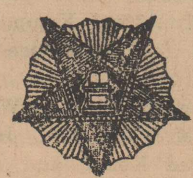

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT**

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 62 and which shall empower the Legislature to provide for the temporary succession to public offices so as to insure the continuity of governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack; providing for the proclamation and publication of this proposed amendment by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 62 and to read as follows:

"Section 62. Continuity of State and Local Governmental Operations. The Legislature, in order to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, shall have the power and the immediate duty to provide for prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public offices, except members of the Legislature, of whatever nature and whether filled by election or appointment, the incumbents of which may become unavailable for carrying on the powers and duties of such offices. Provided, however, that Article I of

the Constitution of Texas, known as the "Bill of Rights" shall not be in any manner, affected, amended, impaired, suspended, repealed or suspended hereby."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment empowering the Legislature to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack by providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public offices, except members of the Legislature, the incumbents of which may become unavailable."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment empowering the Legislature to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack by providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public offices, except members of the Legislature, the incumbents of which may become unavailable."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Texas A. & M. College  
Extension Service

A luncheon commemorating the first 100 years of service by the state landgrant college system and the U. S. Department of Agriculture will be held September 5 in Sbis Hall at the A&M College of Texas.

Sponsors of the noon luncheon are the A&M College, as the landgrant institution for Texas, and the agencies of the U. S. Department of Agriculture which maintain Texas headquarters.

Featured luncheon speakers will be Dr. W. E. Morgan, president of the Colorado State University and a native Texan; Dr. T. C. Byerly, administrator of USDA's Cooperative State Experiment Station Service; and H. N. Smith, state conservationist, oil Conservation Service, Temple. Earl Rudder, A&M's president, will be master of ceremonies.

"Two acts of far-reaching consequence to the United States and to the world were approved into law in 1862 by President Abraham Lincoln," President Rudder said. "One established the U. S. Department of Agriculture; the other, commonly called the Morrill Act in honor of its author, established the nation's land-grant college system, so-called because the federal government set aside a portion of the public domain for the establishment and support of these colleges," Rudder continued.

"This was the first of several acts whereby it became public policy for the federal government to encourage and help support resident teaching, research and extension work through state-administered colleges and universities.

"The A&M College was authorized by the Texas Legislature in 1871 under the provisions of the Morrill Act, and opened its doors to students in 1876. This was Texas' first venture into tax-supported

higher education," Rudder concluded. Tickets to the luncheon may be obtained from the Texas headquarters of each USDA agency in Texas, from state agencies having agricultural services, from chambers of commerce of many cities, and from all faculty and staff office at College Station.

Is the cotton bollworm becoming tougher and more resistant to insecticides in Texas? Because some farmers had trouble controlling bollworms last year, it seems they might be developing a tolerance to commonly used chemicals.

But, according to test results contained in Progress Report 2236 of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, bollworms show no resistance to the insecticides used for their control.

Bollworm larva for the tests were collected over the state and reared on cotton leaves and an artificial diet. They were then treated with various insecticides at different dosages and the rate of kill recorded.

The insecticides used were DDT, endrin, Sqvin, toxaphene-DDT (2 to 1 ratio), and Strobane-DDT (2 to 1 ratio).

The bollworms collected in El Paso, College Station, Eagle Pass, and Laredo showed a good rate of kill from the treatments. However, there was some evidence of tolerance to DDT in bollworms from La Grange and Rosebud, and Eagle Pass during August. But this data does not show a real resistance of the bollworm to DDT according to the report.

During the study it was found that the population of tobacco budworms was unusually high and therefore data kept on both insects as both attack cotton in a similar manner.

Comparative toxicity tests with the bollworm and the tobacco budworm showed the bollworm to be more susceptible to DDT. This agreed with previous findings that tobacco budworms are harder to kill than cotton bollworms.

The study indicates that boll-

worms may be controlled with the usually recommended insecticides but if tobacco budworms are present DDT alone will not provide sufficient control.

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT**

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 70 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new Section authorizing the creation of two (2) hospital districts in Brazoria County, one to include all or part of the West Columbia, Brazoria, and Damon Independent School Districts, and the other coterminous with the Sweeny Independent School District, providing for a possible consolidation of the two providing mode of funding and also authorizing construction, equipping, maintaining, and financing of a home for the aged in Titus County.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding thereto a new Section to read as follows:

"Section 10(a). The Legislature may authorize the creation of two (2) hospital districts in Brazoria County, one of which shall include all or part of the West Columbia, Brazoria, and Damon Independent School Districts and the other coterminous with the Sweeny Independent School District. The qualified electorate of the hospital districts may, by majority vote of each such hospital district, consolidate the Sweeny Hospital District into the Damon, West Columbia, and Brazoria Hospital District at any time subsequent to the organization of the separate hospital districts.

"Such districts, if created, may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed twenty-five cents (25c) on the one hundred dollar valuation of taxable property within the districts. provided no tax may be levied until approved by a majority vote of the participating resident, qualified, property taxing voters who may have duly rendered their property for taxation. The maximum rate of tax may be changed at subsequent elections, provided existing obligations are not impaired, but in no event shall any change of rate exceed twenty-five cents (25c) per one hundred dollar valuation.

"The maximum tax rate submitted shall be sufficient to discharge such obligations, liabilities, and responsibilities, and to acquire, construct, maintain and operate the hospital system, and the Legislature may authorize the district to issue tax bonds for the purpose of the acquisition, construction, purchase, repair or renovation of improvements and initially equipping the same and such bonds shall be payable from said twenty-five cent tax.

"(b) In addition to all other ad valorem taxes authorized under this Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas, Titus County is hereby

authorized and empowered to levy, assess and collect a tax not exceeding twenty-five cents (25c) on the one hundred dollar valuation of taxable property in said County in any one year for the purpose of paying the principal and interest on any bonds issued by said County for the purpose of constructing and equipping a home or homes for the aged persons in said County and to pay the maintenance and operation expenses thereof, provided said bonds and tax shall have been authorized at an election or elections held for that purpose by a majority of the qualified electors of Titus County who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, voting at said election. This provision shall be self-enacting and no enabling legislation hereunder shall be required. Any bond issued hereunder shall be issued in accordance with the General Laws except as herein otherwise provided."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at the General Election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the construction, equipping, maintenance and financing of a home for the aged in Titus County and for permitting the Legislature to authorize the creation of two (2) hospital districts in Brazoria County, one of which is to include all or part of the West Columbia, Brazoria, and Damon Independent School Districts, and the other coterminous with the Sweeny Independent School District, also providing for a possible consolidation of the two by qualified voters of such districts, and providing for all necessary construction, equipping, maintaining and financing if authorized."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the construction, equipping, maintenance and financing of a home for the aged in Titus County and for permitting the Legislature to authorize the creation of two (2) hospital districts in Brazoria County, one of which is to include all or part of the West Columbia, Brazoria, and Damon Independent School Districts, and the other coterminous with the Sweeny Independent School District, also providing for a possible consolidation of the two by qualified voters of such districts, and providing for all necessary construction, equipping, maintaining and financing if authorized."

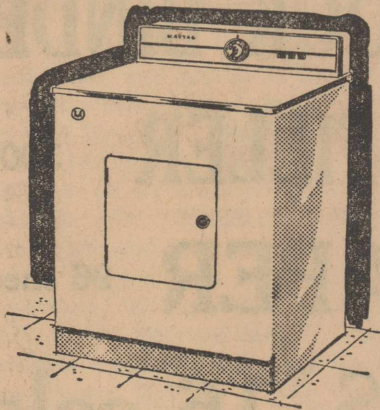

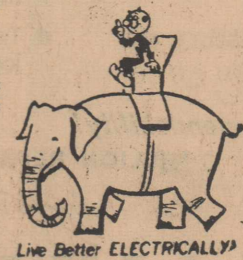

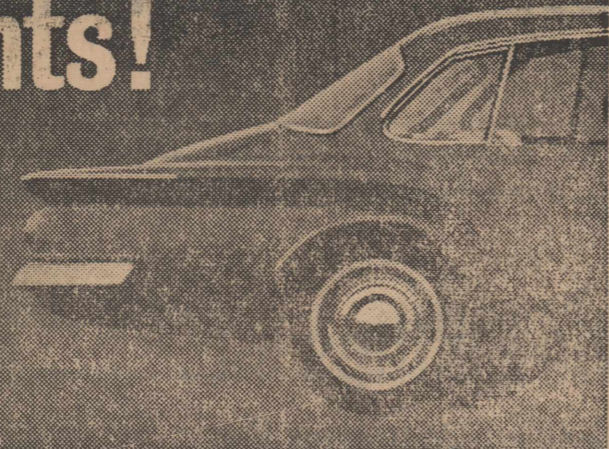

## Farm Facts

Scientists are evaluating bird-repellent grain sorghums. Growing from seed coverings of test varieties are sharp spines which seem to keep birds from feeding.

Agricultural Research, published by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, reports some of these sorghums have been grown in south Florida and tests are being conducted at Beltsville, Md., and in Mississippi and other states.

An effort will be made to cross sweet sorghums with the grain sorghum strains to learn if widely adaptable bird-repellent sweet sorghums can be produced.

Bird feeding on sorghums is a problem in the South and Southwest.

Agronomist F. T. Boyd, in charge of the Plantation Field Laboratory of the Florida Agricultural Experiment Station at Fort Lauderdale, found the bird-repellency characteristic during tests of hundreds of sorghums. Blackbirds, rice birds, Eng-

lish sparrows, and Florida grackles left two sorghums strictly alone. By crossing these with others, some 50 strains have been developed with their own built-in bayonets.

## Farm Facts

Of 12 to 13 inches of average annual precipitation in the 17 Western states, only about 30% contributes to the fresh water supply.

According to J. S. Robbins of the Agricultural Research Service, much of the moisture evaporates from soil, water, and plant surfaces. The rest infiltrates the soil and is transpired back into the atmosphere by vegetation.

An additional inch of water for plant use could increase Western wheat production up to five bushels per acre.

Scientists are studying plastic or mechanical barriers to control water or vapor flow to the soil surface and are testing chemical or physical treatments of soil to inhibit water loss.

At Tempe, Ariz., they're experimenting with sprays to sterilize the soil and kill weeds, stabilize it to prevent water infiltration, and make it water repellent to control



erosion. Ground covers of butyl rubber sheeting or asphalt-coated jute fabric are being used in Utah to move runoff from small areas into reservoirs or special bags.

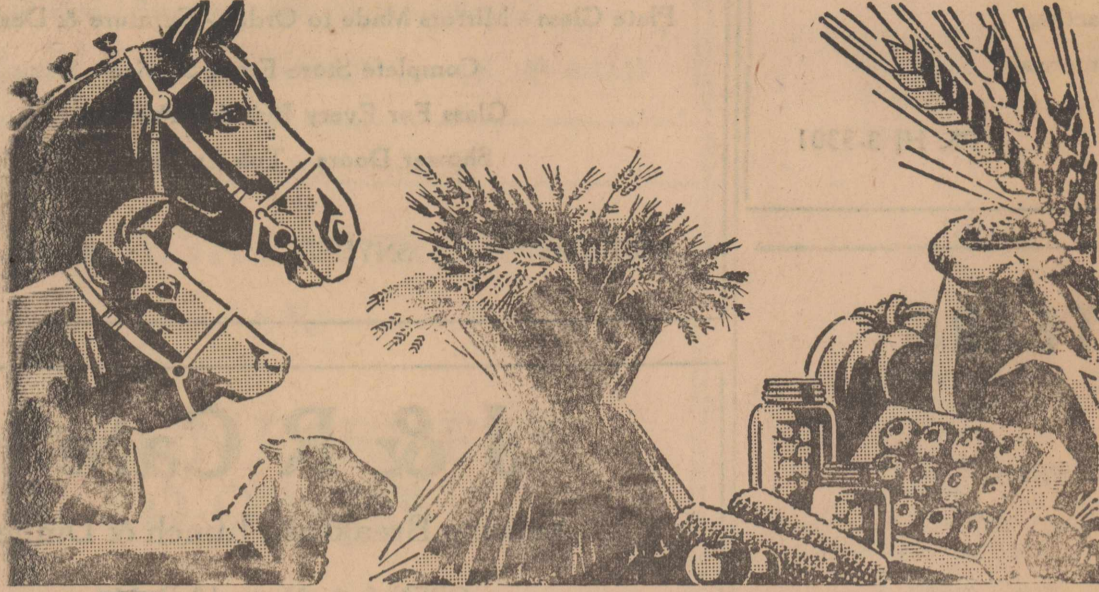

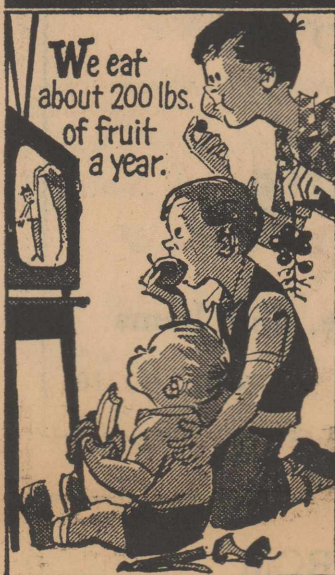

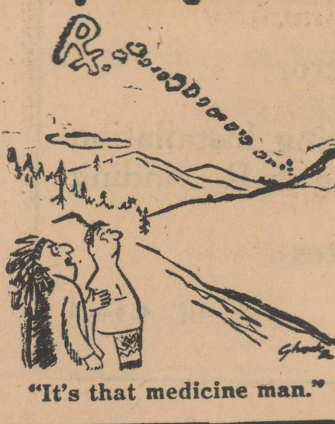

### MORE INFORMATION ON TELSTAR

In last month's Telephone Talk, I briefly explained Telstar and the mission this month, I would like to expand a little more about Telstar.

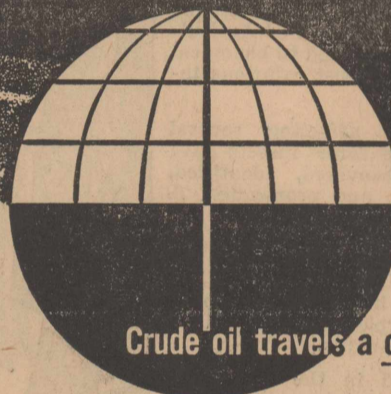
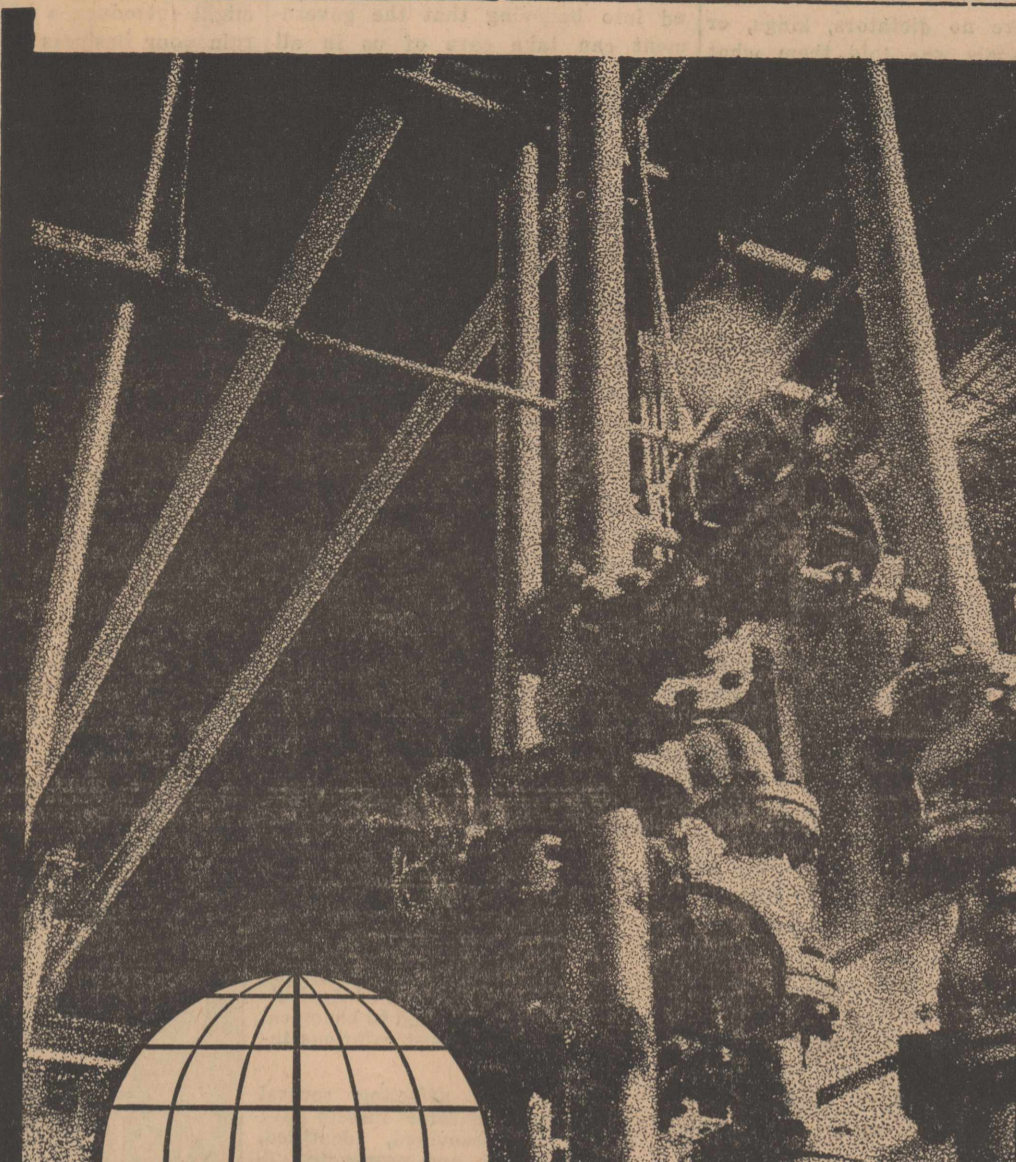

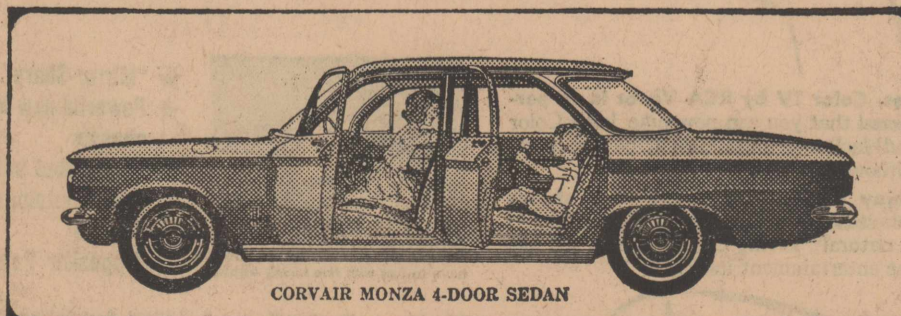

**Guest Editorial**

**Farm Facts**

The Forest Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture has resorted to biological warfare against injurious insects.

Viruses affecting several species of forest insects have been discovered, identified, collected, and propagated. A virus spray, for example, can now be used to control the European pine sawfly in red pine plantations. Other sprays have been applied from airplanes to control insect outbreaks.

To aid in the control of several species of highly destructive insects accidentally introduced from abroad, more than 200 species of parasites and predators of these insects have been collected and introduced into this country. At least 60 species are known to be established here.

Further research on biological control of insects should make it an effective weapon in combating infestations and checking losses inflicted on the nation's forests. Losses to

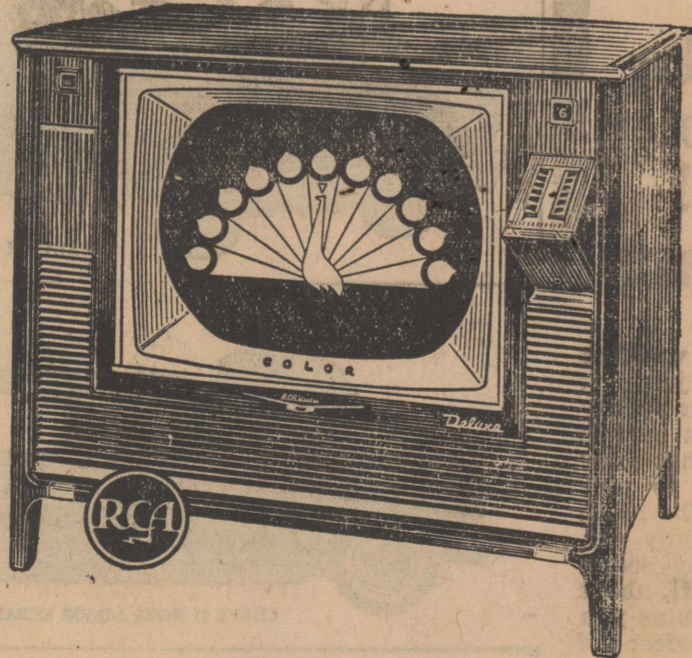
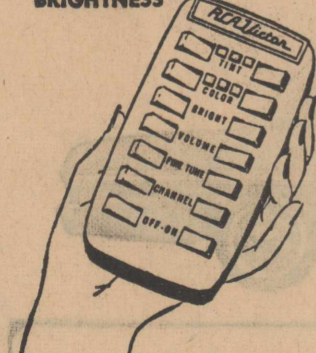


timber supplies attributed to insects and diseases exceed those caused by forest fires. The USDA conducts forest and range research at nine experiment stations and at the Forest Products Laboratory at Madison, Wisconsin.

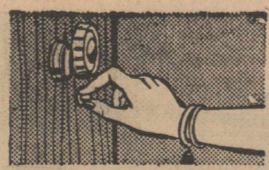
