The other Rotan tally came on a 26-yard run by halfback Lennis Polnack in third quarter. End Bill Ashton kicked one extra point. Herron ran over the extra points on two occasions and Polnack ran one conversion.

Damp Weather Aiding Crop Insect Damage

Slow, gentle rain fell most of Tuesday over the area, with Fred Byerly gauging .45 inch. The amount seemed to be general.

Ranchmen were happy with this and the cooler weather, most of them have caught stock water and report pastures in perfect condition to go into the winter.

Farmers as a whole are worried by insect problem in cotton. Many have poisoned several times, and apparently will have more to do as insects are still doing much damage according to reports from most sections. Most of the early cotton is short due to dry weather early in the season and harvest in the young crop seems very uncertain at this time. Insect damage will cut the yield shorter than early estimates, and only the final ginning will tell the complete story.

Rainfall for the year is above last year, at this date, 18.07 and 19.63, which is above the past few years average for 12 months.

PP&K Contest Open To Grade School Boys

Rotan area grade school boys from seven through 11 can pit their football skills against thousands of other boys throughout the nation in the second annual Punt, Pass & Kick competition which will culminate with a White House reception and an appearance at the National Football League Championship game for the top ten winners.

Sponsored nationally by the Ford Division of Ford Motor Company and the National Football, the Punt, Pass & Kick Program -- or PP & K -- will be staged in Rotan by Rotan Motor Co., with Junior Chamber of Commerce as local co-sponsor.

Rotan youths will be tested for their ability to punt, pass and kick (using a kicking tee) footballs on the same day as thousands of other boys all over the country, with warm-up jackets, football helmets and autographed footballs to be given as first, second and their prizes for each age group, or five top Rotan winners in all. Scores throughout the state then will be compared to determine the five top Texas winners, and these scores compared to determine the most skillful seven, eight, nine, ten, and eleven year old fledgling football stars in each of the areas covered by the telecasts of the 14 National Football League Teams.

Area winners and their fathers will receive all-expense paid trips to a National Football League game in their area, and will compete during half-time to determine the five top Eastern Division winners and five top Western Division winners. These ten boys will visit Washington and the White House, accompanied by their parents, and then will go to the site of the NFL Championship game, for half-time competition to determine the five National winners.

Ray Brown, Owner, of Rotan Motor Co. pointed out that there is no body contact necessary in the competition, no charge for entering, and no special equipment needed. "Registration will be open through out October," he said, "with Rotan Motor Co. as the registration headquarters."

"Last year, the first year of the PP & K program, more than 200, 000 boys entered the competition," he said, "and President Kennedy said 'Programs of this type will enable our youth to build the energy and strength that is their American heritage.'"

Mr. Brown said entrants will be judged on the distance and accuracy of their punting, passing and kicking (using a kicking tee), with points awarded for each foot of distance the ball travels on the fly and subtracted for each foot the ball lands to the right or left of a center line. The Rotan competition will be held at Football Field on Saturday, November 3.

Any ties in the Rotan competition will be played off on the day of competition, and ties for top spot in the state and area standings will be played off at special contests. State winners will receive trophies, and area winners will receive complete junior-type football uniforms of the NFL team in their region, and the uniforms worn when the winners compete during NFL half-time ceremonies to determine the Divisional champions.

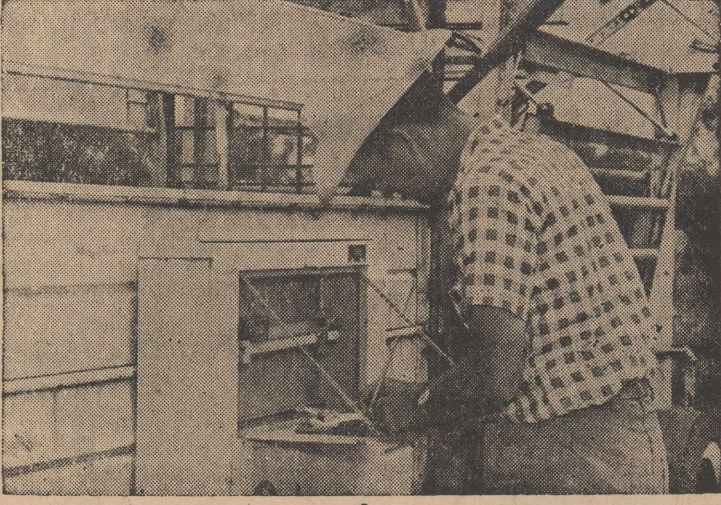

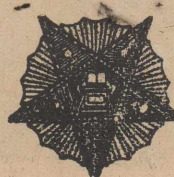

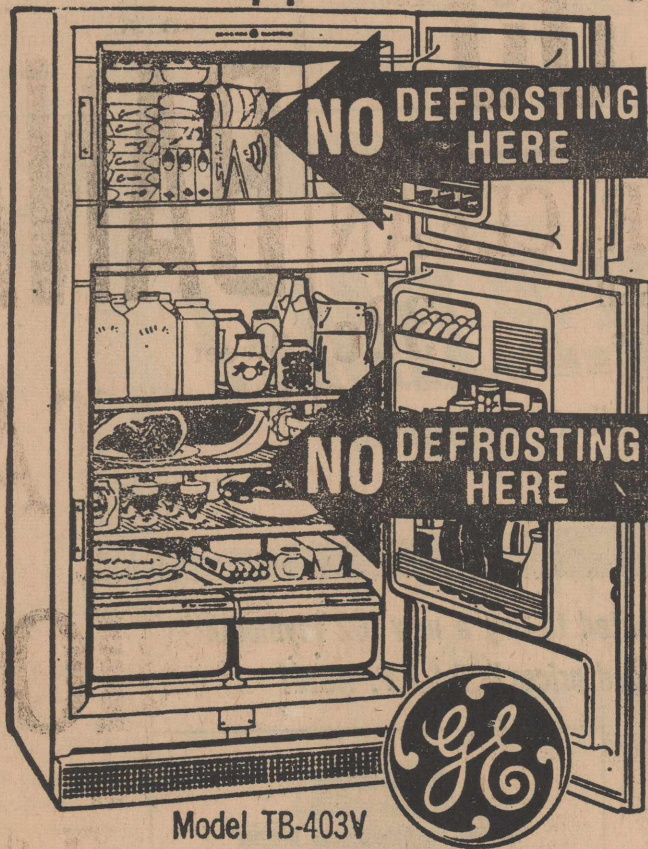

This is a last reminder to those of you who have not filed for the Federal Tax refund on gasoline used on the farm.

The period covered is from July 1, 1961, through June 30, 1962. The Federal tax on gasoline is at the rate of 4 cents per gallon.

The final filing date is on or before October 1, 1962.

Form 2240, used for filing a claim, are available at the local Extension office.

Officials of the Screwworm Eradication Program are hopeful that a recent absence of cases reported in certain counties within the sterile fly release reflects the effectiveness of the program.

In early July all counties within the sterile fly release area, which includes over 60 counties in southern Texas, reported some screwworm cases. Since that time, the number of counties in the release area reporting no screwworms has increased to more than 20 counties at the beginning of September.

Officials are hesitant to give complete credit to fly release since that period of hot weather usually results in fewer screwworm cases anyway, but they are watching the situation very closely to see if it does represent a definite trend.

The eradication program entails the production and sterilization of screwworm flies at the plant near Mission, Texas, and their release over infested areas. The sterile male flies mating with naturally-occurring females results in infertile eggs.

Program officials explain that originally the plan in 1962 was to contain the screwworm fly in the southern area of Texas where it normally overwinters and, by the release of sterile flies, prevent the insect from moving north. It was also felt feasible to release sterile flies in "hot spots" are areas outside of the overwintering area where screwworm cases were reported.

However, when it became obvious that the flies could not be contained, and because of a limited number of flies available, a sterile fly release area was established. Sterile flies are being dispersed from airplanes in this area at rates of 800-1,200 flies per square mile. Officials say they are hopeful of eradicating screwworm within this area, while winter weather kills all those in the northern areas. In addition, a 100 mile wide barrier zone will be established on the Mexico-United States Border where sterile

flies will be air dropped to prevent the northward migration of sterile flies into the U. S.

An important consideration in the machine harvesting of cotton, explains Fred Elliott, extension cotton specialist, is the use of defoliants or desiccants for preparing the cotton plant for the harvesting process. So far the desiccants will do the best job in our area. The 1962 "Texas Cotton Defoliation Guide" has more detailed information. Stop by the local extension office for a copy.

Moisture in seed cotton from humidity may not be seen or felt, but it is there, points out B. G. Reeves, extension cotton ginning and mechanization specialist. And, it limits the kind of job the ginner can do. Excess moisture in cotton usually results in the loss of grade and quality and can cost the grower as much as \$10 a bale.

These were a few of the points covered at the cotton harvesting meeting held at the Lance Theatre last Friday afternoon.
