--ELECTIONS--Friday, August 31, 1962 1. Where to Vote: Both elections at City Hall.

2. Why 2 Elections?

-a- One Election called by City of Rotan to authorize the City Council to sign a contract with the Rotan Municipal Water Authority to purchase water from the Authority.

-b- One Election called by the Rotan Municipal Water Authority to give Board right to issue the bonds in the amount of \$900,000 to construct pipelines.

-c- Should qualified electors vote in both elections? Yes, only qualified Electors who reside within the city limits can vote on the water contracts. All qualified voters who live within the authority can vote on the bonds.

3. From what source will the water be obtained? The Rotan Municipal Water Authority has signed a contract to buy treated water at the Treatment Plant in Snyder, which gets its water from the J. B. Thomas Lake through contract with the Colorado River Authority.

4. Will the supply be ample? Yes, the contract with City of Snyder runs for 35 years, with the Rotan Municipal Water Authority having the option to extend the agreement for 25 years.

5. Will the water be of good quality? Yes, same as used by City of Snyder, Big Spring and Odessa.

6. How will the money from sa le of the bonds be used? To build a 12 inch line from Snyder to the Rotan Well Field and an 8 inch · line from the well field to Rotan which will supplement the present 6 inch line from the well field to Rotan. Use of the two lines . from the well field will permit ample water to be delivered to Rotan under pressure at Snyder plant without expense and cost of pump stations.

7. From what source will the bonds be paid? The City will pay one-third of the Average Annual Principal and Interest requirements, to the Authority out of its net revenue and the Rotan Municipal Water Authority will provide two-thirds by a tax

8. Who pays Snyder for the water? The City of Rotan will pay the Authority the exact cost of the water from Snyder plus 3 cent per each 1M gallons. The extra 3 cents will give the Authority's Board funds to operate.

9. Will the well fields be discontinued if the elections carry? Yes, it is believed it will not be necessary to use the well fields, which are depleting very fast. It costs the city annually between \$25,000 and \$30,000 to operate the well fields, pumping, equipment, equipment repairs and other costs. This cost will be saved and will be approximately enough to pay for the water from Snyder.

10. If the elections carry when will the water lines be installed? It is planned that the lines will be put in and water available by the spring of 1963. The first year's interest and principal will be paid out of the bond issue-so there would be no tax levy until the fall of 1963.
