Rotan Eligible For Low Interest Rate Water Financing

A \$900,000 bond election is due for Rotan this summer to finance a connecting link with Snyder's water supply.

The proposed election was discussed by Rotan Mayor Juston M. Morrow and Rotan Municipal Water Authority officials in Austin, who were told by the Texas Water Development Board Friday morning that the project is eligible for a state loan.

Joe Burke and John Gray of the Water Authority also were present. According to C. M. Smith of the First Southwest Co. of Abilene, Rotan's water well field has just about dried up and a new supply is urgently needed.

The well field, located halfway between Rotan and Snyder, has been supplying the city for 35 years through a 6-inch pipeline. When the supply first became scarce a booster station was put in, but the water problem continued to become worse.

The \$900,000 improvement pro ject would involve laying of a 12inch pipeline from Snyder to the Rotan Well field and then an 8inch pipe to Rotan. It was estimated that \$20,000 a year could be saved by abandoning the well field operation and buying all water from Snyder's Lake J. B. Tomas supply.

With a state loan in view, the Rotan Water Authority would ask local citizens to vote in late August in combination tax and revenue bonds and the city would seek a vote on a contract with the Colorado M. Municipal Water District, which is made up of Snyder, Big Spring and Odessa.

A 45-year contract with the city of Snyder laready has been signed The pipeline proponents expect to return to the development board in the fall with a loan proposal.

Ronald Eugene (Yogi) Gilleland was taken to Cogdell Memorial Hospital following the accident where he underwent surgery Monday afternoon. A specialist who was flown in from Lubbock to perform the surgery, said that there was a very good chance that the boy would live, but added that chances of his ever walking again were slim.

Reports from his bedside Wednesday was that he could move a toe, which improves hopes for complete recovery.



Check your garbage can for leaks and corrosion, replacing those that are worn or mishapen. Garbage cans should be washed weekly to keep them clean and dry.

Always replace the lid when depositing refuge. If the lid doesn't fit, fix it or get a new one.

Inspect the house and ground carefully for stagment water catchers. Vases and flower pots inside the house are frequent offenders as are old tires, wood piles, tin cans and tmphy jars in the yard.

Tax Ruling-Retirement Calendar Club Met and Compensation

The Internal Revenue Service has and Veterans Administration disability compensation.

Most retired persons are aware of the fact that disability compensation payments received from the VA are tax exempt. However, it must be remembered that the mere fact that a potential entitlement to disability compensation will not result in any tax savings until the person has executed a formal waiver of any equal amount of retirement pay in order to actually draw the compensation.

When a person retires from the Army for length of service or age, the entire amount of retirement pay reseived is subject to Federal income tax. If such persons have a compensable service connected disability rated by the VA, it will generally be to their advantage to execute a waiver equal to the full amount of compensation, since the amount they receive from the VA is not taxable and it reduces the taxable amount received from the Army. A person retired from the army for disability is less likely to realize a tax savings by waiving a part of his retired pay since at least a portion of his retired pay is already tax exempt.

The recent rulings by the Internal Revenue Service are as follows:

(1) When Veterans Administration disability compensation is made retroactive, the retired pay pre viously received from the Army by a member retired for length of service or age remains subject to Federal income taxation.

(2) Any previously received Army retired pay, refunded by a member in order to receive an equal amount of Veterans Administration dis ability compensation retroactively awarded, remains subject to Federal income taxation. Only future entitlement to Army retired pay may be waived to effect a tax savings.



Bell System microwave-in-sky satellite is latest communications triumph for America arising from telephone research

The world's first private enterprise communications satellite is now being used for dramatic experiments in relaying telephone calls and television internationally.

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
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
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
