About Your HEALTH

Insects have bothered man since the beginning of recorded history. They have stung him, bitten him, destroyed his home and his food and, even worse, carried germs that brought sickness and death. Entomologists report that they can identify some 10,000 "public enemy" insects that do \$4 billion annually.

For thousands of years men probably did little but swat and squash the insects to defend himself against them, but by 1000 BC Homer was writing about sulphur as a fumigant. Since that time insecticides have steadily improved. One, DDT, was developed in 1942, and knocked punch against insect hordes. However, many insects, including flies, salt marsh mosquitoes, roaches, and lice quickly developed resistance to the chemical. Other insects including Mexican beetles, spider mites and many aphids were not affected by it.

Even today there is still only one sure defense against insects. A simple but complete program of community and home sanitation. Start this program at home by clearing the weeds from around the garage, stock ponds and fence corners. These are ideal breeding places for mosquitoes and flies.

Check your garbage can for leaks and corrosion, replacing those that are worn or misshapen. Garbage cans should be washed weekly to keep them clean and dry.

Always replace the lid when depositing refuse. If the lid doesn't fit, fix it or get a new one.

Inspect the house and ground carefully for stagnant water catchers. Vases and flower pots inside the house are frequent offenders as are old tires, wood piles, tin cans and empty jars in the yard.

Use a good residual spray on all

out buildings, walls, ponds, and shrubbery and eliminate stagnant water areas.

Empty and refill all stock and pet water troughs at least once a week.

Finally, repair or replace all worn or damaged screens and use a space spray or aerosol bomb to rid the house of flying pests, being particularly careful to cover foods and eating ware.

Take the precautions now and keep them up through the summer, and the fly and mosquito population will be the only loser.

Baptist Brotherhood Rally At Abilene

More than 1,000 Baptist men from 11 West Central Texas counties are expected at Hardin-Simmons University Friday (Aug. 3) for the annual rally of the District 17 Baptist Brotherhood.

In fact, attendance may exceed 2,000 if Abilene men meet the challenge from other sections of the district, said Lowell W. Queen, the district president. Men of Haskell, Knox, Fisher, Jones, Stonewall and Kent counties have said they will send 1,000 to the rally if Abilene and Taylor county will register an equal number, according to Queen.

Chief drawing card for the rally will be the president of the Southern Baptist Convention, Dr. Herschel H. Hobbs of Oklahoma City who will speak at both afternoon and evening sessions, Queen reported. Dr. Hobbs is pastor of the First Baptist Church in Oklahoma City and is starting his second term as president of the SBC.

The rally will be held in the big air conditioned chapel-auditorium at H-SU and barbecue supper will be served in Rose Field House. Program will begin at 3:30 p. m. with a recess from 5:30 to 7 p. m. for the supper. Other speakers will be Dr. T. A. Patterson, executive secretary of the Baptist General Convention of Texas; Sam Reed, O'Brien; Dr. Elwin L. Skiles, Abilene; F. D. Emerson, O'Brien; Joe Honcutt, Abilene; and J. L. Cartrite, Sweetwater.

Theme of the rally will be "A Great Door Is Opened Unto Me" and discussions will cover such topics as home and world missions, Texas Baptists' "Crusade for Christian Education," and the Baptist Brotherhood's Royal Ambassador program for boys, Queen said. Dr. Hobbs is to speak at 5 p. m. and at 8:30 p. m.
