Water Bond Issue Carries By Big Vote

Voters of Rotan Municipal Water Authority District gave an overwhelming approval for the \$900,000 tax and revenue bond issue last Friday with a vote of 431 for and 22 against. Another election at the same time approved the City signing contract with the Water Authority to purchase water.

This was better than 19 to 1 favoring the proposal and showed how local citizens feel on need of adequate water supply.

Plans call for the new system to be in operation before hot weather next summer.

The bond issue will provide a 12-inch line from the treatment plant at Snyder to the city water farm at Camp Springs, and one 8-inch line, which will supplement the existing 6-inch line to bring water from the farm to Rotan.

Rainfall Nearing Last Year's Mark

Rains this week have brought the total near last years mark at this time. According to Fred Byerly 16.99 was totaled up to Wednesday night this year against 17.07, 1961.

Sunday's rain was gauged by Byerly at .48 inch, while the fall was much heavier east of town. 1.30 fell Tuesday night and Wednesday, making the 16.99 to date.

Several parts of the area have had up to four inches this spell.

Oral Polio Vaccine Questions and Answers

Q. What are the advantages of oral vaccine over other types?

A. The ease with which the vaccine can be given - by mouth, instead of by an injection needle, is a big advantage.

Another advantage is that this oral polio vaccine provides what doctors call "intestinal immunity" against polio. Thus, unlike some other polio vaccines, the individual is not only immunized against polio by being provided with antibodies in his blood, but he is also less likely to be a carrier of the disease, and therefore may not transmit it to other unimmunized people via the digestive tract.

Q. How is the vaccine administered?

A. Vaccine is taken orally from paper cups or - if a concentrate is used - on sugar cubes.

Q. Are there any harmful after-effects, such as fever or slight illness, as a result of taking the vaccine?

A. Oral polio vaccines have been administered to millions of persons, with little or no after-effects directly attributed to the vaccine.

Q. How does the vaccine work?

A. After it is swallowed, the vaccine particles multiply in the digestive tract to work building up what doctors call "antibodies". These are what provide protection against polio.

Q. How long does immunization from polio last after a person takes the vaccine?

A. Experts believe it will give you long-term immunity against polio, similar to that provided by smallpox vaccine, which needs a booster dose only every three or four years.

Q. How long after a person takes the vaccine does it become effective in providing immunity?

A. From two to three weeks.

Q. Can a person contract polio as a result of taking the vaccine?

A. No. Even though the vaccine includes live polio virus (in a very weakened form), there have been no confirmed cases of polio resulting from the vaccine.

Q. Who is eligible to receive the vaccine?

A. Everyone - including infants.

Q. What about those who have received previous Salk polio shots?

A. A complete series of all three types of oral vaccine is recommended irrespective of any previous polio shots.

Q. Suppose all members of a family but one get the vaccine, is there a possibility that the person may become immunized from the others?

A. The person who did not take the vaccine might achieve a partial immunity through transmission from other members of the family - and this would of course be a beneficial effect.

Q. Does this vaccine provide protection against all types of polio?

A. Yes. There are three types of polio known to medical science, and there is a separate feeding for each type.

Q. How many doses of the vaccine are needed?

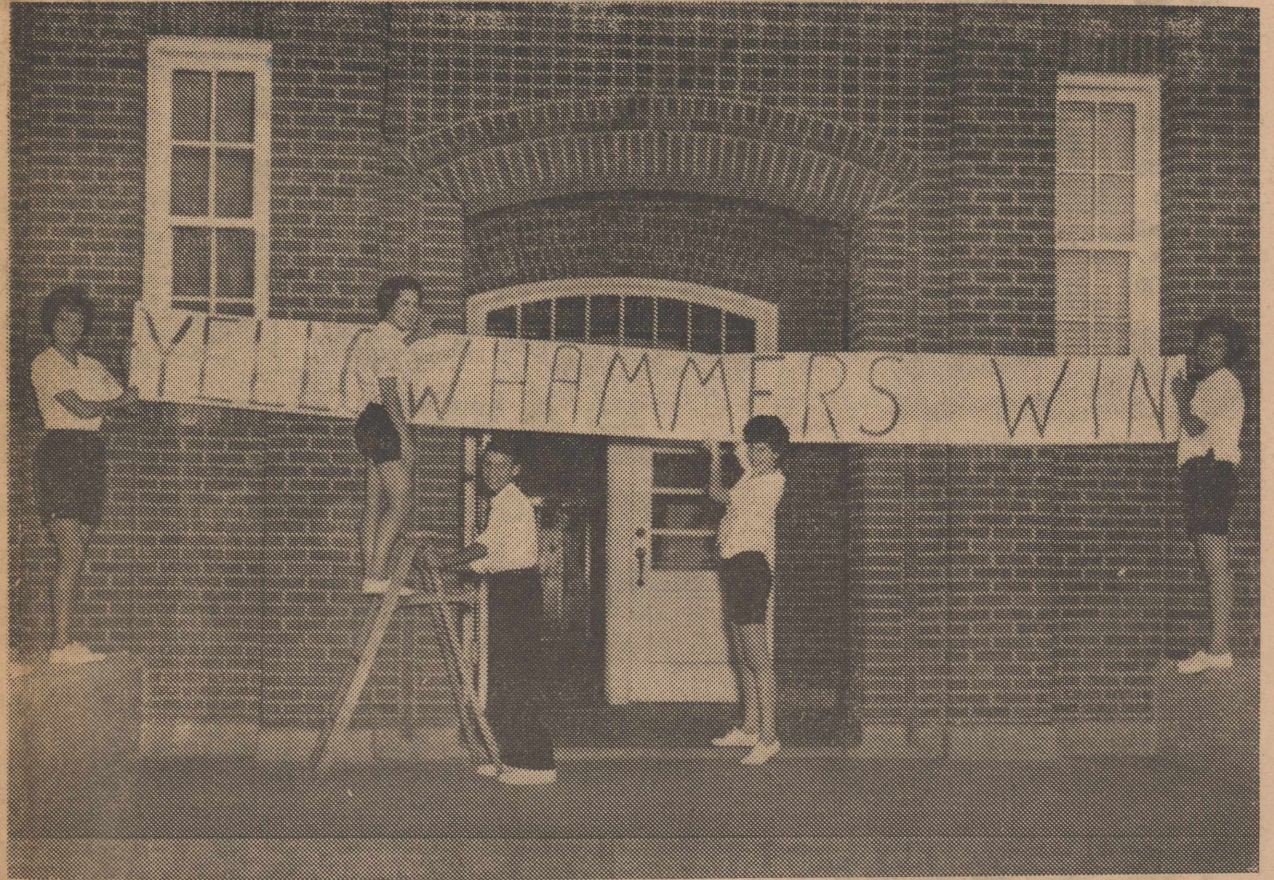
A. Three - spaced at certain intervals, and given in certain order.

Q. Where will this vaccine be obtainable during the mass immunization program?

A. You may receive the vaccine at certain community centers or through special mobile units which will be placed at strategic points throughout the county. Watch your newspaper for further announcements on this.

**New Car Stickers
Dry Mount Material**

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today a new-type motor vehicle inspection sticker is now available for the new inspection year beginning September 1.

"The only thing new about the inspection this year is the sticker itself," he said. "This new sticker is a dry mount decal which we believe will adhere regardless of weather conditions and one which has been used very successfully in other states."

More than five million vehicles registered in the state are required by law to be inspected at one of the 5,000 official inspection stations between this date and April 16, 1963. Owners of vehicles not displaying the current inspection sticker after that date will be in violation of the law.

Garrison urged motorists to get their vehicles inspected as early as possible, and pointed out:

"With hard summer driving coming to an end, fall is an excellent time to have vehicles safety checked in preparation for the winter months."

In announcing the new inspection period, the public safety director said the Vehicle Inspection Program in Texas has proved itself to be a valuable tool in reducing accidents on Texas streets and highways.



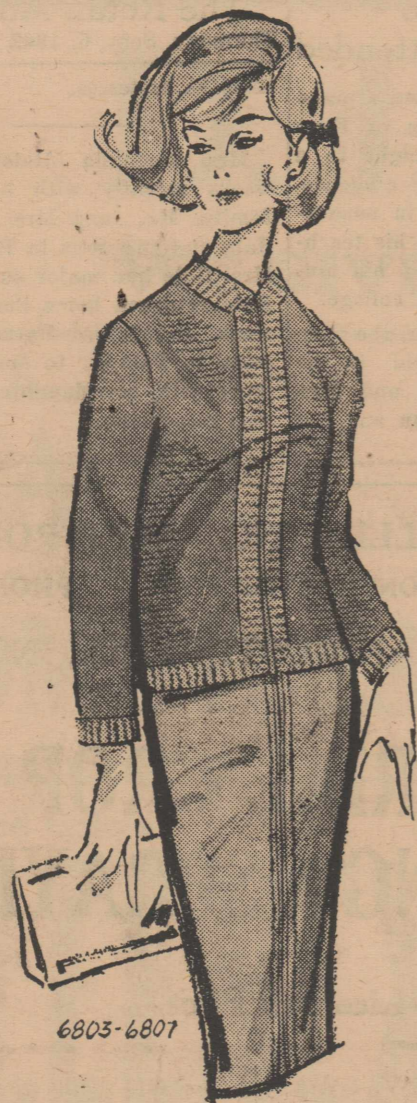

Off To College?

When a boy or girl goes to college for the first time, it marks the start of a new way of life.

Parents can help the child make the necessary adjustment by assisting in planning for a comfortable, cheerful dormitory room, points, Charlotte Tompkins, housing and home furnishing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

This "room away from home" can be quite important, she stresses. It is a place the young student can call his own, a place where he can express his personality, relax, study and visit with new friends.

Many students will be among the lucky ones admitted to new college and university dormitories just constructed. They will step into bright, modern dormitory rooms, professionally designed down to the last lamp and wall pictures.

Other students will be among those attending overcrowded colleges with inadequate housing facilities. Many of the latter students will have to take rooms off campus. Some other groups of students will attend fine old, ivy-covered colleges where dormitory facilities are "just" adequate, the specialist says. Perhaps all that is provided is a bed, mattress and a chair.

Still other students will attend local colleges and live at home.

"Your college boy or girl deserves a pleasant room during the college years, whether they are away or at home," Miss Tompkins emphasizes. It is important that the student participate actively in the project -- since choosing the furnishings may be one of the first expressions of adult individuality the student has known.

If possible, a student should have an opportunity to see the prospective room in order to know what furnishings are needed. Comfortable, good-looking furnishings need not be expensive, the specialist reminds.

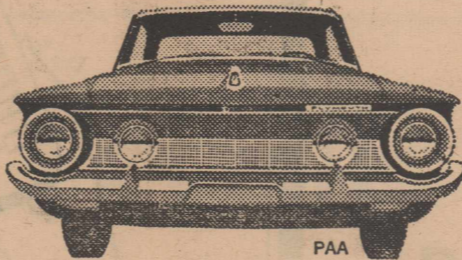
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
