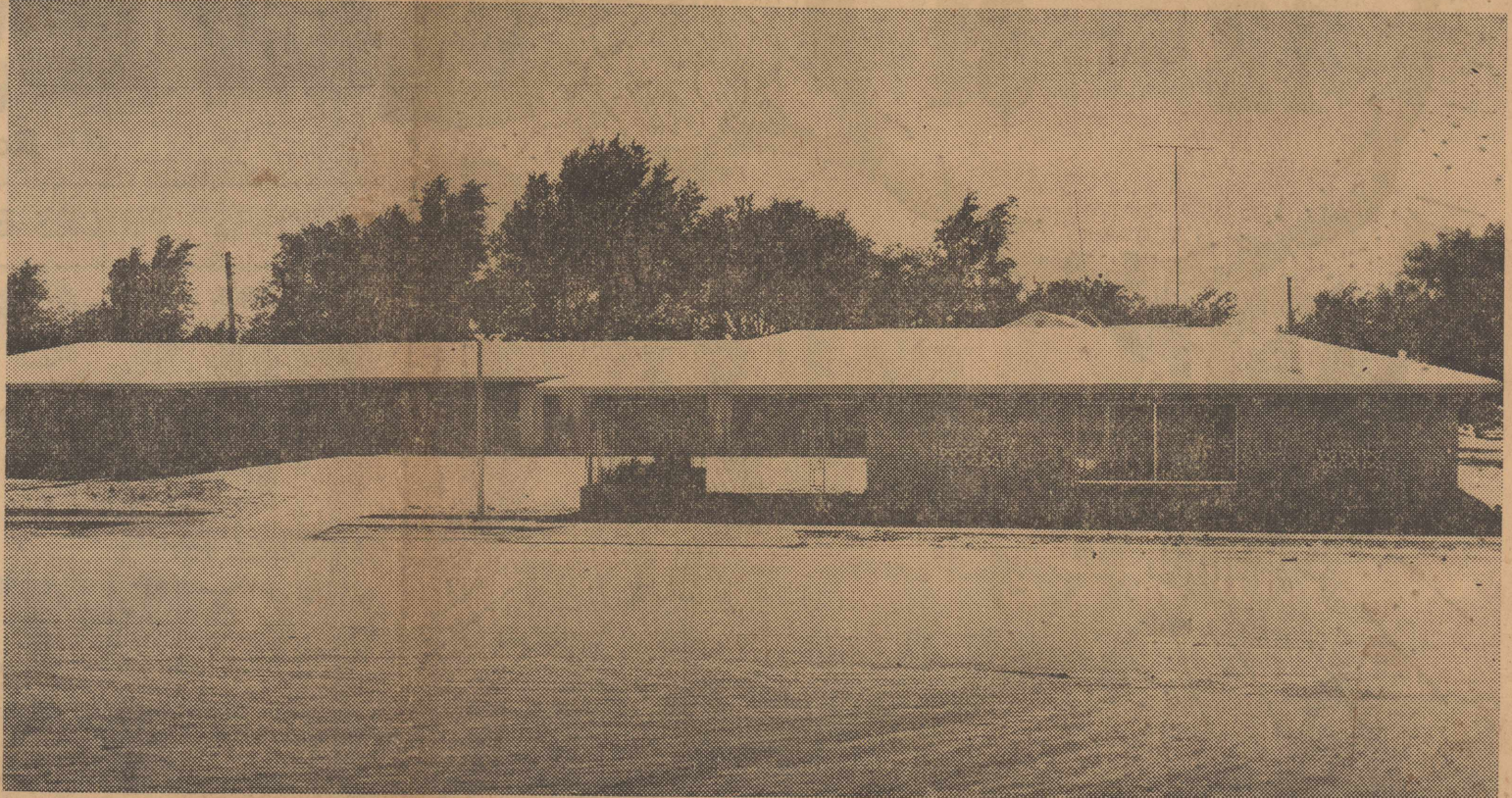

Cattle grubs annually cost U. S. livestock producers between 100 and 300 million dollars, says R. L. Ridway, associate extension entomologist, Texas A&M College.

Losses to meat packers result from the carcass devaluation and trimming and hide damage. Losses on the farm and ranch result from skin irritation, nervousness of the animals, below normal weight gains and lowered milk production.

Cattle grubs may be controlled by conventional spray application or pour-on or backline treatment. All grub insecticides should be used between the time heel fly activities cease in the spring and before the grubs appear in the backs of the animals, he adds. In most areas in Texas, the systemics may be used between May 1 and August 1.

Co-ral and Ruelene may be used as sprays or as pour-on insecticides and Co-ral may also be used as a dip. Ronnel (Trolene) is a systemic and may be fed to the animals in the normal feeding operation either in the feed or in mineral. It is pointed out that these materials should be use only on beef animals or dry dairy cows.

For detailed information on the mixing and application rates of these insecticides, study the label instructions. Ridgway recommends that precautions concerning their use on young and sick animals be particularly observed.

Well organized area-wide cattle grub control programs give the best results, the entomologist says. By regular and effective treatment of all cattle in an area or county, the amount of reinfestation and spring and summer annoyance from heel flies will be reduced.

Grasshoppers are increasing in numbers in some sections of Texas and may pose a threat to crops and pasture forage unless controlled while still young, advises Extension Entomologists.

They list several chemical control measures and their limitations for use on pasture or ranges being used for grazing beef animals but point out that only sevin and malathion should be used on areas grazed by dairy animals.

Dieldrin is recommended for use along ditches, roadsides, on wastelands and non-crop areas including soil bank land.

Dairy cattle or animals to be slaughtered should be grazed on on areas where aldrin is applied. Neither should this material be applied to forage to be sold for commercial use, points out the entomologists.

On areas treated with heptachlor, dairy animals should not be grazed and slaughter animals should be kept off the areas for at least 90 days prior to slaughter.

Only one application of toxaphene at the recommended rate should be made during the season. Dairy animals should not graze the treated area. Meat animals should not be permitted to graze treated fields or pastures within six weeks of slaughter and the entomologists say not to use the material on forage to be sold commercially. Also to avoid direct application of toxaphene to streams and ponds.

The only restriction or limitation on malathion treated areas is that grazing or harvesting of forage should not take place sooner than five days after treatment.

There are no restrictions for livestock including dairy cattle when sevin is used. However, the entomologists point out that this material is highly toxic to bees and beekeepers in the area of use should be notified so necessary precautions can be taken.

Because of the importance of using the right amounts of these materials, the entomologists recommend that label directions be followed to the letter. Additional information on grasshopper control will be supplied through the county agents office.

School Library Being Greatly Improved

An extensive library-improvement program is underway at Rotan High School. The project is the result of recommendations made by the Accreditation Team which visited our school more than two years ago. At that time the study hall was converted to a reading room and all books and magazines were placed on open shelves so that they were more accessible to students and teachers. Before any books to the library, the administrators requested that the Library Consultant for the State Education Agency inventory our library and make recommendations as to the number of books needed to meet the standard requirements for a school with our enrollment.

On December 3, 1961, Miss Lois Garver, Head Library Consultant, checked our library and presented a list of reference books which were needed immediately, and which have been purchased. She pointed out, however, that our greatest need was a simple but accurate card catalog, which could be made only after school was out, when all the books were in. Because Miss Garver feels that the problems in our school are common to almost all schools that do not have full-time trained librarians, she offered to help plan the reorganization of our library and come back to help get the project started. She asked permission to use our library as a laboratory for working out procedures to be recommended in a library manual, with accompanying sound film which she is preparing for distribution to schools throughout the state.

On June 12, Mrs. Garver returned with plans for reorganizing and operating our library and suggestions for adding books as money is available. She recommended the number of books that should be added in each subject area with specific titles to be chosen by the teachers from an approved list. The Consultant asked that our librarian assist her in preparing the librarian's handbook by reporting to her special problems that arise, any additional information needed, and instructions that need clar-

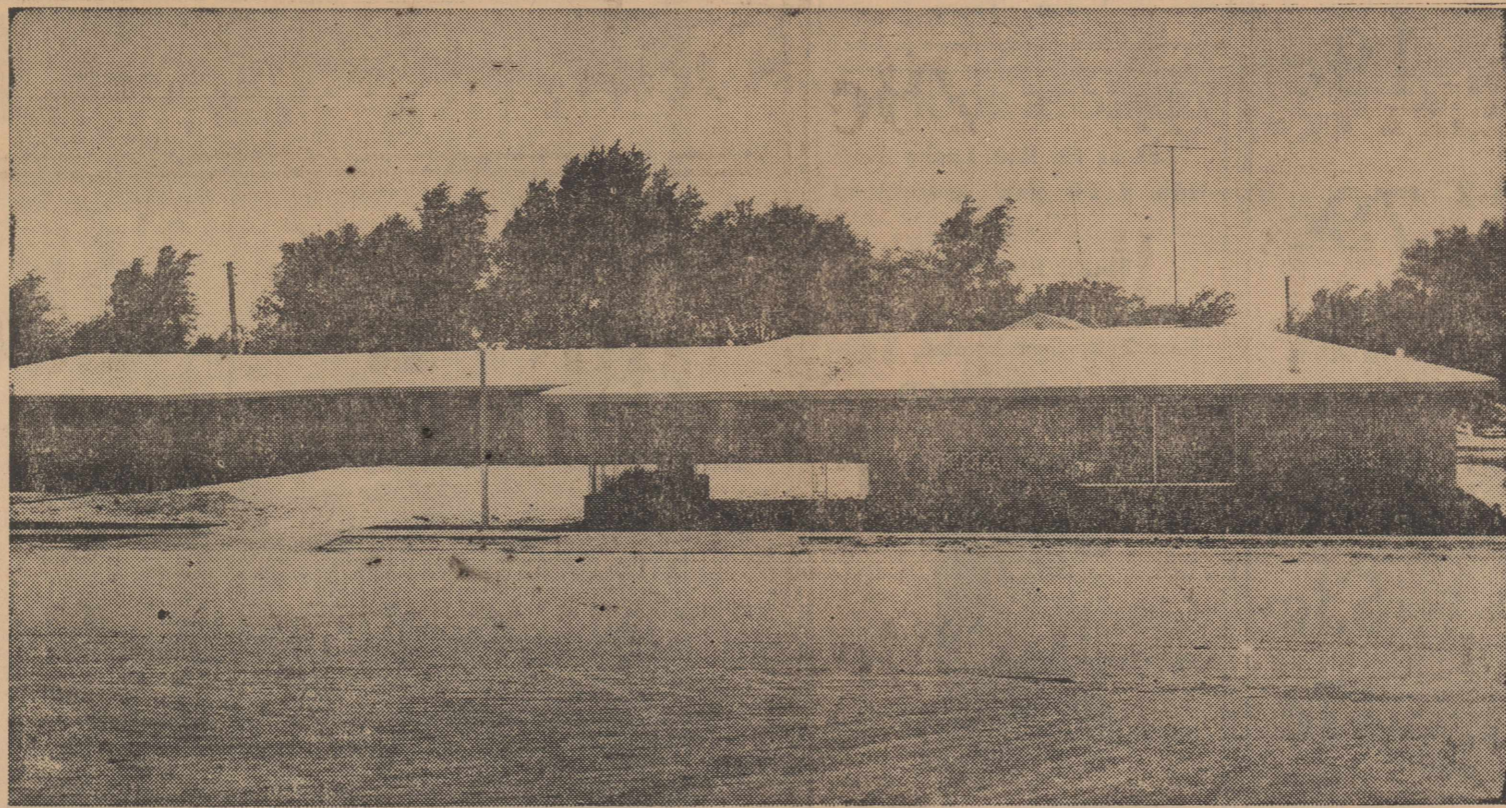

New Peace Corps Project In Brazil

The Peace Corps has accepted an invitation from the Government of Brazil to send 163 Volunteers to assist Sao Francisco Valley Commission in integrated development of the 2,000 mile-long river valley. This program will affect directly 5 1-2 million people who now live in the valley area.

Volunteers will be assigned to agricultural extension work, rural community development, rural electrification, irrigation, health education, sanitation and social work. The project requires 89 agricultural specialists and workers with training and/or experience in various agricultural, forestry and home economics skills, 13 electrical engineers and/or electricians, 1 dentist, 6 nurses, 8 medical technicians, 10 health and social workers, 15 mechanics, 2 marine diesel repairmen, 4 radio technicians, 4 cottage industry instructors, 3 geologists, 3 well diggers, 2 fishing technicians, one carpenter, one cotton textile worker, and one audio-visual specialist.

Training of Volunteers selected

for this project will begin about July 30, 1962, and will include on-the-job skills, as well as language and culture of Brazil. Prior knowledge of Portuguese will be helpful, but it is not a requirement for selection.

Volunteers must be American citizens at least 18 years of age. There is no upper age limit. The basic educational requirement is a high school education. Greater formal training or experience is required for some positions. Married couples are eligible if both husband and wife qualify and they have no dependents under 18.

Volunteers receive a living allowance for food, clothing, housing, medical care, transportation and incidentals plus a termination payment of \$1800, based on \$75 for each month of service.

Peace Corps applications may be obtained from local post offices, county agents, Peace Corps Liaison officers at colleges and universities, or from the Peace Corps, Washington 25, D. C. They should be completed as soon as possible and returned to the Peace Corps, Washington 25, D. C.

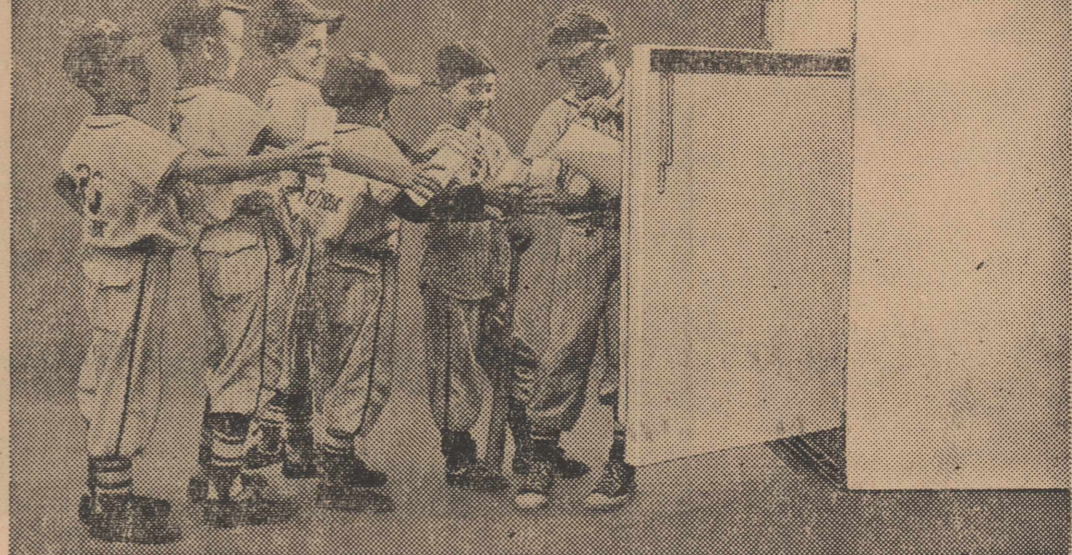

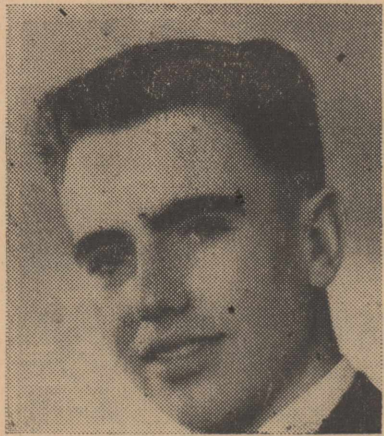

Storm and More Storms

Well it finally looks as if our rash of storms has subsided, at least for now. I know most of the people in Rotan would get the jitters each time a cloud would appear and rightly so, because invariably someone's home would be damaged, electricity and telephone service would be off etc. At one time during these storms we had approximately 250 Rotan telephones out of service, due to damage of our facilities by lightening, high winds, flying debris and torrential rains.

The majority of telephone facilities in Rotan were under what we term "cable pressure". The purpose of high pressure is to keep moisture out of our telephone facilities that span our fair city. But, when these cables are damaged, such as in these last series of storms, it allows this pressure to escape in such great amounts that our machine cannot replenish the lost amount, fast enough and resulting in "cross-talk" or no service at all.

Damage to telephone facilities in Rotan were to such an extent that telephone men from Abilene and Sweetwater were called in so as to get your telephone service in good working order as quick as possible.

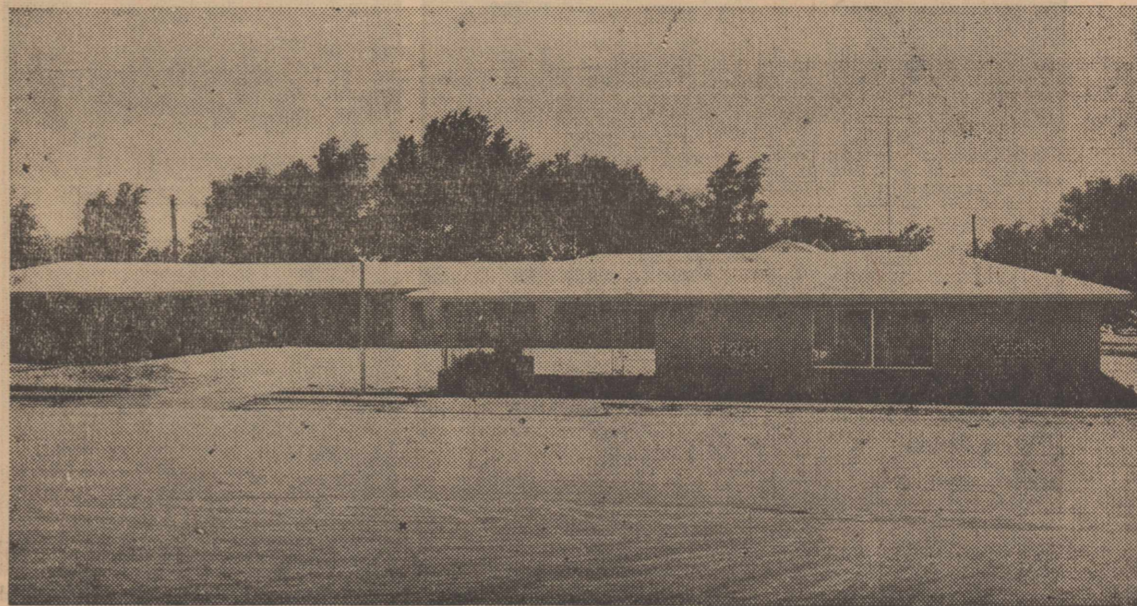

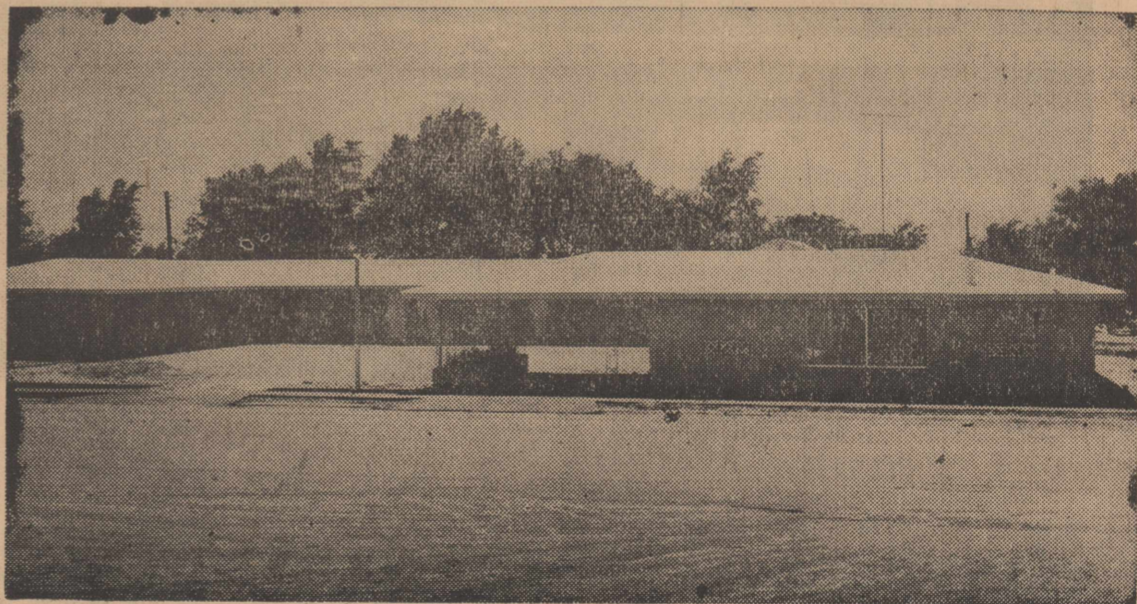

Polio Pioneers Blazing New Trail



In April, 1954, six-year-old Randy Kerr received the first shot launching the giant nationwide field trials of the Salk polio vaccine. Eight years later Randy presents a Salk Institute lapel button to Crystal Brown, 18, a March of Dimes Teen Age Program leader and delegate from Warwick, R. I. at the 32nd National 4-H Conference in Washington, D. C.

Young Randall Kerr, son of Mr. and Mrs. Victor H. Kerr, Oakton, Va., is growing up to the title he has held for eight years—the nation's No. 1 Polio Pioneer.

In April, 1954, he was the first of millions of young school children who participated in the giant March of Dimes-financed field trials which helped prove the safety and effectiveness of the Salk vaccine.

Now going-on-15, Randy is the official leader of today's teen-age Polio Pioneers who are out to build a laboratory wing of the Salk Institute for Biological Studies in San Diego, Calif. To be constructed with funds raised by teenagers representing many schools and youth organizations across the country, the laboratory wing will be an enduring tribute to the youth of America and the historic success of their partnership with science against polio.

"We were just kids when we first got our Polio Pioneer pins,"

says the mature Randy Kerr. "But now we're old enough to realize how much the protection they represented has meant to us and to children everywhere."

A top-notch student majoring in chemistry and math, Randy is completing his sophomore year at the Flint Hill School in Oakton. Like most teenagers, he is far more aware of the giant strides of modern science than many adults.

"Dr. Salk's idea of a center where great scientists can work together for better understanding of the processes of life makes sense," Randy says with youthful positiveness. "Things like heredity and all sorts of disease are complicated. They have to be studied from a lot of different viewpoints if we're going to get the scientific knowledge we need."

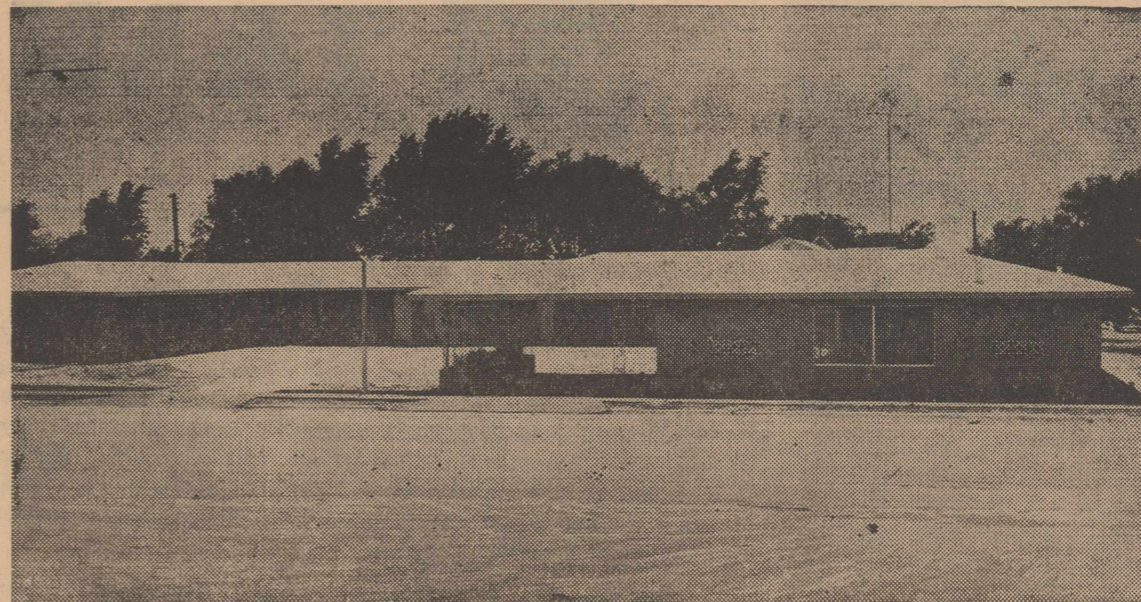
The Salk Institute for Biological Studies, scheduled to open in 1963, will be directed by Dr. Jonas Salk. He will be joined by many world-eminent scientists in biology, chemistry,

virology, immunology and genetics, as well as others from such fields as physics and mathematics, to concentrate on finding answers to basic biological questions affecting life, health and disease.

As the No. 1 Polio Pioneer, Randy Kerr will help his teenage cohorts make plans for fund-raising events to support the \$15 million Salk Institute Building Fund. The fund is sponsored nationally by The National Foundation—March of Dimes, through which the American people totally supported Dr. Salk's polio research.

The starting date for the Salk Institute Building Fund campaign—June 1—coincides with Randy's fifteenth birthday.

"I can't think of a better way to celebrate," he says, "than by joining all the rest of the country's Polio Pioneers to thank Dr. Salk in this concrete way for the protection we've enjoyed. As tomorrow's adults, we can look forward to big dividends from our shares in the Salk Institute."

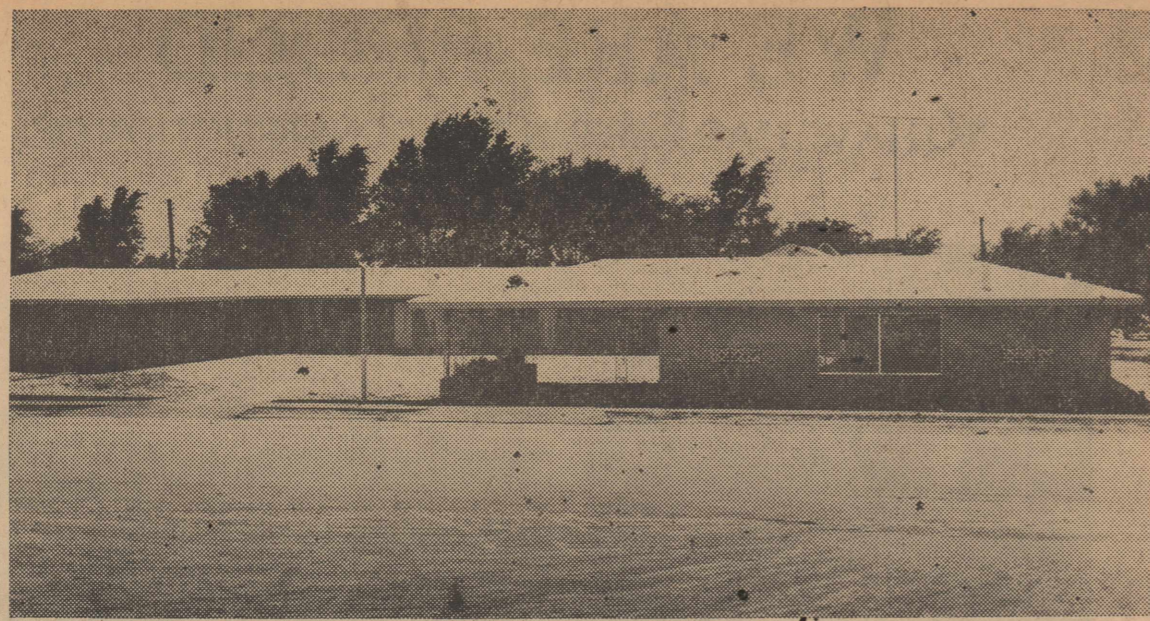

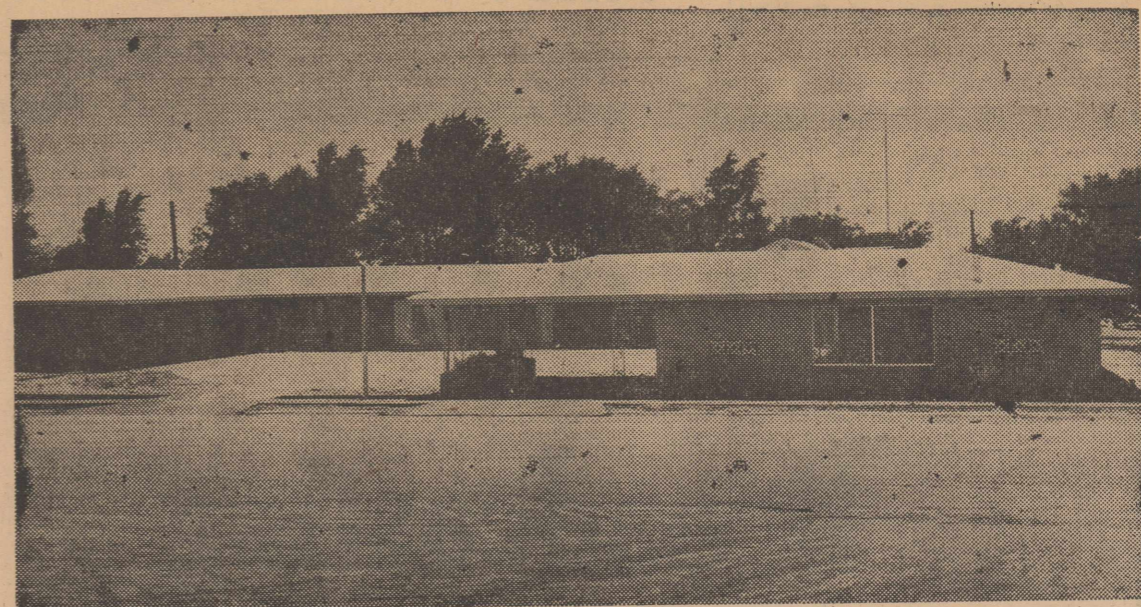
