#### Vents Remove **Moisture From Homes**

The approach of cool weather means harvest time, hunting sea son, and warm glowing fires and heaters. And heaters and open fla mes mean the return of the annual problem of sweating walls and windows, according to W. S. Aleen, extension agricultural Engineer, Texas A&M College.

A considerable amount of moisture is given off when open flame heaters are bruned, he says. When this moisture contacts a cold surface it condenses to a liquid state, the sweating you see.

To solve this problem all gas stoves, floor furnaces, central heating systems, gas refrigerators, dryers and water heaters should be rented, Allen says. This can best be done in a new house when it is built or when an old one is remodeled, but it is sometimes possible to vent space heaters through a closet or old chimmey. But some condensation will still occur if the open flame type heater is used. Allen also suggests the use of good insulation when new homes are bui-It and where practical it can be installed in older houses. Propedly venting of stoves, clothes dryers, water heaters, sinks, dishwashing areas and shower areas will solve the moisture problem in many homes. Check your appliances! today to see if they can be vented to prevent mildew and sweating in





"1. Believe In God, 2. Be of good charter, 3. Have a genuine liking for girls, 4. Have some spare time." These are the requirements for adult Girl Scouts. There are several vacanies which need to be filled. 1. Leaders and Co-Leaders. Each troop needs a leader and a coleader. They can not leave the Scout Hut or the grounds safety wise unless there is. 2. Troop Committee. In addition to the troop leaders, each troop needs a troop committee to register with the troop. Their job is to be responsible for parents meeting, do necessary telephoning and organize the needs of the troop. 3. Neighborhood chairman. This is a responsible position and should be considered as such. The purpose of the job is to keep Rotan Leaders informed of the District. Council and mational reports. She will attend one meeting per month in Sweetwater and in turn will hold one meeting per month with the Rotan leaders. She works with the neighborhood troop, organizer and consultant. These three make up the Service Team. They work with adults, but with the interest of the girls to the community, their needs, etc.

Perhaps if we couldn't fulfil the above, you as a Lodge, club or any organization could sponsor a troop. As a sponsor you extend opportunities and stability to a troop.

What the girls needs most is to know there is some one sharing their ideas and experiences. We have several copies of the Sponsorship Agreement Plan that we would like for every Organization, large or small, to read and study its contens.

You do not have to have a girl in Girl Scouts to be a member of the Adult Girl Scout Organization. If you can see that you can help in any way or know anyone that can, please call 4734 or a Girl Scout Leader, please.
