

# **Vets Loan Provisions**

Veterans holding permanent type Government insurance should be advised to consider the advantages of borrowing on the cash value of their policy rather than cashing in their policy when confronted with financial emergencies. This is one of the desirable features of having a permanent type policy and the insured may call upon this reserve at any time after the policy is at least one year old.

Policyholders should realize that they can borrow almost as much on their permanent policy as they would get by surrendering the policy for cash and thereby keep their policy in force. They can borrow up to 94 percent of the cash value of their policy.

The amount of cash value of each policy depends upon the amount of the policy and the length of time it has been in force. The policyholder will be granted a loan on his permanent plan policy for any amount up to 94 percent of the cash value of the policy at the time he makes application for such loan.

Such policy loans can be repaid in multiples of \$5 and interest is computed on the unpaid balance and is due annually on the anniversary date of the loan. Should the veteran die before repaying the loan in full, the unpaid balance is deducted from thepolicy proceeds before the beneficiaries are paid.

The important thing to remember is that once a Government insurance policy is surrendered for the full cash value, all protection ceases forever because the law prohibits a veteran taking out any new GI insurance, with few exceptions.

The six types of permanent insurance carry the policy loan provisions. The term insurance contracts do not provide for any loan benefits.

Interesting Statistics

The VA recently released some statistical information that should be of interest to Texans. They show that as June 30, 1962, there were approximately 1,109,000 veterans living in Texas. Of this number, 774,000 are veterans of World War II; 217,000 from the Korean conflict; 111,000 from World War I; and 7,000 others (which includes the Spanish-American War; Peacetime; and the Indian Wars. The average age of the various groups of veterans is as follows: World War II-43; World War I-68; Korean conflict-30; and others, including Peacetime-36.

This year nine such one-day demonstrations are being conducted--

The list includes nearly everyone associated with municipal sanitation--mayors, city commissioners, city managers, health officers, sanitarians, sanitation superintendents, public works directors, city engineers, county officials, members of civic organizations and citizens interested in community sanitation

and public health. Highlight of the meetings is a demonstration of collection trucks and sanitany landfill equipment and the correct method for using the equipment.

Sanitary landfill as opposed to other refuse disposal methods in Texas is one method which has considerable potentials in making sanitary refuse - disposal practice economically feasible for many communities.


Basically the method employs three steps -- the refuse is dumped in an excavated trench, it is compacted by heavy tractor equipment, and finally covered with compacted earth.

Garbage, rubbish, and ashes are disposed without nuisance, fire or public health hazards.

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
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

Increasing With Harvest visited Mrs. Burrow's sister, Thelcotton classing office in Abilene receipts from District 2, totaled approximately 15,850 samples last week. Although this is approximately twice the number of samples received the preceeding week, receipts are still below the sason normal. The primary reason for this of course is the harvesting in the area continued to be slow because of adverse weather of the preceding week. However, fields were drying and once again getting in good shape for both hand pulling and machine stripping. The Grades improved slightly over the previous week with a small percentage gain of Light Spot Grades, accompanied by a small percentage decrease of Spotted Grades. Two percent of the cotton classed as White, 58 percent was Light Spot, 39 percent was Spotted, 1 percent was below Grade. Middling Light Spot was the predominant grade making up 33 percent of the total.

Staple continued to run about the same a the previous weke. Breakdown by staple shows the following: 29-32, 12 percent; 15-16, 79 percent; 31-32, 7 percent 1 inch and longer, 2 percent.

Marketing activities continued to increase last week. Some average prices were: Middling Light Spot 15-16, 30.39; Middling Light Spot 29-32, 29.93; Strict Low Middling Light Spot 15-16, 29.36; Strict Low Middling Light Spot 29-32, 28.90; and Middling Spot 15-16, 28.85.

The most common problems for which cotton is reduced in grade when classifed are grass and bark. As more cotton is being machine gathered, these problems are becoming more serious.

Mechanical harvesters have a tendency t oharvest grass, as well as bark, along with the cotton. Maladjusted machinery, or stripping too soon after the plant is killed, causes most barky bales. If the stalk is dry, and machinery adjusted properly, barkies are rare.

Grass and bark are very difficult to seperate from the cotton. and their removal results in the loss of cotton which clings, probably a lower grade of finished product.

Since grass and bark lower the value of the lint after it is ginned, producers should improve their cultivating and harvesting practices in a manner which will do away with these costly foreign objects so common to the cotton industry.
