The Surgeon-General's Office has upheld the complete safety of this vaccine, and this is an opportunity which will eradicate this type of Polio.

Remember that everyone over 6 weeks of age, regardless of the number of Salk type Polio shots they have had, should take the vaccine.

Hammers Strut Over Paducah Dragons

Steve Herron paced the Yellowhammers last Friday in defeating Paducah Dragons 50-6. His 6 touchdowns was highlight of the game, three of them coming in first quarter.

He opened the game with a 47-yard pass to end Joe Garcia to the Dragon six on the first play. He carried over the next play. Bill Ashton kicked the extra point.

The next time Rotan got the ball, Herron scooted 40 yards around right end on the second play. Ashton again kicked the point.

He ended the first period with a 25-yard dash around the same right end for still another touchdown. Ashton's kick was blocked.

Herron opened the second quarter with his fourth TD of the night, using the reliable right end for a 20-yard scamper after guard A. C. Snapp recovered a Dragon fumble on the Paducah 38, Halfback Lennis Polnac ran across the extra points.

After the intermission, Herron climaxed a 43-yard drive with another six-yard plunge. Polnac ran across the extra points.

Herron relinquished the scoring to fullback Bruce Baugh in the fourth. Baugh ran 18 yards over tackle to end a 32-yard drive. Polnac again got the extra points.

But, Herron came right back for the night's final score, a 35yard jaunt, this time around left end. He then passed to Ashton for the extra points.

Paducah scored its only touchdown with five seconds remaining in the first half. Halfback Talmadge Porter ran 31 yards for the score, climaxing a 72 yard drive.

The Hammers will entertain Roby Lions here Friday night in the first home game of the season, which is non-district.

Robert Strange Killed In Calif. Accident

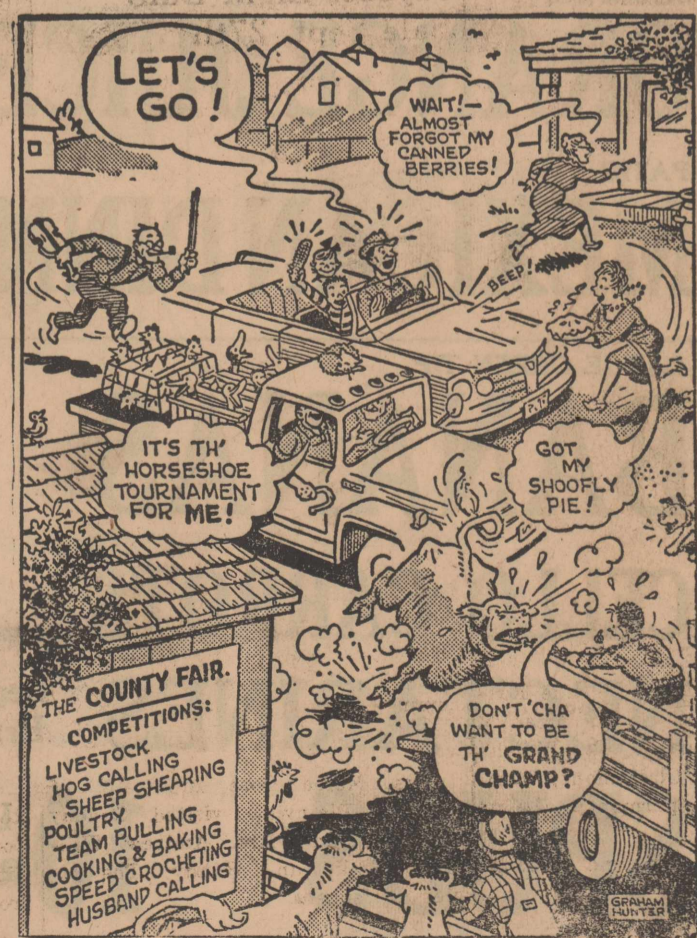

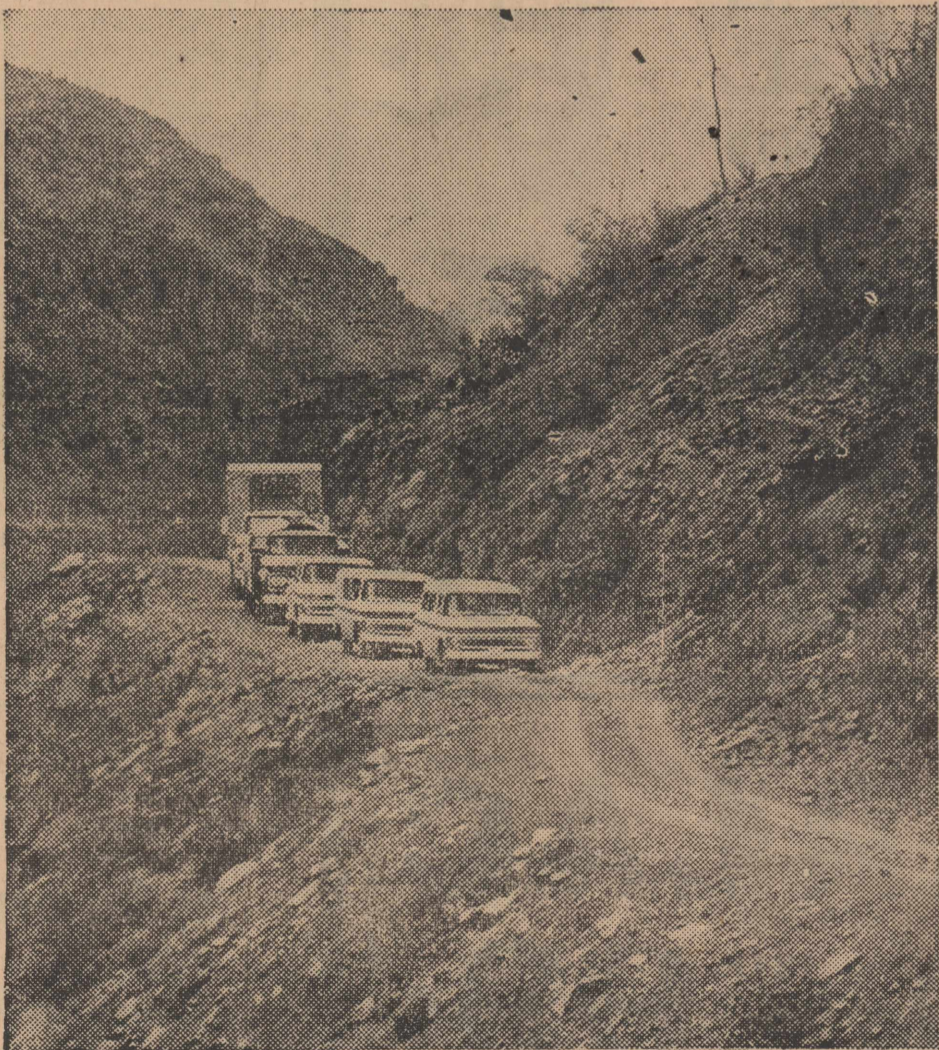

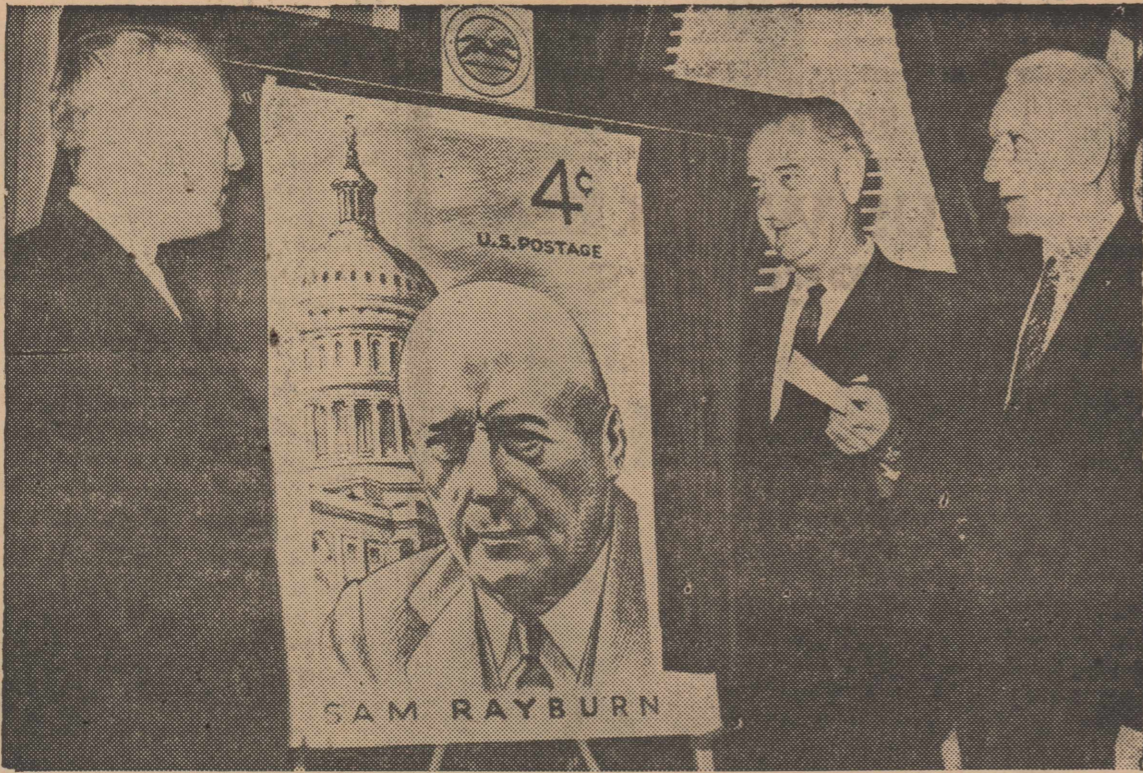

Soil Con. Officials Urge Planting 'Winter Cover'

Supervisors of the Upper Clear Fork Soil Conservation District suggest that now is the time to get Winter Peas and Small Grain in the ground, for effective winter cover.

Protection of the Soil from erosion and absorption of soluble nitrates that otherwise would be wasted are not the only roles played by cover crops. They also, play an important part in soil economy by adding organic matter and, in the instance, leguminous cover crops, soil nitrogen.

Glenn Gruben, operator of a farm Southwest of Rotan, states that his cotton, following peas this year, looks as though it is going to make more lint per acre than it did last year.

The Soil Conservation Service Technicians, assisting the Upper Clear Fork SCD, in Sweetwater and Rotan will be glad to furnish technical assistance, in planning a conservation cropping system, consisting of covercrops, to any landowner or operator who desires assistance.

The officer election and the adoption of a new program of work for the coming year will be other highlights of the meeting.

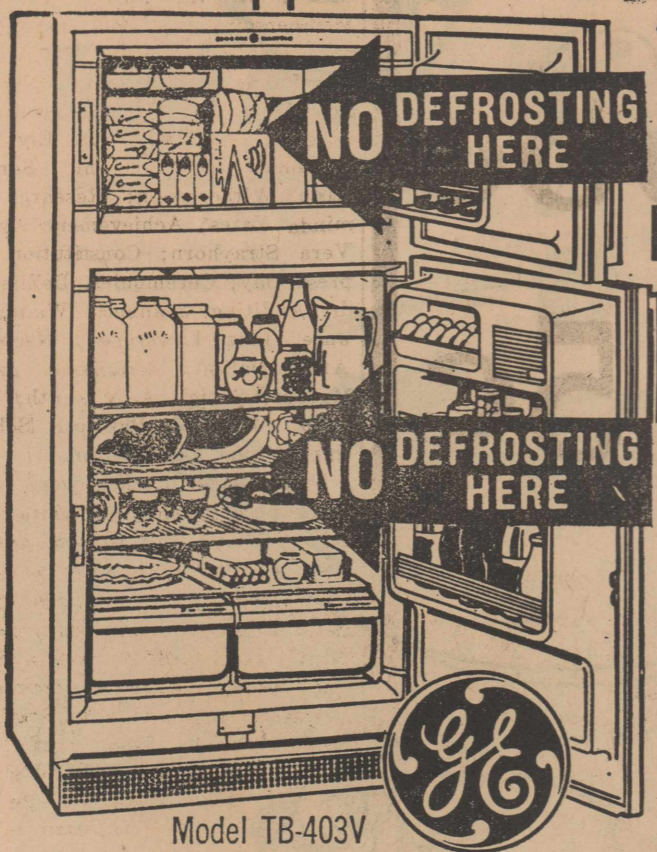
Joy Circle Met Tuesday Morning

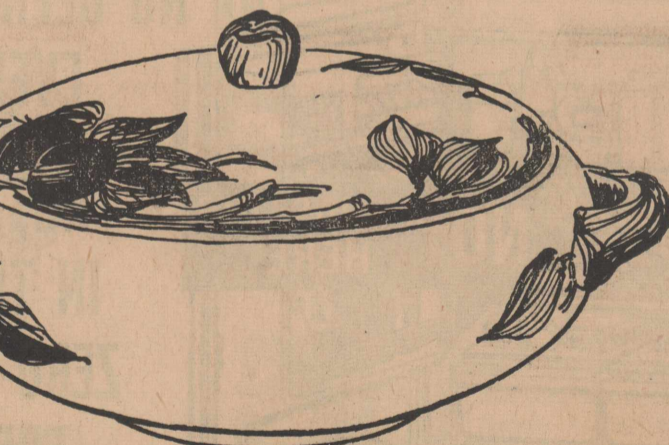
