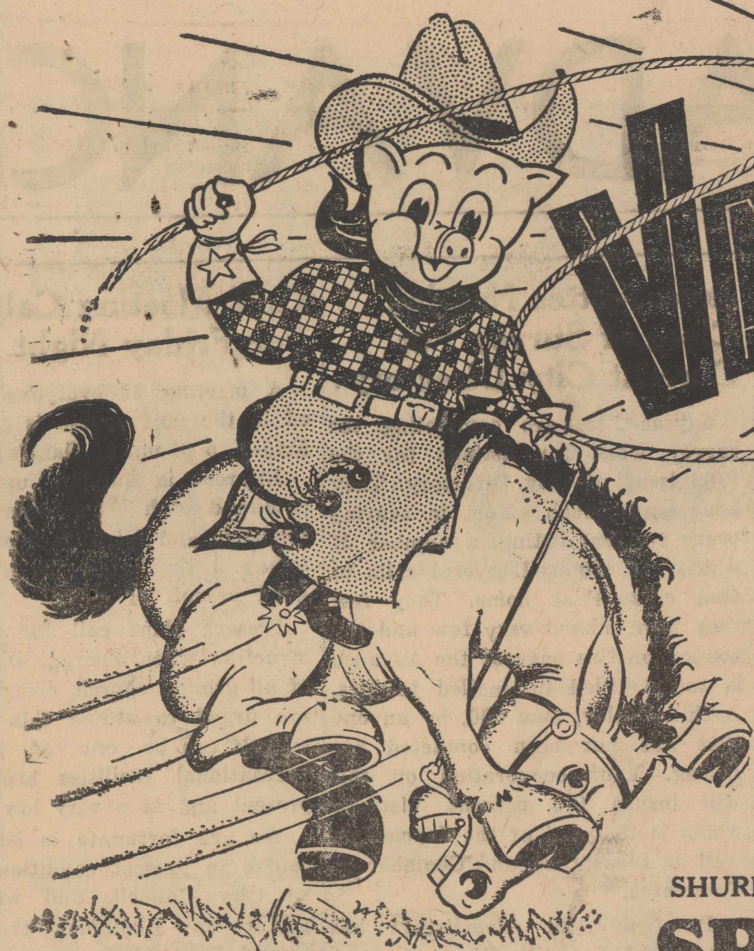
A social hour will follow this special program with a watermelon slicing on the church lawn.



Cotton in most counties in the area has begun fruiting and our area Extension Entomologist, John G. Thomas, suggests that growers should be watching the progress of the crop to prevent any serious insect losses.

The three insects causing the most damage at the present is fleahoppers, boll weevils, and boll worms. So far the damage in Fisher County from these insects has been very light and spotted.

According to Thomas, research findings indicate that about 80 percent of the fruit produced by the cotton plant under ideal conditions is set during the first three weeks of fruiting. Aside from a more rapid rate of fruiting and higher percent stick during the first few weeks, our early harvested cotton brings a higher price, is a better quality and means more money for the producer. Fleahopper control should begin as soon as 15 adults or nymphs are found per hundred terminals, according to Thomas.

Bollworm control should begin as soon as 4 to 5 small worms (plus the presence of bollworm eggs) are found per 100 terminals. Large bollworms are extremely difficult to control therefore for this reason control should begin (where needed) when the worms are small and found feeding in the tops of the plants.

Boll weevil control is recommended when the number of punctured squares reaches 10 to 15 percent. Economical boll weevil control is dependent on keeping the population small, setting the crop as early and rapidly as possible and protecting the crop (if necessary until harvest) well.

Insecticides recommended for the control of these insects are listed in Extension leaflet 218, Texas Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects, which is available at the local county agent's office.

The new screwworm producing

plant went into production the day after dedication on Saturday, June 16. First pupae radiated and packaged on a large scale was on July 6 with a total of 696,000. This daily total was increased to 1,662,000 on July 12 as production problems in the new plants were worked out. Total production for the first week, July 6 through 12, was 7,416,000 flies.

Production at the temporary plant at Kerrville during this same period was 16,927,200.

Egg production in the Fly Colony at Mission is now increased in order to bring production up to the 50-million per week requirement of the program. No additional worms are being started on the vats at Kerrville, an dthis plant will gradually be closed and personnel and needed equipment moved to Mission.

A total of 22,760 larvae samples have been confirmed as screwworms from January 6 through July 13. During the period March 17 to July 13, a total of 330,629,604 sterile flies have been released over Texas and New Mexico.

From Saturday, July 7 through Friday, July 13, 20,633,200 flies were released. Number of samples confirmed as screwworms during this same period was: Texas, 3,023; Oklahoma, 23, and New Mexico, 37. Reported cases (no samples submitted): in all states for this period was 11,602.

Flies are now being released within a 60,000 square mile area in Texas below a line that runs from Del Rio northeast to Coleman, east to Comanche, and southeast to Port O'Connor, plus 7,000 square miles in southern New Mexico.

So far a total of 22 samples have been sent in from Fisher County and identified as screwworms. We still would like to have all cases sent in. Eight to 10 worms from a wound. These can be brought to the County Agent's office.

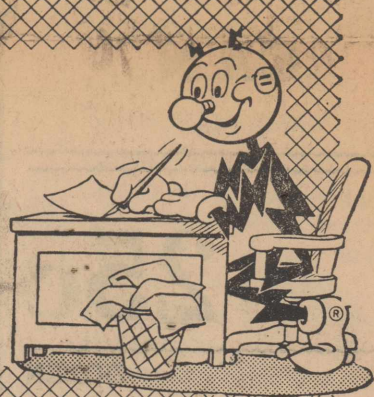

"The kitchen is a country in which there are always discoveries to be made," said a famous French chef. And, bride or matron, you've probably found that out!



Want to dress up that whipped cream pie? Run your potato parer over a chocolate bar (almonds and all!) and make fancy chocolate curls over the whipped cream topping.

Freezing? Line casserole dishes first with aluminum foil. Be sure there's enough to fold over the top. Once frozen, the wrapped food can be lifted out of casserole, freeing it for other dishes. GI Loan Deadline Is Nearing

GI loan entitlement will end for some World War II veterans on July 25, 1962, and entitlement will expire daily thereafter for other veterans until the final expiration date of July 25, 1967. This article should be of particular interest to those veterans whose entitlement is due to expire on July 25, 1962, or anytime within the near future. The exact date a veteran's entitlement ends is determined by a formula contained in Public Law 87-84, approved July 6, 1961. Under this formula, the eligibility of a World War II veteran continues for ten years following the date of his discharge or release from service, plus an additional year for each three months active service during World War II. Under this criteria, the earliest cut off date for World War II veterans is July 25, 1962, and July 25, 1967 is the final date that any World War II veteran will be eligible for a GI loan. Under the governing laws a direct loan may not be made to a veteran after his entitlement has expired, unless a commitment to make a loan to the veteran has been issued prior to the expiration of his entitlement. Consequently, a conditional commitment procedure has been put into force by the Veterans Administration which will afford some measure of relief. This procedure will allow some World War II veterans whose entitlement will expire on July 25, 1962, and daily thereafter to obtain loans even after their entitlement has expired.

The VA Loan Guaranty Officers throughout the country are now following this new procedure. They have already begun mailing letters to the veterans on the Direct loan waiting lists where loan entitlement is due to expire prior to July 1, 1963. This letter will serve these veterans as a conditional commitment, and it explains to each veteran that if funds are available he will be furnished the necessary application forms prior to July 1, 1963. It also informs the veteran that if he is not furnished a direct loan application form before July 1, 1963, the conditional commitment automatically terminated unless it is extended or renewed by the issuing office. For those veterans whose entitlement will expire July 25, 1962, or thereafter, this conditional commitment will simply give them additional time in which to obtain a GI loan. At this time there is no assurance that sufficient funds will be available to enable all veterans on the waiting list to obtain a loan by July 1, 1963.

A letter of conditional commitment will also be sent to each veteran who requests that his name be placed on the direct loan waiting list. This letter will also be good for one year or until July 1, 1963. Although we do not know whether sufficient funds will be available for all waiting list veterans to obtain loans, we still suggest that any veteran whose entitlement is due to expire within the next year to write in and request that his name be added to the waiting list, thereby extending his entitlement expiration date for a brief time. If funds are available, he may be able to obtain a direct loan. If his entitlement expires and he has not been issued one of these conditional commitments, then his right to a GI loan is gone forever. This is his last opportunity to protect this entitlement to the fullest extent.

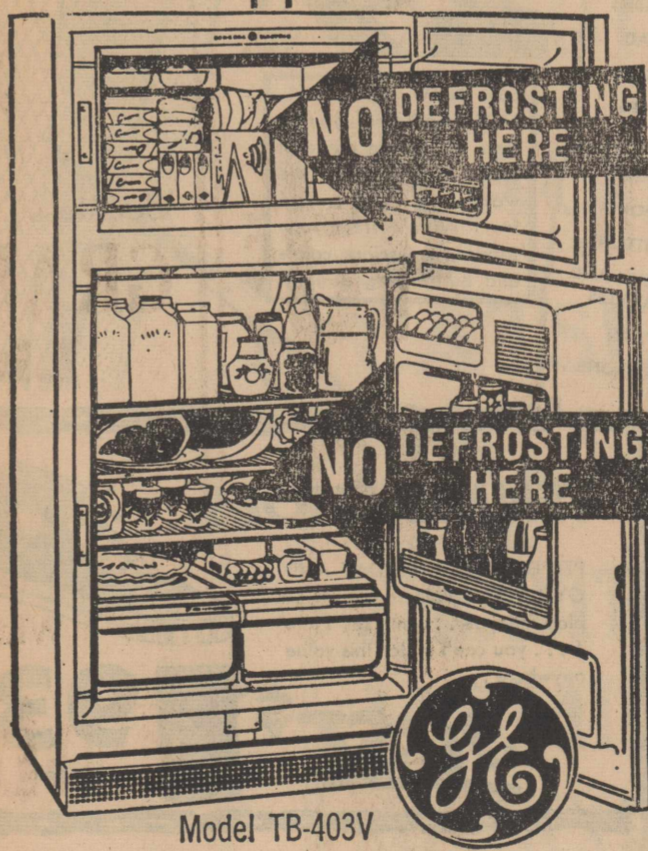

About Your HEALTH



Health public service feature from the Texas State Department of Health. HENRY A. HOLLE, M. D., Commissioner of Health

It will arouse the wrath of sun worshippers, but this must be said: The healthful effects of sunbath aren't worth the time and trouble it takes to get one. After all, a sunburn -- like any other burn -- is a manifestation of a skin injury.

True, a sensible bask in the sun makes a fine mental pick-me-up, and there is no denying the supple appeal of a tawny life-guard. But to overdo it can lead to trouble. In fact it can kill you. More than one person has succumbed to prolonged and unaccustomed exposure to the sun.

Even at best, overexposure can mean two or three miserable days when a mere shirt or blouse is torture, and a friendly pat on the back can end in murder.

The medical term for sunburn is "erythema solaris". It's the ultra-violet light in sun rays which does the damage. And since clouds don't remove all ultra-violet rays, it is possible to get burned even on overcast days in mid-summer.

Some people are physically unable to tan. Known medically as "heliophobes", they could spend the entire summer on Padre Island, and all they'd get would be blisters on their blisters. The reason: Their skins lack the pigment necessary to produce the tan tint. They never had a tan and they never will, so they ought never attempt one. Each new exposure will only mean a new burn.

Assuming you are the type who can tan -- a "heliophilac", that is -- the well-known rule about doing it by progressively longer exposure times is valid and should be followed.

Sunshine is a source of vitamin

D, as most people know. What is apparently misunderstood is that ordinarily healthy people can get all the D vitamin they need through routine activities such as hanging out the family wash, mowing the lawn, or walking to the store.

For persons suffering from pellagra, lung tuberculosis, high blood pressure, or hyperthyroidism sunlight may be definitely harmful.

In case you have wondered about the source of freckles, here's the answer: The color of everyone's skin is determined by the amount of pigment in skin cells. Dark-complexioned people have considerable, blondes very little, and albinos none at all. Under a microscope the pigment in skin cells looks like tiny flecks of brown paint. Sometimes, especially in children, it is manufactured unevenly and collects in the spots we know as freckles.

Ultra-violet rays can be filtered,

fortunately, by smearing a thin film of olive oil over exposed skin. So if you're a heliophilac, and if you just have to have that golden sheen this summer, it might pay you to try it.
