## AAU Women Invites Members

Fifteen colleges and Universities have been added to the list of institution meeting requirements for membership in the American Association of University Women, it was announced today by Membership Chairman of the Sweetwater Branch.

The addition of these institutions brings the AAUW list to 506 colleges and universities whose women graduates are eligible for membership.

To be recognized for AAUW membership, these institutions must maintain high academic standards and a substantial orientation to and foundation in the liberal arts, extend professional recognition to women on faculties and in administration, make adequate provision for women students, and maintain academic freedom.

"Membership in AAUW", said Mrs. John Woody, Branch President, provides an opportunity to join with other women college graduates in a practical, constructive contribution to the functioning of democracy, and in continuing intellectual growth." he AAUW has over 150,000 members in nearly 1500 branches located in 50 states, the District of Columbia, and Guam.

The Sweetwater Branch offers members a study-action program covering the fields of higher education, elementary and secondary education, international relations, social and economic issues, status of women, mass media, and the arts. The Association also supports a Legislative Program, voted by Delegates to its biennial conventions, and members participate in the Fellowship Program, which awards each year about 100 fellowships, with stipends amounting to about \$275,000, to women scholars for advanced study, including about 50 from other countries.

## Hammers Swamps Roscoe Plowboys

Rotan's Hammers drubbed Roscoe Plowboys here last Friday night, to the tune of 56-0, outclassing them in every respect.

Yellowhammers, running their season record to 6-1 and their District 6-A record to 2-0, ground the Plowboys under with a relentless offense and strong line play. High scoring Herron racked up three touchdowns himself and passed for four more six-pointers and two extra points to figure in 44 of Rotan's 56 points.

Rotan displayed a good passing game, completing eight of 12 tosses for 138 yards, and added 232 yards through ground work for total offensive yardage of 370. The Hammers accounted for 12 first downs and were forced to punt only once.

Rotan's stout defensive line held Roscoe to 69 yards rushing. The Plowboys gained 49 yards passing, completing six of 14 aerials, and made eight first downs.

Hammers started off with a bang, making 29 points in a hectic first quarter. The Yellowhammers took the opening kickoff on the Rotan 47, and five plays and 2:20 later had their first TD on a 26-yard jaunt around left end by Herron. End Bill Ashton kicked extra point. Shortly thereafter, Herron passed to Lennis Polnac for 11 yards and another six points. Ashton missed the kick.

Rotan rampaging continued when Bruce Baugh went one yard for a touchdown with 1:45 left. Polnac ran the two points. Following a Roscoe fumble on its 15, Herron passed to end Joe Garcia for a 15-yard scoring thrust, an Baugh added the two points.

In the second quarter, Herron zipped 70 yards on a punt return for the only TD in that period, and passed to Ashton for two points. With 4:00 gone in the third period, Herron capped a 36-yard march by going over from the two-yard line. The other score in that period came on a 21-yard pass from Herron Garcia. Ashton kicked point.

After holding Roscoe on its one-yard stripe, Rotan went 99 yards for a TD with seconds left in the game. Herron passed to Polnac for the last ten yards and a sixpointer. Extra points failed.

The Hammers play Coahoma here Friday night. Let's be there to back them.

County Agricultural Agent Texas A. & M. College Extension Service

Extension of the sterile fly release area and changes in the fly release rates were announced by officials of the Southwest Screw-worm Eradication Program last week. The latter will put a heavier burden of responsibility on individual livestock producers, James S. Norman, County Agent said.

An additional 10,000 square miles are being included in the fly release area in western Texas and the number of flies released will be stepped up in some areas and reduced in others. While definite release rates have been designated for all areas, this will tend to vary according to the number of confirmed screwworm specimens sent to the Mission laboratory for identification. Thus, says Norman, the producers, themselves, will largely determine how many flies they will get each week. This, of course, affects only those counties within the fly release area, he said.

The additional area is composed roughly of the territory encompassed by a line running west from the old line along the Sutton-Schleicher County line, passing just south of Ozona and Sheffield and continuing westward until it intersects with a line coming north from the U. S.-Mexico border and passing through Sanderson. This line could vary somewhat, officials have said.

This new release area will receive 600 sterile flies per square mile per week. The Edwards Plateau, surrounding territory where native flies exist in large numbers will receive 1,000 flies each week. The areas in southern Texas where fewer screw-worm cases are being detected will receive 400 flies per square mile each week.

Program officials will be watching the number of specimen confirmed as screwworms which sent in to the laboratory each week by livestock producers and livestock inspectors. This will largely determine whether the number of flies being dispersed in any area should be increased or reduced. So, says Norman, it is up to producers to check their livestock on a regular basis and send

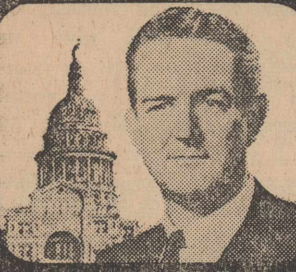

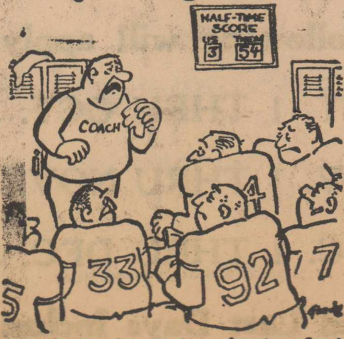

#### Social Security Can Be Checked

As the social security representative who comes to Rotan every other week, we want to give you an important reminder.

All of us are interested in our financial standing; therefore, we are always checking on our bank accounts, savings accounts, and on our other assets.

The Social Security Administration would like to remind you of another account -- one that should be checked from time to time. This, of course, is your social security account. This is especially important if you have more than one employer in the course of a year.

If you are one of the 9 out of 10 working Americans with Social Security card, the Social Security Administration is keeping a record of the earnings reported to your account. Year after year for as long as you work in employment covered by the social security law, regular reports of your earnings are sent to the Social Security Administration in Baltimore, Maryland, to be added to your own personal social security record. It is this personal work history that will be used to figure the amount of social security benefits payable to you and your family in the future.

Have you checked your social security record in recent years? Do you know whether all your earnings have been correctly credited to your social security account? If your answer is "no" to either of these questions, you should take action now.

Your Abilene Social Security office has a post card form with which you can request a statement of the earnings credited to your social security account or you can get one from me on my next visit. You need only fill it out, sign, stamp, and mail it. When you receive the statement, check it carefully.

If your own records, such as payroll slips, forms W-2 do not agree with the amounts shown on your social security earnings statement, you should write or visit your local social security office immediately. The time in which correction can be made is limited.

The representative will be at the City Hall on Wednesday, November 14, at 10:30 o'clock and will be glad to talk with you about your own social security account and its worth to you and your family.
