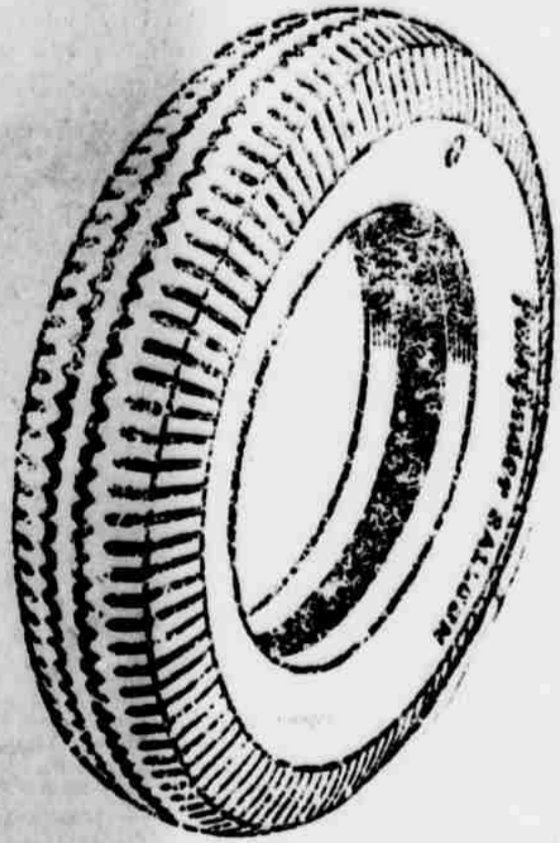

Community Building

Indiana Town Proud of Art Development

Richmond, a small city in southeastern Indiana, is an example for other cities because of its development of art.

Richmond is the only city in the United States to have a real community art gallery free to the people, which receives annual support from the department of education and which is an integral part of its educational plans and equipment. The Richmond Art Association, which made this possible, had its thirty-first anniversary a short time ago. Through its efforts the public schools have a broad art course with a supervisor and nine special teachers. Student art leagues have been formed for special study in the Junior and Senior High Schools. Saturday morning classes are held for talented children and both drawing and painting classes for adults.

Those influences united in the fine exhibits held annually in the gallery, have produced a group of 20 painters whose work is being in the annual exhibits by Richmond painters and in important exhibits elsewhere.

The art movement in Richmond began in 1897 when Mrs. Melville F. Johnston secured the use of the school building for free educational art exhibits. Fourteen years later she established the present gallery in the high school, rooms being specially built for this purpose. A circuit of exhibits was at first secured and excellent works were loaned by collectors in all the large cities. From this start official support was soon secured and the city occupies an enviable place among its sister cities.—Anna Stesse Richardson in the Woman's Home Companion.

Seeking All Methods of Civic Improvement

Eighteen Wisconsin cities are no longer satisfied to boast of having the "finest town in the state"; they are now conducting investigations to as-

ertain just how they measure up with other cities and with minimum standards established by authorities in all the phases of civic life, including education, industry, municipal government, recreation, city planning, social work, library, town and country relations and religious.

This information is from Aubrey Williams, Madison, general secretary of the Wisconsin conference of social work, under whose guidance and leadership the investigations are conducted.

The survey is not, Mr. Williams explains, made by "imported experts" but by citizens of the community who wish to find out for themselves just what ways their city excels and just what it needs to make it a better "home town."

Transplanting Trees

The owner of a new house has been blessed with shade trees and has the pleasing idea of having them planted in the new yard. It is well known to everyone that it is not desirable to transplant trees until they are well established. However, the difference between a treeless lot with a house on it and an established home is really a very considerable one.

To prepare a large tree for transplanting a deep trench should be dug around it from 5 to 7 feet from the base and worked under so as to stabilize all the smaller roots to prevent wilting injury to the tree. The ends of the roots should be cut smooth and the tree carefully unshaded with a plastic wrap being taken to remove the soil with as little injury as possible to the young fibers. The tree should then be drawn over until the top root can be cut. Bagging should be used to wrap the soil and roots which can then be loaded on a steam wagon.

FORMER HASKELL COUNTY TEACHER TELLS OF WORK AMONG THE HOPI INDIANS

To the Haskell Free Press and to our friends of Haskell County, whom we have worked with during the past several years in the public schools, we send greetings.

On September 1st, last, we arrived at our present location on the Hopi Indian Reservation, fifty miles north of the Painted Desert and seventy-five miles north and west of Holbrook, Arizona. We are also about sixty miles east of the Grand Canyon of the Colorado. We were only too glad to reach our

destination, but I think the feeling of gladness was very much overshadowed by a feeling of forlornness. This feeling, however, was of short duration as our many duties, and the new sights soon filled our minds.

Monday morning, September 5th, school opened with a full attendance of red and brown lads and lasses. Now I began to realize what my charge meant. I found myself president so to speak, of more than three hundred full-blooded Hopi Indians. (You notice that I have begun the word president with a small letter, it expresses better the attitude that possessed me.) This number included the children's parents which I also have charge of.

To assist me with the work, I have two Indian helpers, man and wife. As I never before had helpers I did not know what to do with these. In a short time I discovered what helpers were good for. Soon after 8:30 o'clock these helpers had the children in tubs of warm water and were applying soap and brush irrespective of their parents receiving their bath, the children were given of their summer's growth of hair. Next, government clothes were issued and after the noon meal, which is always furnished by the Government, the academic work of the school was ready to begin.

Each Monday morning the clothes are changed and the pupils above ten wash-those removed; the ironing and patching is done by the girls as industrial work during the week.

Teaching the Indian children is a very difficult job, as we are teaching a foreign language to them, and their English vocabulary is so limited. They are, however, most submissive and eager to learn, willing to try anything. Their almost unbounded confidence in the teachers creates a bond between teacher and pupil that is not found in the public schools.

The things stressed most in the Indian Service are: (1) Cleanliness, (2) Orderliness, (3) Decoration of school room, and (4) Academic work. Neglect of either of these almost means loss of position.

The social life of the Hopi Indians is found in their dances. But these

dances are in nowise similar to our English dances. Their religious and social dances are so intermingled that one cannot distinguish them apart. The Hopis do not drink of course, and very few use tobacco. They are sociable, and very kind to strangers. Nine of ten of them can understand English, but a much smaller per cent speak it.

There are many interesting things about the Indians, and about Indian life. All Indian stories are not true. One thousand pounds of corn is the price that the Hopi girl must pay for her husband and grind it.

We have now been at Chimpovey a little more than six months and have found the place very homey, but the Indian Commission has seen fit to transfer us to another school, which will be about fifteen miles closer to Texas for which we are very glad. Especially, as it is a promotion and a start toward home. We are making preparations to move to the Polacca Day School, Polacca, Arizona. Orders are to report for duty at Polacca Monday morning morning March 19th. Here I will have four helpers and four teachers. We are looking forward to the work at the new place with much interest.
